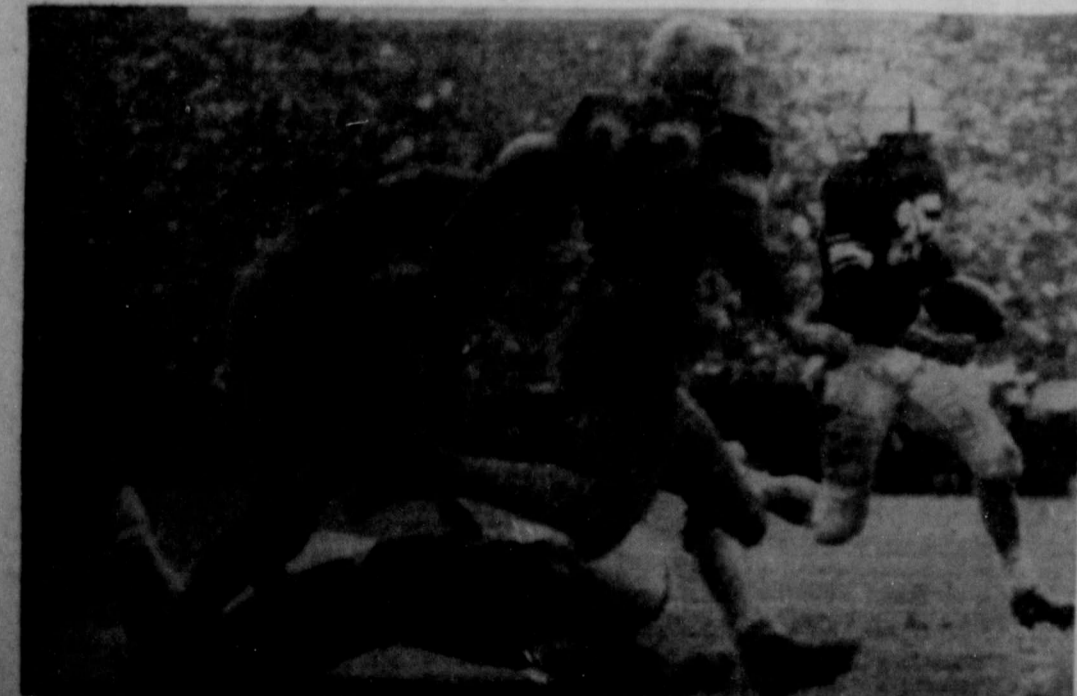

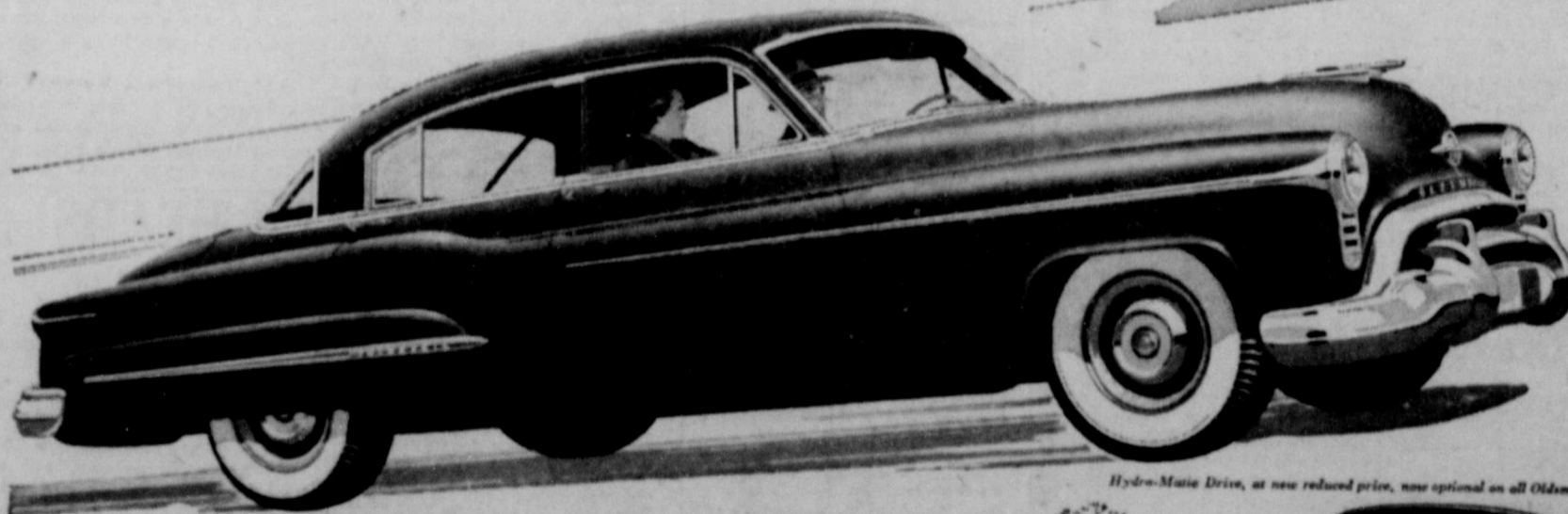

TEXAS News Briefs

AUSTIN, Jan. 4 (UP)—Cigarette stamp sales in Texas rose in December to \$2,030,479, topping revenue during the previous month and in December 1948.

State Treasurer Jesse James reported that total stamp sales amounted to \$2,798,582 during December.

BROWNSVILLE, Jan. 4 (UP)—The Lower Rio Grande Valley counted its first traffic fatality of 1950 with the death of five-year old Antonio Azua.

The small boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesus Azua of near Brownsville, died yesterday after being struck by a hit and run driver on a country road.

WESLACO, Tex. Jan. 4 (UP)—The Texas Citrus Commission today inaugurated a "free" publicity program to run, on a temporary basis, until Sept. 1.

On the recommendation of advertising committee chairman Maurice Acas of Mission, the committee decided yesterday to forego any paid advertising program. Instead, the group will "pay" all itself of all possible free channels of publicity and information.

TYLER, Jan. 4, (UP)—Little Lynn Keedy, three year old Tyler boy who died Monday of deadly leukemia, will be buried tomorrow at Dallas.

The youngster fought a long but losing battle with the disease in Tyler, Dallas and New York Hospitals. His final trip to New York, where he died, was financed by contributions from generous East Texans.

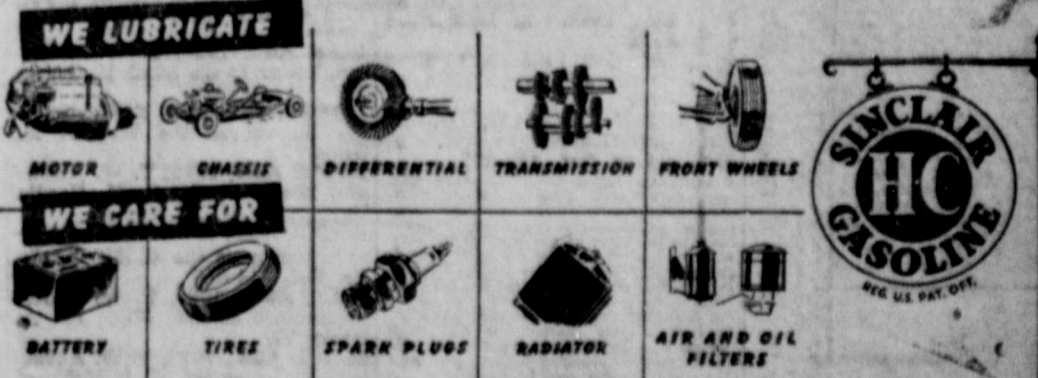

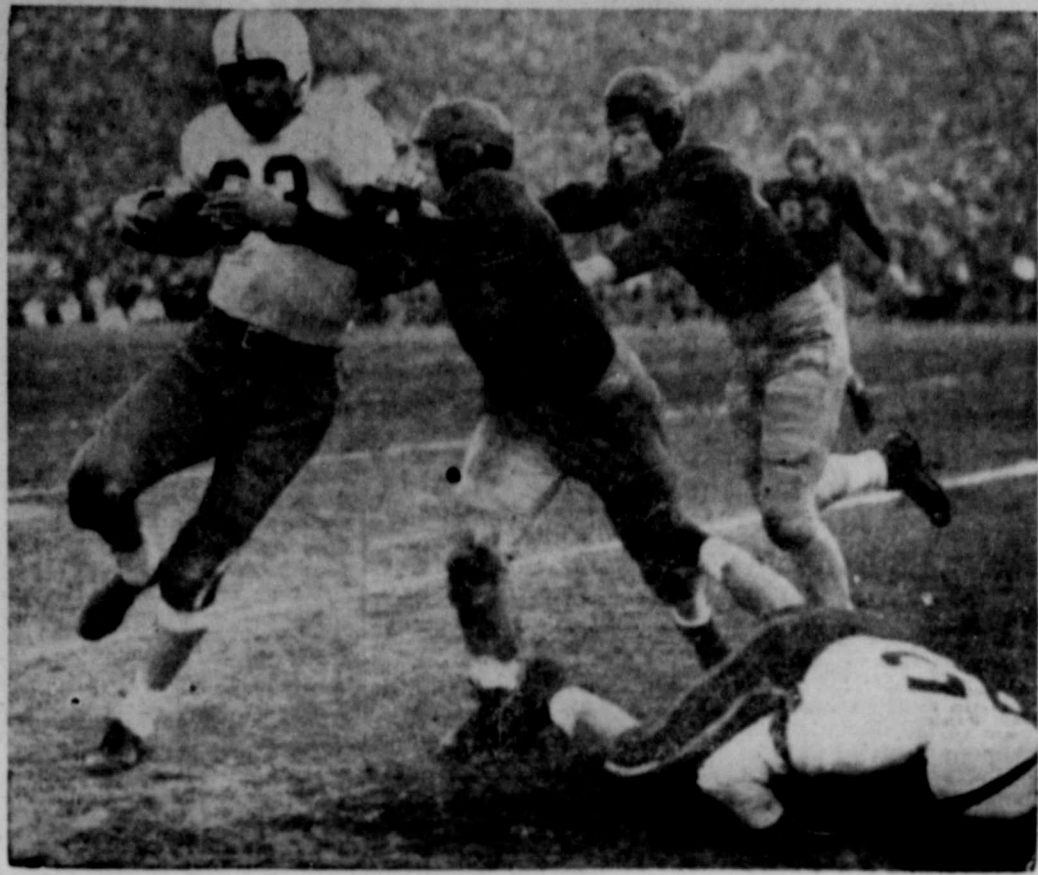

Ben Hogan Back In Big Golf

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Jan. 4 (UP)—one of the great comebacks in sports history got underway today with Bantam Ben Hogan's announcement he intends playing in the \$15,000 Los Angeles open golf championship starting Friday.

The rugged little Texan called tournament officials yesterday and told them, "count me in." Just 11 months ago, on Feb. 2, Hogan was so seriously injured that for a while there were fears whether he would survive. His automobile collided head-on with a bus and Hogan was crushed so badly he spent months in a hospital, undergoing several major operations.

Only a month ago the three-time winner of the Los Angeles open dropped around to a Fort Worth golf course and tried a few rounds, just to see whether it would bother him to play. It did but afterwards he felt stronger.

Still uncertain whether he was ready to start tournament play, Hogan came here and tried it again, this time on the difficult Riviera Country Club course, the links on which he won the U. S. open in 1948 with a brilliant score of 275.

One of his partners in a prac-

tice turn was Dr. Cary Middlecoff, national open champion. He like the others in the foursome—Jimmy Demaret and Jimmy Thomson—thought they would have to take it easy with Hogan playing.

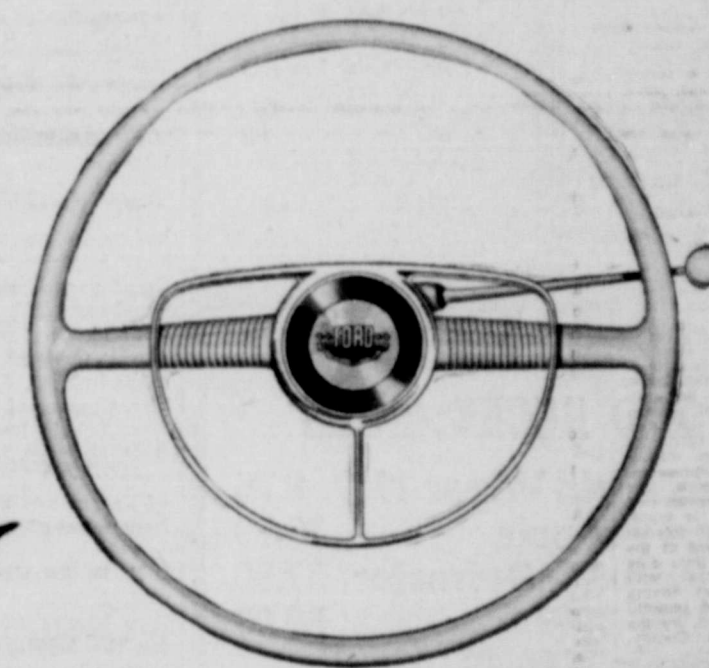
