## Major Oil Companies To Take Area Oil

Texas weather fooled the weather man again today. The forecast for this area was for colder tonight and Thursday but by 8 o'clock this morning a blue norther cloud showed up in the north and temperatures began to topple. In about 30 minutes, from 8:30 to 9 o'clock there had been an eleven degree drop from 45 to 34 degrees.

The weather man said nothing about the norther being a "blue nosed" one but it blew in with all the symptoms of one.

Evidently the fundamental economic law of supply and demand is outmoded so far as government officials are concerned. It used to be considered rather important in the economic structure of the country. But now every time any product exceeds in supply the demand from the consumers, the government steps in and starts buying that product to boost the price. Here pork had just about dropped in price to the point where we could at least buy that, and eat meat, and what happens, the government has started buying it off the market to create higher prices.

The Agriculture Department was to feed what they buy to school children under the Federal-State Lunch Program, to public hospital patients and at public institutions and jails.

It looks like the government has quit running the government and gone into business.

### Cisco Man Dies In Car-Train Crash Monday

CISCO—Funeral services are pending for Charles Jeffrey Elliott, 47-year-old construction worker, who died almost instantly at 6:30 P. M. Monday in the crash of a freight train and a pickup truck at the Texas and Pacific crossing on the Breckenridge Highway in the city limits.

The accident occurred when Elliott drove onto the tracks in the path of an approaching freight train. He apparently did not see the train until too late to stop. The vehicle Elliott was driving was almost completely demolished. Survivors are a daughter, Mrs. Don Flack of Odessa; a son, Donald Joe Elliott, with the U. S. Army in Germany; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Elliott of Cisco; two sisters, Mrs. D. L. Isbell of Cisco and Mrs. J. D. Butler of Fort Worth; and two grandchildren.

### Arnold's Body Flown To Capital

HAMILTON FIELD, Calif. Jan. 18 (UP)—An Air Force C-54 flew to Washington today, carrying the body of Gen. Henry H. (Hap) Arnold for burial at Arlington National Cemetery.

Another plane, President Truman's "Independence," carried Arnold's widow, three sons, and son-in-law. Arnold's body was brought to this West Coast air base yesterday afternoon after memorial services. Drearly, wet weather lent a somber note to the airman's last flight. Arnold died of a heart attack Sunday at his Valley of the Moon Ranch home near Sonoma, Calif. He was 68.

The hearse drove slowly along the 20 mile route from Sonoma to Hamilton Field. As it entered the gate, an honor guard of air force men escorted it at a half-step along a winding avenue. Four thousand men stationed at the base were drawn up at attention from the gate to the airbase.

### CATHOLIC LAYMEN OF ABILENE AREA ORGANIZE

A group of 89 prominent Catholic laymen of the Abilene area pledged themselves Tuesday night to honor the forthcoming jubilee of Bishop Joseph P. Lynch by instituting an intensive program to strengthen and extend the work of Catholic charities throughout the 64 counties of the Dallas Diocese.

The meeting, which was held at Sacred Heart Rectory was one of a group of five similar organizational gatherings held at key spots in North Texas through which the 75,000 Catholics of the diocese are making plans to do homage to their Bishop.

Bishop Lynch will celebrate his fiftieth year as a Roman Catholic priest and his fortieth year as Bishop of Dallas next month.

Dan A. Gallagher, chairman of Tuesday's meeting, announced that the Bishop's Jubilee Program will have a seven-point objective:

1. To establish a home for the aged.
2. To complete a founding home already being organized.
3. To extend the facilities of existing Catholic orphanages and establish a Diocesan Charities Organization co-ordinating the welfare program of the diocese.
4. To create a sinking fund to assist in the establishment of schools and missions and to subsidize clinics and social centers for the poor.
5. To create a major seminary for the education of native-born Catholic priests.
6. To establish catechetical centers with professional teachers to meet the religious and educational needs of small and scattered communities in the rural areas of the diocese.
7. To establish central Diocesan offices for all Catholic charitable and administrative organizations.

"This program is unique in the sixty-year history of the Dallas Diocese," Gallagher said. "It represents a spontaneous expression of loyalty and devotion to a great

### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEMBERS HEAR ABOUT LOW-RENT HOUSING

Joe Nuesse, city attorney, discussed the low-rent housing project for Ranger, at the second monthly luncheon for members of the Chamber of Commerce held at noon Tuesday in the dining room of the Ghelson Coffee Shop.

Forty-four members, officers and directors attended the meeting and voted to continue the luncheons.

Nuesse explained the origin of the plan and its recent expansion through appropriations of Congress and then gave a detailed explanation of how the plan works. He said that the purpose of the project is to raise the housing standards for low income families and that the unit will be financed by a government preliminary loan and through government guaranteed bonds that will be sold after the project is under way.

### COURT ORDER TO PUT MINERS ON JOB EXPECTED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (UP)—Robert N. Denham, General Counsel for the National Labor Relations Board, was expected to announce today his plans to seek a Federal Court Order to put 400,000 soft coal miners back on a five-day workweek.

On direct orders from John L. Lewis, the miners have been working only three days a week since Dec. 5. Some 89,000 miners are now engaged in a wildcat strike despite Lewis' suggestion that they stay on the job.

### Two Killed, 3 Injured In Wreck

SWEETWATER, Tex. Jan. 18 (UP)—Two men were killed instantly and three others were critically injured today in a head-on automobile collision seven miles east of here.

The dead were identified tentatively as Herbert Peterson, 22, and Elmer R. Roberts, about 50, both of Merkel.

The critically injured were William B. Wade of Merkel, Eddie Harold Morgan of Sweetwater and Fort Worth, and George Brewer of Sweetwater. They were hospitalized here.

Cause of the collision had not been determined. It occurred on U. S. Highway 80, seven miles of Sweetwater at 7:30 A. M.

### Former Kansas Governor Dies

WICHITA, Kan., Jan. 18 (UP)—Funeral services for Henry J. Allen, former U. S. Senator and Kansas governor who might have been president, will be held here tomorrow.

Allen, 81, died yesterday following a short illness.

He was a newspaper publisher and editor before going into politics on the Teddy Roosevelt "Bull Moose" ticket in 1912. He lost two bids for congressional seats but was elected governor of Kansas in 1918.

### Testimony On In Sandra's Trial

BRADY, Tex. Jan. 18 (UP)—A jury of ranchers and farmers today began hearing testimony in the high-hike murder trial of 18-year-old Sandra Peterson of Somerville, Mass.

Sandra pleaded innocent yesterday to the charge that she thumbed a ride with Lewis Patterson, a Brady business man, and shot him to death last Aug. 25, dumping his body into a highway ditch.

Jury selection was completed yesterday at 6:45 P. M. District Attorney Baisden F. Hawn made clear that he intends to seek the death penalty for the attractive young woman.

All but one of the jurors were ranchers and farmers from small McCulloch County communities. The other was a Brady farmer.

Brunette Sandra appeared refreshed as she walked into the jammed court room yesterday morning. She was wearing a gray suit, a pink blouse and sandals.

She leaned forward to hear every question and answer during the early investigation of prospective jurors. Later she looked around the courtroom, stared at the ceiling and showed other signs of boredom.

When the final juror was selected and seated, Sandra told the District Court that she was pleading innocent.

### Teague Honors API President

TEAGUE, Tex. Jan. 18 (UP)—This is Bill Boyd day in Teague, and a day long program honored the retiring president of the American Petroleum Institute.

One of the highlights will be a \$5 per plate dinner tonight in the Teague High School gymnasium when Texas Senator, Tom Connally, speaks.

The Teague Citizens Council is sponsor of the day dedicated to William Rufus Boyd, Jr., better known to the homelands as "Bill"—who was with the API from its formation in 1920 until his voluntary retirement last November.

Boyd, a native of Fairfield, Tex., observed his 65th birthday last Jan. 7. During World War II, he was chairman of the Petroleum Industry War Council, the petroleum industry's national war service agency created by the petroleum administrator for war.

In recognition of his war service record, the council in Washington at which he was presented with an oil portrait of himself and a large silver platter on which was engraved the signatures of all the members and staff of the council. Also, in 1946, President Truman gave Boyd the Presidential Medal for Merit, the highest government award for a civilian.

### ALLOWABLE CUT MAY ALSO LEAD TO SOLUTION HERE

#### Hospital Board To Determine Financial Needs

AUSTIN, Tex. Jan. 18 (UP)—The board for Texas state hospitals and special schools may meet again "pretty quick" to decide exactly how much money will be required to improve the state's hospital system.

Although the board failed to reach a figure yesterday, it was estimated the special legislative session convening Jan. 31 must set aside at least \$50,000,000.

Gov. Allan Shivers previously had estimated a minimum of \$25,000,000 would be required to put the state's hospitals, especially mental institutions, in top shape.

Only three members of the nine-member board were present yesterday. Because a quorum was not present, they could not transact business.

Board Chairman Claud Gilmer said an effort would be made to reach an agreement with members by telephone. Otherwise, he said, "we'll have to have another meeting pretty quick," possibly next Monday.

Gilmer said, however, that the board definitely would ask for \$1,247,000 for hospital construction in the present fiscal year, which ends next Aug. 31.

### Four Injured In Accident Near Ranger Today

Mr. and Mrs. Cassa Winogrocki and their daughter about 12 of Phoenix Arizona and James Cagle of Little Rock, Arkansas were all treated at the Ranger General Hospital this morning for injuries sustained in an accident a few miles east of Ranger on Highway 80.

Winogrocki and the daughter were said to be not seriously injured but were treated for cuts. Mrs. Winogrocki was reported to have possible internal injuries in the chest and Cagle sustained cuts about the face and head, a fractured left arm and possible internal injuries.

Detail as to how the accident occurred were not known. Two Killingsworth ambulances answered the call to the scene of the wreck.

### NEW COURSE TO BE GIVEN IN RJC NIGHT CLASSES

A new course, designed to cover the requirements for the elementary teacher-training curriculum will be integrated at the evening classes of Ranger Junior College, it was announced today. The course will begin next Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock in the Recital Hall on the campus.

Required of students in the elementary teacher-training curriculum this course is especially adopted for students without previous musical training. Emphasis is laid on the learning of notation and theory of music, which are presented in much the same manner the student will later use in teaching. Participation in note and sight-singing, as well as simple melodic and rhythmic dictation. Much use will be made of the modern electric phonograph to correlate the approach to music both historically and from the appreciation point of view, Fred Baumgardner, head of the fine arts department of the college stated.

According to word received here this morning, four major oil companies have agreed to purchase 1,000 barrels of oil daily that heretofore has been purchased by Premier Oil Refining Company from this area. Humble, Gulf, Magnolia and Texas Companies indicated at the oil proposition hearing in Houston Tuesday that they will come to the rescue of producers in this area.

This plus the fact that the allowable for February in Texas has been cut for the third successive month encouraged producers to feel that the situation will be taken care of. The situation arose when Premier was forced to cut its purchase to 40 percent of the allowable, or a 60 percent of the allowable reduction.

At the meeting with the Railroad Commission in Houston Tuesday French M. Robertson of Abilene, president of the West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association, said that Premier's action would leave operators in Young, Stephens, Eastland, Shackelford, Erath, Palo Pinto and Comanche counties with 5,400 barrels of "distress" oil daily, unless the Commission cut the statewide allowable to create demand for the 7-B production.

Although spokesmen for some major companies would not comment, representatives of Humble, Gulf, Magnolia and Texas Companies each agreed to handle 1,000 barrels of the oil daily.

David Pickrell of Ranger, Premier's pipeline superintendent informed the oilmen that his company had an acute storage problem which was complicated by a glutted market.

"Our market situation is such that we have to dispose of 8,000 barrels of oil per day, or by the end of this month we will be without any storage space at all," Pickrell said.

The Commission's next allowable hearing will be held in San Antonio Feb. 17.

More than 400 oilmen attending the prorator hearing yesterday heard the Commission announce that February's allowable would be cut to 2,052,174 barrels daily—36,226 barrels below the January allowable.

Production in the vast East Texas field will be cut to 13 days for February. Other fields will be given 15 days. The cut lopped two days off the January limitation.

Many oilmen felt that the Commission's action might benefit producers in District 7-B, West Central Texas, where Premier Oil Refining Company cut its purchases to 40 percent of the allowable.

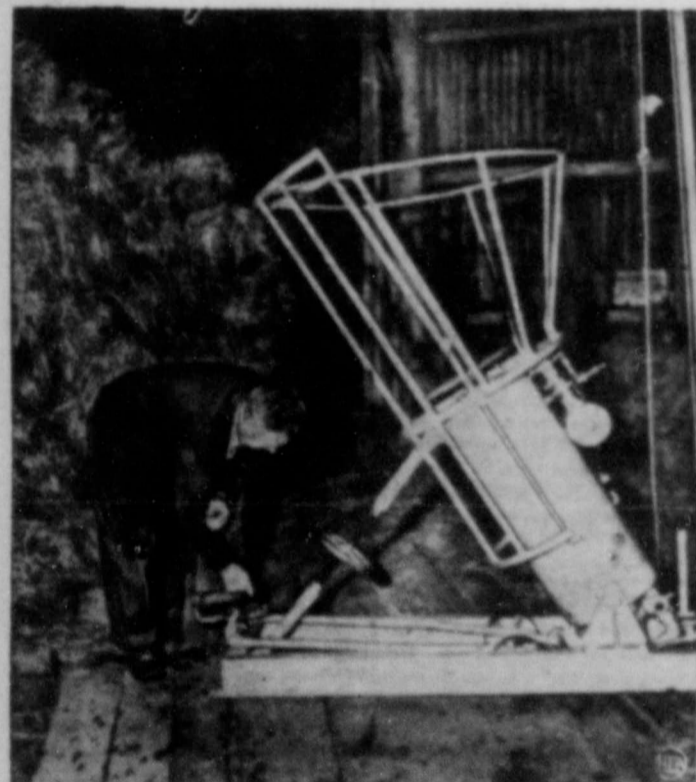

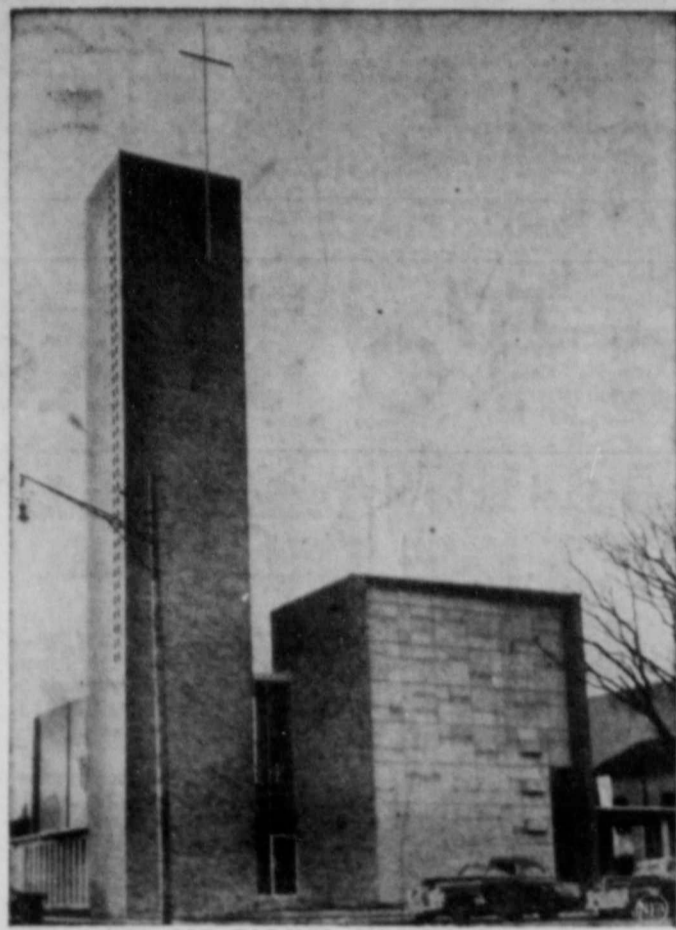

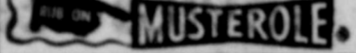

## WOULD LIFT VEIL ON WALLACE VISIT TO CHINA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (UP)—Senate Republicans today sought to lift what they considered a "veil of mystery" from Henry A. Wallace's 1944 visit to China.

Sen. Homer Ferguson, R., Mich., told newsmen he will press for publication of the anti-Nationalist report which, he said, the former vice president made to the Late President Roosevelt. He said the original is in the custody of the Army Historical Section.

He said he hasn't seen the report as yet but that he has studied a synopsis of it. Wallace's conclusions, he said, have closely paralleled U. S. decisions on China since 1944.

Ferguson referred to the "Wallace Plan For Asia" in a Senate speech yesterday. He said it sought to "discredit" the regime of Chiang Kai-Shek and foster close U. S. trade relations with the Red's "whom Wallace hopefully saw emerging as the postwar power in China."

Secretary of State Dean Acheson may be asked about that and other China developments at his news conference (11 A. M., EST) today. He also is scheduled to discuss the situation with the House Foreign
