

### Bible Thoughts

"GOING TO THE SAME PLACE ON DIFFERENT ROADS" By Ronnie Parker

It is said of the new converts in Jerusalem that "the multitude of them that believed were of one heart and scul:" Acts 4:32. Th same cannot be said of the people in this nation who profess Christ as their savior. The existence of sectarian bodies is a sad fact. The 1966 World Almanac shows 221 different religious bodies in the U.S. It is believed by many that we are all going to the same place but on different roads.

The Bib'e does not warrant such a conclusion. If such is true, the prayer of Christ becomes a mockery. John 17:20 says, "Neither for these only do I pray, but for them also that believe on me through their word; that they may all be one; even as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be in us; that the world may believe that thou didst send me." Religious division is antagonistic to the teaching of Paul. In I Cor. 1:10 he says, "New I beseech you, brethren, through the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that we all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfected together in the same mind and in the same judgment."

A spirit of union now pervades in many of these different bodies. But union is not the answer to the religicus division that exists. Amos asked, "Can two walk together, except they be agreed?" (Amos 3:3). Unity, not union, is the answer and that will require a strict return to the Bible, the standard for unity.

Accordingly, as part of a broad drive to modernize criminal law, bar associations and other attorney organizations are trying to clean out these legal anachronisms.
