### HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION HELD FRIDAY

Fifty-five students of Ranger High School stepped out of that realm Friday night when they received diplomas at exercises held at the high school auditorium at 8 o'clock.

The welcome address was given by William Anthony Lewis, III, who was salutatorian of the class and the valedictorian address was given by Dorthea Hightower Blitch.

Marvin Wilson, president of the class presented the class gift to the school which was the final payment on the cyclorama for the high school building and Recreation building. This is the eighth class to contribute to the cyclorama.

Now that the cyclorama is paid for in both the high school and Recreation building, maybe those two things would be something for future senior classes to start working on.

But then, that's a long time to wait, ain't it? How it took eight senior classes to pay for the cyclorama.

Something that bothers us—to try to talk to people that wear colored glasses. When we talk to people we like to see what their eyes are doin' and when they're hid behind dark glasses we can't. We usually work up a real sweat trying to peer behind that screen and sure enough we can't and find ourself all worn out when we leave the person.

Heard a man sayin' the other day that there are nearly as many students finishing the University of Texas this year as were enrolled in the whole University when he was a student there.

Speaks that's true of most colleges and universities. Higher education has become a MUST and Uncle Sam has helped to make it so.

There was a time when only a very few had the privilege of goin' on to the higher institutions after they finished high school and there was also the time when a high school graduate could teach school by merely taking an examination given by the county board of teacher examiners. A little farther back than that, higher-education for women was frowned upon except for Miss So-and-So's finishin' school, or some "Female Academy", and then when the gals got through with that, they were supposed to go home, sit down and fold their hands. Some few braved public opinion and taught school.

Yep, it's a changin' world.

This year's graduating class at Ranger Junior College is scorin' two firsts—it's the first class to graduate since the college was moved to its new plant and it's the first in size—the largest class ever to finish the college.

And they say next year's prospects are even brighter so far as numbers are concerned.

Nit's goin', for no one that gives it a thought can doubt the importance of the junior college in the present system of education and the current demand for higher education.

The largest class in history" seems to be the order of the day for others than Ranger Junior College. In the mail this morning was information that both TCU at Fort Worth and ACC at Athens, are graduating the largest class in the history of the two schools. And Ranger is represented in both classes—Billie Jean Crawley at TCU and Morris George and Jean Roberts at ACC.

Well, that's exactly what a rugged, elderly Oklahoma citizen did Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock to his equally rugged, elderly wife on U. S. Highway 80, near Olden, located about half way between Eastland and Ranger. And we have the Eastland County Sheriff's office word to prove it.

It seems the Oklahoma tourists had been riding all day, with the male driver being tired out from the drive and the constant "help" from the little woman on how to operate the vehicle.

Between Eastland and Olden, going in a direction toward Fort Worth, the driver made a few bobbles in the road and his wife instantly reprimanded him for his carelessness and urged him to drive better.

Without a word, the patient little man, who the men folks will most likely nominate as a candidate for the Medal of Honor, pulled out to the side of the road. Stopping the car, he got out and started walking across a pasture and on out of sight despite the cries of his wife urging him to come back.

Logan, wife of the famous Union commander, visited battlefields in Virginia. She was particularly touched by the way graves of Confederate dead were decorated with flowers and tiny Confederate flags. General Logan...



... Memorial Day was fully established as a regular institution through most of the country. Because of its original purpose—the decoration of soldiers' graves—its formal observance had a military aspect from the first. For many years the day was in charge of the G. A. R. posts of every community. Observance consisted of a military and civic parade to the cemetery for appropriate exercises. Leading citizens and outstanding veterans made memorial addresses. A flag was placed on every soldier's grave, which was strewn with flowers. Firing squads volleyed over the graves as the bugler sounded "Taps." Today the exercises are much the same, except that the American Legion is in charge and the parade now includes civic officials, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and fraternal organizations. ... was much interested in her account, agreed it was a beautiful custom and, as Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued his famous General Order No. 11, designating May 30, 1868, as the day when the G. A. R. should decorate graves of comrades who died in defense of their country. The order was obeyed by G. A. R. posts, and by May 30, the next year...



... widened as North and South united to fight foreign foes in new wars. After the Spanish-American War, Memorial Day ceremonies included honors for veterans of that conflict and the deeds of the Spanish-American War Veterans contributed marchers to every parade. Its observance became international when, following World War I, the grateful French people decorated graves in American military cemeteries in France. American graves in England and other European countries were also decorated. After World War II, Memorial Day became truly a global institution, for on May 29 honor is paid to American fighters whose final resting places are scattered from Germany to Africa and from Australia to Okinawa and all the seas between. Usually a legal holiday, May 29 is observed...

# MCHAMMEDIAN TO TAKE TURN IN RITES FOR RITA AND ALLY

CANNES, France, May 28 (UP)—Two Muslim Imams arrived at this Riviera town today to unite film star Rita Hayworth and Prince Aly Khan in a second wedding ceremony, this time in accordance with the laws of Mohammed.

Rita and Aly, who became man and wife yesterday in the eyes of French civil law, refused to say when the Muslim rites would be held. But arrival of the priests from the Paris Mosque indicated that the marriage vows prescribed by Aly's faith would be held today.

Prince Aly, who will some day succeed his father, the Aga Khan, as spiritual leader of some 12,000,000 Ismail Moslems, telegraphed his thanks to the Paris Mosque for dispatching the two priests.

S. I. Kaddour Ben Ghabrit, head of the Muslim Church in France, regards the marriage as "the most important of the century for the Moslem Church in France."

Prince Aly will wear special robes for the occasion. The Aga Khan will attend in the ceremonial costume of the Imam Ismail sect. Miss Hayworth is expected to wear western dress if she attends. However, it is not necessary for a bride to be present at a Moslem ceremony.

Friends said that Miss Hayworth, as a Catholic, recognizes the penalties of marrying outside her faith but that she was very happy despite the religious complications.

Vatican sources said Rita incurred an automatic excommunication without formal announcement by the Catholic Church and without specific proceedings when she married outside the church without permission.

The excommunication is minor and the Bishop of her Diocese can remove it providing she returns to the church, these sources said. The Moslem rites will be in two parts. In the first, non-religious part the couple or their representatives will sign marriage contracts stipulating a dowry for the bride. It probably will be a nominal sum.

In the religious rites, the Priest will read from the Koran and give advice to the bridegroom on how to live a happy life. Last night there was a small family dinner at the Chateau De L'Horizon and the new princess retired comparatively early. Today she began opening dozens of wedding gifts from friends and fans.

Upon completion of this test, he plans to drill the No. 1 Davenport, located about three-quarters of a mile south of Olden, on the Fred Davenport property.

Chamberlain stated he planned to test the shallow sand, and if they don't produce, he will go on down further.

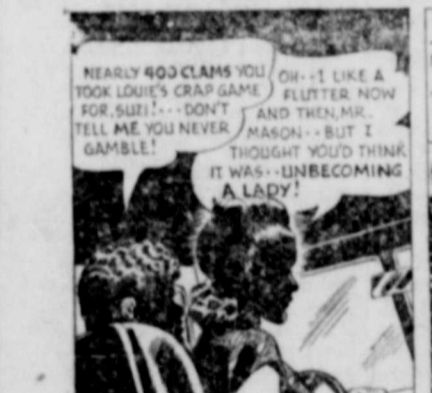

## BERLIN AIRLIFT BEGINS WORK SECOND TIME

By WALTER G. RUNDLE United Press Staff Correspondent BERLIN, May 28 (UP) — Western Berlin fell upon the Anglo-American airlift for sustenance Saturday in the face of a Soviet-inspired rail blockade intended to smash the eight-day strike of 16,000 West Berlin rail workers.

British and American planes kept roaring along the Buckeburg Corridor into Berlin despite Soviet warnings that ground-to-air firing would start in that area Saturday morning as part of Russian Army summer maneuvers.

The Russians said an area 7 by 11 miles in the airlift corridor would be unsafe during the firing. However, no guns were reported shooting by noon (6 A.M. EDT).

Soviet authorities asked airlift planes to skirt the area by flying farther north. British authorities said this would cut the 20-mile-wide airlift to nine miles, contrary to an international agreement.

Western officials at the Air Safety Center in Berlin made it clear to Soviet authorities Saturday morning that airlift planes would fly their normal routes along the Buckeburg Corridor.

An estimated 40,000 Russians were reported maneuvering in the heavily wooded area of Lipzenger-Hide, second largest troop training area in Germany.

Maneuvers at present were reported on a small scale, with military problems carried out at company and battalion level.

In Berlin, Soviet sector officials took further steps to end the strike, called May 20 to enforce West Berlin workers' demands for full salaries in Western marks from the Soviet-controlled city railway management.

J. W. Riddleberg, chief State Department representative in the American Sector, denied reports there are plans to take the rail strike issue before the Big Four Conference in Paris.

"Of course, I can't say what will happen in the future, but at the moment the strike is still a matter for local authorities," Riddleberg said.

## Believe It Or Not Ripley Dies

NEW YORK, May 28 (UP) — Robert L. Ripley, 55, the cartoonist whose name was synonymous with the Bizarre and unbelievable, died unexpectedly yesterday of a heart attack at the Columbia Presbyterian Hospital.

The circumstances surrounding Ripley's death had the "believe it or not" quality which marked the variety of odd subjects he brought to the attention of an incredulous world in newspapers, feature books, broadcast and television shows during the past 30 years.

Ripley's last public appearance was on his regular television program Tuesday night on the National Broadcasting Company network. He told the story behind the bugle call for the dead. The program closed with the playing of taps. Thursday he entered the hospital for a "check-up" although apparently in good health and died 24 hours later.

Ripley was born on Christmas Day, 1893, in Santa Rosa, Cal. His unique career began when he illustrated a column about sports oddities while working for the New York Globe in 1918. The cartoon was so popular that he expanded the feature to include bizarre facts of all sorts, and later was syndicated all over the world.

Strike leaders meanwhile rejected a Soviet offer to settle the week-old walkout by paying 60 per cent of wages in Western marks.

## New Union Plan Spurned By Ford

DETROIT, May 28, (UP) — The CIO United Auto Workers offered Saturday to send striking Ford Motor Company workers back to their jobs pending selection of an arbitrator to end the strike, but company negotiators spurned the plan.

Walter P. Reuther, UAW president, made the offer after round-the-clock negotiating sessions to end the 24-day-old walkout bogged down on the brink of settlement.

Further negotiations were scheduled at 8 P. M. EST, Saturday night, after the company refused the back-to-work offer.

Reuther called it a "common sense proposal."

It came when dead-tired union and company negotiators could not agree on the selection of an arbitrator to referee the main issue that has blocked final settlement of the strike.

The union proposal suggested that if after 72 hours the negotiators could not agree on an arbitrator, that President Truman, the Governor of Michigan, or the Director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service pick a referee.

## King Motor Car Is Recovered 2 Men Being Held In Custody

Mears and Hillman Bridges, both of Comanche County and said to be between 28 and 30 years old wanted on felony charges in Eastland had been apprehended in Fort Scott, Kansas. Sheriff J. B. Williams, Deputy Sheriff Aubrey Yeager and Curly Maynard of King Motor Co. left Friday morning at 10 o'clock for Fort Scott, Kansas to return the two prisoners and the Ford automobile, which was recovered. Both men waived extradition.

Before leaving Eastland, Sheriff Williams filed an additional charge against Mears in Justice of the Peace E. E. Woods' court of theft by bailment, value over \$50. A similar charge was also against Bridges. The group are expected to arrive back in Eastland Sunday, May 29.

Kansas authorities told the Sheriff's office, in the telephone conversation, that the automobile had been traded to a private citizen in Winfield, when it was recovered. At the time Mears and Bridges were apprehended, they were occupying a Chevrolet received in the trade with the Winfield citizen.
