
Funeral services are pending at Dennis Funeral Home for Frank Wright, elderly Negro man who was one of the last survivors of the historic Panama Canal project.

MR. WRIGHT, about 92, died at 7:15 p.m. Saturday in Plains Memorial Hospital. He had been a Dimmitt resident about 15 years and had worked as a yard man and tree pruner until his health forced his retirement. He has no known survivors. When the Panama Canal was built, Mr. Wright worked on the historic project as a No. 1 mule

driver. He joined the canal construction in its third year, 1910, and worked until its completion in 1914. All the power for the huge project was furnished by horse and mule teams.

HE AND HIS fellow workers narrowly escaped death once when a dam broke and hundreds of mules were washed into the sea, along with much of the construction equipment. He and his fellow workers also faced such other hazards as malaria, which they warded off by taking a tablespoon of epsom salts each morning, and by large tropical flies which





Last rites were held Friday afternoon in Canyon for Dr. Lester Fields Sheffy, 80, a noted Panhandle author and WTSU history prcfessor.


HE WAS the brother of Sid Sheffy of Dimmitt. He is also survived by his wife, Carrie, another brother and one sister.


A DAILY INCIDENT!
