TEXAS News Briefs

BROWNSVILLE, July 14 (UP)—Florida newspaper executive Don Morris will take over this week as editor and general manager of the Brownsville Herald. Owner-publisher Leo Owens announced Morris' acceptance of the position yesterday. Morris, 42, was formerly director of the Florida Science News Service.

WESLACO, July 14 (UP)—A lower Rio Grande Valley Citrus Exchange was in the cotton business today. Officials of the Texsun Citrus Exchange announced yesterday that the corporation's big warehouse had been approved for citrus storage facilities. The move was regarded as another in the announced policy of Texsun directors to economize and concentrate on keeping the exchange on a sound financial basis.

RAYMONDVILLE, July 14 (UP)—Rulio Nino, 24, was charged here yesterday with the murder of his second cousin, Obertino Lopez Nino, 22. Nino admitted the killing, saying "I beat him to death with a club."

The badly decomposed body of Obertino was found July 7th in a cornfield 21 miles southeast of here. Nino said he killed him exactly a month earlier.

KINGSVILLE, July 14 (UP)—Thelma Garza, the last survivor of Kingsville's well-known triplets, is reported to be slightly improved today.

The three-month-old girl's sisters, Delma and Velma, died Monday of dysentery. The triplets achieved notoriety last week when their father, Ascension Garza, was jailed for failure to pay the medical bills of a woman he struck with his automobile.

MNEOLA, July 14 (UP)—James Horton, 32, of Tyler, was in the hospital here today with injuries received in an accident which took the life of another truck driver.

A truck driven by W. A. Scarborough, 19, of Vidor, struck the rear end of Horton's milk truck yesterday. Scarborough was killed in the pile-up, on the Sabine River Bridge South of here.

DALLAS, July 14 (UP)—Intra state bus travelers on the Continental Trailways System were looking forward to new and lowered rates today.

The system announced a ten per cent fare reduction for all points between Dallas and San Antonio yesterday.

HOUSTON, Tex, July 14 (UP)—The decomposed body of a white man, found in tall weeds in the swank Riverside residential district, was still unidentified today.

A parson for the Riverside Memorial Methodist Church found the body yesterday when he was asked to investigate an odor that had permeated the area several days. The man, apparently the victim of a brutal beating and robbery, was clad in khaki pants, a "T" shirt and brown shoes, police said.

Justice of the Peace Thomas L. Decker said the condition of the body made it impossible to determine immediately the age of the man or how he met death.

HOUSTON, Tex, July 14 (UP)—Funeral services were to be held today for Fred B. Finkenburger, Sr., 63, manager of an optical firm here for many years.

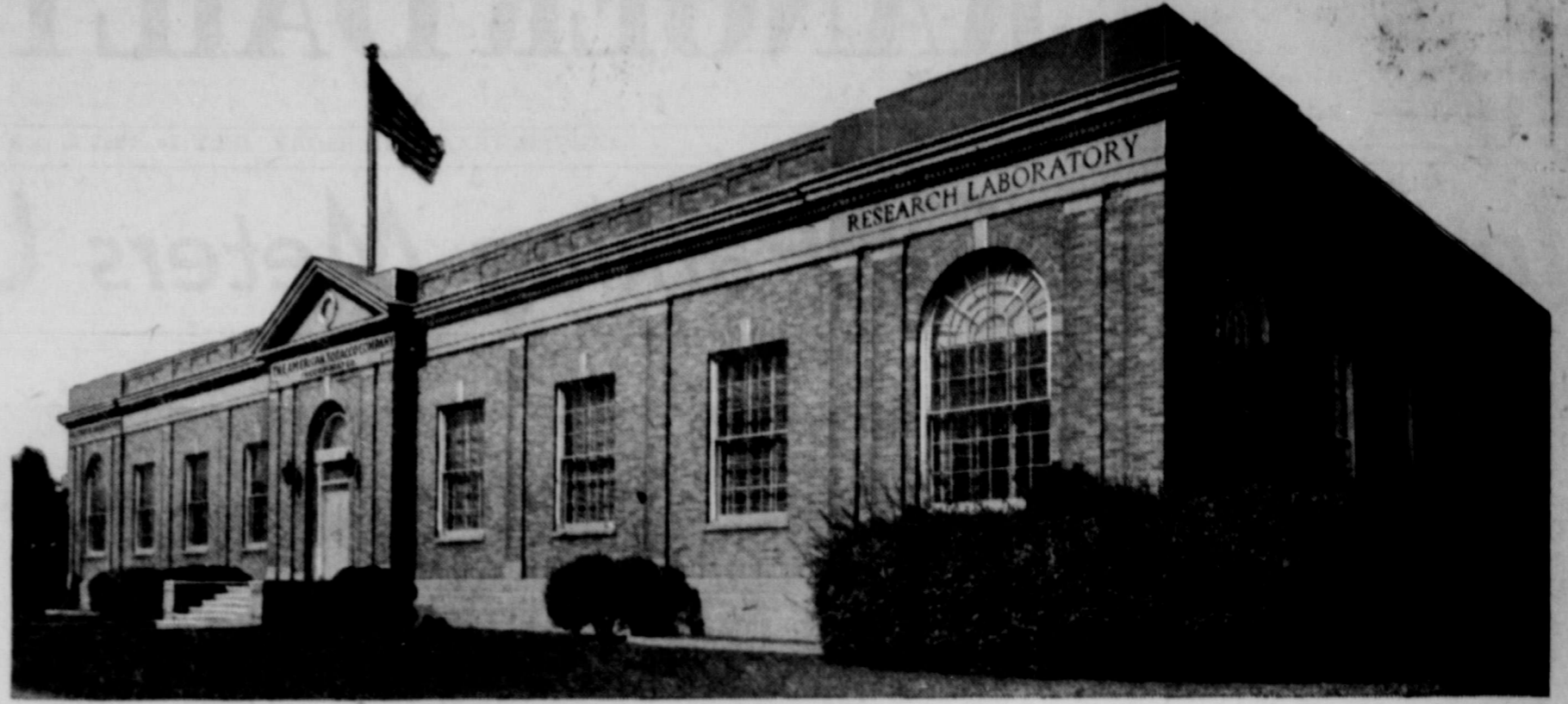
Finkenburger died in a hospital yesterday. A native of St. Louis, he had lived here 32 years.

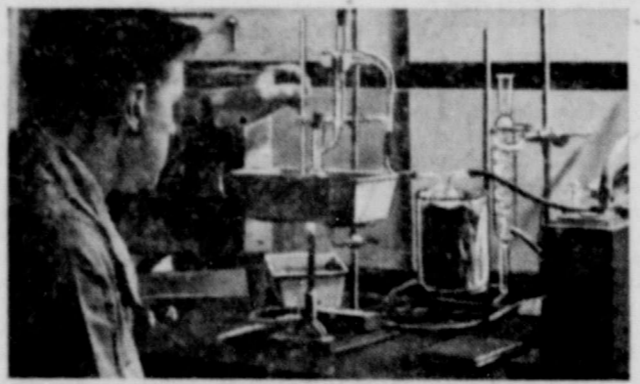

Jap Phillipine Ruler Sentenced

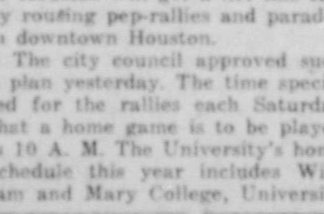
MANILA, Philippines, July 14 (UP)—Lt. Gen. Shigenori Kuroda was sentenced today to life imprisonment at hard labor for the more than 2,800 atrocity deaths of Americans, Filipinos, and other allied nationals while he was Japanese Commander-in-Chief in the Philippines.

A Philippine Military Commission, in passing sentence, held him responsible for 2,873 specific atrocity deaths and countless additional cases of murder and torture between May 1934 and September 1944.

The thin, graying, 65-year-old general pleaded innocent.



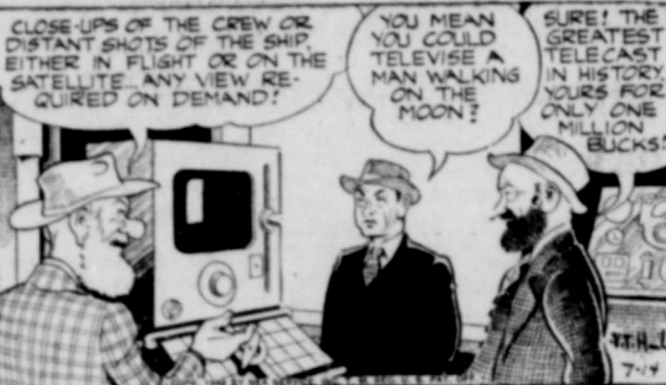

Softball Game Here Tonight

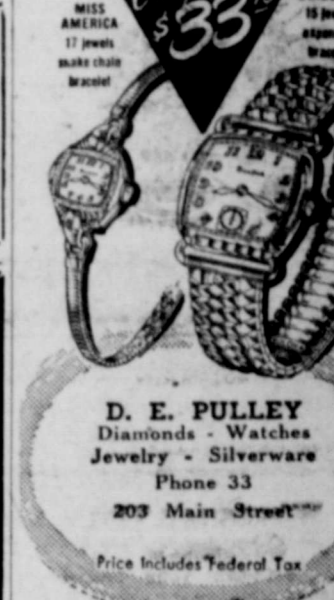
It was announced today that a softball game will be played here tonight at 8:15 o'clock between the Rangers and the VFW Breckenridge team.

TRUMAN HOPEFUL STEEL WILL ACCEPT HIS PLAN

United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, July 14 (UP)—President Truman was reported to be optimistic today that the steel industry's big three would reconsider and accept his plan for averting a steel strike on Saturday.

The president's labor advisers said he hopes for favorable replies during the day from U S Steel, Bethlehem and Republic.

The three companies previously had spurned Mr. Truman's proposal for a 60-day truce on the ground that it would by-pass the Taft-Hartley Act. But the chief executive renewed his appeal last night and simultaneously invited more than 50 smaller steel makers to cooperate with him.

White House advisers were counting on two factors to swing the big steel companies into line behind the president's recommendation.

One was acceptance of the armistice plan by four major steel producers—Inland Steel, Wheeling, Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co. and Jones & Laughlin.

The other was CIO President Philip Murray's announcement that his united steelworkers will strike the big three and any other companies that turn down Mr. Truman's peace plan.

The big three, which also are the largest soft coal producers among the steel companies, faced the possibility that if their steelworkers walk out their 30,000 miners will quit too. Some 350,000 workers would be idled altogether.

Coal industry sources said local union leaders at steel-company-owned mines ended the second

three-day week last night by advising their men not to return to work next Monday in mines of those steel companies which may be shut down by Murray. They reportedly are unwilling to build up coal stockpiles for fear of weakening John L. Lewis' bargaining position. The United Mine Workers' president is seeking a new contract to replace the one which expired on June 30.

Mr. Truman staked all his hopes for heading off a damaging shutdown of a major part of the steel industry on his fact-finding plan. A special board would investigate the contract dispute and make recommendations for a settlement.

The president brushed aside suggestions of the big three that he use the Taft-Hartley law's emergency provisions to obtain an injunction, forcing employees to stay on the job. He told them the present situation "does not constitute such an immediate peril to the national health or safety" as to warrant that procedure.

MINERAL WELLS, Tex., July 14 (UP)—The Fifth Annual Convention of the Texas Assn. of Public Accountants will open here tomorrow for two days.

Chief speakers will be State Sen. Grady Hazelwood, Amarillo; President Thomas H. Taylor of Howard Payne College, Brownwood; and Attorney Sidney L. Samuels, Fort Worth.

Dallas Favored For New Texas Medical School

AUSTIN, Tex., July 14 (UP)—Dallas held the edge today as members of the University of Texas Board of Regents convened in a special meeting to conduct a hearing on a proposed site for a new state medical school.

The State Medical Association's House of Delegates recommended Dallas yesterday as their choice for the school.

The action was praised by Dudley K. Woodward, Jr., Chairman of the Board of Regents, who told the house of delegates that "you have made our decision immeasurably easier to make. I hope that my colleagues . . . will adopt your report."

The North Texas city took the nod over San Antonio and Temple.

The recommendation was not binding on the regents but they were expected to follow through on the selection.

An appropriation of \$1,000,000 (M) was made by the 51st Legislature to cover maintenance and operation for the new medical school, supplementing the main medical branch at Galveston.

Vatican Not To Withdraw From Red Countries

VATICAN CITY, July 14 (UP)—High Vatican sources said today that the Vatican will continue to maintain diplomatic relations with Communist governments despite its mass excommunication of Catholic Communists.

The Vatican daily began broadcasting the text of the excommunication decree today.

Vatican informants said the decree will force millions of Catholics around the world to choose between the church and the Kremlin.
