In addition, it will be made illegal to possess these drugs outside of the legitimate channels of commerce in them, to discourage peddling asd illegal distribution of the drugs.

This is an important bill in removing temptation from our youth and in removing a means of destruction in our society, and I am proud to be associated with its enactment.

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



Plains Memorial Hospital Offers New Lab Service

Plains Memorial Hospital is offering a new service known as, PKU test, performed by the laboratory announces Stanley Kennedy, lab tech

This test is given to detect early mental deficiency in infants which can be cured through a special dieting program. The test is performed by taking a sample of blood and running a special test on each newborn at Plains Memorial Hospital.

The PKU test will show if there is an early indication of an excess of PKU (phenylketonuria). If an excess of PKU is noted in the blood test the child will eventually become mentally retarded. An excess of PKU can be remedied with a year of special dieting. If this condition is discovered at infancy, it can be corrected and the child will have a normal development during child-hood. This condition is inferied. It has been discovered mainly in the

It costs about \$1500 a year to put the child on a treatment routine which includes a special diet to correct the situation. If the child has already reached the stage of mental retardation, it will cost \$7,000 a year for treatment and care.



Archie Brown, an open and avowed Communist for more than a quarter of a century, served on the executive board of Local 10 of the ILWU in 1959, 1960, and 1961. In 1961 he was indicted for "knowingly and wilfully serving as a member of an executive board of a labor organization, while a member of the Communist Party, in wilful violation of Title 29, United States Code, Section 504." tion. .while a member of the Communist Party, in wilful violation of Title 29, United States Code, Section

> A jury found Archie guilty and he was sentenced to six months' impri-sonment. The Court of Appeals held that Section 504 of Title 29 USC viothat Section 504 of Title 29 USC violated the First and Fifth Amendments to the Constitution, and reversed the conviction. The case was presented to the Supreme Court. That Court, in an opinion written by Chief Justice Warren on June 7, 1965, held that the statute was a bill of attainder and therefore violated Article I, Secion 9, of the Constitution, and affirmed the decision of the Court of Appeals setting aside the conviction. This was a split decision, being five for setting aside the conviction and four dissenting. The following Justices: White, Clark, Harlan, and Stewart, disagreed with the conclusions of Chief Justice Warren and the other four members of the Court. The Archie Brown decision will, in

The Archie Brown decision will, in my opinion, go down in the history of this country as one of the most infamous decisions rendered by the Supreme Court. It will, I hope, crey to force remedial action.

try to force remedial action.

Those of us in the Congress who have long challenged the advisability of the absolute power in the Supreme Court to declare acts of Congress unconstitutional look upon this decision as a perfect example of the tragedy against which we have long warned. The decision in this case, to see from a well known and avowed. set free a well-known and avowe Communist who had openly and flag-grantly violated a Federal law, was based primarily on a misconstructio and a misinterpretation of the term.
"bill of attainder." I have long argued that, if this can be done, there is no limit to the power of the Su-preme Court of the United States. Such decisions are final and not ap-

This problem can be solved by the This problem can be solved by the people, through a Constitutional Amendment liniting the power of the Supreme Court with regard to declaring legislative acts unconstitutional. In the meantime, those of us who have long sought a solution short of amending the Constitution will of amending the Constitution, will continue to search for means and methods through statutory provision to stop the dangerous course represented by the decision in the cas of the United States v. Archie Brown
