POST OFFICE, 3 BUSINESS FIRMS BURGLARIZED EXPLOSIVE USED TO KNOCK SAFE

Safecrackers made a haul of approximately \$1,100 at Carbon, located 10 miles south of Eastland, after entering the post office and three business houses Friday night.

The Carbon Post Office reported between \$400 and \$500 taken and the Carbon Trading Co., \$600. Two other business houses—Carbon Drug Store and Ben Stephenson's Grocery Store—were entered, but owners had not discovered anything missing from their firms.

Public Lands For Sale In Eastland County

AUSTIN.—State Land Commissioner, Bascom Giles, states there is still public land for sale in Texas.

RUSSIANS AGREE TO KEEP HANDS OFF BRITISH BOATS

BERLIN, April 30 (UP)—The Russians agreed today to keep hands off British barges in Berlin's waterways and released three British soldiers seized last night while they were trying to retrieve livestock from Soviet zone rustlers.

The Soviet action removed two minor obstacles that had threatened to complicate Anglo-Russian relations at a time when lifting of the Berlin blockade appeared imminent.

Deputy Sheriff Solomon said the burglars evidently had circled around the post office several times in an automobile as fresh tire marks were visible. Recent rains had left the ground in a soft condition, with a good set of the marks preserved.

F. J. Stubblefield, owner of the Carbon Trading Co.—a large mercantile store—stated that approximately \$600 in currency and change was taken from his safe. The huge safe had been blown open by an explosive, the exact nature not being determined. The contents were ransacked and left strewn on the floor in front of the safe. Entrance had been gained to the building after the lock on the door had been pried off.

E. R. Yarbrough, owner of the Carbon Drug Store, had not discovered any valuables taken from his business. Entrance had been made through the front door, with the burglars going out the back door. Indications were the culprits had a more difficult time getting out, than getting into the building—as a large two-by-four board had been used to prise open the door. Authorities were keeping their fingers crossed in hopes that a set of fingerprints could be secured from the board.

Ben Stephenson's Grocery Store had been entered, after the lock had been pried off the front door, but the owner reported nothing missing. A safe, which had been burglarized last year, was not disturbed. Stephenson said he believed the burglars did not go back into the building as the cash register had some change in it and he had some "folding money" cached in a paper sack.

PRICE OF SYNTHETIC OIL NEAR COMPETITION WITH PETROLEUM

WASHINGTON, April 30 (UP) — Diesel oil and jet fuel of high grade have been produced synthetically at a cost "very close to, if not already" competitive with regular petroleum products, a government expert said today.

Stewart said the synthetic jet fuel even "in some ways surpasses" military standards.
The development of the two fuels from so-called oil shale, he said, dispels doubts that this country's vast reserves of untouched shale could ever be used for the economic production of high-grade synthetic products.

Stewart said the synthetic fuels were produced by a joint government-industry project. The oil shale was mined and processed at the bureau's Rifle, Colo., and Laramie, Wyo., demonstration and experiment plants and refined by an industrial plant which he is not free to name.

Gasoline and other petroleum products can be refined from the Diesel oil, Stewart said.

Stewart said the bureau is convinced that the shale products can be produced at a cost competitive with petroleum products. This could not be proved, he said, however, until a commercial plant undertook the job. The government plants are not large enough to turn out products in commercial quantities.

No blending with petroleum products was necessary to get the high-grade output, Stewart said. The synthetics were produced wholly from a deposit known technically as marlstone. This mineral has been dubbed "shale" by government and industrial petroleum experts.

The pores of the rock hold a substance known as kerogen, which can be turned into an oil by heating it to more than 800 degrees Fahrenheit. One ton of shale can produce up to 50 gallons of oil.

Why would he testify in your presence that he made a quick trip to Fort Worth on the morning of the killing after he told the grand jury he never left the house," the District Attorney asked the jury. Here's why. He learned that Floyd Simpson would testify and he knew Simpson would say he gave Hester a ride out to the house on that morning.

In his rebuttal, Defense Attorney Jack Love made a personal attack on Longview Attorney Fred Erisman, a special prosecutor in the case and an ex-student and personal friend of Lord. He accused Erisman of "flying to Cleburne in his big airplane" in an attempt to vindicate Lord's character rather than try a person for murder.

Pointing to Hester, Love told the jurors: "there, but for the Grace of God, could be your boy or mine."

Both sides rested yesterday after Hester testified he was "sorry, he killed the Dean."
Hester, who has pleaded innocent, said he did not know he had killed Lord when he attacked him with a metal rod March 8. He said he first learned of his guardian's death March 12 when he was arrested in Los Angeles at the home of a sister.

Lord's body was found after his absence from TCU for two days caused concern.

Truman Misses April Pay Check

WASHINGTON, April 30 (UP) — President Truman faced a payless payday today because Congress failed to appropriate money for his \$12,500 April pay check.

Last January the lawmakers boosted Mr. Truman's salary to \$100,000 a year plus a tax-free \$90,000 expense account. But so far they haven't bothered to vote funds to pay him the extra money.

Mr. Truman's April salary check normally would arrive at the White House no later than today, the last day on the month. However, the presidential payroll fund now has only \$4,167 in it, and there isn't any chance of Congress making up the difference because it isn't in session today.

But as long as he is president, Mr. Truman will be ineligible to receive his pension. Federal law prohibits government officials from drawing "dual compensation" from the treasury.





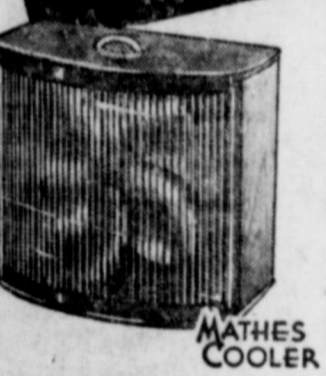

Says U. S. Must Prove Beliefs To Communism

HOLLYWOOD, Fla., April 30 (UP)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt believes that the Democracies should prove their belief in Democratic ideals if they hope to draw the masses of Europe and Asia away from Communism.

She told the General Federation of Women's Clubs here last night that "if we fail in moral and spiritual leadership, we will lose the battle against Communism."

"The battle ground against Communism is Europe and Asia which have never known freedom," the president's widow said, "therefore Russia need not mention it to them and stresses security and equality."

"The day may come when the Russians will be convinced that we are strong in our beliefs and they will have to cooperate because they have to live in the same world. But this will not occur until we demonstrate that our faith is so strong in our beliefs is so strong that we always try to live up to what we talk about."

Mrs. Roosevelt, who made the final address of the Federation's 58th annual meeting, said that the Soviet's practice of racial equality "is one of Russia's greatest weapons against the United States." Racial discrimination is "no longer 'our own private business,'" she said.

She also recommended admission to this country of more travelers from abroad, so that they might see for themselves, and take the word back home, what the United States is really like.

Rio Grande flood victims totaled an even dozen today with the drowning of two Mission farmers.

The men — J. C. Copeland, about 40, and Hally Langford, about 58 — drowned when their boat turned over about 100 feet from the shore near Mission.

Matamoros police pulled five unidentified bodies from the Rio Grande during the past week. Five other persons previously had been accounted for.

At Matamoros, Mexico, police ordered special patrols to walk the water front and keep residents from the treacherous Rio Grande.

No lives were endangered by the Guadalupe, which crested at 28 feet at midnight Friday, and San Antonio at the same time at Tivoli. The Rio Grande crested Thursday night.

Copeland and Langford had paddled to inspect their cotton in Copeland and Langford had a section cut off by backwater.

They lost their directions on the return trip and attempted to turn their boat around. It overturned, casting them into the water.

Although the current was not swift, the men became panicky and shouted for help to a man standing on the river bank. He

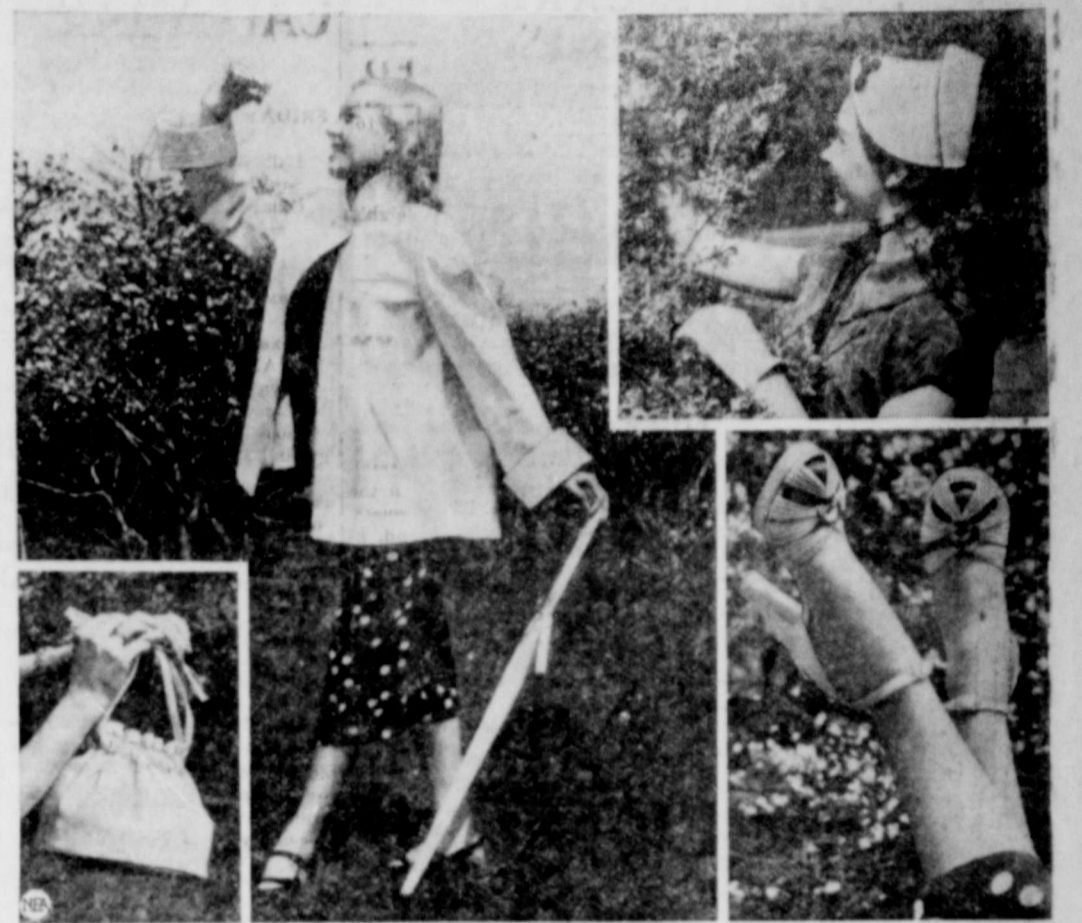

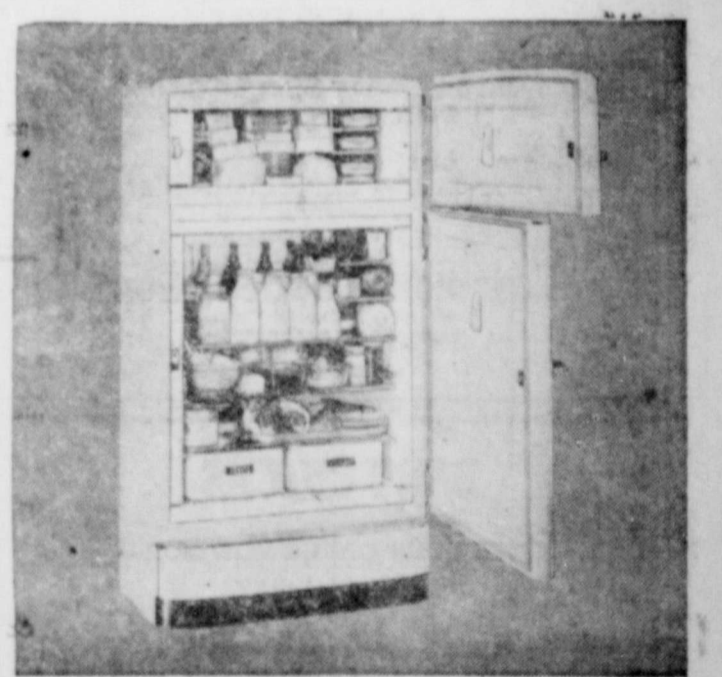

"WHAT CONSTITUTES GOOD CITIZENSHIP"

The bombs continued to fall on my town in Germany. I trembled as I ran, crouched low, trying to find shelter among the rubble. I could hear the crashing of buildings and the cries of small, defenseless children. As I saw the town fall about me I knew that somehow, some way, I must get away from the things which caused bombings, and other tragedies of war.

I looked toward the sky. Those were American planes up there. And as I watched those huge bombers disappear in the distance, I did not hate the men who piloted those planes. No, I did not even hate the men who dropped the deadly bombs on my home, destroying the place where I was born and the lives of the friends I had treasured.

The smoke was clearing away as I walked to the place where my home had been. As I looked at the mass of charred boards and rock, I did not flinch. I realized that all through these years my home had not been worth much more than that any way. I had not really had a home—it had only been a place to hide from those persons who had tortured my life and my thoughts. I was living in Germany, where no one has a real home.

But those Americans—they had something to live for. They had homes, a real life. That's why they bombed my home town to day. They were protecting something dear to them. They were protecting life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

As these thoughts ran through my mind, I made a promise to myself: "Someday," I said, "I'll go to America. I'll live for the joy of living—I'll be an American."

Now, two years later, I am in

the great land of America. It has not been difficult getting accustomed to the American way of life, because I find the American life the life I have always wanted, searched for, and yes, prayed for.

That day my ship came into New York Harbor I gazed with admiration at the Statue of Liberty as it came into view. Beside me was a wounded soldier, and my heart beat faster as the tears came into his eyes and he chokingly whispered, "Sweet land of liberty."

"This is America," I cried. I ran down the plank, realizing through wonderment that I was about to set foot on the soil of America. Then I was in the arms of my American grandmother—my life was beginning—I, too, would have a home, something to live for.

In the months to come, I was spell-bound by America. I saw my grandmother turn on the radio and switch to a program which criticized a law passed by the American Congress. I heard the Democratic and Republican national conventions, and I saw people hurrying to the polls that day to vote for their choice for the Presidency. How the word "choice" rang in my ears!

I went to the movies, and saw newsreels, comedies, and reports of everyday happenings in America. I looked around me in astonishment at the hundreds of other Americans "just living."

One Sunday I did not go to church with my grandmother as usual. I went to a new church. Why? Because I preferred it—I could accept what I wished to.

Now, I am a citizen of a courageous, freedom-loving nation. I have a share in democracy—I have citizenship papers which enable me to live under the influence of freedom and good will. I have the Constitution of the United States, the Declaration of Independence, and the Bible.

All these things—freedom of worship, religion, speech, and freedom of press; love of God; and love of country have made me a part of America—they constitute my good citizenship and the citizenships of millions of others, who make America the great un-

Lubbock Man Given Death

LUBBOCK, Tex. April 30 (UP)—Richard W. McGee, 24, today faced death in the electric chair for the murder of R. L. Allston, 42, Lubbock grocery executive.

Defense attorneys were expected to ask for a new trial, and if denied, would appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals.

A 2nd District Court Jury last night returned a verdict of guilty after two hours and 22 minutes deliberation. The jury judged McGee sane at the time of the slaying July 7 and sane now. He had pleaded not guilty by reason of insanity.

The defendant sat tense at the counsel table as Judge Dan Blair read the verdict. Guards had to assist him from the court room.

McGee was charged with Allston's murder following an altercation with members of the victim's family. He was the object of a manhunt for 30 hours after the killing. He was found on a bus at Austin and returned to the Lubbock County Jail, without bail.
