Election Called To Name Directors Of Water District

Says Schools Fail To Inspire Love Of U. S.

PORT WORTH, Tex., June 30 (UP)—The president of the American Bar Association charged today that the nation's schools had failed to inspire "proper love for the American way of life in our young people."

Frank E. Holman of Seattle, Wash., levelled the sweeping accusation in an address to the state convention of the Texas Bar Association.

Holman declared that many young people of today fall prey to Communism's ideological promises because they lack the intellectual and moral discipline that comes from work in history, science, mathematics, and literature.

Teaching of American history is so ignored in many of the schools of the country, Holman said, that state legislatures are passing laws requiring it be taught.

Missouri passed such a law, he said, but schools experienced difficulty in complying because teachers lacked sufficient knowledge of history to teach the subject. "If there is any justification for our enormous outlay of public funds for public education, it is to train men and women for citizenship and inspire in them an abiding loyalty to their own country which neither Communism or any other foreign 'ism' can understand," Holman said.

Little Credit Relaxing Seen

WASHINGTON, June 30 (UP)—A nationwide survey indicated today that most merchants and lenders will not ease credit terms when government controls on installment buying expire at mid-July.

Some used-car dealers, however, will stiffen credit terms to force buyers into accepting lower down-payments and longer payment periods.

Law under which Federal Reserve Board controls consumer credit expires tonight along with hundreds of other anti-inflation measures. This will leave store and finance companies free to impose whatever credit terms they see fit.

Other controls due to expire include the board's power to require bank reserve requirements, the office of defense transportation's power to control use of railroads equipment. Import controls on fats and oils will also expire unless the Senate acts to extend a house approved measure. The Senate last night passed another measure extending import controls on tin.

Rotarians Hear Explanations On Gilmer-Aikin Education Bill

G. B. Rush, incoming president of the Rotary Club, was the speaker at the regular club meeting Wednesday at noon at the Ghobson Hotel and spoke on the Gilmer-Aikin Bill.

Rush stated that like any other new pattern for education or any other institution, the new bill cannot assure a better program but that it has fine points that unquestionably will improve the school system of Texas.

He pointed out that the bill will cost the Ranger system at least two teachers through the fact that state assistance will be based on average daily attendance in schools, rather than the per capita scholarship age basis. He explained this point by pointing out the fact that an epidemic of measles in Ranger schools last year cut down the daily average attendance until it will eliminate one teacher from the faculty according to the specifications set forth in the Gilmer-Aikin Bill.

Presidio's 104 Nation's Peak

TEXAS nearly always has something to brag about including the weather. Presidio's 104 degrees yesterday was the highest in the nation, the Dallas Weather Bureau said.

Temperature generally were in the upper 90's throughout the state with El Paso reporting 97 degrees; Houston, Corpus Christi and Amarillo 95; Abilene and Lubbock 94; Texarkana, Dallas, Brownsville 93; Waco and San Antonio 92, and Marfa 89.

Lowest this morning ranged from 62 at Guadalupe Pass and Marfa to 78 at Galveston. Rainfall reports included .31 inch at Salt Flat and .08 at El Paso up to 6:30 A. M. today.

The weather bureau forecast partly cloudy with a few widely scattered thundershowers and not much change in temperatures.

Visit Made To Stephenville By Farm Agents

County Agent J. M. Cooper, Assistant County Agent Ed Steele, Jr., and Farmer's Home Administration Agent George L. Lane went to Stephenville Wednesday afternoon for a visit at the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station. During the visit, the farm agent inspected new varieties of yellow-fleshed peaches. A brief discussion was held in the orchard with nurserymen and fruit growers.

The new peach varieties include Redaven; Fisker, Sunbeam, Dixiegem, Jerseyland, Missouri, Prairie Daybreak, Prairie Sunrise and two selections from Beltsville. All of the varieties ripen four to five weeks ahead of Elberta and precede Golden Jubilee peaches by a few days.

Land Office Flooded With Queries As To Veterans Land Legislation

AUSTIN, Tex., June 30 (UP)—Letters, cascading into the state's general land office, have been rivaling the fan mail of a Hollywood star.

Take it from a man who knows—Alvis Vandygriff, executive secretary of the Veterans Land Board, the agency that's largely responsible for the rocketing upsurge.

Letters, Vandygriff said, are averaging about 200 a day. And virtually every writer, he said, wants to know about the Veterans Land Bill, new legislation enacted into law by this session of the legislature.

The bill went into effect June 5. Basically, it provides for the issuance of \$25,000,000 (M) in bonds.

The money will be loaned to World War II veterans for the purchase of land. The money, to be paid back over as long a period as 40 years, draws 4 per cent interest.

Administration of the act is directed by a Veterans Land Board composed of three persons, Gov. Beauford Jester, Attorney General Price Daniel and General Land Commissioner Bascom Giles. Giles is chairman of the Board. Vandygriff was hired as Executive Secretary.

The Board went into action immediately after the bill became effective. Right now the agency is preparing bulletins and pamphlets, each of them aimed at answering inquiries. Provisions of the bill cover any Texas Veteran of World War II. Specifically, the veteran must be—and have been—a citizen of Texas and served at least 90 days sometime between Sept. 16, 1940, and Dec. 31, 1946. Women members of the armed services are included.

Methodist Church Air Conditioned

Installation of three air-conditioning units at the First Methodist Church has been completed and the units will be in use for services Sunday.

The three units have a capacity of 12,000 cubic feet of washed air per minute and have been adjusted to the point where their operation is hardly audible.

The Rev. Cecil Ellis, pastor of the church, stated today that the units should make the church comfortable in the hottest weather and invited the public to attend the services at the church.

Services through July and August will be conducted at 9:45 A. M. and at 8:00 P. M. Sunday school will follow the early morning worship and will begin at 10:40 A. M.

Banker Seeks To Reopen Firms

McALLEN, Tex., June 30 (UP)—Sam Miller, Rio Grande Valley financier being sued for more than \$200,000, today was trying to reopen two of his many firms—Missions Foods, Inc. and Hidalgo Packing Co.

A. W. Taylor, Miller's attorney, said "considerable progress was made toward settlement for reopening."

Miller met yesterday with 26 lawyers and creditors. The meetings were expected to continue, but no date has been set for the next conference.

Miller returned home Tuesday night after a 10-day trip to Guatemala on his banana boat, the Marjorie E.

The lawsuits accumulated during his absence.

LOCAL SERVICE BATTERY DRAWS PRAISE AT CAMP

Word was received this morning from Cpl. Wesley Walker, reporter for Ranger's Service Battery unit of the 648th Battalion of the National Guard, that the Battalion has been commended as the best battalion in the division artillery and the Ranger unit has been commended as the best battery in the 648th Field Artillery Battalion.

July 19 has been set as the date for the election of seven directors for the Eastland County Water Supply District, according to an announcement made today.

The election has been called by County Judge P. L. Crossley and voting will take place at the city hall in Ranger. W. W. Paschall has been named presiding judge of the election.

Only qualified voters residing in Eastland County Water Supply District are eligible to vote. To be eligible a person must own taxable property in the district, such property having been rendered for taxation and must have paid a poll tax.

No ballot will be printed for the election but voters will be asked to write in the names of seven eligible men. The seven candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

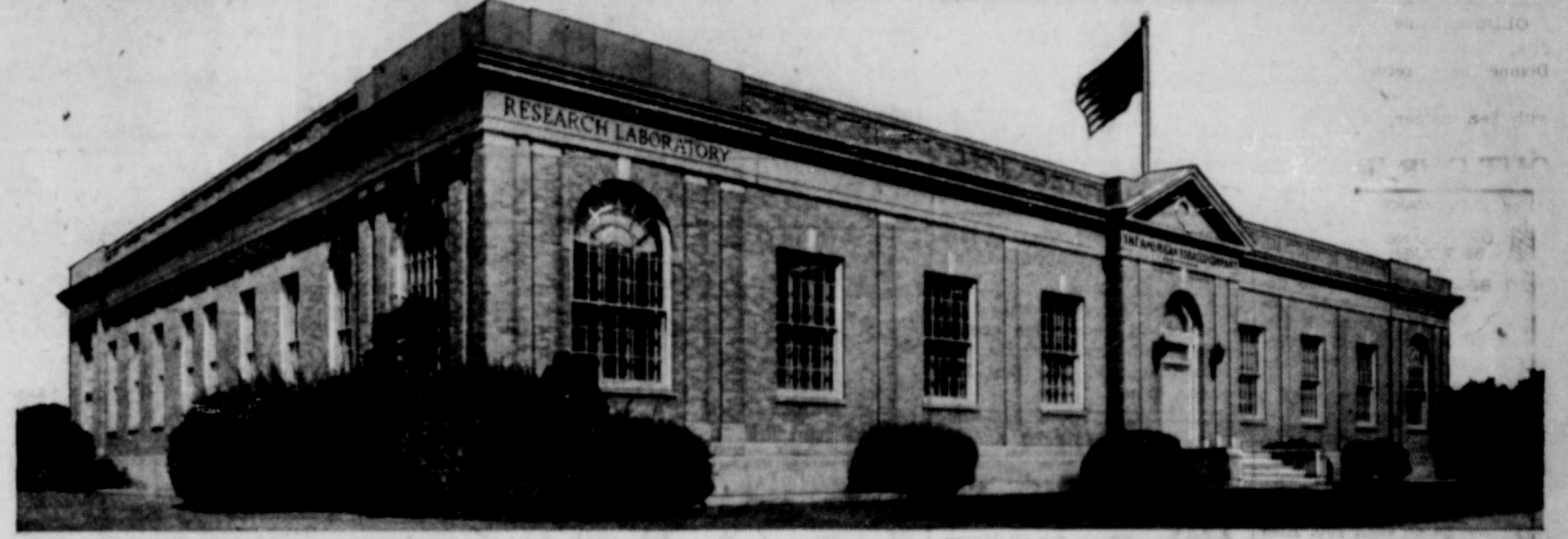

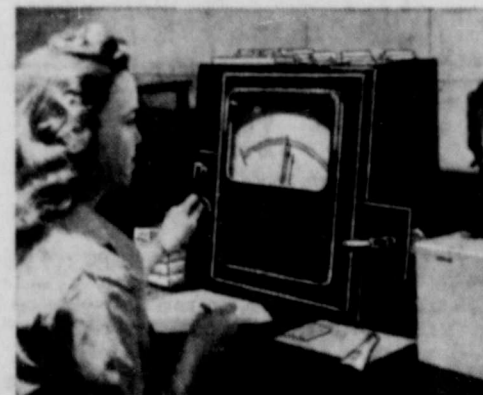

Charges Filed In Dallas Stabbing

DALLAS, June 30 (UP)—Murder charges were being prepared today, police homicide officers said, against Hansel Freeman Emory, 26, in connection with the fatal stabbing of William R. George, Jr.

The 25-year-old George died yesterday morning, about 30 hours after a strange altercation at White Rock Lake. It apparently began because the lights of his automobile played on a yellow convertible parked at the lakeside.

Emory told Police Homicide Capt. Will Fritz that he was the driver of the yellow convertible, and the policeman said he had a statement from Emory in which he gave details of a lakeside fight about Monday midnight.

He said George's car pulled up behind his and that the driver kept his headlights turned on, according to the statement quoted by Fritz.

The statement also said: Emory asked the driver of the other car if he had "lost anything" there, and was told in reply that the occupants of the second car—George and his woman companion—were seeking a place to fish.

A rubber company employe, Emory said George became abusive when he told him to "move on." Before he died, George told authorities that the driver of the convertible refused to accept his apology and pursued his automobile to start the fight that ended in

in his death. Fritz said the fatal weapon was a pair of pliers, one handle of which had been sharpened and fashioned into a screwdriver.

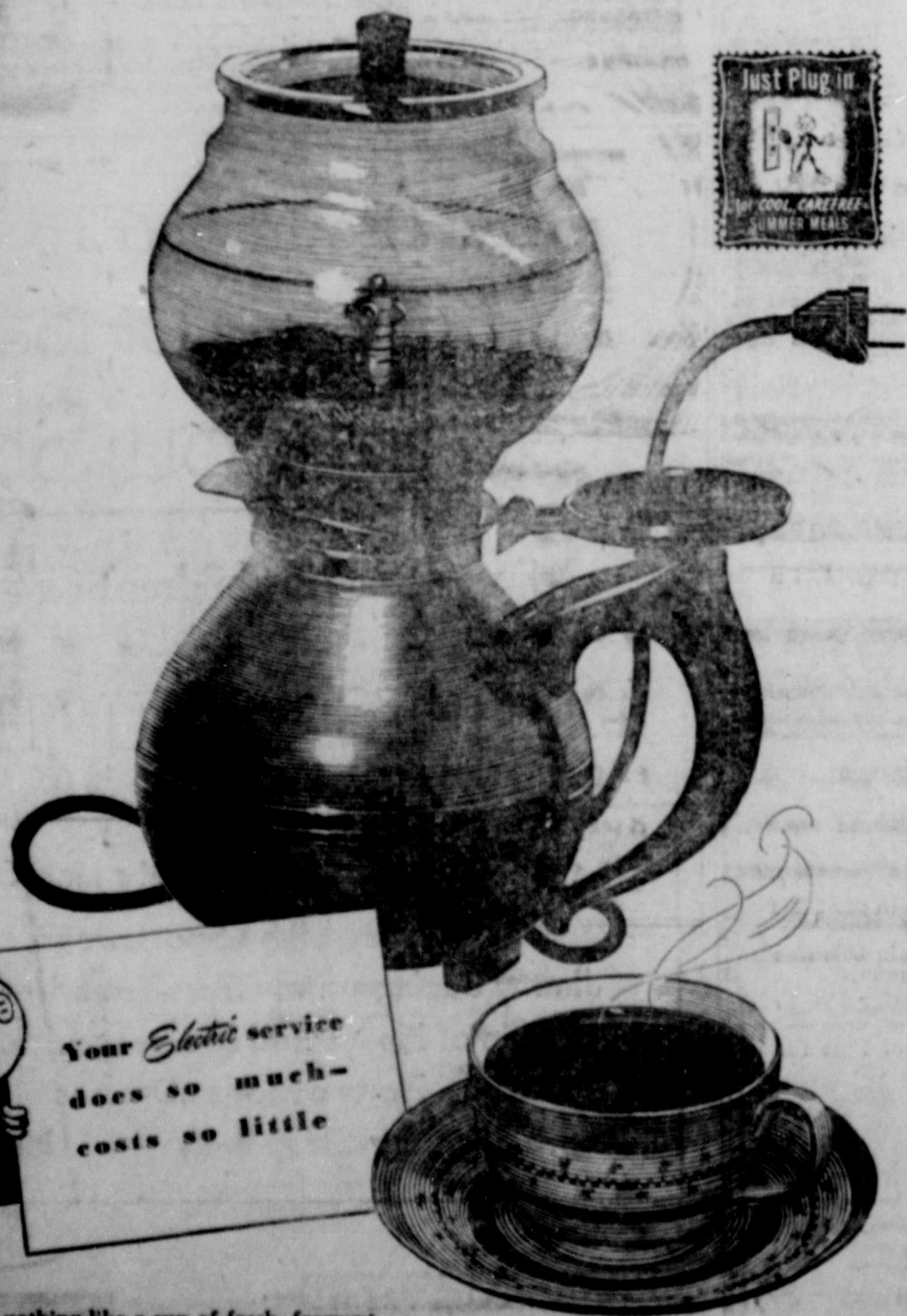

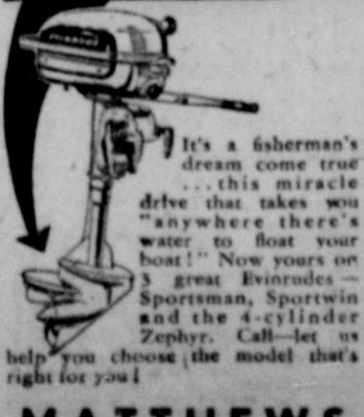

Suits Charging Closed Markets Filed By U. S.

WASHINGTON, June 30 (UP)—Harvey General Ford Clark today filed a civil anti-trust suit against the Du Pont Company, General Motors Corp., and United States Rubber Co., which he described as being together the "largest single concentration of industrial power" in the country.

The suit was filed at Federal District Court at Chicago. It also named as defendants the Christiana Securities Company and the Delaware Realty and Investment Corporation, Wilmington, and 428 members of the Du Pont family. The Christiana and Delaware Companies were described as personal holding companies of the Du Ponts.

The suit charged that the E. I. Du Pont de Nemours Company, General Motors, and U. S. Rubber sell their products to each other at preferential prices and in closed markets.

Two Charged In Twitchell Case

KOUNTZE, Tex., June 30 (UP) — Murder charges were on file today, against two ex-convicts who abducted a woman motorist and took her car, intending to use it in a bank robbery.

Darius Goleman, 30 and Robert Alex LeViness, 28, did not go through with their plan to hold-up the Hull-Daisetta Bank. But the only reason they gave for the brutal killing of attractive, blonde Mrs. Eloise Twitchell was that they had the bank robbery plotted and needed an automobile.

Mrs. Twitchell, 32, picked up the pair near Beaumont as hitchhikers and, they said in signed confessions, that led to her murder. She was slain last Sept. 28 in Frost County near here. Her body was found a week later.

Goleman and LeViness said they got her out of the car and shot her twice through the head. Then Goleman said he hit her three times in the head with a pistol butt.

The felons did not elaborate on the reason for abandonment of their bank robbery project. A check of the record showed that Goleman's brother, T. J. (Red) Goleman, tried to rob the Hull-Daisetta Bank in 1940 and was shot by a Sheriff's posse.

LeViness said Goleman were arrested Tuesday night, nine months to the day after the Twitchell murder. Harris County Sheriff's Office, acting on a tip about which they refused to elaborate, and it came soon after Goleman and LeViness met again for the first time since shortly after the crime.

They told officers they parted on Sept. 29, the day after the murder, and did not meet again until last Thursday, at Orange.

RUSSIANS STOP FOOD TRUCKS GOING INTO WEST BERLIN

BERLIN, June 30 (UP)—The Russians today stopped all food trucks bound for Western Berlin.

American authorities immediately denounced the Soviet move as a direct violation of the Russian's 10-week-old agreement to lift the Berlin Blockade.

By noon, German police said, 160 food trucks had been halted. Vehicles carrying supplies other than food were permitted to pass.

Soviet guards halted the trucks at a checkpoint two miles West of Berlin after they had been cleared at the Helmstedt Border Crossing and had travelled 110 miles through the Soviet Zone without interference.

The guards demanded from all drivers a pass signed by a Soviet officer. American officials said the blockade-lifting agreement called for a return to regulations in effect before the blockade. No special Russian pass was required then.

The Russians had stopped a few trucks yesterday on the same grounds, but the new blockade did not become fully effective until today.

The Russians also issued an order in the State of Brandenburg, which surrounds Berlin, forbidding farmers to sell foodstuffs to Western Berlin.

It was understood the order was prompted by the higher prices paid for food in Western Berlin than in the eastern sector of the city.

Meanwhile, elevated train tickets went on sale in Berlin for the first time in 41 days. The Soviet-controlled railway management announced elevated service would be resumed tomorrow.

But there was no word on whether passenger and freight trains between Berlin and Western Germany would resume normal schedules at the same time.

Train service was disrupted by a 30-day strike of West Berlin

British Attorney Praises ERP Plan

FOR WORTH, June 30 (UP) — Sir Hartley Shawcross, British Attorney General, today credited the Marshall Plan with blocking the spread of Communism in Europe.

Sir Hartley, in Fort Worth to address the Texas State Bar Association, said last night he thought Russia's concession to the Paris Conference hinted of a friendlier policy.

He told a press conference that he did not believe Russia has ever intended to wage a shooting war. The Soviets hoped, he said, to create instability and economic chaos and then gain control of Europe.

The Marshall Plan has stood in the Red's path of conquest, Sir Hartley said.

He predicted "they won't succeed" in their objective to wreck the plan and he also expressed faith in the United Nations as an instrument of World Peace.

The UN serves as a safety valve for the "Russians to let off steam," he said. "They may do the Russians some good and certainly does us no harm."

He said the UN also served as a sounding board for world opinion on controversial issues.

"Even the Russians don't want to act against world opinion," he said.
