We just plain nearly busted with pride Wednesday afternoon when we went out for an inspection of the Community Clubhouse that has undergone the most wonderful face lifting through the concerted efforts of Ranger women and men. And they tell us that the men really got in on it through donations and just honest to goodness labor.

The club meeting room has been beautifully furnished by the 1920 club with no stone unturned nor no dollar spared. It has been carpeted with a beautiful rose beige rug. There is an antique drop leaf table in walnut that would make any home lover green with envy and two hand carved chairs that would do for the king.

Through the courtesy of Mrs. Bob Hodges and her antique shop, marble top tables, lamps and vases have been loaned for the duration of the current convention of clubwomen. A Betsy Ross flag painting has been loaned by Mrs. Ross Hodges and a hand painting of the country club has been loaned by Mrs. John M. Gholson who also loaned a rug for the foyer.

Mr. and Mrs. Felton Brasher Sr. have given a beautiful floor lamp; a handsome gold framed mirror is a gift from Mr. and Mrs. J. Floyd Killingsworth; Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Wylie have donated waste baskets and a mirror for the powder room; Jack Williams painted the sign "Community Clubhouse and Library" across the front and a front porch light has been added.

The grounds of the clubhouse look like a picture out of "House Beautiful," thanks to the efforts of Mrs. H. C. Henderson and the numerous people that have contributed flowers and shrubs for the grounds. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Houghton have given a little white fence that marks one corner of the grounds and serves as a "keep off" sign to thoughtless people.

Thanks to the New Era Club the house has a complete set of crystal for 100; the 1947 Club started the ball to rolling for the 100 piece setting of silver with a donation of \$50 and the Civic League completed the pot and the Board of Control of the Clubhouse selected the silver and also the 100 piece setting of china which was paid for by contributions from Ranger women.

But after all there wouldn't have been any inspiration for all of this giving and efforts nor any place to put all of the gifts if it hadn't been for the mayor and city commission that built the clubhouse and presented it to the women of Ranger. Those men were Mayor J. J. Kelly, and commissioners Edwin George, V. V. Cooper, Jr., L. E. Gray, and A. L. Stiles. George Murphy, then fire and police chief, supervised the work of constructing the building and got in a few extra fixings to please the women, and E. T. Eubank, then city secretary put in a good many hours helping out.

The present commission completed the job and has continued to cooperate with the women of the town in bringing the center to its present completeness. They are Mayor Lee Dockery, and Commissioners Hershel Angus, V. V. Cooper, Jr., A. L. Stiles, and A. H. Powell. Lester Crossley, city secretary has been the untiring friend to the clubhouse and library.

And we've only had the clubhouse a little less than two years.

SEVEN COUNTRIES RECALL AMBASSADORS, MINISTERS

BELGRADE, March 31 (UP)—Russia and its Cominform satellites have quietly withdrawn their ambassadors and ministers from Yugoslavia in a diplomatic boycott of their Communist former ally.

The boycott came to light today when a poll of the Soviet, Bulgarian, Romanian, Czech and Polish embassies and the Hungarian and Albanian legations disclosed that all heads of missions left Belgrade from three weeks to three months ago.

All the countries participated last year in the explosion of Yugoslav slavia from the Cominform and the dunciation of Marshal Tito's government as Trotskyist.

Other developments in Yugoslavia's worsening relations with its Communist neighbors included the:

1. An announcement that the Greek rebel government would be broadened to include Bulgarians, Albanians and dissident Yugoslavs as part of a "United Macedonia" movement.

Bagwill Given Life Sentence

STEPHENVILLE, Tex., March 31 (UP)—Seventeen-year-old Robert C. Bagwill sat in his jail cell today and despite facing life in the penitentiary said he was "happy."

Bagwill was given the life sentence last night after being found guilty of the pistol slaying of service station operator, Crockett C. Ross during a holdup on the outskirts of Stephenville last Jan. 28.

The 29th District Court Jury, composed of 11 Erath County farmers and a Stephenville grocery clerk, was out only one hour and 58 minutes. Judge Ernest O. Belcher imposed the life penalty 27 minutes later, at 8:32 P. M.

The state had sought the death penalty at the tension-packed trial and Bagwill afterward told reporters he was "very happy" about the life verdict.

Meanwhile Dan White, 47-year-old ex-convict who is Bagwill's uncle, awaited action today on his separate trial for the filling station murder. Judge Belcher was expected to set White's trial date today.

White is the man whom Bagwill claimed acted as his "crime tutor." Bagwill and White were arrested in Vernon after a search that extended into Oklahoma. Bag will later detailed to officers a six-month series of holdups.

The slim youth claimed that White had spurred him to the crimes and sat outside the victims' establishments while he (Bagwill) performed the actual "stick ups."

J. Ross Rucker of Eastland is president of the club.

Want Hoover Investigated

WASHINGTON, March 31.—(UP)—A group dominated by new deal Democrats called on the Senate today to investigate Director J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI on charges that he violated the law by tapping telephone wires.

The charge was based on the following statement by Hoover in a recent issue of the Yale Law Journal.

"It is no secret that the FBI does tap telephones in a very limited type of cases with the express approval in each instance of the attorney general, but only in cases involving espionage, sabotage, grave risks to internal security, or when human lives are in danger."

The request for an investigation was addressed to chairman Pat McCarran, D., Nev., of the Senate judiciary committee in a letter signed by Paul A. Porter, Joseph L. Rauh Jr., and Wendell Berge, of Americans for Democratic Action, and Roger Baldwin, James Lawrence Fly and Arthur Garfield Hays of the American Civil Liberties Union. Porter and Fly are former chairmen of the Federal Communications Commission which consistently has battled against wire tapping by the FBI under any circumstances.

Bob Emfinger Loses Right Arm

Bob Emfinger of the Morton Valley Community lost his right arm in an accident in Eastland this morning and attending physicians reported this afternoon that he is resting very well at the Ranger General Hospital in Ranger where he was rushed after the accident.

Doctors reported that the arm had to be removed just above the elbow on the right arm.

According to reports of the accident, Emfinger was drilling a water well at the home of Wade Messagale on South Basnet street in Eastland when his arm became entangled in the machinery and was mangled.

Parents Urged To Register Children

An appeal has been issued to all parents who have children who will be six years old before the first of September to register those children with the school census taker, J. R. Ervin.

Dr. G. C. Boswell is issuing the appeal stated that each child that becomes six before that date will add another \$50 to the school allotment from the state.

He urged that all such parents act at once to attend to the matter.

### RANGER DOWNS GORDON IN CLOSE BASEBALL GAME

The Ranger High School baseball team took a close one from the Gordon team Wednesday afternoon before a large crowd of local baseball fans here in Ranger. It was a close ball game all the way and one that kept the fans holding their breath.

Billy McKinney, the promising young left hander, started on the mound for Ranger and worked the entire seven innings to receive credit for the win. He allowed only two hits, of the scratch type, fanned ten, and gave up six walks. Hamrick's triple, Hale's double and Stiles and Cunningham's singles accounted for Ranger's hits. Gibbs of Gordon worked on the mound for his team and limited Ranger to 4 hits, but his wildness in the fifth inning cost him the ball game.

McKinney got off to a good start by striking out the first two batters to face him and forcing the third to ground out, third to first. Gibbs followed his example, and didn't allow a single Ranger player to reach first. In the first of the second McKinney ran into trouble when after retiring the first two batters Elkins beat out an infield hit and took second on an error by catcher Robinson. McKinney walked the next Gordon man and then settled down and struck out McMordie to retire the side.

Ranger also threatened in the second after Robinson struck out Munnerlyn walked and took second on a wild pitch and Hamrick was hit by a pitched ball. Wilson popped out trying to bunt and Stiles was out on a high fly to the third baseman. Neither team could score in the third and the game remained scoreless. McKinney walked Boggus to start off the fourth inning. McKinney struck out Segars as Boggus stole second. Elkins reached first on Stiles' error. Boggus scored from second on the lead throw and Elkins took second as the play was made for Buggus at home. Boggus stole third and then scored on a passed ball by catcher Robinson.

McKinney took control of the situation and struck out the next two men to face him to retire the

side. Hale started the rally for Ranger in the last of the fourth by slapping a clean double down the third base line. Hale took third on a bad throw by the left fielder. Gibbs got Robinson on a pop fly and struck out Munnerlyn to leave Ranger with a man on third and two away. Buddy Hamrick came through with a solid blow that carried the ball down the left field line and hooked into foul territory. It went for three bases and scored Hale from third to make the score 2 to 1. Gibbs hit Wilson to put him on first and Stiles hit a clean single between third and short to score Hamrick. Gibbs then struck out McKinney to retire the side and leave the score knotted 2 all. Gordon couldn't get anything started in the fifth despite two walks and a stolen base.

Cunningham led off for Ranger in the last of the fifth with a single and then stole second. Simpson went out on a long fly to center field which advanced Cunningham to third. Munnerlyn struck out and Cunningham came home on a bad throw. Robinson walked and was thrown out trying to steal. McKinney took advantage of his one run lead and retired Gordon three up three down for the remaining two innings. Gibbs didn't give Ranger anything from good then on so the ball game ended Ranger 3 Gordon 2.

# SYRIA OPENS DOORS AFTER BLOODLESS COUP BY ARMY

DAMASCUS, Syria, March 31 (UP)—Syria, under firm army control after a bloodless coup yesterday, reopened its frontiers and communications today and reportedly was preparing to go ahead with armistice talks with Israel.

and ousted Premier Khaled El-Azam and his cabinet lifted the strict curfew in Damascus. Shops reopened and life in the capital was back to normal.

Traffic was resumed across Syria's borders with Lebanon and Trans-Jordan. Telephonic communications cut when the coup was launched also were resumed.

Hundreds of students marched through Damascus streets waving banners and cheering the "liberation" of their country.

Deposed President Shukri Al-Kouwatly, along with Premier Al-Azam and government ministers, was held in a Damascus hospital. Reliable reports from other middle eastern capitals said Syria's delegates to the United Nations, Faris El-Khoury and Emir Adel Arslan, have tried in vain to persuade Al-Kouwatly to resign.

His resignation would pave the way for a completely new government. Unconfirmed reports said army leaders of the coup planned to hand over temporary control of the country to a provisional government headed by El-Khoury, a former premier, and former President Hashem El-Atassi.

Meantime, Col. Husni Al-Zaim, Army chief of staff and commander of the Gendarmarie, continued at the head of a military junta ruling the country.

(Reports from middle-eastern capitals said Al-Zaim has decided to dissolve the Syrian parliament and call country-wide elections within 20 days to form the basis for a constitutional government.)

Informed sources said Al-Zaim was preparing to go ahead with armistice negotiations with Israel under United Nations auspices. El-Azam's government had agreed last week to enter into negotiations with Israeli covering the northeast sector of the Palestine front.

U. S. Marine Gen. William Ripley, chief of staff to acting UN Palestine mediator Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, arrived in Damascus Tuesday night almost simultaneously with the start of the coup for an attempt to arrange the Syrian-Israeli talks.

It cost \$2,000,000,000 and 2 1/2 years intense work by 100,000 physicists and chemists to perfect the first atomic bomb.

## Body Of Singer Recovered Today

BEAUMONT, Tex., March 31. (UP)—The body of Buddy Duhon, 34-year-old singer, was found early today in Jap Bayou near Fannett, Tex., after a three-day search.

Duhon sank in the rain-swollen waters Monday night while on a fishing expedition with a friend, M. F. Sterling of Beaumont. Sterling told police the light boat became entangled in fishing lines and capsized in the swift current.

Fisherman John L. Colville of Nederland discovered Duhon's body, lodged in branches of a willow tree some 50 yards downstream from the bridge on Galveston-Beaumont highway 124. Duhon sang for the last seven

## 1 Dead 2 Hurt In Plant Explosion

MADILL, Okla., March 31 (UP)—One man was killed and two others were critically hurt last night in a blinding explosion which rocked the Warren Petroleum Corp. plant, on the shore of Lake Texoma 19 miles east of Madill.

J. S. Green, 47, plant chemist, died of burns 15 minutes after reaching the hospital here. F. E. Thompson, 46, plant superintendent, and Arnold Heinrich, 40, pump operator, were reported in critical condition in the hospital.

Foy C. Reid, 41, a plant repairman, is hospitalized with less serious injuries and J. J. Mahan, another employe, has been released after treatment for face and hand burns suffered when he pulled Green from the fire.

Three others were sent home after treatment for less severe burns.

H. W. Hartus, Warren Vice-President in charge of manufacturing, said a section of pipe in a plant unit broke, causing the blast. Observers said the flash was visible in downtown Madill and across Lake Texoma.

The plant is one of 16 operated by the company in Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Indiana and Illinois, processing natural gas

# HOW TO SPEND \$10,000 IF YOU HAD ONE YEAR TO LIVE

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 31 (UP)—If you had only one year to live and \$10,000, how would you spend the time and money?

That is the question a 51-year-old Oklahoma City widow asked today.

A retired business woman, she has worked hard for 17 years to build up a modest fortune. Now she has learned a heart ailment will probably end her life within a year.

"I've worked and sacrificed a long time for security," she said. "But I haven't had any fun. I never learned how to spend money."

She has more than the \$10,000. But that's the amount she picks at random to give her grim "fling" the flavor she feels her life so far has missed.

Her daughter, married and living in California, will be well provided for. If death delays its arrival, the \$10,000 won't be needed. So how to spend it?

"The first thing people think of is travel," she said. "But you think, what's the use?"

"You talk to a preacher and he tells you to give it to the church or to some needy people. Maybe I'm selfish, but I can will money for those purposes. I want to spend it now on myself. I want to plan a way to spend the money so every day I will know what I'm going to do that day."

"What would you buy if you went on a shopping tour? New clothes. They don't interest me. A new home. A new car? The one I have is in good condition."

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"I just know somebody, somewhere, will have a better idea than I have."

Yes, she has thought of marrying. Her first husband has been dead since the first World War, and she lives with a Pekinese dog. "I am terribly lonely," she concedes. "But I would want to know someone pretty well before I thought of marrying him."

Even if she finds the right man,

however, she won't leave her estate to him. He will just help spend the \$10,000.

With the warning of her death, the anonymous widow, named Mrs. Heart by the Daily Oklahoman here, has found fate playing its tricks with fine irony.

"I've lost all fear," she said. "I used to be afraid to travel by plane—made me ill. But now it doesn't bother me at all."

"And another strange thing. I play cards sometimes, and I used to lose at poker all the time. Now I'm a consistent winner. I can't lose. If I spend \$10 or \$15 on a dinner, I win it back. I just tell my friends my luck has changed."

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
