WASHINGTON, April 12 (UP)—President Truman to-day sent the North Atlantic Treaty to the Senate for ratification as a step "on the road to peace" within the framework of the United Nations.

In a message to the Senate, Mr. Truman called the pact 'a great advance toward fulfillment of the unconquerable will of the people of the United States to achieve a just and enduring peace.

By indirection, the chief executive rejected criticism from Russia that the pact contravenes the United Nations

He said the 12 signatory nations through the pact would exercise their right "of collective or individual self-defense against armed attack" in accordance with article 51 of the

He added that the defense treaty is subject "to such measures as the (UN) Security Council may take to main-

tain and restore international peace and security.' Originally, Mr. Truman planned to send the pact to the Senate with a mere letter of transmittal. Over the weekend he decided to draft a major






