undertaking economic aid to underdeveloped areas of the world. He promised American support for these efforts in line with his "four point program. He said he would urge Congress when it reconvenes in January to give "high priority" to proposals to make additional technical assistance and money available for undeveloped nations.

Then Mr. Truman summed up in these words what seemed to be the theme of his speech:

"Respect for human rights, promotion of economic development, and a system for control of weapons are requisites to the kind of world we seek. We cannot solve these problems overnight, but we must keep everlastingly working at them in order to reach our goal."

"No single nation can always have its own way, for these are human problems, and the solution of human problems is to be found in negotiation and mutual adjust-

ment. "The challenge of the twentieth century is the challenge of human relations and not of impersonal natural forces. The real dangers confronting us today have their origins in outmoded habits of thought, in the inertia of human nature, and in preoccupation with supposed national interests to the detriment of the common good."

"As members of the United Nations, we are convinced that patience, the spirit of reasonableness, and hard work will solve the most stubborn political problems. We are convinced that individual rights and social and economic progress can be advanced through international cooperation."

"Our faith is in the betterment of human relations. Our vision is of a better world in which men and nations can live together, respecting one another's rights and cooperating in building a better life for all. Our efforts are made in the belief that men and nations can cooperate, that there are no international problems which men

of good will cannot solve or adjust."

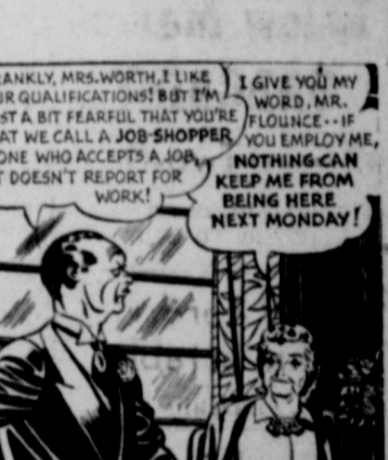

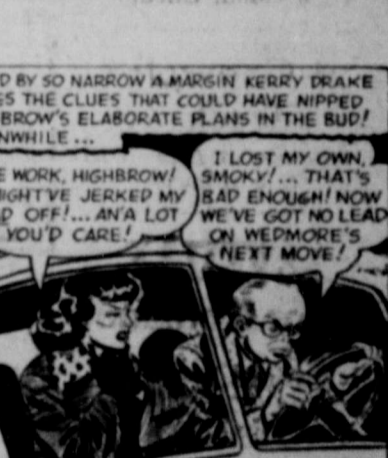

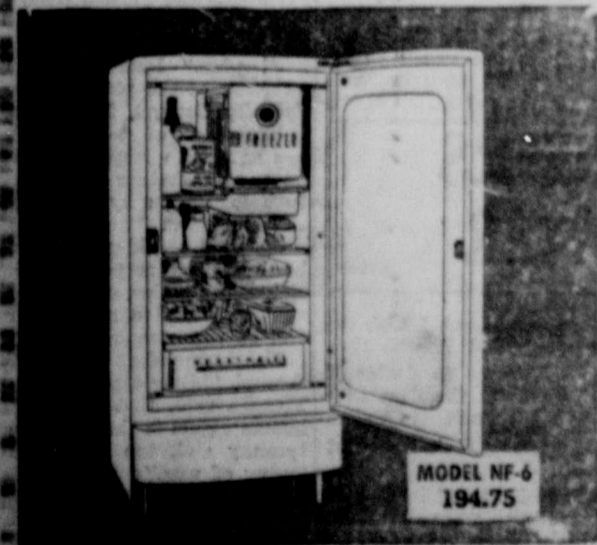

Dock Strike Ends

HONOLULU, Hawaii, Oct. 24 (UP)—More than 2,000 CIO Longshoremen are expected to return to work on the Hawaiian docks tomorrow, 178 days after they walked out in a wage dispute that cost \$100,000,000.

Leaders of the union and of seven stevedoring firms signed a back to work agreement yesterday. They sent a letter to Gov. Ingram Stainback asking him to return the waterfront facilities to private ownership.

The back to work agreement provided for a progressive wage increase reaching to 21 cents an hour by March 1 and for rehiring of strikers without discrimination. The union agreed to the wage plan Oct. 7.

More important to Hawaiians, whose pineapple and sugar crops have been held up, the agreement included guarantees by the union against strikes, slowdowns, slowdowns or other work stoppages for the next 20 months.

Strikers Won't Work While Negotiations On

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 24 (UP)—Striking CIO Workers at the Mathieson Chemical Corp. plant will not return to work while contract negotiations are proceeding.

The big plant near Pasadena, tied up by an 11-week strike of some 300 employees, will remain idle until newly-named negotiator Ivan B. Haven and Mathieson officials have reached an agreement. The rank and file of local 227 voted Sunday to stay off their jobs, despite Haven's plea to return to work while talks proceed.

Meantime, oil workers' international union president O. Q. (Jack) Knight and a few members of the local apparently were set to go through with the threat of court action to oust Arthur Hapecate and Billy Kieke as secretary-treasurer and president of local 27 respectively.

FBI JOINS SEARCH FOR BADMAN JACK TATUM

 PHOENIX, Ariz., Oct. 24 (UP)—Hundreds of FBI agents, deputies and police searched today for notorious badman Jack Tatum in one of the biggest manhunts since the days of John Dillinger and "Pretty Boy" Floyd.

Authorities used planes, horses, and speedy motorcars in an attempt to track down the thick-lipped, tattooed gunman who escaped from the Maricopa jail after a gun battle in which two other prisoners were slain by a crippled watchman and two others taken into custody before they could flee.

Roadblocks were thrown up at the California and Nevada borders and all cars were stopped and searched.

Police feared, however, that Tatum, whose exploits as a bandit, burglar and jail breaker are almost legendary, had once more eluded pursuers and made his way into one of the bordering states.

There was evidence that he had been aided by someone outside the jail.

Tatum is a member of a three-man family gang that has terrorized the Southwest repeatedly in the past with forays of gunmanship and banditry.

Despite the belief that he may have escaped over state lines, a big search for him was launched in the nearby Salt River Valley which has been a refuge for out-

laws since the two-gun days of the old wild west.

Sharpshooters FBI men, called into the case because Tatum is wanted for transporting stolen cars across state lines, were prepared to shoot it out with Tatum as they did with Dillinger.

They doubted that he would give up without a fight and believed they probably would have to kill him.

The search was the most widespread since officers tracked down Billy Ray Gilbert, another southwestern gunman, at a suburban auto court here last Feb. 27 and shot him down in a hail of bullets.

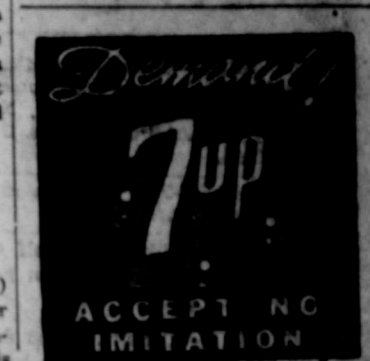

BRITAIN MAKES BIG CUT IN BUDGET FOR NEXT YEAR

 LONDON, Oct. 24 (UP)—

Britain's labor government today jettisoned \$754,000,000 from its 1949-1950 budget in a desperate attempt to head off runaway inflation and restore the nation's world trade.

The government's emergency program to meet the economic crisis touched off by devaluation of the pound was announced by Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee at a crowded session of the House of Commons.

"dollar areas" to \$1,200,000,000 (B) compared with \$1,600,000,000 in 1948-49.

Abolition of free prescriptions under Britain's socialized medicine program to save \$28,000,000 a year. Britons henceforth will have to pay 14 cents for each prescription received under the national health scheme.

Abolition of subsidies on fish and revision of other food subsidies to save \$19,000,000 a year. Food subsidies now total \$1,302,000,000 (B) a year.

Reduction of capital expenditures on new building, machinery and so forth of \$392,000,000, a year, including a cut of \$98,000,000 in appropriations for new housing.

Cuts totaling \$280,000,000 a year in general government expenditures, including reductions of \$16,800,000 in expenditures for the royal ordnance factories and \$4,760,000 in administrative expenses of the food ministry.

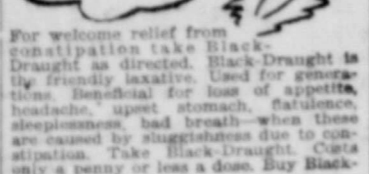
