Fishing Boat, Liner Collide; **Crew Escapes**

New York) - June 28-(UP)-Twelve men escaped death by a scant 100 feet today when their 84-foot fishing boat crunched into the side of this 36,287-ton-luxury Liner in a murky morning fog.

The Marmax with a crew of 12 out of New Bedford, Mass., which was outward bound with a fishing fleet, bounced off the port-side of the Nieuw Amsterdam 20 miles off Nantucket, Mass., at 4:33 A. M.

"We had no warming that the Marmax was near us," Commo-dore Cornelis H. P. Coster, master

of the Nieuw Amsterdam, said. There was a grinding crunch and the morning fog-it was a quarter of an hour after sunupwas filled with yells and curses.

"We put a motor boat over and found that the Marmax had her lose stove in above the water line," Coster said.

he was in no danger of sink ing. The Nieuw Amsterdam suffered slight damage in her port side, also above the water line. There were other fishing boats in the vicinity and after contacting them and the Coast Guard the Nieuw Amsterdam proceeded at 5:35 A. M., daylight saving time."

The Marmax headed for Nan-tucket under its own power. Seamen said that if the Marmax had crossed the bow of the Ninuw Amsterdam, she would probably have been crushed and her crew lost.



Culbertson had managed the ranch in partnership with an R. S. Coon. When Coon decided to retire, he agreed to sell out his share, but only on condition it be distributed to Culbertson's child-

Culbertson set up a new partership with his four sons in 1939. Later a share was created for his daughter. Culbertson contributed the money for the purchase of the children's shares.

The Internal Revenue Bureau held that the partnership was not valid for tax purpose, demanding back taxes for 1940 and 1941 from the elder Culbertson. The U. S. Tax Court upheld

this view, but was reversed by the Fifth U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals. The government appealed. The Supreme Court decision sent the case back to the Tax Court for reconsideration, holding that there may be a "bona fide'






