EMPLOYMENT SHOWS BIG DROP IN APRIL AND MAY

WASHINGTON, June 17(UP) — The Labor Department reported today that employment in manufacturing industries fell off 320,000 between mid-April and mid-May for its eighth straight monthly decline.

The department's Bureau of Labor Statistics said that although part of the decline could be attributed to labor disputes, "most of the drop reflects seasonal contraction of activity and a continuation of declining demand for a substantial number of products."

Manufacturing payrolls on May 15, it said, totaled 15,017,000 — a drop of about 900,000 below May, 1948 and of 1,709,000 below the postwar peak of last September.

The decline in manufacturing employment caused total employment in all non-cultural industries to drop 282,000 between mid-April and mid-May. In connection with these figures, the department noted that unemployment increased by about 250,000 during the month to a postwar high of 8,289,000.

Some government economists believe the June unemployment total may reach 4,000,000. It was revealed earlier this week that the administration is working on a program to combat unemployment if the number of jobless reaches serious proportions.

President Truman declined to discuss the program at his news conference yesterday. He said he does not believe the nation is undergoing any unemployment crisis and indicated he would reveal any plans he has in his economic report to Congress next month.

A number of business and financial leaders apparently agreed with Mr. Truman's optimistic view. A United Press survey showed that in general they regard the current business slump as nothing more than a "levelling off" from postwar economic peaks.

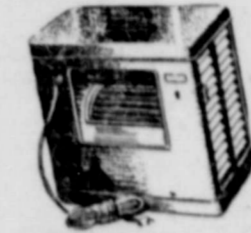
The latest buying power and consumer needs of the public, they said, are of such a nature that they do not anticipate any depression. They predicted that the decline in business activity would continue through 1949, become stabilized in 1950 and then break again in 1951.

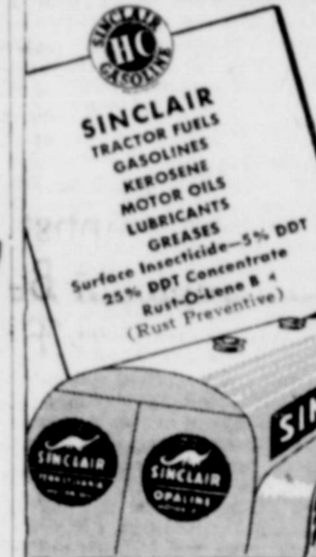

RANGERS' WINNING STREAK BROKEN BY BRECKENRIDGE ELKS

 The winning streak of the Rangers was broken Friday night when the Elks of Breckenridge outscored the locals by a 5 to 3 margin. The game was played on the Ranger field beginning at 8:15 o'clock.

Of seven games played this season this is the first time that the Rangers have taken the little end of the score. The Rangers had their scoring spree in the first inning, piling up a 3 to 1 lead over the Elks. Hogan was critically injured and fought desperately for life during the weeks that followed.

Logan, who has since been involved in another bus accident in which some 40 persons were injured, said from the witness stand that he no longer was driving a bus.

He denied culpability for the collision with Hogan, claiming it was Hogan's car which was on the wrong side of the road.

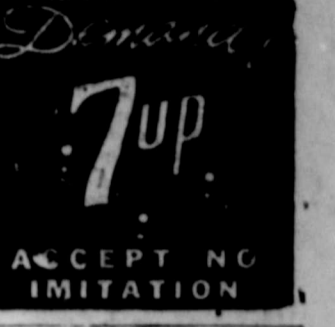

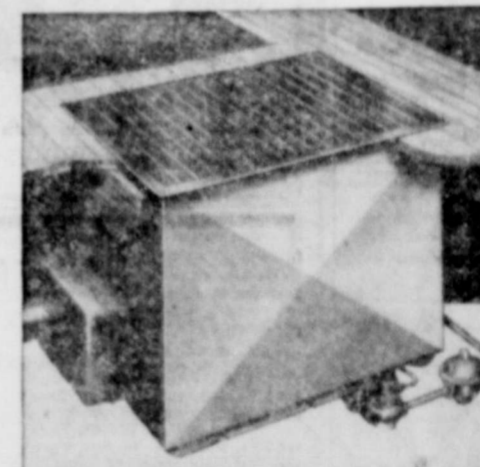

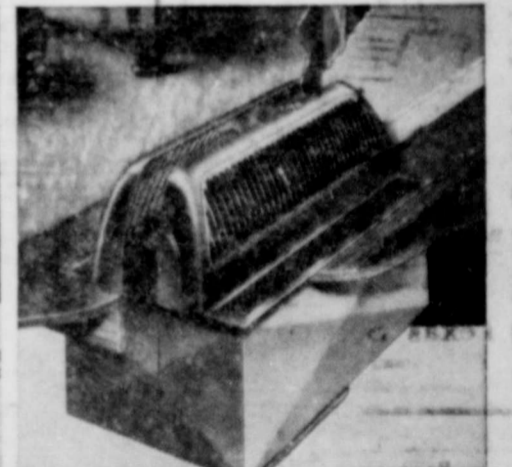

about 1 mile out of Gorman says his land and most of the land in his neighborhood is still too wet to plow. He had his peanuts planted and the last 3 inch rain which fell this week has washed them rather badly, so badly, in fact that he will probably have to replant some of them at least. Pittman has 141 1-2 acres of land. He has 85 acres in cultivation which he plants mostly to peanuts. However, he keeps sufficient cows, hogs, chickens, etc. on the place for home consumption and he sells some of such produce as eggs, chickens, etc. His 50 hens at one time last year were laying at the rate of 45 eggs per day. In the area where Pittman lives on the Ranger road, some small grain is planted & also some head stuff such as milo and maize. This is always planted to be fed on the place. Pittman farms with a tractor and has been investigating the possibility of equipping his machine with a subsoiler since he thinks that is a noted improvement in the breaking of land.

Alabama Solons Join Fight On Masked Raids

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 18 (UP) — The Alabama Legislature today joined the fight against terrorism by hooded mobs in the Birmingham area as the Senate passed a bill outlawing the wearing of masks in public.

The Senate action came late yesterday as public and official outcry mounted against recent unprovoked raids by masked gangs.

Veterans groups in Birmingham, angered by the latest incident in which hooded men flogged a former sailor, moved to form their own "committee against crime and violence."

Passed by a 23 to 3 vote in the Senate, the measure prohibiting public masking now goes to the State House of Representatives.

If the House approves the bill when it reconvenes next week, Alabama will become the first southern state to make a legislative move toward wiping out hooded organizations.

A similar bill was defeated in the Georgia House of Representatives early this year, and in Florida the State Legislature failed to act on Gov. Fuller Warren's

Intra-Coastal Canal Dedicated

PORT MANSFIELD, June 18 (UP) — The latest link in the Intra-Coastal canal system linking Maine to Mexico will be officially dedicated today.

The noon ribbon-cutting ceremonies, aboard a fleet of small boats, will open the lower Rio Grande Valley to Corpus Christi channel. A spot where two-channel cutting dredges met four days ago will mark the ceremonial site, on the mud flats of Kensdy County.

The sheltered waterway will join Brownsville at the southeast tip of Texas to gulf ports all the way to Carabelle, Fla.

Business, legislative, and civic leaders will meet at the mud flats site and remain aboard their crafts for the ceremonies.

On hand will be U. S. Representatives Lloyd M. Bentsen, Jr., McAllen; John Lyle, Corpus Christi; and Tom Pickett, Palestine.

The link culminates a 44-year-old goal of the Texas-Louisiana Intra-Coastal Association, a civilian group designed to promote its construction.

Flash Flood Hits West Virginia

PETERSBURG, W. Va., (UP) — A flash flood hit a 60-mile stretch of the South Branch Valley of the Potomac River today, driving thousands from their homes and isolating the town of Petersburg where "eight or 10" persons were reported missing.

The fast rising waters knocked down power and telephone lines to scores of points in the stricken valley area and washed out key roads, hampering rescue operations.

State police at Romney, about 27 miles north, were directing rescue missions but were hampered by communications difficulties. One police radio car broke through into Petersburg before the flood made road travel impossible. Its reports were the only source of information to the outside.

The latest report from Romney itself, before telephone lines to that town were cut off, indicated that water in the Petersburg and Moorefield area were receding. However, the water was still rising at Romney with the crest expected

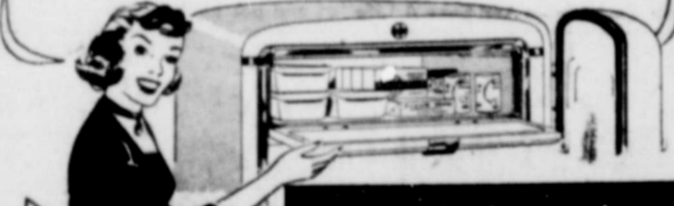
