Well... I Dunno, But...

Not being the nature of man to criticize himself, we're at a loss to understand the criticism that some heap on their Chamber of Commerce when the Chamber of Commerce is the business people of the town.

If the Chamber of Commerce is spiritless, if it is inactive, if it fails to measure up to expectations, the critics should first sweep around their own doorsteps, because the inertia is nothing more than the reflection of their own indifference.

The spirit of a town is measured by the fire of its people, which fire is reflected in the organizations that they compose.

A Chamber of Commerce is not a one-man organization and all of the enthusiasm and efforts of any one individual can't force progress on a town when the people themselves are indifferent about that progress.

Every clear cut example of this very sort of this is the Ranger Airport deal. The Chamber of Commerce spent months of hard work bringing the airport plans to a point where they could be carried out and through no fault of that Chamber of Commerce, the airport is a dead pigeon.

Right now the Chamber of Commerce is cooperating with the city of Ranger, in an effort to improve the water supply of the town, if the people want it improved and after 18 years of listening to a constant howl about the inadequate and unwholesome water supply for Ranger, one naturally assumes that the people want something done about it.

No sir, you can't stuff progress down people's throats when they're agin' it themselves. And speaking of the water supply, two men who operate good sized businesses in Ranger with a considerable payroll, told us yesterday that another year of fighting the water shortage like the last one and they'll be looking for another town to operate in. And both of 'em can find plenty of towns that want 'em.

We hear an awful lot of howling about "taxes" in connection with the proposed water control district when as a matter of fact the operations of the district would be financed by revenue bonds and not by tax bonds. Bond companies have definitely stated that they would frown on any kind of tax bond purchases from this area and that the only hope of financing such a project would be through the revenue bond route.

Besides that, no bonds can be issued unless the people in the district vote them and the mere creation of a water district does not mean that bonds will be voted. If such bonds were voted they would be retired through the sales of water from any reservoirs that were built in the district, and the district has been designed to take in industries that are big water users.

And furthermore, if there were any taxes necessary, the rate would be so low that no one would be hurt and the taxes would automatically dissolve when the water revenue started coming in.

We were reminded Wednesday that it's about time to begin appealing to people with livestock, in town to make every effort to keep them fenced in to avoid destruction in the neighbor's new gardens and shrubs and flowers.

We were reminded that animals are just like fishermen, come the spring and they wanta get goin', and are likely to defy the fencing in.

Kidnapping Pair Seized By Police Near Palestine

Two 17-year-old youths have been seized by Palestine authorities in connection with the armed robbery and auto theft of a Breckenridge man Monday evening. Eastland County Sheriff J. B. Williams and Texas Ranger John Cope left for Palestine, Tex. this morning to return Hannon Gambrell and Dale Kellogg to Eastland.

Charges of armed robbery and car theft have been filed in Justice of the Peace court in Eastland.

A state wide pick-up had been ordered on the two youths who forcibly took Jimmy Cox on a wild ride ending in Cisco. There the boys drove off with Cox's car. Palestine authorities checked the license number of the stolen car and apprehended the pair.

The case comes under the jurisdiction of county authorities because the actual robbery took place in Eastland County. Cox picked up the hitchhikers near Gatesville.

They threatened him with a .38 caliber gun and forced him on the high-speed trip through DeLeon, Gorman, Carbon, Eastland and Cisco.

Student Balks At Expulsion

AUSTIN, Tex., March 24 (UP)—Wendell Addington, GI-student and member of the Texas state committee of the Communist party, said today he would resist in "the courts of law and in the higher court of public opinion" any attempt to oust him from the University of Texas.

Under terms of a resolution passed yesterday by the Legislature, presidents of state supported colleges and universities were ordered to purge their institutions of all Communists.

Dr. T. S. Painter, president of the University of Texas, announced that he intended to follow the "letter and the spirit" of the legislative mandate.

However, Addington charged in a statement that to "execute the letter of this proposal would be to investigate and expel every student and teacher who stands for peace, works for the rights of the negro people, seeks to curb monopolists, or who is suspected of harboring such dangerous thoughts."

He referred to the action as a "witch-hunt resolution," and added: "As for myself, I shall resist any attempt to expel me, both in the courts of law and in the higher court of public opinion."

THOUSANDS OF ACRES FLOODED AS MISSISSIPPI LEVEE BREAKS

BATON ROUGE, La. (UP)—The Mississippi river hammered a 150 ft. gap in the west bank levee three miles north of here before dawn today, flooded thousands of acres of rich delta land and forced some 200 persons to flee their homes.

Five hours after the sudden break, the gap had widened to 200 feet and state police reported the levee walls were being rapidly washed away. The little town of Port Allen, La., across from Baton Rouge, was threatened as refugees poured into it by car and on foot from the water-covered lowland areas.

U. S. Highway—190 west of Baton Rouge was reported under three feet of water and was closed to traffic. Police reported straggling refugees wading through the water toward Port Allen, some wrapped in blankets and carrying bundles of clothing and other belongings.

HOUSE KILLS EFFORT TO TRANSFER VET BONUS BILL

AUSTIN, March 24 (UP)—An effort to transfer a veterans bonus proposal to a more favorable committee was killed by the House today.

Rep. Jimmy P. Horany of Archer City, author of the proposed constitutional amendment, lost an attempt to switch consideration of his plan from the constitutional amendments committee to the committee on military and veterans affairs.

The vote was 71 to 50. Horany's measure had been scheduled for a hearing yesterday by the constitutional amendments committee.

However, he withdrew his proposal in favor of one by Rep. J. A. Benion of Wylie, which sent to a sub-committee after a two-hour hearing before some 700 veterans.

Members of the committee pumped life into Horany's measure long enough to send it to the sub-committee. The sub-group also was instructed to study a veterans loan fund amendment by Rep. Miller Walker of Beaumont.

The bonus fight followed return of a house-enacted basic science bill to the Senate floor for final action with recommendation for passage from the upper chamber's public health committee.

The bill would require practitioners of the healing arts to pass examinations in anatomy, bacteriology, chemistry, physiology, pathology and hygiene and public health.

The senate committee passed out the bill on a voice vote late last night without calling a supporter of the measure to the stand or questioning any of five witnesses who spoke against it.

One of the witnesses, Sen. W. H. Abbingdon of the Arkansas legislature, a country doctor for 56 years, said that things had happened in his state after the passage of a similar bill 20 years ago.

In Arkansas, he said, "small town doctors are getting extinct as the Dodo bird."

Approves Repeal Of Labor Law

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(UP)—The House Labor Committee today approved the administration's bill to repeal the Taft-Hartley Labor Act without changing a comma.

Rayburn, speaker of the House, was fettered down from Washington to put the icing on the political cake that will be cut tonight in the annual observance of the Democrats' Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner.

Fund raising was the purpose of the party, and indications were that some \$30,000 would result.

Something like two tons of barbecue, including a half chicken per person, and beef and lamb that will be passed on the side, were ready.

Tom Miller, mayor of Austin and general chairman of the affair, stressed that the dinner will be informal.

Paying guests will be seated, but sawdust will be on the floor. After the speaking, feuding factions of the party will join hands in square dancing.

Rayburn was scheduled to arrive by train shortly after noon. The subject of his talk was not announced.

It was reported that he would speak "off the cuff."

Connally Asks More ERP Money

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(UP)—Chairman Tom Connally of the Senate foreign relations committee today asked a \$5,580,000, 000 second-installment on the Marshall plan to bolster Western Europe against "the tawdry theories of Communism" and speed economic recovery.

Opening Senate debate on a 15-month renewal of the European Recovery Plan, Connally termed first year operations a success, but said the critical test lies just ahead. He said that fast action is "absolutely essential" because recovery funds will run out next week.

At the same time, he served notice on the 16 participating nations that the multi-billion dollar program will come to an end on schedule, in 1952.

Earlier, Connally told a reporter that it would be a "reckless gamble" to cut ERP spending substantially, and he reiterated this theme in his address to the Senate.

Notwithstanding, Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., and Hon. Charles H. McNair, R., Ind., have indicated they will support cutbacks.

Group Seeks To Push Road Work

China's new nationalist government sought today to hasten peace talks with the Communists.

Premier Gen. Ho Ying-Chin's Cabinet appointed a new five-man nationalist peace delegation and called upon the Communists not only to do likewise, but to fix the time and place at once for negotiations to end the civil war.

The Communist radio promised that peace negotiations would begin in the "very near future," but did not elaborate.

The new Nationalist peace delegation comprises Shao Li-Tze, former ambassador to Moscow; Chang Chih-Chung, who participated in past peace talks with the Communists; Huang Shao-Hsiung, former interior minister; Chang Shih-Chao, former justice and education minister and Li Chen, former president of Peiping Normal College.

Shao, Chang and Huang, were members of the former peace delegation appointed in January during the regime of premier Sun Fo.

Nationalist sources reported further large-scale Communist troop movements toward the Yangtze river, last barrier before the Nationalist capital, Nanking. Two-thirds of the 30 central China Communist armies were said to have reached front-line positions along the north bank of the Yangtze.

The Control Yuan, meantime, decided to summon former premier T. V. Soong, brother-in-law of retired president Chiang Kai-Shek from Hong Kong for questioning about the alleged disappearance of national Treasury funds. The control Yuan said \$2,000,000,000 (U. S.) worth of gold and silver in foreign exchange had vanished during Soong's one year as premier.

Other foreign news included: WARSAW (UP)—American press attache Chester Opal said he plans to leave Poland within ten days at the "request" of the Polish government. A government spokesman yesterday said that the U. S. information service office in Warsaw tried to "smuggle into Polish public opinion" ideas not connected with life in the United States.

BRUSSELS (UP)—The Belgian cabinet reportedly agreed to ask regent Prince Charles to dissolve Parliament next month and call new general elections.

BERLIN (UP)—German authorities said all goods produced in western Berlin for export henceforth will bear a "made in blockaded Berlin" stamp.

MOSCOW (UP)—Soviet newspapers trumpeted Communist party declarations against the Atlantic pact from Europe and the far east. Both the government newspaper Izvestia and the Communist Organ Pravda devoted full pages to the protests against the pact and to the forthcoming "peace conferences" in New York and Paris.

BUENOS AIRES—Thirty-five persons were arrested in connection with a riot yesterday between pro-Communism and pro-Tito Communists.

Several shots were fired at police during the riot, but there were no casualties.

LONDON—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin prepared to leave for Washington to sign the Atlantic treaty and to discuss the east-west cold war with secretary of state Dean Acheson. He will sail from South Hampton tomorrow.
