### Foreign Address Policy Rumored

WASHINGTON, March 25. — (UP)—President Truman may deliver a major foreign policy address here on April 4 when the North Atlantic Treaty is signed, administration sources reported today.

Mr. Truman announced late yesterday he would attend the historic treaty-signing ceremonies. He said Secretary of State Dean Acheson would sign the 20-year treaty for the United States.

While the formal program has not been completed, informants said tentative plans call for the President to make a 15-minute address before the actual signing begins. The chief executive has not yet approved the plan although he is expected to do so.

### GROUP EXPRESS OPPOSITION TO CREATION OF WATER DISTRICT

Firm opposition to the creation of the Eastland County Water District No. 1 was expressed by citizens of Ranger and surrounding territory at a meeting held Thursday night at 8 o'clock at the high school auditorium. About 70 persons attended the meeting.

Dr. R. H. Hodges presided at the meeting and introduced Frank Sparks of Eastland who explained details of such a district as he sees it and stated that the future is far too uncertain to undertake any such proposal.

Sparks stated that proposers of the district had said that the revenue from water sales in such a district would finance it, "but," he said, "we don't know who is going to buy this water except the city of Ranger."

In reply to queries, Sparks stated that the property owners of the district would have to vote on directors to control such a district and they would determine

### DEMOCRATIC PARTY AT AUSTIN NETS \$40,000

AUSTIN, Tex., March 25 (UP)—

House Speaker Sam Rayburn will take a \$40,000 check back to Washington to swell the Democratic party treasury and prove Jefferson-Jackson Day dinners in Texas are no small events.

The check was handed Rayburn after he delivered the principal address to 1600 Democrats at the annual fund-raising dinner, believed to have been the most successful in the state's history.

Each of the participants paid a minimum of \$25 for a plate of barbecued chicken, vegetables, ice cream and rum cake.

Rayburn and about 600 other Democrats sat in a barn adjoining a war-surplus B-29 hangar that was converted into a "mess hall" overnight. The remainder took seats in the hangar.

Rayburn told the Democrats that President Truman and others were working to bring about permanent peace. But he admitted frankly that he did not know what the future of the world situation would be.

"We can't look into the minds of dictators, and we can't pierce the stony heart of those ungodly people," he said. "As long as the wounds of the last war are unhealed, we must keep our powder dry."

Rayburn said he saw nothing to "indicate either a depression or recession."

Rayburn mentioned the touchy issue of state's rights twice.

He said he believed the federal and state governments would reach a compromise on ownership of tidelands.

"I've always believed that, and I believe now, that the tidelands of Texas to 10 1/2 miles offshore belong to Texas. Maybe something can be worked out about it."

He said he did not favor repeal of the poll tax law, "but I do not believe in Texas that a poll tax should be a prerequisite to voting."

The House speaker sat at a table

with Gov. Beauford Jester, Wright Morrow, National Democratic Committeeman of Texas; Byron Skelton, claimant to Morrow's position; Roy Baker, National president of the Young Democratic Clubs; Major Tom Miller of Austin, and about 40 state officials.

Miller received a loud cheer after reading a telegram from President Truman urging the Democrats to give "three cheers for Sam Rayburn" and said:

"We don't always agree with the gentleman, but we worship at the shrine of courage he shows."

Miller told the group he had received a contribution from a Corsican negro.

"We are eternally grateful to our Texas negroes," the mayor said.

Rev. Charles Summers, rector of St. David's Episcopal Church at Austin, gave the invocation, the late President Roosevelt's favorite prayer.

It asked for divine guidance for "justice and peace at home."

Thunderstorms were reported this morning over North Central Texas, the Panhandle and South Plains and low cloudiness in south and east Texas.

The Dallas Weather Bureau reported that its 8:30 A. M. observations disclosed showers at that hour at Amarillo, Lubbock, Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Abilene, Waco, and Dallas. San Antonio reported a drizzle and fog.

Considerable cloudiness will prevail over the entire state during the next 24 hours, the weather bureau said. At Dallas, a cold layer more than 5,200 feet thick darkened the sky to the extent that motorists were using headlights at midmorning.

Temperatures last night dipped as low as 33 degrees at Amarillo, but generally were much higher over the state. Laredo had an early-morning low of 74 degrees. Yesterday's high reported to the Dallas Weather Bureau was 89 at Laredo.

Scattered showers were predicted for East Texas tonight and Saturday and in West Texas this afternoon and tonight.

Because of the dark overcast this morning in Dallas areas, the Weather Bureau was literally swamped with calls from persons inquiring if a storm was brewing.

DALLAS, March 25 (UP)—A severe rainstorm accompanied by hail hit the Dallas area at 10 A. M. today.

### BULGANIN STILL DEPUTY PREMIER, IMPORTANT POLITBURO MEMBER

The Soviet armed forces got a new boss today.

Moscow announced that Marshal Nikolai A. Bulganin has been relieved of his duties as minister of the armed forces and the job taken over by his deputy, Marshal Alexander M. Vasilevsky.

However, Bulganin apparently retained his posts of deputy premier and member of the policy-making Politburo. It seemed to be just another case of Premier Josef Stalin relieving his top advisers of departmental duties to leave them free for policy-making and special tasks.

Bulganin is the fourth deputy premier and Politburo member to be relieved of a departmental portfolio within the past three weeks. Only one Politburo member Alexei N. Kosygin, remains in charge of a ministry. He is minister of light industry.

The 54-year-old Bulganin is one of Stalin's top administrators and trouble shooters. He served successfully as manager of the Soviet Union's largest electrical plant, mayor of Moscow and chairman of the State Bank before taking over from Stalin himself as minister of the armed forces in 1947.

Vasilevsky is a 47-year-old professional soldier who has been credited with master minding the Soviet victories at Moscow, Stalingrad and Leningrad during World War II. He is a former chief of staff of the armed force.

Other foreign news included: BERLIN—Brig. Gen. Frantisek Dastich, chief of the Czech military mission in Berlin, was revealed to have fled to Western Europe "some weeks ago," Col. Emil Busch, Czech military attaché in Berlin, also may have fled west.

FRANKFURT—Attempts to establish a western German state appear about to collapse. The Bonn Assembly of Western German political leaders has rejected bluntly recommendations of the 3 western military governors for revision of a draft constitution for the proposed new state.

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### Churchill Enjoys Capitol Salute

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25 (UP)—It was just one "Hiya Winnie!" after another from the time he arrived at Union station until he said good bye to President Truman at Blair House late last night.

Winston Churchill of Great Britain was back in town.

Although he was just unofficial visitor, Washington crowds followed him around, just as they did when he came here during World War II as Britain's fighting prime minister.

And he seemed to enjoy every minute of it. He bowed to the crowds. He puffed luxuriously on his inevitable, big black cigar. He gave his famous "V for Victory" sign.

The 74-year-old Churchill was still the Winnie of old.

Churchill, who stayed last night in the British embassy, was scheduled to return to New York this afternoon. He came to the United States primarily to speak next Thursday at the Mid-Century Convocation of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The former prime minister and Mrs. Churchill were guests of President and Mrs. Truman last night at a small, formal dinner party at Blair House, the President's temporary residence.

It was purely a social affair. No official matters were discussed.

### Eastland-Cisco Highway Planned

Proposed work on a new highway between Cisco and Eastland should get under way in a year's time, commented Highway Engineer E. M. Pritchard yesterday.

An authorization from Austin for the construction of the highway is awaited here. Plans call for a four lane highway to be built which entails reconditioning the old highway and adding two new lanes.

The County Engineering department has been working on many farm to market roads in the area. Contracts pending for June construction are:

A Rising Star-Carbon highway from Okra to an intersection with Highway 36, four miles east of Rising Star.

A stretch of road between Ranger and Caddo, three miles of which is in Eastland County.

About five miles of Highway 15, south of Strawn, from the Eastland Palo Pinto County line.

Construction of seven miles of farm to market road from Ranger to Cheney is expected in April. The road is rapidly nearing completion.

MISSISSIPPI BREAK THREATENS LOUISIANA FISHING VILLAGES

PORT ALLEN, La., March 25 (UP)—Flood waters swirling through a wide break in a Mississippi river levee today threatened to force complete evacuation of 1,000 to 1,500 residents of a bayou fishing settlement west of here.

At the same time, the Red Cross ordered 600 refugees spending the night in shelters here moved across the river to a Baton Rouge when water crept into the outskirts of town.

Brig. Gen. Raymond Huff, Louisiana's adjutant general and coordinator of disaster relief, ordered a helicopter reconnaissance of the 40-square-mile bayou area to begin at dawn.

He said the flood waters are now within nine miles of the thick cluster of fishing villages on the shores of Grosse Tete bayou and it may be necessary for the residents to flee their homes before they are completely cut off.

His decision will depend on the results of the air reconnaissance, Huff said.

### Sheriff Returns Jovial Youths To Eastland Jail

Sheriff J. B. Williams and Texas Ranger John Cope returned to Eastland about 8 P. M. last evening with Hanson Gambrell Jr. and Dale Kellog, accused of armed robbery and car theft. The pair was picked up by Palestine police and turned over to county authorities.

According to Sheriff Williams they both came from Colorado Springs, Colorado, en route to California seeking employment. After stealing the car from Jimmy Cox of Breckenridge they traveled to Palestine to borrow money from a relative there.

Williams stated they laughed and joked all during the trip to Eastland. They admitted they were sorry they committed the crime but were prepared to make the best of it, he said.

The youths, 16 and 17, had been questioned by police before in Colorado in connection with a previous car theft. While in Colorado Springs they purchased two revolvers, used in the robbery.

Pickrell radioed several messages to his office here after he made a hurried trip to Desdemona after learning of the disaster. He stated that the highway into Desdemona was debris littered.

It was stated that 17 homes were completely destroyed, many others damaged and the Magnolia and Rudeco Plants struck.

The Texas Electric Services Company has holdings at Desdemona as well as the Premier and representatives of those two companies were in the storm area soon after the wind struck.

**WICHITA FALLS, March 25 (UP)**—Wichita Falls today was admonished to better its housing situation if it wants to improve Sheppard airforce base's enlistment troubles.

Brig. Gen. John H. McCormick, Sheppard commanding officer, said only 19 percent of his personnel were satisfied with the present housing setup.

Sheppard has the lowest re-enlistment rate of any airforce in the training command.

The 16-year-old boy readily admitted having part of the burglary loot, but he wasn't so sure about the smallpox.

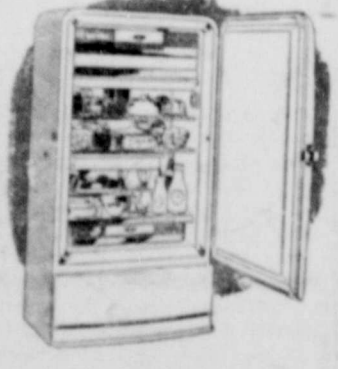

## Woman Asks \$100,000 From Oil Magnet

**CHICAGO, March 25 (UP)**—Mrs. Beatrice Williams Brown, 30, today demanded a \$100,000 settlement in a divorce suit against millionaire oilman and former Harvard football star, Thomas M. Brown, 51, who she said is her common-law husband.

Attorney Charles A. Boyle filed suit in Superior Court to dissolve the common-law marriage allegedly contracted in Texas in 1940.

Boyle said that Texas recognizes common-law marriages, and Illinois recognizes the legality of such marriages contracted in Texas.

Mrs. Brown said in the suit that she divorced her former husband, Robert K. Williams, and entered into the common-law marriage with Brown. She said she lived with Brown until he joined the Army in 1942, and then lived with him at various posts where he was stationed.

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## WYMAN, OLIVIER QUEEN AND KING OF HOLLYWOOD

HOLLYWOOD, March 25 (UP)—Jane Wyman, a Missouri song-and-dance girl, and Sir Laurence Olivier, a knighted Britisher, were the new "king and queen of the movies" today. Their coronation last night as the "best actress" and "best actor" of the year came as a surprise to partially nobody at the 21st annual academy award ceremonies.

The experts had them pegged for months as top favorites in the "Oscar" derby. Sir Laurence won the coveted award for his "Hamlet", which received five citations, including best picture of the year.

Miss Wyman, who used to play beautiful but dumb chorines, switched to a deaf-and-dumb role in "Johnny Belinda" and won hands down.

Pert and beauty in a clinging white gown, she picked up her

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producer of "Johnny Belinda," and then flung her white ermine wrap over her shoulders and whisked away to the Mocambo and a party in her honor.

Sir Laurence is in London and accepted his award by proxy. His was a double victory. "Hamlet," which he directed and produced as well as starred in, also snagged an "Oscar," as the best picture of the year. This is the first time a British movie walked off with top honors, although the academy handed Oliver a special award two years ago for his producing-directing-acting job in "Henry V."

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
