

HOUSE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS OVER 5 MILLIONS SLASH BACK

WASHNGTON, April 11 (UP)—The House Appropriations Comnittee today cut budget estimates for Veterans by \$508,75060, but recommended full speed ahead on the veterans hopital construction program.

Most of th cuts were made in military pensions and GI readjustmenubenefits. Pensions were reduced by \$222, 089,000 and G benefits by \$244,167,000.

The reductin in Veterans' spending was the largest recommended y the committee in approving funds for 28 independent tovernment agencies for fiscal 1950 beginning July 1. Angether, the committee voted \$7,576,886,-231 to run the agncies, about 10 per cent less than was asked by the Budet Bureau.
