## Reds Seize U. S. Consulate General At Peiping

### IN DEFIANCE OF PROTESTS U. S. DIPLOMATS CLAIM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (UP) — The Chinese Communists have seized the U. S. Consulate General in Peiping, the State Department announced today.  
The Department said the Communist action was "in defiance of protests by the U. S. Government."  
The Department said it is preparing instructions for the recall of all American official personnel from Communist China, in consequence of the Red action.  
These orders will affect 135 American officials in Peiping, Tientsin, Shanghai, Mankin, and Tsingtao.  
The State Department said the Peiping Consular Offices were "invaded by police and four civilian officials" at 9:50 A. M. Jan. 14 (Peiping time) (8:50 P. M. EST) Jan. 13.  
"This seizure is in violation of standing treaty rights granted the U. S. in 1901 and reaffirmed in the Sino-U.S. Treaty of 1943 by which the U. S. voluntarily relinquished extraterritorial rights in China," the Department announced.

## BLIZZARD, GALE LASH PACIFIC NORTHWEST

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 14 (UP) — A blizzard borne by 70-mile an hour gales lashed the Pacific states today leaving seven persons dead and hundreds of travelers stranded.  
This city was virtually cut off by rail, or by bus from the outside world as the storm headed into California today. The only connection was by car to Seattle and Union Pacific railroad to the east.  
The weather bureau warned that "whole gales," just under hurricane strength, would batter the northern California coast.  
Ten below zero temperatures were forecast for Eastern Washington and northern Idaho. Along the Pacific Coast, where the mercury seldom drops below 20, forecasters said it would plummet almost to zero.  
In British Columbia, the Canadian Air Force planned to buck the blizzard to parachute emergency food supplies to 500 soldiers stranded with only 24 hours' food near Chilliwack. It was believed the men could hold out two or three days, if necessary.  
Search parties hunted along the Province's northern coastline for three fishermen missing four days after a gale.  
Hundreds of motorists were forced to take refuge in hotels, motels or public buildings in the area. Stranded airlines and railroad passengers sweated out the storm in stations and terminals.  
The most fortunate were 57 reserve officers and three WACS at Reno surplus base headquarters 10 miles north of the city. They reported they had 17 cases of beer, plenty of fuel, but no food.  
They said they weren't worrying about the last item.

## Trinity Above Flood Stage

The Trinity River in Dallas was five feet above flood stage at the 8 A. M. reading today and livestock owners downstream were warned to remove their stock from lowlands.  
The river measured 38.15 feet. Flood stage is 28 feet. Levees protect up to approximately 60 feet in the Dallas area.  
A minor cold front moved through the Panhandle and north and central Texas during the night but it had dissipated this morning. Some of the overnight lows included 19 at Dalhart, 23 at Amarillo, 26 at Lubbock, 28 at Guadalupe Pass and Childress, 30 at Wink and El Paso and 32 at Childress.  
Yesterday's temperatures ranged from 90 at Alice to 41 at Guadalupe Pass. Highest minimum this morning was 66 at Brownsville.  
Rainfall reports included 1.18 inches at Tyler, .90 at Palestine, .59 at Beaumont, .26 at Galveston, .12 at Bryan, .06 at Dallas and .04 at Waco.  
Generally warmer weather was expected over Texas tonight.

## SEEK CAUSE OF GLIDER CRASH THAT KILLED 13

COLUMBUS, Ga., Jan. 14 (UP) — An Air Force investigation board hoped to find the cause today of a freak Friday the 13th glider crash that killed 13 men, 11 of them paratroop students scheduled to "graduate" today.  
Ten of the students died instantly when their glider, sloping in for a landing at Lawson Field on the huge Fort Benning reservation, tipped sideways and crashed with a tremendous roar.  
Another student an instructor and an Air Force pilot died within hours.  
Four more students lay injured as a result of the splintering smash that came without a second's warning. The Fort Benning public information office would not disclose their names or conditions.  
First reports said a sudden, strong wind current caused a wing to rip into the ground.  
But officers later said they did not know the cause. The wreckage was spread over 700 feet of

## Boys Silent About Trying To Wreck Trains

CHICAGO, Jan. 14 (UP) — Two cocky schoolboys refused to tell police today why they stacked heavy steel bars on the Chicago and Northwestern railroad tracks, nearly derailing two fast passenger trains.  
The boys, identified by officers as Thomas Bryl, 12, and John Grayman, 15, admitted blocking the tracks but refused to say why they had done it. They were held overnight in the juvenile home.  
Police described them as "tough-talking kids" who apparently felt little remorse over 500 persons.  
When a reporter sought to question them, they said:  
"Mum's the word—we don't talk to newspapers."  
They were seized last night by a railroad detective who found them near the switch shack from which they had taken switch bars and other equipment they admitted piling on the tracks.  
Railroad men said it was "miraculous" that neither of the speeding trains, carrying hundreds of passengers was not derailed, Thursday night.  
After watching the trains smash into their handiwork, the boys said they broke open several switch locks, according to police. The unlocked switches were discovered before the boys threw them open.  
Police said they and a third youth, Clarence Jones, 14 admitted setting fire to two railroad shanties earlier this month. Young Jones did not participate in piling the obstructions, however.  
The FBI joined railroad detectives and police in an investigation of the incident, after the Valley 400 and the Twin Cities 400 struck the obstructions, which had been heaped on parallel tracks.

## Colleges To Get New Buildings

FORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 14 (UP) — The board of regents of Texas state colleges yesterday awarded bids totaling \$1,838,112.97 for six new buildings at Southwestern State and Sul Ross State and approved architects plans for two new structures at Sam Houston State.  
A fine Arts building, a dining hall with dormitory facilities on an upper floor and a library extension were contained in the contracts let for the Sam Marcos school on bids totaling \$1,050,000.  
At Sul Ross, bids totaling \$788,112.07 were let for erection of a new girls' dormitory, a central dining hall and cafeteria and a fine arts building.

## Man Held For Query In Robbery

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 14 (UP) — The State Highway Patrol today held for further questioning a man who admitted he held up a bank with no deadlier weapon than a bottle of hair oil.  
The patrol said Kenneth Darrell carpenter of Kenton, O., and his wife, Vivian 33, were captured less than four and a half hours after a bank holdup at Mt. Blanchard, O., yesterday. A bandit had walked into the Citizens' Bank, brandished a bottle of what he said was nitro-glycerine, and escaped with \$395.  
Patrolman E. M. Valentine sighted the getaway car shortly after hearing a patrol broadcast giving the license number of the vehicle.  
Bank cashier W. D. Feller had taken down the number as the robber pulled out.  
When Valentine captured the couple near Mt. Vernon, O., he found carpenter unarmed. The bottle which he had threatened to blow up the bank was found in the car. It contained hair oil.  
Patrol Lt. F. C. Moon said Carpenter admitted the robbery. He also confessed he stole the car in Amarillo, Tex., and two sets of license plates in Kenton, Moon said.

## Man Held For Query In Robbery

## Catholic Schools Fight Sanity Code

NEW YORK, Jan. 14 (UP) — Catholic colleges rallied behind the three-conference Southern bloc today in the bitter fight against the NCAA Sanity Code.  
With seven schools facing expulsion from the NCAA for Sanity Code violations, members of the Southern, Southwest and Southeastern Conferences claimed the Catholic schools' support assured them of the 80 votes they need to avoid expulsion.  
In the event that the Southern find themselves in trouble, they have prepared a resolution which would postpone any action for one year.  
However, a spokesman for the Southern delegation said, "we have the votes we need now. We want to settle this thing today."

## Blast At Mine Alerts Police

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 14 (UP) — State Police were alerted today after coal pickets dynamited a steam shovel at a Western Pennsylvania non-union mine in retaliation for the arrest of four of their number.  
The blast came on the heels of growing dissension in the coal fields as sentiment to ignore John L. Lewis' "suggestion" to return to work Monday spread among the 81,000 soft coal miners.  
Pickets were out in force again this morning and State Police patrols were ordered to be on the lookout for further trouble.  
State Police said no one was injured in the blast which destroyed a \$20,000 shovel at the strip mine operated by Lorain Knight in South Kersey, Pa.  
The dynamiting was reported about an hour after the arrests of Don Longo, Penfield, Pa., on charges of malicious mischief, destruction of property and violating the motor vehicle code. Earlier three other pickets were arrested on similar charges growing out of an attack on a four-truck convoy coming from the mine.  
The pickets stoned the trucks and several drivers were cut by flying glass. The attackers were dispersed when Knight leaped from his automobile brandishing a pistol.

## Two Brothers Die In Home Fire

ROTAN, Tex., Jan. 14 (UP) — Two elderly brothers died in the fire which destroyed their frame farm home four miles west of Rotan yesterday, one of them succumbing when he was trapped trying to rescue the other.  
A partially-blind sister, Miss Lou Spears, 70, told Justice W. Lee Burk of Roby that her brother, Tom Spears, 70 died when he entered the flaming house in an attempt to rescue another brother, George 55, who was asleep on a rear sleeping porch.  
She said she and Tom Spears were working outside the house about 4 P. M. when they noticed the fire. His body was found in the living room, that of George on the porch.  
Neighbors had to use force to restrain Miss Spears from entering the house after her brothers. The fire was believed to have started from an oil heater in the rear of the home.

## ASK FULL AUTHORITY FOR NEGRO SCHOOL HEAD

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 14 (UP)—Four students of the Texas State University for negroes petitioned Gov. Allan Shivers yesterday to give full authority to Dr. R. O. O'Hara Lanier in his duties as president of the Houston institution.

The placard-bearing students did not see Shivers personally. They delivered their plea to the governor's executive secretary, William L. McGill. Charlie Wexler, 18-year-old student body president, presented a letter to McGill. It said that "were our president granted full power and authority as briefs his office, a situation such as presently exists could be successfully comb-

ated to the benefit of those who take pride in the institution and its progress."  
 The group charged that John H. Robertson, executive assistant to Craig Cullinan, chairman of the school's board of directors, was "interfering with the operation of the institution."  
 Wexler, a senior from Rainbow, said the group was named by the student council to come to Austin and represent the school.  
 He was accompanied by Lawrence Holler, 23, a junior and football team captain; Otto Gibson, 24, a senior, and George McElroy, 27, a junior and editor of the campus newspaper, all of Houston.

The placards carried read: "Give us a first class college or let my people go to the University of Texas."  
 "How long must we be students of circumstance?"  
 "Untie the hands of Dr. Lanier."  
 State University of negroes students held a campus demonstration Wednesday.  
 Nine students marched Thursday in front of a downtown Houston building where Cullinan and Robertson have offices. Police halted the demonstration.

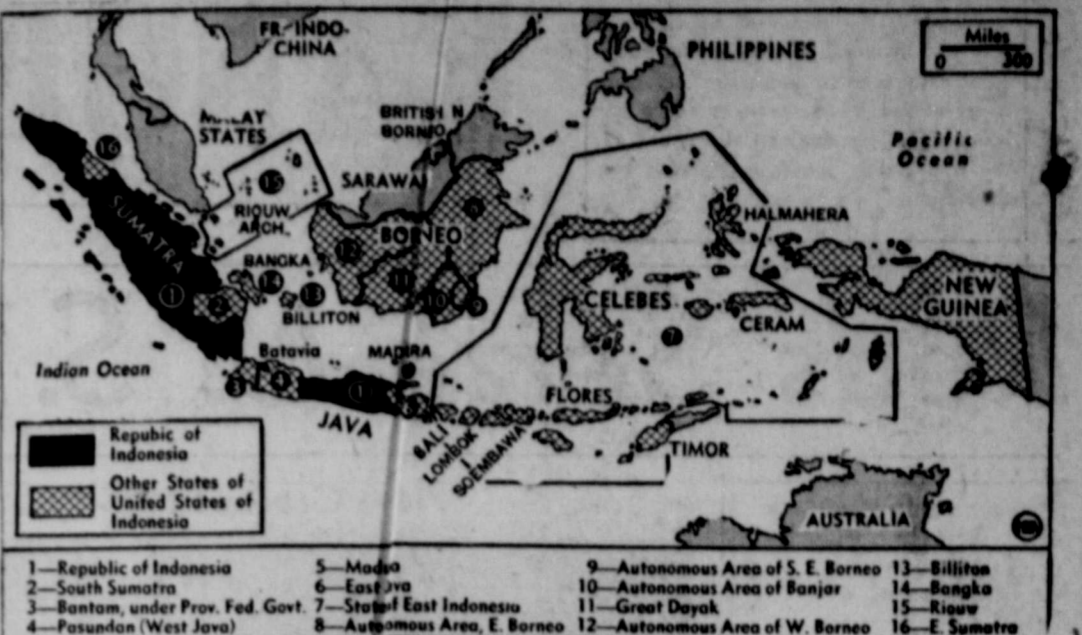

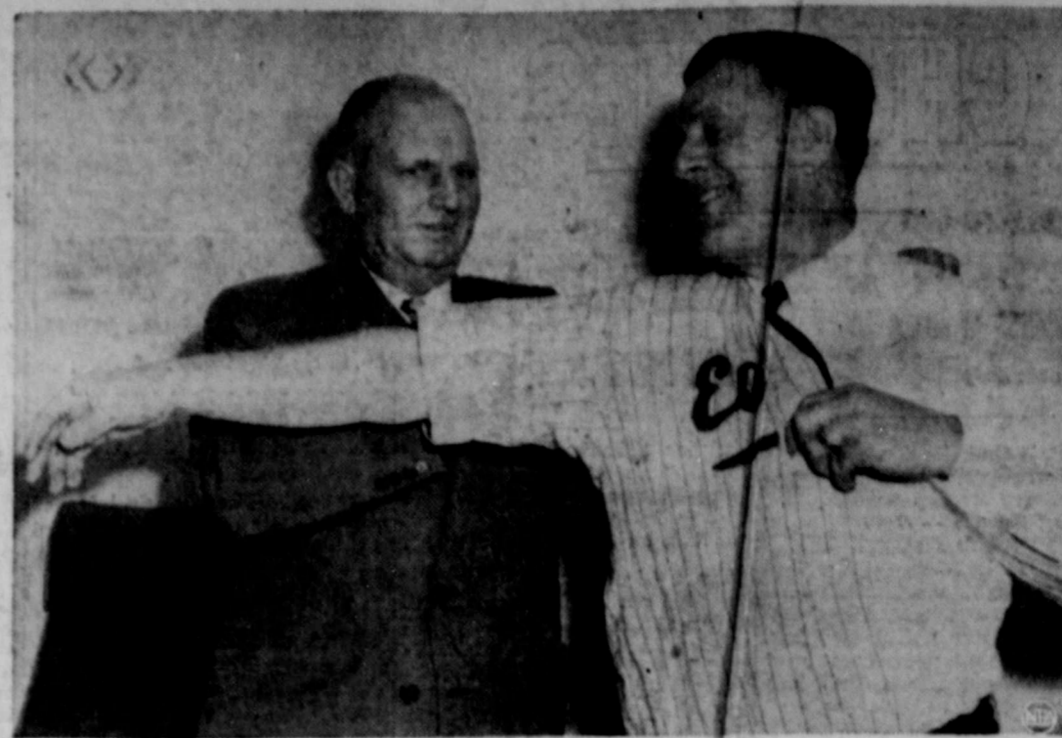

## COYOTE POPULATION IN TEXAS GREATLY REDUCED

**AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 14 (UP)**—There were 4,100 fewer coyotes howling on the lone prairie of Texas today, and the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission had to prove it.  
The commission held its quarter annual meeting yesterday in Austin. Its members were told that 4,100 coyotes were trapped last month, mostly in south Texas.  
The coyote mortality rate was expected to go even higher as a result of a commission decision to expand the use of radio in its law enforcement work. The chief warden supervisors were authorized to have radio telephones in their cars.  
The commission also voted to increase the commission's warden school at Texas A&M College from an enrollment of 150 to 25.  
Fishing wasn't overlooked in the survey of Texas sportsmen's needs, either.  
The commission authorized the issuance of special \$5 Lake Texoma fishing licenses to Texas anglers, effective Feb. 1.  
The license was viewed as Texas' final step in ending long-standing confusion about licenses for the huge lake which flows both Oklahoma and Texas.  
The next move expected to be formal ratification by Oklahoma of a reciprocal agreement with Texas about the licenses. Executive secretary Howard Doughty expected sooner approval.

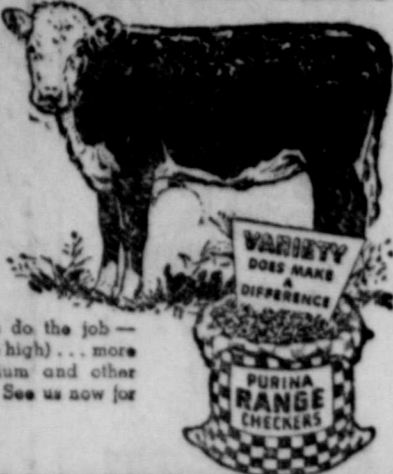

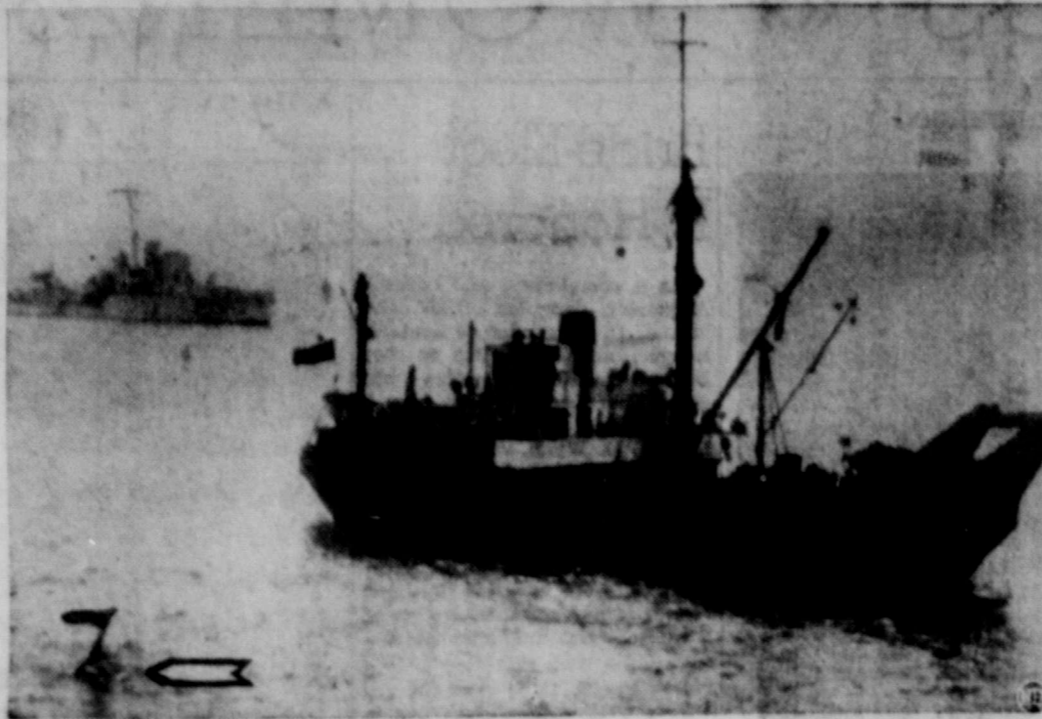

## Railroad Commissioner Murray Praised For 'Citizen's Action'

AUSTIN, Jan. 15.—From every part of Texas came messages of praise for the action of Railroad Commissioner Chairman William J. Murray, Jr., in launching a Citizens Committee "charged with the responsibility of investigating the economic impact, both present and future, of excessive importation of crude oil and acquisition of the citizens of Texas with their natural resources and the threat to their schools and universities, their private businesses and jobs."

Named to head the Citizens Committee were E. J. McCurdy of Fort Worth, Chairman, and Dr. T. S. Painter, President of the University of Texas, Co-Chairman.

"We as independent producers and land owners of Texas hail, with this section on the part of the Chairman of our oil and gas conservation body as one vital to the welfare of the entire State and Nation," said Guy L. Warren, president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association. In pledging TIPRO support of the Committee, Warren offered the full facilities and resources of the Association.

"Too long this problem has been thought to be one affecting only the oil industry. In appointing a 'Citizens Committee' with representatives from every segment of the Texas economy, Commissioner Murray has made a tremendous contribution to the understanding of the real nature of the import problem."

"Despite the fact that Texas has increased its oil producing ability by 484 new fields and a net gain of 6196 new wells during 1949, its January crude production will be some 500,000 barrels per day less than January of last year, (representing a daily loss to the state, producers and royalty owners of about \$1,250,000.) As imports rise, (already at the 800,000 barrels per day) crude allowances here have to be cut back to prevent excessive above ground accumulations and consequent waste. Texas' 116,000 oil wells, which Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson says could produce 3,000,000 barrels daily without waste, are allowed only 2,000,000 barrels daily production."

"On the national level, crude production in 1949 declined 8.5

percent while crude output in the rest of the world jumped by 9 percent. Crude production in the world outside the U. S. rose to 4,123,000 barrels daily, as compared with 3,819,000 in 1948; in the U. S. production dropped by an average of 469,000 barrels daily.

"Accounting for this was the fact that U. S. exports fell while imports increased. Exports for 1949 were at the rate of 325,000 barrels daily, compared with 368,000 last year and 450,000 in 1947. Imports jumped to a 1949 daily average of 638,000 barrels, compared with 513,000 last year, and 436,000 two years ago.

"This nation's oil wells are permitted an average daily flow of 12.6 barrels as compared with 3,000 to 15,000 barrels daily of foreign wells where no conservation agencies exist. If the current worldwide surplus of oil is permitted to flood the domestic market, the U. S. will become a have-not nation with respect to vital oil in a very short time. Approximately three-fourths of the nation's 440,000 flowing wells are marginal wells which will have to be abandoned permanently soon if some curb is not placed on petroleum imports."

"It was with a full understanding of the problem, then, that Commissioner Murray said in making the announcement that the problem is not one facing the oil industry alone but is a crisis common to all Texans."

## Famous Cross Coming To U. S.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 14. (UP)—A Cross, alleged to contain a fragment of the cross on which Christ died, will be flown to Los Angeles, Calif., today after causing "the greatest religious demonstrations in Mexican history" during the past week.

Sixty persons were injured yesterday when 200,000 worshippers jammed the Basilica of Guadalupe to kiss the relic. Church authorities said more than 1,000,000 persons have kissed the relic during its exhibition.

Catholic priests are carrying the cross on a tour of the world. Before arriving in Mexico it was exhibited in Europe and South America.

## River Threatens To Break Levee

SHAWNEETOWN, Ill., Jan. 14 (UP)—The Ohio river threatened to crash through the big levee protecting this historic river town today as flood waters lapped within three feet of the danger point.

The Ohio was on a rampage over 200 miles of its course from Cairo, Ill., where it dumps into the Mississippi, almost to Evansville, Ind.

The big stream was being pushed upward by two days of rains throughout its valley and by a big flood crest sweeping along a 75-mile stretch of the Wabash River which empties into the Ohio just north of here.

About 50 towns and hamlets were affected by the rising waters and state police estimated that about 4,000 persons had been forced from their homes in lowland areas.
