597 Cows Signed For Artificial Insemination

A total of 597 dairy cows have been signed up for artificial breeding in Eastland County to date according to Harry Crow, Cason, artificial insemination technician.

Out of the 286 cows artificially bred up to June 1, at least 70 per cent were bred to Jersey bulls, 25 per cent to Guernseys and only 5 per cent to Holsteins, Crow reported.

"We are growing right a long and hope to have at least 1,000 in the program by fall," commented A. Z. Murick, Cason dairyman and president of the Eastland County Dairy Association, sponsors of the breeding program.

"The very first goal that we set up when we organized in May of 1948 was to establish an artificial breeding program in the county. We actually started to artificially breed cows on February 8, only ten months after we perfected our organization," Myrick said when discussing the results of the organization.

Any owner within a 30 mile radius of Cason can get his cow artificially bred to either a Guernsey, Jersey or Holstein bull for a total of only \$5.00 with two repeat services free if necessary.

Cows can be signed up with either Crow at Cason, Murick at Cason or at the County Agent's office in Eastland.

Railroad Defendant In \$125,000 Suit

FORT WORTH, Tex., June 21 (UP)—The Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railroad was defendant today in a \$125,000 damage suit filed by Chesley L. Duvall of Cleburne.

Duvall, a former employe of the railroad, alleges he was injured permanently Aug. 7, 1947, when the upper part of a two-deck stock car fell on him as he worked beneath it.

Nationalists Bomb British Motor Vessel

SHANGHAI, China, June 21 (UP)—Nationalist planes bombed and strafed a British motor vessel in the Whangpoo river near Shanghai today a few hours after the government at Canton announced a "total" blockade of Communist-held ports.

At least four of the 68 British and Chinese crew members were injured in the attack on the 8,281-ton Blue Funnel liner vessel Anshien.

The ship, heavily damaged, its engine-room flooded, was driven aground near the mouth of the Whangpoo.

Britain, whose warships were shelled by the Communists before Shanghai fell to the Reds, immediately protested the Nationalist bombing. The foreign office note, in which Britain reserved the right to demand compensation for damage, was handed to the Nationalist foreign office in Canton.

The attack came during the fourth and most serious Nationalist air raid on the Shanghai area since the Communists captured the city.

Other foreign lines immediately routed their vessels away from Shanghai. The British cancelled all Shanghai sailings and the Dutch Royal and Interocean Lines and the American President Lines said they were considering similar action.

Mrs. Hansford died late Monday afternoon at the Ranger General Hospital where she had been ill for a number of weeks. Known to her many friends as Susie, Susan Ruth Hansford was born on June 7, 1881 in Opelika, Alabama. She was a member of the First Methodist Church, the Spanish War Veterans Auxiliary, the American Legion Auxiliary, the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, and of the Royal Neighbors. She was married to Mr. Hansford on March 8, 1913 at Tyler, Texas.

Survivors are her husband, R. H. (Bob) Hansford, a stepson, Billie Hansford of Madill, Oklahoma, a stepdaughter, Jessie Evans of New York, N. May Ask Charges Against Lonely Hearts Club Fan

LAKEPORT, Cal., June 21 (UP)—District Attorney Lovett Fraser said today he may ask the grand jury for murder and arson indictments against handsome Stephen Brunahan, 31, "Lonely Heart" club fan jailed after his wife and stepdaughter perished in a mystery fire.

Fraser said all evidence in his possession led authorities to believe there was a distinct possibility of "foul play" in the deaths of Mrs. Virginia Brunahan, 31, and her daughter by a former marriage, Agnes, 2.

They died a week ago in a fire that destroyed their small cabin 10 miles northwest of here. At the time, Brunahan was inside the cabin taking a shower. He said he was unable to save them.

Fraser said the suspicions of authorities were aroused by a "compelling factor" — Brunahan lost nothing in the fire.

"He left his wrist watch at a jewelry store to be cleaned," said Fred Crump, assistant district attorney. "He told Fraser his belongings had been destroyed in the fire, but we found a trunk, a valise and a suitcase, all packed with his effects in the garage. He said he always kept them there."

"He was wearing his glasses when first seen outside the burning house although he told us he was taking a shower. He told us he always wears his glasses in the shower."

Negro Woman Gets Suspended Sentence For Ranger Burglary

Following indictment by an Eastland Grand Jury Thursday, Johnny Rae Williams, Ranger negro woman, was tried in 91st District Court Friday on a charge of burglary and received a five-year suspended sentence by Judge George L. Davenport, according to the Sheriff's office.

The woman plead guilty and waived trial by jury. The charge resulted from the recent burglary of another negro woman's house in Ranger.

Other indictments by the Grand Jury included two counts of burglary and theft of the A. & P. Grocery in Eastland, against Clyde Blair. Bond was set at \$2,000 on each indictment. Blair is being retained in custody, pending posting of bail.

Roy L. Mearns was indicted on two counts of theft by bailee and swindle by worthless check of the King Motor Co. of Eastland. Hillman Bridges was indicted for theft by bailee in connection with the same case. Both are being retained in Sheriff's custody.

Combine Shortage Plagues Harvest

AMARILLO, Tex., June 21 (UP)—A shortage of at least 550 combines, continued to plague the Panhandle wheat belt today, as men and machinery raced to complete the harvest before the wheat shatters.

Day and night harvest operations were underway across the grain-producing area, where continuous rains had caused serious delays. The round-the-clock schedule was an effort to beat the machinery shortage which appears to be getting worse instead of better.

Estimates of the combine shortage in Lipscomb County alone ranged as high as 300, although the Texas Employment Commission placed the need at 150.

Lipscomb County also reported a need for additional trucks, combine operators and tractor drivers.

Ochiltree County called for 75 additional combines, and Handsford County asked for 50. Floyd, Hale, Swisher and Gray counties needed from 20 to 30 machines, and Childers and Roberts counties each were short 15.

Missing News Editor Sought

GALVESTON, Tex., June 21 (UP)—Police had found no trace today of Robert J. (Bob) Savage, 40-year-old news editor, who has been missing since last Wednesday.

Savage's absence was reported Saturday by his wife, who became alarmed and said she feared he might be a victim of amnesia. Savage is news director of radio station KGIC here.

The newsman collapsed May 2 in an elevator. His wife said he had been fatigued ever since.

Lovell Gets \$2,250 In Compromise Settlement Of \$26,136 Damage Suit

A compromise settlement was reached Monday morning by parties involved in a civil suit for damages filed in 91st District Court by J. W. Lovell of Eastland against O. D. Dillingham of Abilene, doing business as Banner Ice Company, with the plaintiff receiving \$2,250 and cost of the suit.

The plaintiff asked \$26,136 damage as result of a traffic accident in Eastland Dec. 10, 1948. It was alleged in the suit filed by plaintiff Feb. 21, 1949, he suffered permanent injuries when he started to cross the street on the southwest corner of the courthouse square.

Judge George L. Davenport entered an order approving the compromise agreement.

No Clue Yet In Tinney Slaying

TEXAS CITY, June 21 (UP)—Authorities, seeking a solution to the death of attractive Iris Tinney, found unconscious and dying on a roadside early Saturday, voiced the belief today that the 23-year-old Galveston woman went for her last ride with a stranger.

She died at a Texas City hospital Saturday afternoon without gaining consciousness. Deputy Sheriff Sam Gibbons said Miss Tinney apparently jumped or was pushed from a speeding automobile, although a blow on the head with a blunt instrument apparently caused her death.

Apparently the last person besides the killer to see the young woman alive was Galveston county Deputy Sheriff Eddie Toledano who reported seeing her on U. S. Highway 75 at Dickinson, north of here, attempting to hitch a ride. Doctors said she was not criminally assaulted.

She was the daughter of M. V. Tinney, a linotype operator for the Galveston News.

OFFICERS UNDER FIRE OVER ALABAMA VIOLENCE

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., June 21 (UP)—Law officers in two counties were under public fire today as a "newsmag" charged he was beaten while investigating recent unpunished mob terrorism in which 11 persons were flogged or threatened with hanging.

Clarke Stallworth, 23-year-old Birmingham post reporter, swore out assault warrants against two men in neighboring Walker County.

He charged they attacked him with their fists and a monkey wrench when he questioned them about the hooded outrages.

The alleged beating was the latest incident connected with a wave of masked gang violence in Jefferson (Birmingham) County and next-door Walker County.

The unpunished outbreaks brought these other developments:

1. Jefferson County Sheriff Holt McDowell drew criticism from veterans and business groups for his "miserable failure" in trying to curb hooded violence in his area.

2. Clark Wells, chairman of an American Legion committee, said his group was "not satisfied" by a conference with McDowell and planned to "demand answers" to a list of questions regarding the violence. The list will be drawn up at a veterans meeting tonight.

3. Grover B. Baggett, sheriff of Walker County in which the newsmag charged he was beaten, was ordered by the Alabama Supreme Court to stand impeachment trial July 11 on 86 counts of corruption and neglect of duty.

(The charges against Baggett involved alleged illegal liquor dealings and the acceptance of fictitious surety bonds.)

4. The Alabama legislature reconvened in Montgomery, with the House of Representatives scheduled to begin consideration of an anti-masking measure already passed by the Senate.

5. Civic leaders here considered forming a "citizens' posse" to curb the most flagrant outbreak of mob violence since the Ku Klux Klan ran riot in Alabama in the early 20's.

TEXAS NEWS BRIEFS

COLLEGE STATION, June 21 (UP)—Some 200 church people, over half of them rural pastors, were assembled here today for a five-day conference.

Forty-three rural pastors, who recently received scholarships from organizations throughout the state, will be honored during the meeting.

Addressing the pastors on "meeting the needs of the rural church," Dr. Monroe Vivian, Tyler, opened the session last night.

AMARILLO, June 21 (UP)—The legality of Potter County's domestic relations court was in doubt today.

County Judge Eugene Jordan said the question might lead to a "friendly suit" in the supreme court, from which a ruling would be sought.

Constitutionality of the court was questioned yesterday when County Auditor John Crudgington refused to approve an amendment to the current budget to provide for it.

BEAUMONT, June 21 (UP)—The Texas Federation of Labor went into the second of its three-day convention here today.

Delegates yesterday heard Dan Tracy, president of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, belabor the Taft-Hartley law as "class legislation of the worst type."

HOUSTON, Tex., June 21 (UP)—Police busted the killer today of Pete Garcia, 17, shot to death last night in a vacant lot.

Witnesses at a tavern nearby said there was an argument. The name of the other man involved was not learned.

Garcia was shot once in the back.

Stallworth said he was attacked while running down reports in nearby Sumiton, Ala., that a mother and her two daughter and three men were beaten and treated with hanging by hooded and robed ridders.

The reporter said he went to a hardware store in Sumiton on a tip that its proprietor, Roscoe Fowler, "had some information" about the Ku Klux Klan.

Stallworth said he questioned Fowler about the Klan, and Fowler told him to come into a back room.

There, the newsmag charged, Fowler turned and hit him in the face, saying, "call me a Klan, will you, you —?"

Stallworth said he struggled with Fowler a short time before another man, identified as Glenn Godfrey, burst into the room and came at him "with a monkey wrench."

HOUSTON, Tex., June 21 (UP)—A 64-year-old nightwatchman was struck and killed last night as he walked on highway 59, apparently making his rounds.

The Sheriff's department said John Walton died instantly when hit by a car driven by Maj. W. M. Styron of Ellington Air Force Base, who said lights from another car blinded him.

A justice of the peace returned a verdict of accidental death.

HOUSTON, Tex., June 21 (UP)—Raymond McGuire, 21, of Lampasas, died in a hospital last night from injuries he received last Wednesday when his truck collided with a car.

HOUSTON, Tex., June 21 (UP)—Radio Station Manager Jack Harris laid claim today for what may be the longest reception on record for any Texas radio station.

Harris said he had received a report from D. C. Smith of Invercargill, New Zealand, that standard broadcasts by radio station KPRC had been picked up April 25 and 26.

Invercargill is some 8,000 air miles from Houston.

Bids Studied For Randolph Field Housing Units

GALVESTON, Tex., June 21 (UP)—The U. S. Army Engineers announced today that bids from three firms were being considered in a proposed 72-apartment housing unit at Randolph Field.

District Engineer Col. B. L. Robinson said the contract award, to be announced later, would be in the neighborhood of \$950,000 for the nine two-story buildings, of permanent-type construction.

Col. Robinson said bids were submitted by the McKenzie Construction Co. of San Antonio; H. B. Zachry Construction Co. of San Antonio, and the Ricks Construction Co. of Austin.

Col. Robinson also announced that formal approval had been given a bid by the McCann Construction Co. of Ft. Worth to build 104 apartment units at Carswell Air Force Base near Fort Worth.

The McCann bid, announced last week, was \$891,382 for the family-type dwellings. The contract for installing utilities went to the Oscar Quisile Co. of Fort Worth, on a bid of \$82,000.

Escape Attempt Proves Fatal

SANDY POINT, Tex. June 21 (UP)—A young convict paid with his life yesterday when he tried to flee a work gang at Darrington Prison Farm near here.

Bobby Frank Dyer, 25, died in the prison hospital after Guard Harold Deutski opened fire. Dyer, serving a 20-year sentence for robbery from Dallas county, was running across a cotton patch and did not obey the guard's command to halt.

Wounded was Dyer's companion in the abortive escape, Kenneth Kilpatrick, 25, serving 35 years for robbery from Moore county. He was under treatment at the prison hospital.

Proposes Quick Settlement Of Tidelands Issue

WASHINGTON, June 21 (UP)—Special Master William H. Davis has recommended to the Supreme Court immediate proceedings to settle California's tidelands dispute with the federal government.

Davis recommended that the settlement cover seven coastal areas—three specified by the federal government, and four proposed by California but opposed by the federal authorities.

The boundary argument stems from the Supreme Court's decision two years ago that the federal government — and not California — has paramount rights over disputed off-shore oil lands.

Davis recommended that the Supreme Court appoint "a special court of federal judges" to make "the ultimate findings of fact or conclusions of law."

First, however he recommended the appointment of another special master to take documentary evidence. He said the master should have authority to assemble all necessary information and to simplify the issues, but not to make findings or conclusions.

Babich Begins Life Sentence

MIWAUKEE, June 21 (UP)—Milton Babich, 19, began serving a life sentence today for murdering Patricia Birmingham, 16, to conceal that he made her sister Kathleen, 18 pregnant out of wedlock.

Babich, a handsome former high school honor student, was raced to the Wisconsin State Prison at Waupun early today, less than three hours after a jury of 10 men and two women found him guilty of first degree murder.

The slight, olive-skinned youth stood rigid and grim last night as Judge Herbert J. Steffes handed him the mandatory sentence required by the conviction — life imprisonment. He turned pale when the conviction was announced but won back composure quickly.

The judge added the words "at hard labor" to make his sentence stiffer.

Wisconsin has no death penalty. With time off for good behavior Babich will be eligible for parole in 11 years. His attorneys said they would ask for a new trial. Falling in that, they will appeal.

COL. KERNAN CONFUSED BY WIFE'S STRANGE STORY

McALLEN, Tex., June 21 (UP)—Retired Army Col. Harold Kernan said today he was "too mixed up" to talk about his wife's story of being kidnapped and held hostage for three months in Mexico.

Kernan, who rushed here from his home in Durango, Mexico, last night, tried to brush newsmen off.

"We want no publicity and I'll answer no questions," he said. He conversed with his wife, Cynthia, for two hours and then said he was "too mixed up to talk about it."

He said he would announce today whether he intended to have the matter investigated by Mexican authorities.

In an interview yesterday, Mrs. Kernan said two Mexicans seized her near her home at Durango on the night of March 17. They threw a blanket over her head, forced her into a car and drove all night to a tiny adobe hut.

During her captivity, she said, she was questioned five times by a tall, blond man, speaking "precise English," who wanted to know what her son and brother had done on Army duty in Alaska.

Mrs. Kernan's son, Benjamin, was a 1948 West Point graduate who died last November in a plane crash at Wright Field, O. Her brother also is an Army officer.

Mrs. Kernan said she did not know where the adobe hut was located. After three of four days she was moved, in a two-place airplane, to a large adobe house.

A swarthy fat man and a large woman "apparently of Italian descent" guarded her there.

She escaped last Wednesday by stealing their jeep and driving until the tank was empty. Then she hitchhiked to Renoza, Mexico.

If confirmed by the Senate, Mrs. Mesta will be the third woman to hold a minister's portfolio. Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen Rhode served as U. S. Minister to Denmark from 1933 to 1936, and Mrs. J. Borden Harriman served as U. S. Minister to Norway from 1937 to 1940.
