

All right, the figures don't lie. The past week netted \$242.80 collection from the meters. Which puts revenue from the meters over the \$2,000 mark for the first Day holiday period. six weeks. This the city does not split with the meter company inciientally

Based on last week's collections the meters alone, not including fines for violations and zoning fees, would bring in \$12,625.60 A year. Half of that is \$6,312.80 which goes to the city. On the same basis the meters will pay for themselves in a little over two years. After that the entire collection goes to the city.

We don't know now much the . city is paying the meter patrolmen, but we do know that we're safe in saying they're not paying them better than \$6,000 a year and at the end of the two years we don't think it'll take \$12,625.80 to pay patrolmen to keep the violators booked.

we think that it stands to reason that the city will realize some revenue from the meters as well as controlling the parking situation in downtown Ranger.

ould this rate continue, the deficit next June 30 would be near a whopping \$15,500,000,000 (B). But income tax payments, due this month, December, March, and June will pull the deficit far below that figure. But the pay-ments will not get the treasury out of the red.

Today's deficit compares with \$1,100,164,947.56 at this time last year. However, actually the deficit at this time last year was \$1,-475,265,495.82 (B), The treasury statement does not include money extended last year from the European Recovery Program's trust fund.
