It is generally admitted that one of Hitler's greatest strengths was in the fact that through his efforts in power, the youth of many was thoroughly indoctrinated with the Nazi way of life.

If it worked for Hitler, it certainly ought to work for America. The youth of the land as the citizens of another day will be loyal to the extent that they have been taught as children.

We are all too quick to criticize our government regardless of what ears it may fall upon and a child does not distinguish between constructive criticism and destructive criticism. How can we expect young people to respect something which we ourselves are prone to tear down.

If a child is taught that it is a great privilege to have a voice in his government through the right to vote when he becomes of age, he is likely to cherish and make use of that privilege. If he is taught that the four freedoms are something to be protected, he is likely to do something about keeping them.

And the best way to teach a child a lesson is by setting an example.

### Government Ends Year Nearly Two Billion In Red

WASHINGTON, July 2 (UP)—A whopping treasury deficit for the fiscal year just ended, far beyond official estimates, today brought new demands for government economy.

Secretary John W. Snyder announced that the treasury went into the red in fiscal year 1949 by \$1,811,440,047 (B). President Truman estimated six months ago that the 1949 deficit would be \$600,000,000 (M), a mis of more than \$1,211,000,000. His severest critics had not expected the red figure to exceed \$1,500,000,000 (B). But they fear it will be much more next year.

Federal taxes raised an enormous sum, \$38,245,000,000 (B). But it cost \$40,057,000,000 (B) to operate the government including foreign aid for the 12 months which ended at midnight June 30. The president took the bad news with him when he sailed at 10:30 A. M., EDT today aboard the Yacht Williamsburg for a July 4 weekend cruise on the Lower Potomac.

He planned to devote much of his time to his forthcoming mid-year economic report to Congress. In preparation for that study and to discuss preliminaries of the 1951 budget, Mr. Truman met yesterday with several cabinet, budget and other aides. The administration charges blame for the big deficit to the Republican tax reduction vote by the 80th Congress. Republicans and some Democrats contend that Mr. Truman is responsible because of what they regard as extravagant government spending.

Wherever the responsibility may lie, the facts are that this rich country has been in the red all but two of the past 19 fiscal years. The two surplus years were in 1947 and 1948 and the excesses of income over outgo were in 1947 and 1948 and the (M), and \$8,419,000,000 (B).

### Texas Fair And Hot For Fourth

Texas began its long July 4th holiday weekend with the kind of weather calculated to stir up heavy highway traffic — mostly fair and hot.

Scattered thundershowers in both East and West Texas were forecast for tonight or Sunday but the overall weather outlook was not encouraging for those who like their temperatures on the temperate side.

Presidio was the hottest spot in the state Friday, with 102 degrees Victoria and Wichita Falls had 100 degrees. Elsewhere, the mercury played from the middle to upper 90's.

Ozona residents snoozed blissfully in 61-degree weather last night, the coolest afforded Texans.

Austin, with 41-inch, and Lufkin, with 28-inch, had the most rainfall reported in the 24-hour ending at 6:30 A. M. today. San Antonio had 24-inch, Galveston .02 from a "baby hurricane" which lashed the island resort with 75-mile winds for a half-hour Friday afternoon, causing one death directly and a second indirectly.

#### Houston Woman Leaps To Death

HOUSTON, July 2 (UP)—An unidentified woman, about 30, jumped to her death from the twelfth floor of a downtown office building today after carefully placing \$2.27 on the window sill.

Her body plummeted 10 floors and smashed through a skylight on the roof of a two-story annex of the Sterling Building.

The impact was heard by building Superintendent R. C. Hochmuth, who notified police before investigating. Hochmuth said he saw the woman's inert form topple from the skylight, where it had crushed an iron grill, and fall to the roof a few feet below.

There were no identifying papers on the body, but a cotton print dress she wore had the label, "Marcy Lee — Dallas."

Building employees found \$2.27 neatly laid out on the ledge of a twelfth story window, presumably the one the woman opened to leap to her death. A coroner said she died instantly.

#### New Boss Reports To American Zone

BERLIN, July 2 (UP)—John J. McCloy, new boss of the American zone of Germany, flew to Berlin today with a promise to continue the policies of his predecessor, Gen. Lucius D. Clay.

More than 300 white and negro guardsmen, a company of Military Police, and Army band and a life and drum corps lined up and saluted as the 54-year-old Philadelphia-born lawyer stepped from his plane at Tempelhof Air-drome.

He came here to assume formally his new duties as American Military Governor in Germany. After the formation of the new Western German Republic following the Aug. 14 elections, he will become America's first high commissioner for Germany.

McCloy reviewed the troops with Lt. Gen. Clarence E. Huebner, U. S. Army Commander in Germany.

### MILLIONS TAKE TO ROADS AS LONG HOLIDAY BEGINS

The nation's city dwellers left their hot and humid homes by the millions today, flocking to beaches, picnic areas and resorts for the Independence Day weekend.

Roads were jammed-bumper to bumper, in some areas—but only a scattering of deaths in traffic accidents were reported across the nation.

Experts estimated that 33,000,000 cars would be on the highway at one time or another over the three-day period. That was 3,000,000 more than was on the roads over the Memorial Day weekend when 408 persons died in accidents, 229 in traffic.

Last year's Fourth of July holiday, which also fell on a weekend, resulted in 629 deaths, 296 in traffic, 204 by drowning and 129 due to miscellaneous mishaps.

From the midwest to the Allegheny Mountains, the weather was searing hot, but uncomfortable humid. Westward, more moderate weather prevailed.

The sudden wind that swept Iowa yesterday forced postponement of the semi-final round of the National Collegiate Golf Tournament. Golfers and spectators were drenched by the accompanying downpour.

Temperatures at Chicago set a new record for the year, hitting a high of 98 degrees. No relief was in sight.

### TWO DIE IN GALVESTON BABY HURRICANE FRIDAY

GALVESTON, Tex., July 2 (UP)—Two persons were known dead today after a baby hurricane roared through a n d around this island city late yesterday, damaging shore installations and smashing small boats like match-sticks.

Leroy Bushner, 18, recent high school graduate, drowned when mountainous waves were kicked up by the sudden 75-mile gust. He was swimming in the bay at the foot of sixty-first St.

Bushner's uncle, Charles Emmert, 48, died of a heart attack shortly after being summoned to identify the boy's body.

The Galveston wharves yacht, Eugene, was a casualty. The swanky boat piled up on the rocks at the quarantine station in the bay, and then sank. E. H. Thornton, Sr., vice president and general manager of the wharves, and pilot Charles Strickland were away from the Eugene in a skiff when the heavy winds struck. They managed to swim ashore.

The black clouds, loaded with sand, sped to shore at an estimated 50 mile per hour. The Galveston Weather Bureau said it rapidly built up to 65 miles, and then hit 75 mile gusts. Rainfall was negligible, about .04 of an inch.

Moving inland, the winds hit Houston. Sand whirled through downtown streets, and tree branches littered lawns in scattered residential sections. No major damage was reported. Radio stations and newspaper offices were deluged with inquiries about the possibility of a full-fledged hurricane.

### Delegates Back From VFW Meet

One of the highlights of the convention was the address by former Congressman Martin Dies who called upon the United States to outlaw the Communist party in this country, prepare for war with Russia and observe stricter screening of immigrants.

Another outstanding address was given by Mrs. Frances Anderson, past national president of the Auxiliary. Mrs. Anderson attacked teaching in American schools and urged a more careful supervision of school text books.

Clyde A. Lewis of New York, senior vice-commander-in-chief of the VFW addressed the gathering and scored the anti-veteran attitude in the nation's capital. He also praised the work of the auxiliary.

### Clark Defends FBI Procedures

WASHINGTON, July 2 (UP)—Attorney General Tom C. Clark, Defending FBI procedures, has announced that it will continue to complete files on individuals, even though some of the data may turn out to be rumor, malicious gossip and unverified charges.

He made that clear in a statement assuming full responsibility for the exposure of 34 secret FBI reports at the Judith Coplon spy trial.

Clark said he permitted the reports to be put in evidence — religiously and against the advice of FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover concerning some of the reports — because the only alternative was to drop the case against Miss Coplon.

By inference, he blamed Federal District Judge Albert L. Reeves, who presided at the Coplon trial, for forcing the disclosure of reports which Clark said involved the national security.

But the attorney general emphasized that the furor those documents created will not change the FBI's investigative methods. He said the agency has to collect all kinds of seemingly trivial, irrelevant and hearsay information because of the nature of its work.

Otherwise, he asserted, the FBI would be unable to operate.

### Independence Day Reminder: Tyranny Still Stalks Abroad

On the Fourth of July we celebrate the winning of independence as a nation. This day—in 1776—was the moment in history when a great enterprise founded on freedom was begun.

We Americans of the mid-20th century are the current custodians of those liberties born 173 years ago. We and our forefathers have seen them challenged by tyrannies that have come and gone in the world. We have guarded freedom well against these tests.

But the idea of tyranny dies hard. Crushed, it finds new forms and new tools and rises again. When it grows strong, it seeks to stifle liberty wherever it exists. For the heady draughts of free air are poisonous fumes to the tyrant.

Today tyranny is astride part of the world once more. In its new dress it is called communism. It has a strong weapon, a philosophy of government that professes to look toward a great, co-operative society welding the mass of men together.

Armed with this weapon, Communists have shrewdly muddled the world's thinking. They have made a starkly reactionary system appear progressive to some, thus trapping idealists, intellectuals and others easily drawn to the idea of co-operation.

Yet while extolling the glories of co-operative living, practicing Communists in Russia and other nations have ruthlessly stamped out liberty and real co-operation among peoples wherever they could.

Communist ideology is a hideous deception conceived to lure millions to the destruction of their freedoms. Communists have adopted the idea of co-operation only to debase it and corrupt it to their own tyrannical ends.

Not many Americans are deceived by this elaborate fraud. Some who are fooled are blinded to the realities by genuine grievances they nurse against our admittedly imperfect society. Feeling robbed of their American birthright, they unwittingly make themselves servants of a tyrant who, at a whim, would crush not only their liberties but their lives.

Independence Day is a good time to vow anew never to let this tyrant or any other set his cruel boot down on our soil. And to remember, too, that so long as we know him for what he is few of us are likely to welcome his coming. This one called a Communist we already know. Need there be any panic, then, when a few of his henchmen are unmasked?

## JUDITH COPLON SEEKS QUIET BEFORE NEW TRIAL

NEW YORK, July 2 (UP)—Judith Coplon, convicted spy went into seclusion with hometown friends today "to relax and rest up" for her next trial July 11 when she and her Russian sweetheart, Valentine A. Gubitchev, will be tried for conspiracy to commit espionage.

In her second trial, Miss Coplon will be tried on three counts charging that she and Gubitchev conspired to transmit vital government documents to Russia. If convicted she faces a maximum sentence of 35 years in jail and fines totaling \$25,000. Miss Coplon arrested at LaGuardia Field last night from

Washington after spending three hours in a capital jail, while her bail was being arranged. Dressed in black, she appeared haggard and much thinner than when her espionage trial began nine weeks ago. The former Justice Department employe was sentenced yesterday to 40 months to 10 years in prison for stealing government documents to give to Gubitchev, a Soviet engineer. She is free in \$20,000 bail pending an appeal.

The 28-year-old brunette was pale and unsmiling as she met reporters at the airport. She let her attorney, Archibald Palmer, do most of the talking. Asked if

he would see Gubitchev before the trial she answered sharply: "No".

She and the 32-year-old Gubitchev, a member of the construction staff for the United Nations Headquarters here, were arrested on a Third Avenue street corner in what the government termed a "spy tryst."

The government has charged Miss Coplon and Gubitchev jointly with conspiracy to defraud the United States for purposes of espionage. Miss Coplon is charged separately on two counts for conspiracy to obtain vital government information and for doing injury to the United States. A fourth count charges Gubitchev alone with conspiracy to receive documents.

Miss Coplon refused to say what she thought of the Washington trial.

"It was a farce," her lawyer commented. "I'm more convinced of her innocence than ever."

## Lawmakers Take Fourth Holiday

But members of the upper chamber called it a day 30 minutes after they convened. Ten Senators were on the floor when the chamber voted a Fourth-of-July recess until 9 o'clock Tuesday morning.

The House stayed in session until action was slow.

A 9 A. M. gavel-to-order found less than a quorum present. It was more than an hour later before the lower chamber limped into action.

Before the Senate, ready for anticipated early action next Tuesday, was a drastically changed compromise for financing a state building project.

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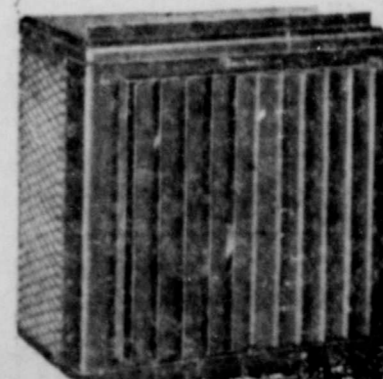

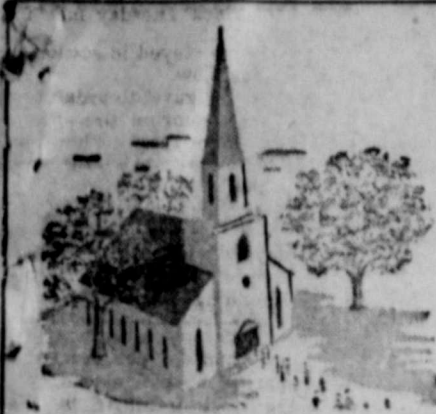

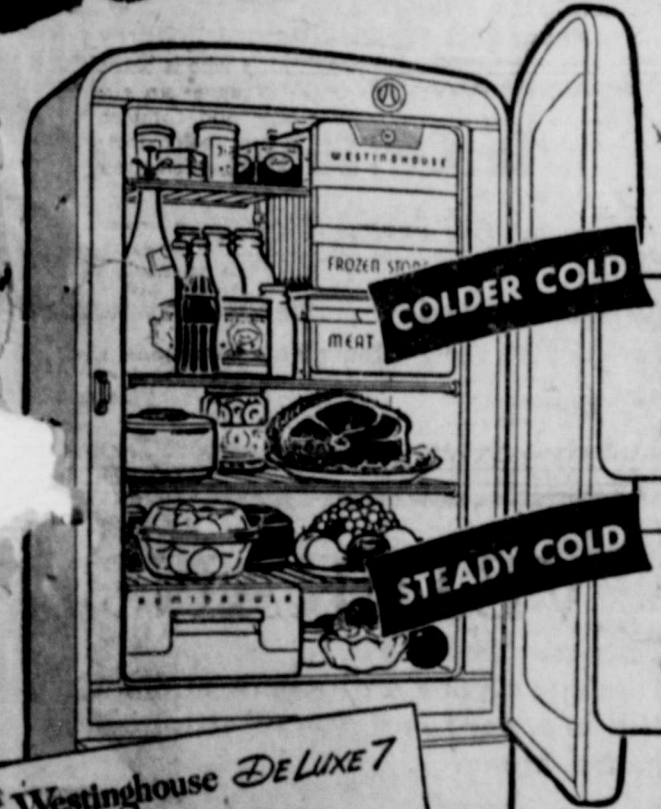

## DIMITROV, PREMIER OF BULGARIA DIES IN RUSSIA

LONDON, July 2. (UP) — Georgi Dimitrov, 66, premier of Bulgaria, onetime head of the old Communist International, and the No. 1 Communist of the Balkans, died today of diabetes at a sanitarium near Moscow.

The Moscow radio announced the death of Dimitrov after an illness of several months. His ailment forced him to give up his duties as Bulgarian premier on April 14, when he went to Russia, his former homeland by adoption, for treatment.

The central committee of the Russian Communist party and the Soviet Council of Ministers announced "with profound regret"

the death of Dimitrov. The formal statement broadcast from Moscow hailed him as "the outstanding leader of the international working class movement, chairman of the Council of Ministers of the Bulgarian peoples Republic, general secretary of the Central Committee of the Bulgarian Communist Party."

He died, the Soviet statement said, at the Bordikha sanitarium near Moscow after a long and serious liver ailment described as diabetes.

Often called the Soviet Union's No. 1 statesman in the Balkans, Dimitrov died 16 days before his 67th birthday.



## PARENTS WATCH OVER 5 STRICKEN CHILDREN

The fearful parents were preparing for daily trips over the 30-mile distance to Fort Worth and Dallas where the children were fighting for their lives in hospitals.

To eldest, James, 15, was doing "fairly well" at a Dallas hospital where he was taken Wednesday. The other four children, Virgie, 13, Wilena, 11, Nora Marie, 9, and Floyd Wayne, 3, were admitted to a hospital in Fort Worth Thursday. The family tried Parkland Hospital in Dallas but it was overcrowded.

Of the four younger children, Virgie suffered the most serious attack but was reported early today in "fairly good" shape.

The couple has one other child, an 18-year-old married daughter, James was the first struck down by the disease. When first hit two weeks ago, he was thought to have malaria fever.

His aunt, Mrs. F. A. Emiston, said "he dragged around for a few days" before doctors diagnosed his disease as poliomyelitis.

The eight-grader was rushed to Parkland in Dallas, where 13 other polio patients were being treated today.

Early this week, the other four youngsters began running high temperatures.

The Meekers applied at Parkland's polio ward for their admission but lack of room forced them to turn to City-County Hospital in Fort Worth. Twenty polio victims are undergoing

## Unemployment Outlook Brings Some Optimism

WASHINGTON, July 2 (UP)—June employment statistics were more encouraging than expected giving rise today to some optimism among business and government experts alike.

The father, 37-year-old trucker and commercial fisherman at Lake Dallas, stayed in Denton. He expected to visit both hospitals today.

He said on the senate floor that "there are coming from various quarters indications that the decline in prices has now reached a level bringing in new demands which will, in turn, have the effect of halting unemployment trends which appeared earlier in the year. At least, it is hoped so."

## Believe Ford Strike Averted

DETROIT, July 2. (UP)—Threat of a Ford Motor Company strike after July 15 faded today when the CIO United Auto Workers agreed to extend their contract on a day-to-day basis.

Despite the extension, workers at Ford's Key River Route and Lincoln-Mercury Plants voted today on whether to authorize a walkout if negotiations remain leadlocked.

Under the extension the 106,000 Ford production workers will remain on their jobs after the contract expiration date July 15, subject to five working days notice of a walkout.

The agreement to extend the contract was signed yesterday by negotiators for Ford and the UAW which still are feeling the effects of a 25-day "speed-up" strike in May.

It was agreed that there would be no possibility "of anything even resembling a recession" if there were 60,000,000 (M) jobs in the United States. June employment was 56,619,000.

Herman W. Steinkraus, President of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, was equally optimistic.

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### Two Overcome, Kill Bandit

LOS ANGELES, July 2. (UP)—A stalwart Oklahoma City youth and his fiancée fought off a lovers' lane holdup man last night in a life-and-death struggle in which the bandit was killed.

Alwyn (Sonny) Ivers, 19-year-old hero of the battle, was wounded seriously defending his sweetheart.

He arrived here yesterday to marry pretty blonde Betty Bowen 16, in a ceremony set for tomorrow.

The young couple was parked in a little-used lane in the Baldwin Hills when a man, his face masked by a bandana handkerchief, suddenly pointed a .38 caliber revolver through the car window.

"Get out and give me your money," he ordered Ivers. The youth complied.

"Now go out in back of the car and grabbed for the gun, which I'm going to get your girl."

Ivers knocked the bandit down and rabbed for the gun, which fired three times as they scuffled on the ground. One bullet struck

the gunman in the head, another pierced Ivers' cheek and lodged in his neck, and a third went wild.

The sobbing girl jumped from the car, grabbed the gun and hit the holdup man on the head again and again. Then she realized he was no longer moving.

"I tagged at Sonny until I got him in the car," Betty told police. "I didn't know how to drive, but I knew I just had to get help."

She managed to back out of the parking place, the car's wheel passing over the bandit's body. Then she coasted down the hill to a gas station and, unable to stop, crashed into the attendant's parked car. The attendant called police.

The hysterical girl led officers back to the gunman's body. He was about 23 years old, wearing khaki trousers and blue denim jacket, and carried no identification.
