Rape Charges Filed Against Ranger Youth

A 17-year-old Ranger youth was charged with statutory rape in Justice of the Peace Charley Bobbs' court in Ranger Saturday, June 4, according to the Sheriff's office.

The youth was released from custody Sunday, following posting of \$1,000 bond. He will be remanded to the grand jury, when it convenes Thursday, June 9, the Sheriff's office stated.

The alleged attack occurred three months ago on a 15-year-old Ranger girl. The complaint was preferred by the girl's mother.

Jewel Thieves Overlook Loot

NEW YORK, June 6 (UP)—Jewel thieves raided the lavish hotel apartment of multimillionaire William Helis over the week end and escaped with \$26,000 in gems, police disclosed today.

Police said, however, that the thieves overlooked \$100,000 worth of jewels left in the same drawer with those that were stolen. They said a second fortune in jewels, left in another drawer, also was overlooked.

COURT UPHOLDS CONVICTION, FINE AGAINST LEWIS, UNION

WASHINGTON, June 6, (UP)—The U. S. Court of Appeals today upheld the contempt of court conviction and \$1,420,000 (M) fine against John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers union for failing to call off the 1948 coal strike.

The soft coal walkout began March 12, 1948, in a dispute over the miners' pension fund demands. The government obtained a temporary restraining order directing Lewis and the union to order the miners back to work.

Lewis ignored the order, however, and the miners remained out until April 12, when he notified them that their pension demands had been satisfied.

Lewis appealed on the grounds that he had not called a strike and that in any event the fines — of which \$20,000 was levied against him personally — were excessive.

The three Appeals Court justices ruled unanimously, however, that the conviction and fines were justified. They also dismissed the

WOMAN HELD TO PREVENT ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE

GALVESTON, Tex., June 6, (UP)—The world closed up on blonde and beautiful Mrs. Martha Pfeiffer today, and police were fearful that the wealthy divorcee might find the same release as her lover, who killed himself.

Threatened with never being allowed to see her five-year-old daughter again, the 27-year-old Crystal Lake, Ill., woman tossed on an iron cot in Galveston County Jail.

"I have nothing to live for. Bob is gone," she moaned over and over.

"Bob" was war hero Robert Emmet Benjamin, 33, also of Chystal Lake. His body was found by police yesterday in the couple's cabin at the swank Jack Tar Courts, one of many resort hotels lining the causeway drive.

Benjamin, who was wounded and captured by the enemy in the European theater on World War II, shot himself through the heart with a foreign-made pistol. He had apparently become remorseful after attending church, and joined Mrs. Pfeiffer in their rooms, where they registered a week ago as man and wife.

She told police today of a weird three-hour tirade by Benjamin, reeled off as she stalked the floor, remonstrating with himself for leaving his wife and two children in Chystal Lake.

"We both talked of killing ourselves," she threw bottles against the wall. Then he sat down on the bed. He had his hand on a pistol under the pillow," she said tearfully.

Police Lt. Willie Burns said Mrs. Pfeiffer talked to her estranged husband in Crystal Lake shortly before the tragedy.

"She said her husband told her never to come back, and that she would never see their daughter again," Burns said. "We are holding her for her own protection."

Bottles of liquor littered the thick carpet in the tourist cabin, police said, and bottles containing barbitol and amylol, both drugs, also were found. Walls were stained with liquor.

Mrs. Pfeiffer said Benjamin went to church Sunday and heard a lesson on the evils of "illicit love." A check of texts delivered here yesterday, however, revealed no such topic.

Woman Says She Kept Secrets From Russian

WASHINGTON, June 6 (UP)—A Bell Telephone Aircraft Co. librarian told the house un-American Activities Committee today how—acting under the guidance of the FBI—she prevented a Russian agent from stealing war-time secrets from this country.

The librarian, Leona Franey, Niagara Falls, N. Y., said the Russian agent was Andrei Schevchenko.

Mrs. Franey told the committee how she met Schevchenko in October, 1942. He was in this country to purchase Bell Aircrafts—American fighting planes—for his government.

Mrs. Franey was accompanied by her husband, Joseph J. Franey, and the witness stand. In a calm voice, she said that Schevchenko first asked her for text books but later began to establish a personal relationship.

"He began bringing little presents—boxes of candy and theater tickets," she said. "He asked us to go out to dinner and said he wanted to meet my husband."

Gradually, she said, he started painting the beauty of life in the Soviet Union and then asked for classified material out of the Bell Aircraft Library. He first desired confidential reports on jet-propulsion, she said.

Weatherford Seeks Funds For Junior College

Weatherford, Tex., June 6 (UP)—Petitions seeking a special tax election to raise funds to continue Weatherford Junior College were in circulation here today.

The move follows recent announcement by Southwestern University at Georgetown that it planned discontinuance of affiliation of Weatherford Junior College.

Weatherford city officials indicated a desire to operate the college under state aid, which would require approval from the State Board of Education and also approval in a special election here.

The petitions in circulation propose approval of a tax levy of 30 cents annually on each \$100 property valuation. This would be used in operation of the college.

Thomas Urges Labor Law Repeal

WASHINGTON, June 6 (UP)—Chairman Elbert D. Thomas of the Senate labor committee today urged repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor law as a "dangerous" measure which undermines organized labor's right to bargain collectively.

Thomas opened Senate debate on the labor legislation after Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., Ohio turned thumbs down on new compromise. Taft said the "battle" would be fought between his amended Taft-Hartley bill and President Truman's demand for its repeal.

Thomas said the Republican bill was taking the nation "down the dangerous road toward government intervention and dictation in industry-labor relations."

The Utah Democrat recalled that repeal of the Taft-Hartley measure was "central" in the platform and program of Democratic party in the 1948 campaign.

Centennial Celebration On In Fort Worth

FORT WORTH, Tex., June 6, (UP)—The curtain went up today on Fort Worth's 100th birthday celebration as the city paid tribute to the past.

The centennial observance was to be touched off by a late afternoon downtown parade featuring 42 men dressed in authentic 1849 costumes.

It was 100 years ago to the day that Maj. Ripley Arnold rode at the head of a column of 42 members of the Second Dragoons Regiment to the high bluff on which he founded Fort Worth as an outpost to fight off Indians.

Walker Moore will impersonate Arnold and lead the column of men through downtown Fort Worth to the county courthouse lawn where the scene of a century ago will be re-enacted.

A western parody operetta—"The Texas Mikado" will open the evening activities in the first of four nightly performances.

Following the performance, a huge birthday cake with 100 candles will be cut by Frank Kent, president of the Fort Worth Historical Society; Julian Meeker, Fort Worth Opera Assn., president; an Amos Carter.

Square dancing will end the night's activities.

Company Making Gas Line Survey

Lee Dockery announced today that the Community Public Service Company currently is carrying on a survey to locate gas leaks in company lines as a safety measure as well as a conservation move.

Richard Waters with the Southern Cross Forestry Company of Atlanta, Ga., is making the survey. Waters stated today that the leaks are spotted by discoloration in vegetation and then a machine is placed on the spot to test the soil for gas.

He said that to date 14 leaks have been located, which is comparatively few. He pointed out that in a recent survey of the lines in Austin better than a leak for every mile of line was discovered.

Waters also stated that while working in Austin, word was spread that he was an anti-killer which rumor caused some humorous situations.

SAN ANGELO INTENSIFIES FIGHT AGAINST POLIO

San Angelo's grim war on poliomyelitis continued today, with a second-round citywide cleanup program in full swing.

Twelve-year old John T. Joyce of Givens county died at a hospital late Saturday—the second victim of polio in the day and the seventh of the year in the San Angelo region.

Finger Ann Boatright, 5, of Miles, Tom Green county, had died earlier Saturday.

San Angelo was like a ghost town Sunday. Churches did not open their doors. Swimming pools and movie houses—along with all other public assemblies—were closed at the order of the city commission, which ordered a one-week shut down. The week will end next Thursday.

San Angelo's toll of polio cases for the year is more than 70. Ministers in the West Texas city, deprived of their public pulpits, took to the radio yesterday praying for an end to the outbreak of the feared disease and counseling the citizens to remain "calm."

A "team" from headquarters of the National Foundation for Poliomyelitis was ordered into San Angelo from New York, and financial aid to the city was promised by the southwest division of the foundation.

There were scattered other reports of new cases during the week end—two in Dallas, one in Fort Worth, one in Arlington and one in Wichita Falls, the seventh of the year there.

San Antonio—Sprayed for the past 10 days by DDT-carrying National Guard planes under command of District Attorney William N. Hensley, went to the aid of other towns. Eight planes from the 182nd Fighter Squadron flew from San Antonio to San Angelo for spraying duty Sunday.

CLAIM EFFORTS FUTILE IN FACE OF RED REFUSAL ON AGREEMENTS

Chambers Admits Perjury In Court

NEW YORK, June 6 (UP)—Former Communist spy courier, Whittaker Chambers admitted today that he had "committed knowing perjury" before the house un-American Activities Committee on Aug. 3, 1948.

His admission was made at the perjury trial of Alger Hiss while under cross-examination.

The times Chambers mentioned was years after he had left the Communist party and allegedly had become a "god-fearing man."

The former Communist spy courier is the main accuser of Hiss and one of the government's chief witnesses who was called to support the charge that Hiss had under oath when he said he did not give state department secrets to Chambers in 1938.

Chambers was placed under cross-examination by Chief Defense Attorney Lloyd Paul Stryker as the trial of the former high state department official entered its fifth day before a federal court jury of 10 men and two women.

"That's the second admission by you of perjury at a time when you no longer were a Communist, isn't it?" Stryker said.

"I believe it is," Chambers replied.

Chambers testified Friday that last October he perjured himself before the same federal grand jury which in December indicated Hiss on a perjury charge.

In both instances, the Chambers perjury involved his refraining from telling his story about espionage, in which Hiss allegedly delivered government documents.

"I believe it is," Chambers replied.

CLAIM EFFORTS FUTILE IN FACE OF RED REFUSAL ON AGREEMENTS

The three western foreign ministers held a private strategy conference today in the face of continued Soviet refusal to make agreements on Germany and Berlin.

Their meeting came a few hours before they were scheduled to sit down with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky for the third time behind closed doors.

Thus far the secret session of the foreign ministers council have proved as fruitless as semi public ones. The western ministers were reported considering how long to continue a debate that was leading nowhere.

They were understood to be studying ways of adjourning the council without making a complete break between east and west.

Other foreign news included: CAEN—Thousands of persons lined the French coast to mark the fifth anniversary of the Allied invasion of Normandy. Ceremonies similar to those held yesterday on the American beaches, Omaha and Utah, were scheduled at the Anglo-Canadian landing points. Lt. Gen. Clarence R. Huebner, American commander in Germany, urged his troops to complete their peacetime mission with the "same determination, and doggedness, and courage, and faith that was shown on Omaha and Utah beaches five years ago."

PRAGUE — Archbishop Josef Beran warned Czech Roman Catholics to remain loyal to the pope and not to be deceived by alleged attempts of the Communist government to establish a Catholic church independent of the Vatican. He told a crowd that jammed St. Vigus Cathedral in Prague, "The only genuine church founded by Christ is headed by the pope and his bishops."

BLACKPOOL, England—The Labor Party began mapping strategy for the 1950 general elections as the annual party convention opened. The first major speaker Minister of National Insurance James Griffiths, said a labor victory in the elections would be Britain's only bulwark against Communism.

SANTIAGO, Chile—President Gabriel Gonzalez Videla rushed back from Vina Del Mar after a bloody clash in the capital between police and carabinieri and demonstrators described as Communist. The president said one carabinieri was killed and nine police and carabinieri were injured. More than 20 demonstrators were wounded and a number were arrested.

BOGOTA, Columbia—An unofficial tabulation gives the Liberal party a substantial lead over the conservatives with one-third of the votes counted in yesterday's elections for 132 seats in the Chamber of representatives.

Man Who Sought Jail Dies There

AMARILLO, June 6, (CP)—Herbert Brisbane, 41, who was committed to jail at his own request, died in his cell early today.

Justice of Peace Mrs. Ivy Wilkinson ordered an inquest.

Amarillo Alcoholic Anonymous said Brisbane, whose family lives at Mineral Wells, Tex., appealed to them yesterday for aid in getting a jail cell to sleep off drunkenness.

A spokesman said Brisbane was handed over to the county sheriff's office for jailing.

Prince Aly Khan and his bride Rita Hayworth put in an appearance at Epsom Downs, England, to watch the 170th running of the English Derby. Race was won by Nimbus, a seven-to-one shot.

DALLAS, Tex., June 6 (UP)—Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Company today announced an increase in consolidated revenue for the first quarter of 1949 of \$2,348,764 as compared to the same period in 1948 and the board of directors declared a second quarter dividend of 37 1-2 cents per share.

Erie P. Halliburton, chairman of the Duwenn, Okla., company said that consolidated revenues for the period totaled \$13,039,193 as compared to \$10,690,429 for 1948.

This represented a net profit of \$1,203,460, or 92 cents per share, as compared to last year's net profit of \$977,140, or 74 cents a share, Halliburton told the directors.

The dividend was made payable on June 30 to stockholders as of June 15.

Mexico Cancels Oil Contract

TEMPICO, Mexico, June 6, (UP)—The government-owned oil monopoly was reported to have cancelled the drilling contract of an American company because of a shortage of money in the monopoly.

The contract was held by the Weigand Oil Co. of Dallas whose 15 engineers here are preparing to go home.

Details of the Weigand contract have not been made public. But they are believed to be similar to those in the Edwin J. Pauley agreement calling for the drilling of a series of wells in Tabasco and Vera Cruz states.

Polish Liner To Be Allowed To Sail Today

NEW YORK, June 6 (UP)—The United States government apparently had no plans to block the scheduled noon sailing today of the Polish liner Batory.

A thorough investigation was made of the ship during the weekend to determine if Communist Eisler had received any aid from crew members in his flight from this country.

The ship's captain, Jan Cwiklinski, two stewards and two purser were taken to Bureau of Immigration offices last night and later released after questioning about their knowledge of Eisler's escape to avoid sentencing for two federal convictions.

Capt. Cwiklinski said after authorities had released him that the questions had been "very polite." "We will sail," he added.

If the immigration officials had found that ship's officers or officials of the Gdynia-America line, the owners, had been implicated in Eisler's successful getaway, the 14,287-ton vessel could have been seized for violating passport regulations.

The entire 351-man crew was confined to the vessel for its two-day stay in port. Although there was no protest from Polish authorities, the Danish Ambassador Henrik Kauffman protested in Washington over the confinement of 30 Danish members of the crew aboard the ship.

Suspects To Be Questioned In Death Of Trio

WALNUT RIDGE, Ark. June 6 (UP)—Authorities today were ready to question suspects in the ice box deaths of three children near here, going on the theory that the youngsters were victims of "a fendish slaying."

Sheriff Joe Spades would not identify those he intends to question about the grim deaths of the three little children who were found crammed into a share cropper's old-fashioned ice box late Friday.

But he indicated that some "members of the family" would be among the first he would talk with.

"There are two or three members of the family who might be able to help us," the sheriff said. Meanwhile, Gov. Sidney McMath ordered the state's two top

criminal investigators to work with Spades and give him "every help possible in solving what appears to be a fendish slaying."

He assigned H. R. Peterson, chief of the Arkansas Criminal Investigation Division of the State Police, and Alan Templeton, head of the State Police Science Laboratory to the case.

Funeral services for the three youngsters, James Delbert Chastain, two; his sister Joyce Ann Chastain, nine; and Shirley Ramsey, six, were held at the Williams school in nearby Calvin Crossing community yesterday.

Spades and other officers abandoned completely an earlier theory of possible accidental death after they tried to reconstruct the tragedy yesterday.

Using the death-trap ice box and three children about the same size as the little victims, officers tried to place them in the food compartment.

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RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ECONOMY GO TO HOUSE

AUSTIN, June 6 (UP) — An economy plea, calling for a \$22,000,000 (M) eleemosynary building program to be dropped unless Gov. Beauford Jester "recommends a reasonable plan" to finance it, was offered to the legislature today.

A voter registration act, by Rep. Frank Oltorf of Marlin, was approved by the House and sent to the Senate, to take effect if the poll tax is abolished as a prerequisite to voting by the federal government or by a state constitutional amendment.

The economy plan, embodied in a resolution introduced by Rep. Wayne Wagonseller of Fruitland, would make cuts in all major appropriations totaling some \$45,000,000 (M).

The resolution was sent to the house rules committee. It was offered as conferees were scheduled to open discussion on three of the four major biennial appropriations covering the judiciary system, higher education and state departments.

He asked for a four-point economy move: Cut out the \$22,000,000 (M) eleemosynary building program "unless the governor recommends a reasonable plan to finance same."

Slash 10 per cent from each of the other major spending bills, estimated to mean a saving of almost \$8,000,000 (M).

Deduct 15 per cent from the higher education bill, a saving of \$10,000,000 (M).

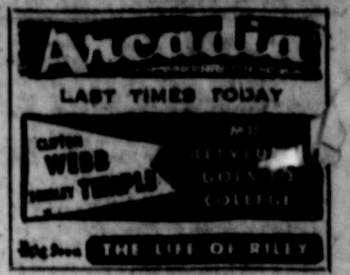
And a cut of \$5,000,000 (M)

from a soil conservation measure, upped by the Senate to \$10,000,000 (M).
