Last Rites Said Today For Late Gov. Beauford Jester

Well... I Dunno, But...

In the mail this morning, a card from the Calvin Harris family, vacationing in New Mexico and Colorado. Dr. Harris was headed for the Rocky Mountain Cancer Conference in Denver. Cool Colorado, boy we'd like to be up there right now.

Well, nobody was fooled Tuesday. It was the hottest day of the year with the maximum temperature hitting 101 and the minimum of the night never going below 75. High for the season prior to Tuesday was 99 degrees and we haven't had a drop of rain since June 25.

Word of Ranger's homecoming somehow got around to H. M. Wright of Hartsville, Tennessee formerly of Ranger and so while passing through Ranger Tuesday, en route back home from the west he stopped to look things over here.

He encountered C. E. May Jr. and asked all kinds of questions about the homecoming, and said he'd sure like to be here.

It seems that Wright came to Ranger in 1919 from Dallas and landed in the middle of the madhouse existing here then and though armed with a pistol, he was considerably pushed around anyway. He said that several times between the railway station and about the middle of the 200 block on Main street, he was elbowed off the sidewalk and to cap it all, about the middle of the block, he glanced up and there hanging from the rafters of an over-the-sidewalk porch was a dead negro, eyes bulging. On a pasteboard sign attached to the body was this "Don't touch this negro until sunrise." Needless to say, Wright didn't touch the negro then nor at sunrise.

But he did remain to work for the Prairie Oil and Gas Company for a while.

Freak Accident Kills 1, Injures 10 Other Persons

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo., July 13 (UP)—Seven buses, an oil tanker and a passenger car collided on a narrow highway here in a series of freak accidents that left one person dead and ten others injured today.

Mrs. Fredrick Rettenmeyer of Marietta, Conn., was killed. The pileup yesterday started when the passenger car skidded and sideswiped the leading bus of a Union Pacific Bus Convey. The other buses rammed into each other as result of the lead vehicle's sudden stop.

As the passengers were being reloaded onto another bus to continue the trip, the oil tanker swept around a curve.

It crashed into the bus, rolling it over onto waiting passengers. The tanker came to rest on top of the bus.

The accident occurred 28 miles south of Mammoth Hot Springs. The injured were taken to a hospital there.

Cooler Buses Due In Houston

HOUSTON, Tex., July 13 (UP)—A cooler bus, more suited to Houston summer-time weather, was on order today for the Houston Transit Co.

The firm has asked three manufacturers to work out plans for vehicles that will be more resistant to heat, according to L. M. Coates, Houston Transit vice president.

Meanwhile, the company has painted bus tops white, on the theory that it will prove cooler than the aluminum paint previously used.

Mayor Pro Tem Lanier Presides At City Meeting

In the absence of Mayor Price Crawley who is en route to New York, Mayor Pro Tem O. G. Lanier presided at the regular meeting of the city commission Tuesday night.

Routine matters consumed most of the commission time at the meeting but at the request of the chairman of the De Leon Peach and Watermelon Festival Nancy Phillips was selected to represent Ranger as its duchess at the festival.

Payment of some bills was authorized.

It was reported at the meeting that parking meters and posts for Ranger have arrived and work on installation of the meters is pending the arrival of the traffic engineer with the meter company. After the engineer's survey and recommendations, installation of the meters will get underway.

Plans were discussed concerning the mapping of Ranger's sewer system after it was brought out that an adequate map has never been made for the city. Further plans relative to the moving of the water mains on Caddo Road were also discussed.

Ranger Urged To Step Up U. S. Bond Purchases

Cyrus Frost of Eastland, county chairman, and W. F. Creager, Ranger Chairman for the Opportunity drive for the sale of United States Savings bonds, today issued an appeal to the people of Ranger to push sales before the deadline Saturday.

Frost pointed out that Eastland county is about \$30,000 behind on its \$181,000 quota for this particular drive and that all bonds that count in the drive must be sold by Saturday.

The Opportunity drive started about the middle of April and is for the sale of the popular Series E Savings Bonds.

Frost stated today that this series of bonds is now owned by over eight million people in the United States and that ownership of the bonds has grown in the last few years rather than falling off.

Ranger has no specific quota but is responsible for assisting the county in raising its quota. It was pointed out that the major part of bond sales are made in the three major towns of the county and the people of Ranger are urged to do their share in meeting the county quota by the deadline.

Returning to Ranger the body is her brother, C. O. Culpeper.

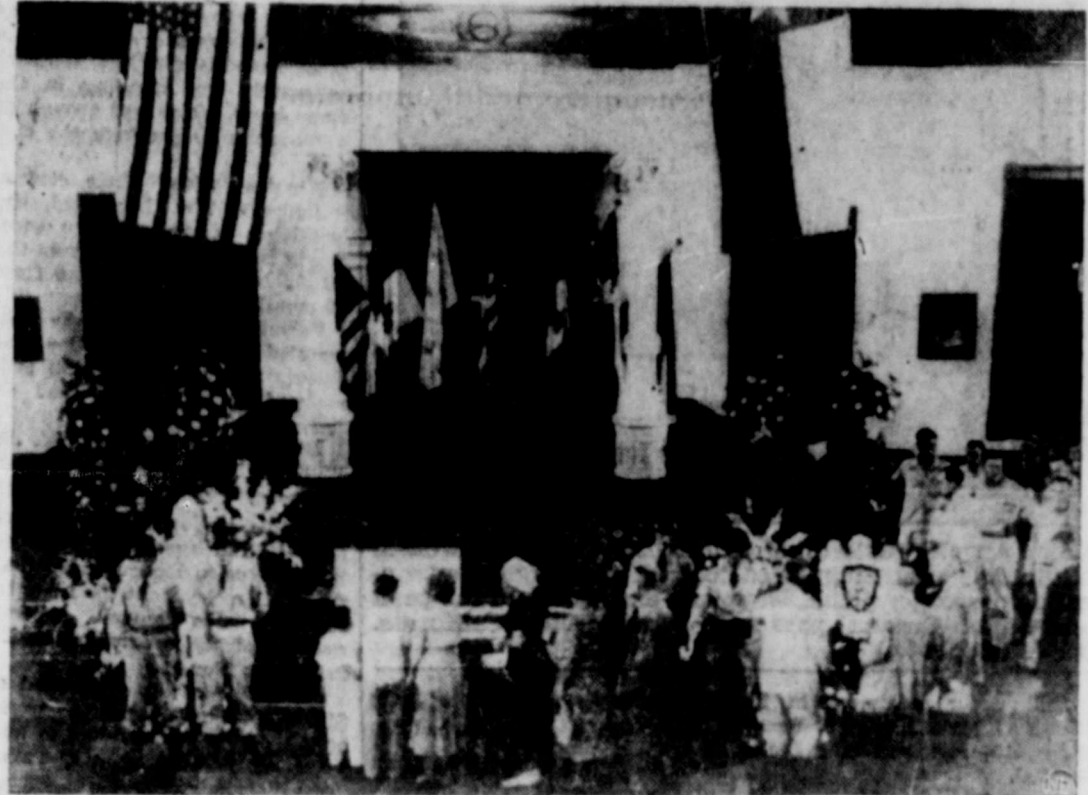
THIRD MAJOR PLANE CRASH TAKES LIVES OF 33 PEOPLE

CHATSWORTH, Cal., July 13 (UP)—A stewardess who helped quell a fight between two passengers just before their C-46 airliner crashed, killing 33 persons, will be questioned today by authorities seeking the cause of the tragedy.

One of the 48 persons aboard the ship was still missing. Fourteen others were injured, including the stewardess, Charlotte Grenander.

The big plane, operated by Standard Airlines on a non-scheduled flight from New York to Los Angeles, plowed into the Santa Susana Mountains at 7:50 A. M. yesterday, just before it was due to land at Burbank, Cal. The airline said 49 persons were listed as aboard the plane but that late information showed one passenger, Lois Tucker, apparently did not get on at Kansas City as scheduled.

EASTLAND HORNE TOAD DERBY TO BE SATURDAY

In the only celebration of its type in the Southwest, Eastland's first annual Old Rip Horned Toad Derby will be held Saturday, July 16, with 150 toads from all over the West Texas to compete for \$350.00 cash prizes.

Under sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce, idea for the Derby stemmed from the fact that Eastland is world-famed as the home of Old Rip, the horned toad who lived after being entombed in the cornerstone of the old Eastland County Courthouse for 31 years. On the twentieth anniversary of Old Rip's death, the first annual Derby is being held to perpetuate the memory of this venerable horned toad, whose preserved body now lies in a push-lined casket in the lobby of the new courthouse.

With fun, thrills, and prizes planned for the entire family, a variety of activities are planned in connection with the one-day Derby.

A special Kid's Derby will be held on the courthouse square at 3:00 P. M., with prizes totaling \$25.00 to be awarded the three fastest toads. There is no requirement for entering a toad in the Kid's Derby other than registering at the Chamber of Commerce office by 1:00 P. M.

Old Fiddlers throughout West Texas will compete for prizes amounting to \$50.00 at 4:00 P. M. The Eastland High School Maverick Band, under the direction of T. R. Atwood, will give a band concert on the courthouse lawn at 6:00 P. M.

Following an intermission, the main Derby will get underway.

Seating facilities will be available for all of the activities, which will be held in the open. The city will be decorated with flags and bunting, and merchants will observe Dollar Day Values.

If you have never seen a horned toad race, and chances are you haven't, don't miss the Eastland Old Rip Derby, where "everybody from everywhere" is invited.

Two More Arrests In Birmingham Are Expected

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. July 13 (UP)—Authorities today apparently were waiting for the arrest of the last of two of 17 persons indicted for participation in recent hooded outrages here before setting trial dates for the suspects.

Circuit court is in continuous session here and the trials of the accused floggers and terrorists could come at any time.

Fourteen of the indicted men were rounded up Monday and the 15th was arrested yesterday. The other two persons named in the grand jury indictments were reported "out of the state."

All 15 made bond yesterday and went free pending the trials. Bonds ranged from a low of \$300 for Elmer Brock, Brookside police chief charged with neglect of duty and intimidating a witness, to \$8,500 for Coleman A. (Brownie) Lollar.

Nancy Phillips Ranger Duchess At DeLeon Event

It was announced that Nancy Phillips, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harlan Phillips, will be the Duchess from Ranger to DeLeon's Annual Peach and Watermelon Festival in DeLeon Thursday night, July 21.

Miss Phillips was chosen Tuesday night at a meeting of the city commission after the festival chairman had requested a representative from Ranger.

Miss Phillips will be escorted by John Marlow and will participate in a big parade Thursday morning, attend a reception at the Travelers Hotel Thursday afternoon and be an attendant in the court of the Festival queen at coronation ceremonies Thursday night at the Fair Grounds.

In the parade Miss Phillips and her escort will ride in a car labeled "Duchess of Ranger".

Rehearsal for the coronation will be held in DeLeon Wednesday night.

Mission Mayor Turns Down Offer From McAllen

McALLEN, July 13 (UP)—Said the Mayor of Mission to the McAllen businessmen: Not on your life.

The cause for the Mayor's vehemence was a McAllen move to annex the Valley home of Governor-designate Allan Shivers.

The home, built by Shivers' late father-in-law, John H. Shary, is located about midway between the two towns. But it is listed under Mission in the phone book.

Ft. Worth Mayor Will Attend 4th Jaycee Rodeo

He won't be riding six white horses when he comes but he'll be bringing two to the rodeo parade, was the promise made rodeo boosters by Mayor Edgar Dean of Fort Worth Tuesday.

Wilson Guest, Ray Ward and E. P. Brasher Jr. accompanied by Carolyn Pruet, Nancy Phillips, Jerry Bowen, Wanda Clem and Betty Jo Penn were in Ft. Worth Tuesday afternoon for the express purpose of inviting Fort Worth's mayor to the Jaycee parade and rodeo. The booster met Mayor Dean at his office at 2 o'clock, extended the invitation and sealed it with a gift of wooden nickles. Jack Douglas, reporter for the Fort Worth Star Telegram, and a Star-Telegram Staff reporter, were at the Mayor's office and each was presented a wooden nickle. Douglas is the reporter that covered the parade and opening performance of the rodeo for the Star-Telegram last year.

The boosters report that their car, well painted with Ranger rodeo signs, drew considerable attention as it paraded up and down Main street and other main thoroughfares of Fort Worth.

Mayor Dean will bring two of his fine horses out to the rodeo parade in which he will ride and will attend the opening performance of the rodeo next Wednesday night.

Heavy Rains Cause Rail Washouts

KEYSER, W. Va., July 13 (UP)—Heavy rains which caused at least four slides and two washouts halted all traffic on the Baltimore & Ohio's New York to St. Louis lines last night.

Three slides on the 17-mile grade between Piedmont and Terra Alta stalled numerous trains, including the east-bound Cincinnati, whose passengers were transferred by bus from Swanton, Md., to Cumberland Md.

Another large washout was reported east of Keyser, although highways were not as badly blocked as the train lines.

The damage resulted when streams rose quickly late yesterday afternoon following an all-day rain.

CORSICANA, July 13 (UP)—The flower-banked auditorium of the grey, plaster-stone church where he had worshipped throughout his lifetime provided a somber backdrop today as last rites were said for the late Gov. Beauford H. Jester.

Loud speakers carried the personalized funeral oration of the Rev. E. F. Bohnfalk to an overflow crowd that spilled out of the 700 capacity auditorium into other rooms of the 53-year old Gothic-type structure and onto the well-kept lawns outside.

The body was brought into the church at 9:11 A. M. Immediately a steady stream of friends, neighbors and state officials formed to start a long, shuffling procession by the tier.

A slow rain began falling at 9:45 and the weather both inside and outside the church was very humid with the thermometer around the 90-degree mark.

"In the first four years (he became Pastor in 1942) of my Pastorate here," the Rev. Bohnfalk said, Beauford Jester missed less than a dozen Sundays in that time.

"He was always in his place, worshipping with his family. As a trustee he kept continuity of family service alive in an official capacity for nearly 100 years.

"There has always been a Jester in leadership here."

Business was at a standstill in this Navarro County Oil Farming center as the homefolk got their chance to pay final tribute to the State's Chief Executive who died quietly in his sleep aboard a Pullman car early Monday.

The weather was a humid 89 degrees when the body was brought into the church at 9:11 A. M. Long before that hour the church began filling with friends, neighbors and state officials who would pay their last respects as Jester's body lay in state until the 11 A. M. services.

A quiet rain started falling around 9:45 out of a grey, overcast sky did not materially interrupt the procession by his tier.

As the people fell into line, they were handed a printed program with a picture of the Jescolonia type, red brick, Corsicana home on the cover. On the left-hand inside page was the 14th Psalm. The right hand page carried the dates of the late Governor's birth, death and funeral services, the names of officiating ministers and the location of today's services.

Large, portable fans kept up a steady hum inside the auditorium but they offered little relief from the pressing weather.

The pastor's personalized sermon touched on the faith in God which had guided the Governor through his life and which would sustain his family and friends in their hour of sorrow.

"The love he (Jester) held for his mother and his immediate family is akin to the love that God holds toward the family in suffering today," the Rev. Bohnfalk said.

"God will sustain mother Jester, Mable (Mrs. Beauford Jester) and the children and give them strength to bear their trials."

The pastor then went on to refer to Jester's service in World War I with the 90th Division and his activities in the division organization since that time.

He mentioned Jester's efforts in helping organize the Corsicana Rotary Club, the late Governor's avid interest in sports and his affiliation with Kappa Sigma Social Fraternity, which he once served as National President.

The church is in one of the older residential areas of the city. It has been well-kept and maintained.

Only a quarter of a mile away down 15th Street lay Oakwood Cemetery, the final resting place for the distinguished-looking attorney who rose to the Chief Executive's post in the nation's largest state.

Oakwood Cemetery, one of the oldest in the county, lies on the extreme north edge of the city, bordered on one side by a playground park and on the other by open countryside.

The Jester plot, in a new section of the cemetery, was purchased since he became Governor and was very unpretentious since Jester had not gotten around to completing plans for its landscaping.

Only volunteer grass covered the ground.

Editor's Note: The Ranger Daily Times is among other newspapers that are touched by the death of S. Burton Heath in the Airliner Crash near Bombay Tuesday. Heath's editorials and feature articles often appeared in the Ranger Daily Times as the newspaper is a subscriber to NEA Service for which the late writer worked.

DEATH OF A REPORTER

A slim professorial-looking fellow who looked like the kind of New Englander who sticks to his home town all his life has died in an airplane crash in the Bombay hills.

S. Burton (Burt) Heath, the famed "Yankee Reporter," was coming home off an assignment in Indonesia. He had filed his size-up of the situation there to NEA Service in four dispatches entitled "Blunder in the Far East."

It was Burt's usual painstaking, conscientious job. It told not only what was happening between the Dutch and the Indonesian Republicans, but why it was happening and what the consequences were which might affect the United States in the world struggle to contain Communism.

Beneath Burt's conservative front there was the soul of an adventurer. He came from Lynn, Massachusetts, not far from the docks which sent other deceptively quiet New Englanders off to the far away places in sailing ships in past generations.

Burt was happiest when he was traveling. During the weeks just before he left for the Far East he was complaining in mild sort of way that he "hadn't been anywhere for several months — just a short trip to Germany. Burt kept a log of his travels — they took him to the atomic bomb tests at Bikini, to the Belgian Congo, to Germany, to nearly every state in the United States.

He was as proud of that air log as he was of his rose garden in Darien. Next to the thrill of world travel, Burt liked most to putter around in his garden or make wooden gadgets in his basement workshop.

He was also an enthusiast for figures. The one time a year you couldn't lure Burt with a ticket to Europe or the Orient was when he was preparing his annual "Income Tax Primer." He was proud of the usage it received in 750 newspapers and of the hundreds who wrote to him for advice. He answered every letter.

Burt knew the risks of air travel better than most people. He wrote many dispatches on air safety and technical phases of aviation. But he never hesitated to fly — any more than his New England forebears hesitated to take their clipper ships around the Horn.

Burt Heath could have existed in a cocoon, commuting from Darien to New York every day to a routine job. He preferred to live as an air-borne citizen of the 20th Century. It was a realistic choice.

TYLER, July 13 (UP) — A gang of vandals who wrecked numerous buildings during the week were being sought here today.

The knife-wielding mischief makers invaded four churches in two nights, sending the damage into the thousands. A Parochial school and a boy scout office also were entered.

Police believed the intruders were apparently bent on destruction only, as few things of value were found missing.

Houston Woman Electrocuted

HOUSTON, Tex., July 13 (UP) — The 41-year-old mother of 13 children was electrocuted today by a faulty iron just as she started her long day's work.

Neighbors found Mrs. Viola Williams lying face-down in the back yard of her home. In her arms, pressed against her chest, was the iron. She suffered deep burns.

A neighbor, Mrs. Jack T. Broussard, said she had talked to the busy housewife only a few minutes before the accident, and that she mentioned feeling a shock from the iron. Mrs. Williams apparently was standing in the damp grass, which was enough of a conductor to generate the current.

Minutes after their conversation said Mrs. Broussard, she heard her neighbor scream once. It was followed by walls from the 13 children, ranging in age from 18 months to 12 years.

Friends and passers-by attempted artificial respiration, but doctors at a nearby hospital pronounced Mrs. Williams dead on arrival.

The woman's husband, M. D. Williams, is a mechanic for a

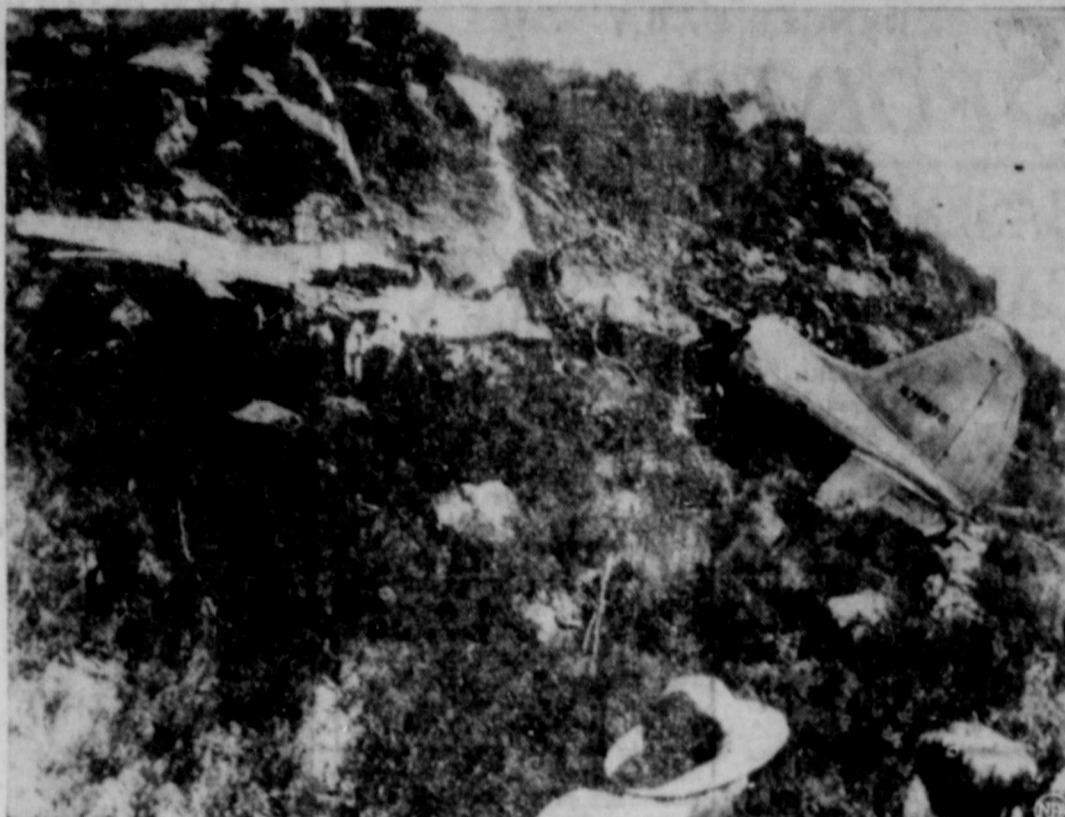

SERVICES BEING PLANNED FOR BOMBAY CRASH VICTIMS

BOMBAY, India, July 13 (UP)—Small private funeral services were planned today for the identified dead among 45 persons killed in the crash of a Royal Dutch (KLM) Constellation airliner near here yesterday.

A joint Dutch-American public ceremony for all the victims probably will be held tomorrow. They include 14 American newsmen.

The U. S. consulate here said it was awaiting instructions from the next of kin as to the disposition of the American dead. Some relatives already have signified they want the bodies returned to the United States. Others have requested burial in Bombay.

Police still were searching the muddy hillsides where the plane crashed for 12 missing bodies. Many of the 33 bodies already found were mangled beyond recognition.

U. S. Ambassador Loy Henderson arrived here from New Delhi to help identify the American victims. He had entertained 13 of the ill-fated group of 14 newsmen returning from Indonesia at his embassy Sunday night.

"Let's get the hell out of here," a woman said to me. She grabbed my arm and dragged me from the flames. She was wonderful. I don't know who she was and couldn't recognize her if I saw her.

I shudder to think what would have happened to me if she hadn't been there. The bad dream ended happily for me because of her.

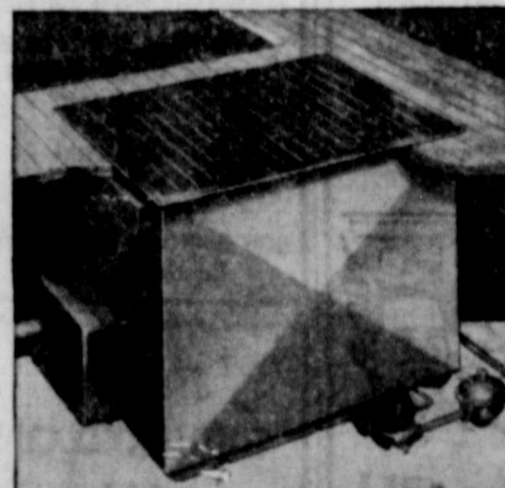

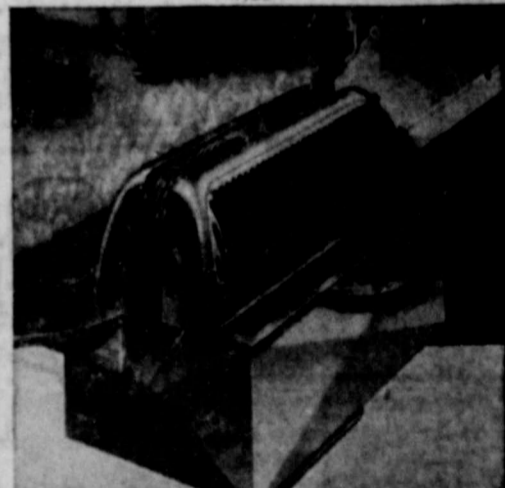
