The drive officially opened on May 2 and sales for this county through the first week totalled \$75,756, according to a sales report received from State Savings Board headquarters in Dallas.

## ANDERSON BUYS PRUETT'S INTEREST IN CAR FIRM

T. J. Anderson has announced the purchase of the interest of C. B. Pruett in the Anderson-Pruett Chevrolet Company and from here on the company will be known as the Anderson Chevrolet Company.

Anderson also announced that his son, Bill Anderson, will be associated with him in the business as soon as he has completed his work toward a BBA degree at Baylor University at Waco.

In connection with these announcements, Anderson also stated that he is adding to the personnel of the company C. H. (Harl) O'Brien, until recently city manager of the city of Eastland, and a former tax assessor-collector of Eastland county.

Mr. O'Brien will be associated with the company in the capacity of bookkeeper and office manager. At present he is driving from Eastland to work but will move to Ranger just as soon as suitable living quarters can be secured.

Both Anderson and Pruett today expressed appreciation for the pleasant association that they have had in the Chevrolet business for the past 15 years and for the fine cooperation of the people of Ranger and this area. Pruett stated that while he is selling his partnership in the Chevrolet business he is not retiring but will devote his time to the insurance business and other business interests.

It was also pointed out that in buying Pruett's interest, Anderson is assuming all obligations of the firm and all accounts owed to the Anderson-Pruett Chevrolet Company will be payable to Anderson Chevrolet Company.

### Provision In Contract Omitted

Through lack of information, in an article appearing in Wednesday's edition of this newspaper, it was stated that the parking meters offered the City of Ranger by Dave Onstead for the Duncan Meter Company of Chicago would be installed on a fifty-fifty basis.

Onstead explained today that the contract he offered the city very specifically states that the company would install the meters in Ranger on a fifty-fifty basis. This means that the company and the city would share the revenue from the meters until the revenue pays for the meters and their installation.

The county quota is \$180,000. The report carries sales through last Saturday (May 21).

The report also showed that sales for Texas were \$19,460,304, or 52 per cent of the state quota of \$36,950,000.

Several counties reached and exceeded their quota during the first week of the drive and numerous others showed sales of 50 per cent or more quotas, causing Nathan Adams of Dallas, state Savings Bonds chairman, to predict that Texas will far exceed its quota "in the most successful Savings Bonds campaign since the war". The drive will continue through June 30.

Counties already having reached or exceeded their quotas are Andrews, Bailey, Blanco, Cass, Cook, Dawson, Ector, Goliad, Hall, Irion, Kimble, Lampasas, Mills, Montgomery, Newton, Scary and Stephens.

### VFW To Make Final Plans For Poppy Sale Sat.

B. S. Dudley, Jr., commander of the Ralph L. McKinley Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, has called a meeting for 8 o'clock Friday night at which time plans for the annual poppy day sale Saturday will be completed.

The Buddy Poppy Day is observed each year the Saturday before Memorial Day and the people of Ranger are asked to buy the poppies and wear them in memory of the country's war dead, and to help the living.

Commander Dudley pointed out today that the poppies that will be sold have been made by disabled veterans in the hospitals of the country and that proceeds from the sales will be used exclusively for the relief of needy veterans and their families. Some of the proceeds are used for the upkeep of the VFW National Home for widows and orphans of war veterans.

Members of the local VFW Auxiliary and young ladies of Ranger will sell the poppies and a person purchasing a poppy may give whatever he wishes. Ranger's goal in the sale is 2,000 poppies.

### Communists In Wipeup Drive On Shanghai

SHANGHAI, May 26 (UP)—Communist forces launched a final attack today to wipe out the last 300 Nationalist troops holding one small island of government resistance in the heart of Communist-occupied Shanghai.

The attack was made by a small Communist assault unit which stormed across the last Nationalist holdouts on the north bank of Soochow Creek.

The Nationalist bridgehead at Garden Bridge was broken and its defenders wiped out. Communist troops then began to close in on other diehard Nationalist strongholds in apartment houses, and other buildings on the north bank.

Reports from Yangtzeopoo, eight miles north of downtown Shanghai, said Communist troops were moving into that area in strength and wiping out the last Nationalist stragglers with rifle fire.

Nationalist stragglers in groups of two and three were roaming the streets seeking civilian clothing for a disguise, these reports said.

### Jury Still Out, One Has Injury

A 91st District Court jury was still deliberating at noon today, after going into session at 2:30 P. M. Wednesday, following hearing of testimony in a suit filed by Donnie L. Grimes and her husband H. A. Grimes, against J. B. Herring of Rising Star, asking judgment of \$1,500 and interest and rescission of a real estate contract.

A physician was summoned to the courthouse this morning to treat J. V. Hyser Jr., of Eastland, one of the jurors, who stepped on a nail early today near his residence. A lock-law serum was administered, according to the Sheriff's office.

The jury was selected Monday and testimony was started Tuesday. District Judge George L. Davenport is on the bench.

### VOLUNTARILY OFFER AID TO MOVE AT MEETING IN ABILENE WEDNESDAY

### Santa Fe Train Derailed Today Near Cleburne

CLEBURNE, Tex., May 26 (UP)—The locomotive and five cars of a Santa Fe freight train were derailed early today in Turkey Creek lowlands east of Cleburne after a flash flood caused a track washout.

Three crewmen, riding in the cab, narrowly escaped drowning as the locomotive and the derailed cars rolled down a steep embankment into the churning water. None of them, however, was injured.

Engineer O. M. Brown said the train was proceeding through water that covered the right-of-way and "suddenly there just wasn't track out there any more."

Brown, fireman, Sam Jones and brakeman Jack Ambler scrambled onto the partially submerged locomotive to wait for the water to recede.

After about an hour, the flash flood was gone and the three, with conductor Lee Rundles who escaped shaking up because he was riding in the caboose at the rear of the 46-car train, walked to the nearest farm house to telephone their report of the accident.

It occurred about 3:45 A. M. The train was outbound from Dallas for Cleburne, where all four of the crew members live.

Brown, Jones and Ambler were taken to a Cleburne clinic, where examination disclosed they had no injuries.

Torrential rains, accompanied by hail, between 1:30 and 4 A. M. caused the sudden rise in Turkey Creek, and also temporarily blocked highways leading east from Cleburne. An ambulance, which picked up the train crew, made a circuitous 27 mile drive to reach the scene—about seven miles east of Cleburne, near the small town of Keene.

Four cars and the locomotive of a Santa Fe freight train derailed east of Cleburne early today when it ran onto a track washout. Three members of the crew narrowly escaped drowning, by clinging to the partially submerged locomotive until the water receded.

### Bevin Wants To Present Plan To Soviet Minister

PARIS, May 26 (UP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin of Britain urged today that the Western Big Three present their proposal on Germany to Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky of Russia and find out at once whether he means business.

Bevin made his proposal to Secretary of State Dean Acheson at a private meeting at midday. Acheson will be chairman this afternoon at the fourth meeting of foreign Ministers Conference.

The Big Four ministers had devoted the first half of the week to Russia's unacceptible proposal to return to four-power control of Germany. Now Bevin wanted the Western Powers to tell Vishinsky their price for an agreement on a more or less take it or leave it basis.

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Chapman indicated, after considerable questioning, that the National Association would lend its support to the boosters association by taking over part responsibility for the installation and maintenance of the initial sign which will be erected somewhere in the neighborhood of Weatherford.

Those from Ranger attending the meeting stated that once the idea became clear as to the purpose of the organization at Ranger, that they threw their support to the move 100 per cent.

The group meeting in Abilene pledged their efforts in carrying their ideas to highway businessmen in all towns on Highway 80 from Ranger to Pecos.

The group in Abilene also expressed their support for the National Association with the reservation that be allowed to retain this local boosters organization to take care of purely local problems.

### Ranger Student In ACC's Biggest Graduating Class

ABILENE, May 26—Two hundred and eighty-five persons will be graduated this year at Abilene Christian College in the largest class in the college's 43 year history.

One hundred and eighty-five will receive degrees at Spring graduation exercises May 30, 8 p. m. in Sewell Auditorium at the college.

Ninety senior students have applied for degrees to be presented in August. Thirty-two completed requirements for degrees in January and will participate in the exercises May 30.

This year's graduates, who will receive degrees include Morris George, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin George of Ranger who will receive a B.S. degree.

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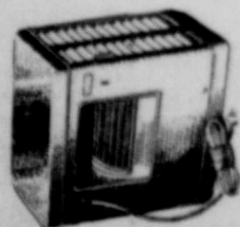

### Corpus Christi University To Have First Graduating Class This Year

While two Texas schools observe commencement for the 104th time this week, their sister institution will be celebrating with the first graduating class in her history.

After more than a century, commencement is another tradition of Corpus Christi University. It is being celebrated by the Hamilton Standard Propeller company for a twin-Mustang Army fighter which was abandoned at the end of the war. According to the propeller company, it cost \$300,000 for development work.

"Everything in the cockpit is automatic," H. C. Danaber, crew chief of the plane said. "This will make it easy to fly as it is to drive an automobile. All Mrs. Lemon will have to do is keep one hand on the throttle and one hand on the stick."

Mrs. Lemon will pay Mr. Reed \$10,000 for the privilege of flying the ship in the record attempt. The hazardous flight must be made within 300 feet of the ground.

"I cannot afford to blink an eye when I am whipping it over the LaPorte airport on the speed run," Mrs. Lemon declared.

She will make her first test flight in the Mustang about June 15. It has not been opened up since it made a forced landing in Kansas last year while being flown to the Cleveland air races. At that time it had made a speed of 565 miles an hour at 14,000 feet.

The plane, which is being painted dark green, has already been entered in the Thompson Trophy race, the top aviation event of the year.

### 'Souped-Up' Mustang To Attempt Breaking World's Speed Record

HOUSTON, May 27—A \$10,000 airplane, converted at a cost of approximately \$95,000 until it has only its original shell and wings, is being rapidly shaped up for an attempt to break a world speed record.

Work on the "Beguine," a souped-up Mustang fighter which will be flown by Dot Lemon in her attempt to set a new three-kilometer record at the Houston International Airspeed Run on July 4, has been virtually completed except for painting. The present record is 463 miles an hour.

Owned by J.D. Reed of Houston, the "Beguine" has been completely redesigned since he bought it a year ago for \$10,000. North American Aviation, its original builder, spent about \$45,000 in changing its entire cooling system. The bottom aircoop has been replaced by trim wing-tip daria-tors.

Included in the estimated \$55,000 which Mr. Reed has spent is a new 2,250-horsepower Rolls Royce engine, the only engine designed for full use of water injection. Water injection increases the power. In ordinary engines it is used for short burst of emergency speed.

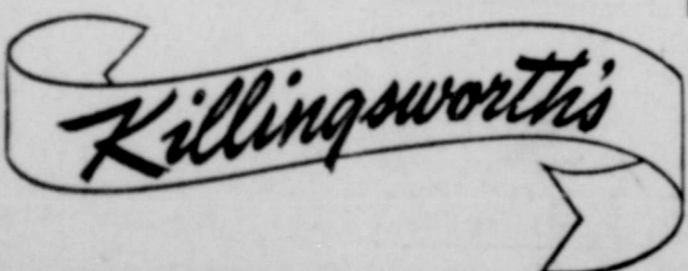
The 12-cylinder engine will be sparked by hand-made British plugs with platinum points, made especially for racing planes. The "Beguine" is also fitted with one of two special propellers developed by the Hamilton Standard Propeller company.



# RETURN OF SENATE TO OLD ROOM RECALLS FIRST RATING AGES AGO

WASHINGTON, May 26(UP)—  
Tuesday, Jan. 4, 1859, was a  
bitter cold day in Washington.  
The wood in the fire place of  
the old, gas-lit Senate chamber  
crackled and the 42 Senators

all there were in those days—  
rubbed the numbness out of their  
hands.

The Honorable John Cabell  
Breckenridge, the vice president  
of the United States, removed the  
glove from his gavel hand and  
demanded order. This, he an-  
nounced solemnly, was to be the  
last day the Senate would hold  
sessions at the old stand. That  
noble body was about to move to  
new quarters, equipped with  
brass snuffboxes, fancy snuff  
boxes and plush surroundings.

The Senate is getting ready to  
move again—back to the old  
place. The roof is about to chash  
on the dignified heads below. Work  
men will jack up the roof  
supports and do the kind of a re-  
make job they are planning on  
the White House.

# New Faces at Big Four Paris Parley



Three new faces will appear at the conference table in Paris when the Big Four Council of Foreign Ministers tries again to unsmarl the German problem. Left to right in this photo montage are U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson; British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin; French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky. Only Bevin was present in London in December, 1947, when the Big Four last considered Germany.

This isn't the first time that  
the Senate has moved back into  
the old room which once echoed  
to the golden oratory of Clay and

Webster and Calhoun. It's gone  
back several times before, for the  
similar reasons—repair to the  
present quarters.

The old chamber, to the left of  
the capitol rotunda, probably is  
Washington's most useful spare  
room. After the 35th Senate  
moved in and stayed for 75 years  
until the tribunal move across the  
street to its magnificent, white  
marble home in 1935. It has been  
a museum since.

On that January day in 1859,  
the senators interrupted business  
long enough to pay respect to a  
friend—the old room.

Sen. John J. Crittenden of  
Kentucky arose to say that the  
35th Congress could spare a  
moment, surely, so he could in-  
dulge "in a few words of parting  
from this chamber."

The gentlemen from the  
blue grass pulled out all the stops.  
"Mr. President," he said, "we  
cannot quit this chamber without

some falling of sacred sadness—  
here questions of American  
constitutions and laws have been  
debated; questions of peace and  
war have been debated; questions  
of empire . . . they give a sort of  
consecrated character to this  
hall. No matter under what sky  
we may sit; no matter what dome  
may cover us; the great patriotic  
spirit of the Senate of the United  
States will be there and I have  
an abiding confidence that it will  
never fall in the performance of  
its duty, sit where it may, even  
though it were a desert."

There was a moment of silence.  
Then Vice President Brecken-  
ridge spoke up:  
"Let us devoutly trust that an-  
other senate, in another age,

# RAILROADS IMPOSE PARTIAL EMBARGO ON GRAIN SHIPMENTS

WASHINGTON, May 25 (UP)—  
A partial embargo on ship-  
ments of grain in the winter  
wheat belt will become effective  
June 1, the Association of Amer-  
ican railroads announced today.

The embargo affects grain  
which shippers desire to store, but  
for which they have not obtained  
definite storage commitments.  
Arthur H. Gass, chairman of the  
car service division of the AAR,  
said it was issued to prevent con-  
gestion and undue delay of box  
cars at grain storage points, in-  
cluding terminal and sub-terminal  
markets.

Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado,  
Mississippi, Oklahoma, Texas (ex-  
cept the ports of Fort Arthur,  
Galveston, and Houston), Council  
Bluffs, Ia., and East St. Louis,  
Ill., are covered by the embargo,  
Gass said.

"Two factors made the embargo  
necessary," Gass said. "First, sto-  
page facilities in the winter wheat  
belt are more than half full with  
grain held over from last year in  
addition to heavy carryover of  
grain on farms and at country si-  
vators.

"Second, it is the beginning of  
the present harvest of a near bum  
per crop of winter wheat. The  
impact created by the arrival of  
all this grain without any form  
of control would result in con-  
gestion at terminals and would  
tie up vitally needed box cars."
