Firing squads volleyed over the graves as the bugler sounded "Taps." Today the exercises are much the same, except that the American Legion is in charge and the parade now includes civic officials, Boy Scouts, Girl. Scouts and fraternal organizations. 

April 26 is Confederate Memorial Day in Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Mississippi. In Louisiana and Tennessee, June 3, Jefferson Davis' birth-day, is observed as Memorial Day. North and South Carolina set aside May 10, while Virginia observes May 30 as Confederate Memorial Day. Attempts have been made to merge all observances into an International Memorial Day on May 30, but without success. Many southerners feel that as the idea of Memorial Day started in the South, and was adopted by the North, any change of dates should conform to the April 26 commemoration rather than the later date,






