MISS AMERICA OFFERED BIG MOVIE CONTRACT

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 12 (UP)—Jacque Mercer, first Miss America of 1949, is pining for Arizona ranch girl who can stop right into a co-starring movie role with bobby-soxers (40) Burt Lancaster.

But the 18 year old brunette, whose ambition is to be a "real dramatic actress" still was so flustered today about winning the nation's most glamorous beauty crown that she still wasn't able to make up her mind to sign the contract.

First the desert country beauty is going to indulge in the round of parties and personal appearances that became her queenly obligation when she was crowned over 52 other aspirants at the annual pageant here Saturday night. She leaves for New York today and next week will go to Milwaukee for the annual outdoors men show. Then she will return to Phoenix Junior College to enroll for a limited course.

She has official permission from the college authorities to eliminate a few courses from her dramatics are schedule this year so she can properly discharge the obligations of Miss America.

She will have a long stinorary that will take her from coast to coast, and a flock of entorse-

ments for concerns manufacturing every thing from lipstick to undergarments.
All these will net her an estimated \$30,000 in cash in addition to her \$5,000 scholarship which she'll use to study dramatics, and the \$3,000 Nash car that went with her Miss America crown.

Jacque, who revealed her real name is "Jacqueline Joy" after her mother's favorite doll, told how her father made her drive a tractor in his cotton fields to earn enough money to go see a play last year.

Only five feet four inches and weighing 106 pounds, the stage-struck Miss America-to-be wrestled the tractor and harrow for 75 cents an hour so she could buy a ticket to California.

"I ran the tractor until I had saved up enough money to see the play," she said.

Father Mercer's cotton ranch is an experimental growing site for the University of Arizona.

Jacque, who measures a trim 34 inches around the bust and hips, is one of the smallest Miss America's on record.

She appeared the next morning after winning her title in a black taffeta dress with a full skirt and a pink feathered hat.

She announced at once that marriage is more important than a career. But lest people misunderstand her intentions, she emphasized later that they don't necessarily rank one, two in the sequence which she'll follow.

Her boyfriend, Douglas Cook, 19, of Phoenix, a classmate in her drama courses, was so happy when she telephoned him he was "swinging on a chandelier," she said. She "might" marry him some day, she said.

Jacque, who neither drinks nor smokes, had mere duties than driving tractors on her father's ranch. She also took care of chickens, ducks, geese, and turkeys—and even was raising a pig until the porker died in a summer heat wave.

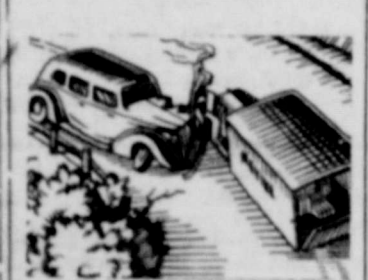

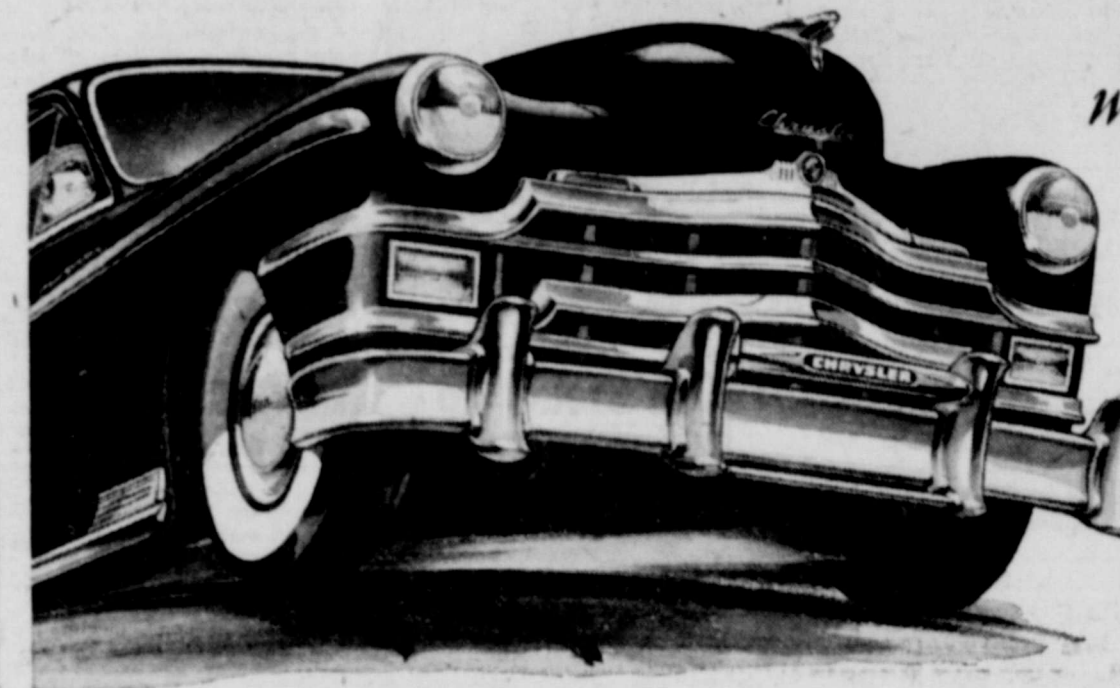

Rocket's Future Is Projected

WHITE SANDS PROVING GROUND, N. M., Sept. 12 (UP) — The Navy's \$300,000 "Viking" rocket may be the forerunner of interplanetary space ships even though it fizzled out only 33 miles above earth on its second flight, a spokesman said today.

The Navy revealed that the sleek pencil-shaped projectile burned out its fuel prematurely during an experimental firing. But even so, it was traveling 1,775 miles an hour when it hit its peak altitude of 33 miles.

On May 3, a similar Viking launched in secrecy for the first time by the Navy's Rocket Research Laboratory climbed 50 miles above the earth and reached

a speed of 3,450 feet per second, it was disclosed.

Milton Rosen, head of the laboratory said that in last week's firing the Rocket burned up its alcohol an diquid fuel mixture in 49 seconds instead of the expected 70 seconds.

Rosen said the Viking was lighter than the bulk German V-2 bomb it was designed to replace. He said the entire rocket program "leads toward the business of inter-planetary travel."
