Sally Rand Likes Judges, Newsmen

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 13. (UP)—Fan Dancer Sally Rand, who plans a court appearance here tomorrow minus her fans, assured the public today that judges are among her favorite people.

She also has a genuine fondness for newspapermen.

"You made me," she told a gathering yesterday of the local chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity. The blonde striptease credited the press with her rise from obscurity before the 1933 Century of Progress Exposition in Chicago to her present standing as a headliner in show business.

Miss Rand said she will forego her usual lack of costume and wear street clothes, maybe a Christian Dior creation and a Lilly Dache hat, for her stint in district court tomorrow.

At the hearing, two Chicago agents will seek half of the proceeds from her current State Fair of Texas revue, claiming they signed a contract with the Fair to provide all "girlie shows" for the exposition's midway.

Miss Rand indicated she will close her production if the court decision is unfavorable to her. "But as I've said before, I have complete faith in judges," she said.

Speaking to the newsmen yesterday, she mentioned a Chicago Judge who ruled on her case 16 years ago when police objected to her strip tease.

"I'll always be grateful to that kind judge," the star commented. "In dismissing my case, he said 'some people would put pants on a horse.'"

 HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 13 (UP)—The Rice Owls planned to taper off with dummy scrimmages today and light exercises tomorrow in preparation for their Saturday night game in Dallas with SMU.

Vernon Glass filled the quarterback position. Neely announced he would start Van Ballard at right half against Southern Methodist.

After practice, Neely said, "we didn't look good against SMU's offense, and our own offense needs better blocking. When you play SMU, you've got to make touchdowns, not yardage."


Two Oil Men Receive Awards

TEXAS News Briefs

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 13 (UP)—A gain of 739 new persons last month brought the total number of old age assistance rolls in Texas to 219,382 today.

The State Department of Public Welfare reported that payments, dropped five cents from September, averaged \$34.16 for this month.

Assistance was given 6,231 needy blind last month, with the amount totaling \$240,039.

OKLAHOMA EX-CONVICT SHOT BY GIRL FRIEND

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 13 (UP)—Woody Tilghman, 38, ex-convict son of a famous Oklahoma peace officer, was gravely wounded last night in a shooting in a crowded, downtown Oklahoma City restaurant.

Officers jailed Mrs. Tonie Ellis, 29, of Dallas, Tilghman's "girl friend," on a vagrancy charge after she admitted the shooting. Mrs. Ellis had Tilghman arrested last month after telling police he had threatened to kill her because he was going with another girl "and is trying to get rid of me."

Tilghman's father, the late William M. (Bill) Tilghman, was credited with killing more early-day Oklahoma outlaws than any other man. He was shot to death in Cromwell where he was serving as chief of police in 1926.

Tilghman termed the shooting last night "accidental." He said "I was sitting in the restaurant with my girl friend when a pistol dropped on the floor and exploded. I don't know where the gun came from."

But Mrs. Marie Bryant, 21, a waitress (at a toddy house on North Broadway) told officers the woman "apparently lifted the gun and shot the man... I heard one shot, then two more in rapid succession."

Mrs. Ellis was shot in the left hand.

12 KILLED AS AMERICAN PLANE FALLS IN ENGLAND

ISLEHAM, England, Oct. 13 (UP)—An American Air Force "world girdling" B-50 bomber on a live bombing mission crashed and exploded in heavy fog today, killing all 12 crew members.

The big four-engine plane, bound for the bomb range on Heigoland from the U. S. Air Force Base at Lakenheath, plunged to the ground on a farm one mile outside this Cambridgeshire village.

"It sounded like the war all over again," said Abel Watkins, a farmer who lives six miles away from the crash scene.

The force of the explosion of bombs aboard the plane ripped a huge crater in the earth and sent shafts of flames shooting in all directions. Several nearby haystacks were set afire.

The flames were extinguished by fire engines and police rushed to the scene from neighboring towns in Cambridgeshire. The crash occurred at 9:25 A. M. (3:25 A. M. EST) at a point about 55 miles north of London.

Visibility at the site of the crash was only 1-8 of a mile because of fog, but Air Force officials did not immediately attribute the crash entirely to the fog.

First reports said there were 13 men aboard the plane but an Air Force spokesman said the crew numbered 12 and that all were killed.

Although the B-50 is a modified bomber of the B-29 type designed especially to carry the atom bomb, the planes based in Britain are understood to have been engaged in live bombing tests with conventional missiles.

The huge ships are capable of flying around the world if refueled in flight, a technique demonstrated recently by a B-50 which made a non-stop flight around the globe.

The B-50 is known officially as the "Stratobomber" but it is also described as an "Atom Bomber."

The Air Force spokesman said the names of the 12 airmen killed in the crash would be announced after their next of kin are notified, probably in about 48 hours.

Wants Opinion On Church Trials

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Oct. 13 (UP)—The United Nations special political committee voted overwhelmingly today to recommend that the General Assembly send the issue of the Balkan church trials to the International Court of Justice for an advisory opinion.

The committee expressed a mild rebuke to Russia and her Balkan partners of Bulgarian, Romania, and Hungary for refusal to arbitrate under their peace treaties western charges that the prosecution of Joseph Mindszenty, a 40 other church leaders constituted violations of human rights.

He first settled in Harris County in 1893, and later moved to Alhambra, Calif., where he was in the building contracting business. He retired and moved from the west coast back to Texas in 1946.

The body will lie in state today and will be sent to Alhambra by train Friday.

MISSION, Tex., Oct. 13 (UP)

—Mission High School was closed this morning as hundreds of students attending the funeral of Enrique Carrizales, 16 victim of a football practice injury.

Left halfback on the school's second team, Carrizales died yesterday of a kidney injury received Monday when he was blocked out on a scrimmage play.

Also a track star, he held the District 30-A mile record and the Donna relay mile mark.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Oct. 13 (UP)

—A head-on collision near here had claimed its second victim today, Leonard G. Johnson, Houston, Tex., chemist.

Johnson died in a hospital yesterday, 24 hours after his wife was fatally injured in the crash.

Mrs. H. B. Sapp, 22, Tallahassee was driving the other car, police said. She was held in Leon County jail here for investigation of manslaughter charges. Arresting officers said Mrs. Sapp did not have a driver's license.

Mary Lee Cowart of Tallahassee, a passenger in Mrs. Sapp's car, was hospitalized with serious injuries.
