





Three Rural Accidents In June Cause One Death And \$7075 Damage

The Texas Highway Patrol inves-tigated three accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of June, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one death, and an estimated property damage of \$7,075.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1966 shows a total of 49 accidents resulting in five persons killed, 32 persons injured, and an estimated property damag of \$46,210.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1966 there have been 1470 traffic deaths compared to 1325 traffic deaths for the first months of 1965. This eleven percent increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture.
The Sergeant stated, "It is esti-

mated that at the end of 1966 traffic deaths in Texas will increase about 10 percent over 1965 which means approximately 3300 persons will be killed in traffic accidents." The Sergeant added one other comment, To control accidents, we must learn to control

The electrical system should have a sufficient number of outlets. The outlets must be seviced with the proper number and size of circuits. The circuits must be properly protected according to wire size. The system must be properly grounded.

A circuit should never be overloaded. This may overload the wiring system and cause a fire. Electric cords should never be placed where they can be walked on, crushed by furniture or regularly bent back and forth They should never be strung over nails or tied back with wire. This can cause wear on the insulation or breaking of wires inside the cord, which may eventually cause a short circuit and a fire. Never run extension cords under rugs or doors or through walls. Always Be Careful

Since the week of July 24-30 is National Farm Safety Week, I, Debra Hochstein, would like to help you, the people of Castro County make it a happy one for yourselves and your families

Electrical hazards are one of the causes of fires on the farm and in the home; however carelessness and thoughtlessness by people are the source of this hazard. Some questions you can ask yourself are: Is your electric wiring system grounded? Are all fuses in branch lighting circuits 15 amperes or less? Are electric wires firmly supported? Does the wiring insulation appear in good condition? Are there enough convenence outlets to eliminate necessity of "makeshift" wiring and the use of extension cords? If necessary to use cords, are they properly located - not hung on nails, run through doorways or under rugs, etc? Are heavy-duty rubbercovered cords used outside or in damp locations? Are extension cords free of frays and cracked plugs? Can you answer all these questions with a yes?

The obvious remedy for fires then is for everyone in the family to practice common sense, carefulness and safe habits. So remember fire hazards can easily be eliminated by following the ABC's of good housekeeping - Always be Careful.




