BODIES OF 24 WOMEN TAKEN FROM FIRE DEBRIS

DAVENPORT, Ia., Jan. 7 (UP)—The bodies of 24 women have been recovered in the masonry hospital fire, coroner C. H. Wildman said at 10:30 A. M. today. Thirteen women still are missing, he said.

DAVENPORT, Ia., Jan. 7 (UP)—A flash fire swept a women's mental ward building at Mercy Hospital early today and at least 17 women burned to death. Nine to 11 others were missing and presumed dead.

Sister Mary Annunciatia, superintendent of Mercy Hospital, said she "presumed that at least 25 persons" would be listed as dead when the final count became known.

All of the known dead were patients except for a nurse's aide, Mrs. Anna Neal, who gave her life trying to save her charges. The count of dead was announced by Scott County Coroner C. H. Wildman who said that from 60 to 65 persons were in the building at the time of the fire. At least ten of the persons, he said, were still unaccounted for.

Hospital officials said at least 62 persons were in the building. The exact count couldn't be given because it was not known how many attendants may have been absent on duties in other buildings of the sprawling hospital. The death toll rose rapidly after dawn as the embers cooled and firemen were able to enter the smoldering ruins to bring out the bodies of victims.

Most of the bodies were burned so badly that identification was almost impossible. Witnesses said the flames swept the structure so quickly that victims were trapped in their rooms, behind windows that had been barred to prevent their escape from the institution.

The patients screamed and yielded in agony as the flames roared around them. Patrolman Richard Fee, one of the heroes of the blaze, told how he found a group huddled together in silent bewilderment, apparently waiting for death by fire.

The mercury began a slow climb today as the blue norther which froze Texas early this week lost its sting.

Rising temperatures were predicted throughout the state over the week end and ice should melt on the streets and highways before dusk tonight.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at Dallas said partly cloudy skies could be expected today and tomorrow.

Sub-freezing temperatures were reported by several cities early today. Amarillo had a 15-degree reading at 4:30 A. M., the coldest in the state at that hour. Brownsville was high with 44.

Other 4:30 A. M. temperatures reported were Laredo 41, Houston 25, Galveston 41, El Paso 22, Guadalupe Pass 27, Salt Flat 19, Wink, 18, Lubbock 18, and Dallas 24.

Skies were cloudy at Beaumont, Lufkin, Bryan, Brownsville, and Corpus Christi and partly cloudy at San Angelo, Junction, Austin, Wink, Houston, Palacios and Waco before dawn. Elsewhere the weather was clear.

Brannin was the son of A. E. Brannin, a pioneer in Knox County, who helped organize the town of Benjamin.

In 1937 Brannin retired as division foreman of the Four-Six Ranch near Knox City.

New Directory Being Compiled For 3 Cities

C. L. Moorhead and a group of associates have started their work this week on a new directory, which will combine information on Eastland, Ranger and Cisco.

The volume, to be produced by the Moorhead Directory Company will be complete and ready for delivery by May and June.

The director is assisted by a corps of men and women workers, who are now compiling information of the new homes and business houses of Eastland.

Included in the book will be the names of every resident of 18 years of age and over; number of children in the home under 18; occupation, address, telephone number, and ownership of home; and will also include an alphabetical listing of business firms and a classified listing of each. In addition will be the names of household head in Eastland County by route.

There will be a street directory, telephone numbers listed numerically, with a supplementary classified business directory and a numerical telephone directory given to each home free.

Hearing Due On Pollution Of San Antonio River

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 7 (UP)—Three State Departments will conduct a hearing Jan. 16 on pollution of the San Antonio River.

The Attorney General's department, the Health Department and the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission will hear charges that the city of San Antonio is discharging raw or partially-treated sewage into the river.

Attorney General Price Daniel said the hearing would bring out plans of the city to speed up construction of additional sewage facilities.

Brownwood Gets Big Housing Unit

BROWNWOOD, Tex., Jan. 7 (UP)—Brownwood housing authorities today laid plans to build 150 low-rent housing units for negro, Latin-American and white families.

Senator Lyndon Johnson yesterday advised housing director Herschel Newby that the public Housing Administration had approved an allocation for the project and a loan of \$55,000 for preliminary planning.

Portable Phones Due For Ranchers

DUMAS, Tex., Jan. 7 (UP)—Panhandle farmers and ranchers soon may be able to carry their telephones with them on inspection trips to far reaches of their sprawling wheat and cattle empires.

Lucian Spencer, vice-president and general manager of the North Plains Telephone Company office, said his firm would go ahead with plans of installing a mobile telephone system in Dumas after receiving permission from the Federal Communications Commission.

He said he hoped to have the system, which will have a good signal up to 50 miles on the flat Panhandle Prairies, in full operation by Feb. 1.

Seek Name For Investigators

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 7 (UP)—A name for a Texas-style "Hoover Commission" was sought today by Gov. Allan Shivers.

However, Shivers said, the tag of "Little Hoover Commission" didn't quite ring the bell for the commission, proposed to study the state government's executive branch.

Following a preliminary meeting yesterday, the governor announced he would name the committee members, and the committee, later this month.

Wells is the son of James B. Wells, political figure for whom Jim Wells county was named. His affiliation with the ranch continued an association with the Wells family that started in 1878.

Conference With Rail Commission Asked Tuesday By Area Operators

ABILENE — Oil industry leaders of the West Central Texas District Friday afternoon took steps here to counteract a crisis that seriously threatens production in seven counties of the area.

The action came after an announcement by Premier Oil Refining Company of Longview that it will take only 40 per cent of the allowable of each well in its gathering system in Eastland, Shackelford, Erath, Stephens, Comanche, Palo Pinto, and Young Counties.

Premier—a major purchaser of crude in the district— notified all of its producers Friday that the 60 per cent cut in oil it will move is effective as of Jan. 1, 1950.

The announcement was the second indication within a week that a softened condition exists in the market for West Central Texas crude.

Premier's announcement came close on the heels of Onyx Refining Company's adjustment in the price of 40-gravity crude from \$2.65 a barrel to \$2.58 last Monday.

The daily allowable for the area, as set by the Railroad Commission, is 7,000 barrels. Of that figure Eastland County is allowed 2,605 barrels per day, with the exception of the Kleiner Pool north of Cisco which was given an additional allowable of 1,044 barrels. If other purchasers follow the lead of Premier in the 60 per cent reduction, it would mean that some 4,200 barrels of crude would remain unsold each day if the full allowable were produced.

C. W. Hoffmann, one of the leading oil producers in the county and a former director of the Premier Oil Company, realizing the gravity of the situation upon notification of the purchase cut, contacted fellow members of the executive committee of the West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association. President French M. Robertson called the meeting in Abilene Friday afternoon.

H. (Hiram) A. McCannies of Cisco has authorized the Times to announce his candidacy for the office of Eastland County Treasurer.

BAYLOR WILL SEEK ONE OF NATION'S BEST COACHES

WACO, Tex., Jan. 7 (UP)—Baylor University, which lost football coach Bob Woodruff to University of Florida last night, will go after "one of the nation's best" to replace him.

That was the firm assertion today from Dr. W. R. White, Baylor president, who, like everyone else around here, was caught by surprise when Woodruff signed with Florida.

Woodruff began a new five-year contract, at \$12,000 annually, with Baylor only this week. At Florida, he signed a seven-year contract, at \$17,000 per year.

There, he will be head coach and athletic director. At Baylor, he was only head coach.

In November, he and the Baylor athletic director, Ralph Wolf, had difficulties because of overlapping authority. In the squabble, both of them "resigned." Woodruff quit one night; Wolf the next day. A week end passed, and Dr.

White patched up the differences. He said both had reconsidered and would stay on. Wolf was relieved of his duty as athletic director, and was assigned the job of managing the new 40,000 seat Baylor Stadium, to be ready for next season. Woodruff was to stay as head coach. The job of athletic director was left vacant.

There was a plaintive note in Dr. White's first statement on Woodruff's resignation.

"I thought everything was settled," he said.

But he disclosed that Woodruff telephoned three times last night from Tallahassee, "insistent" upon being released from his Baylor contract. White said he polled the Baylor Athletic Board by telephone, to get their consent.

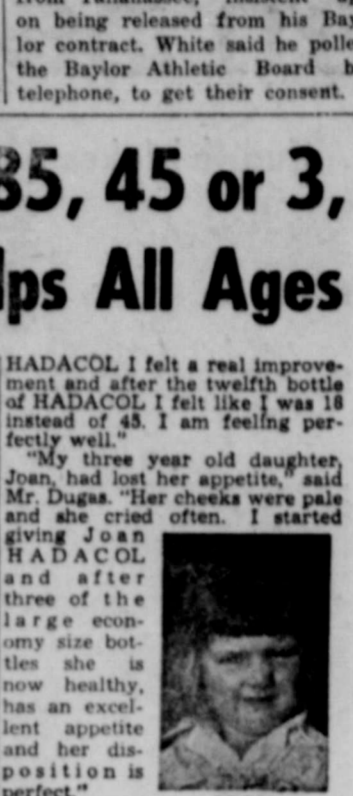
