FALL BY 330 FOR, 59 AGAINST TAX Ranger schools will open this fall for a full nine months

This was the decision made Tuesday when voters of the Ranger School district voted nearly six to one to create a tax for the district of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation.

Final count in Tuesday's election was 330 for the tax and 59 against it. Voters also voted 317 to 59 for the outly-

ing schools now attached to the Ranger district to assume their pro rata part of the bonded indebtedness. Schools attached to the Ranger District are Colony, Cross Roads, Alameda and Tudor.

Revenue from the tax passed Tuesday will be sufficient to pay Ranger's part into the state foundation fund and thus assure Ranger of participation in the foundation and financial aid from the State of Texas.

School officials stated today that the passage of the tax assures Ranger of a full term of school with the opportunity to have one of the best sessions that the schools have ever had. They also expressed their appreciation to all who supported the tax rate, making the continuation of
