## Men's Dormitory At Rice Blasted By Crude Bomb

When they grow okra stalks taller than one Paul Smith grew this year we want see 'em Smith brought in a stalk Friday and left it at the Tip-Top Feed and Hatchery that measured 15 feet and 10 inches. Right on top were three little pods of dried okra. Evidently some that Smith couldn't reach even with his gathering ladder.

Smith stated that he took a ten foot step ladder to gather the crop from the stalk, and that it was very prolific producer. In fact, his whole okra crop was a little unusual and here's a plug for the Tip Top, he got the seeds there. All of the stalks in the crop were from ten to 12 feet high and he can't figure it out, 'cause the seeds were supposed to be dwarf okra seeds. He did use commercial fertilizer on it but hardly thinks that accounts for the giants.

Now that reminds me of something that we've often thought of. Why don't the research men get to work to find some value for okra. It grows with the greatest of ease even in dry weather and is prolific in its production. If some real value besides the food value could be placed on it, it would sure be a fine money crop for farmers around here.

### New Oilfield Discovered In Sherman County

BARTLESVILLE, Okla., Jan. 21 (UP)—Texas had a new oil field today.

Phillips Petroleum Co. yesterday announced the discovery of the new field at its No. Wallico well on the west rim of the Anadarko Basin in Sherman County, Texas.

The new well in the Texas Panhandle pumped 225 barrels per day of 40 degree gravity oil through perforations in the Pennsylvania beds at 5844 to 5880 feet.

The company also announced another potential oil zone in the Pennsylvania beds immediately above the new producing zone.

### FLOOD THREATS IN TWO SECTIONS ARE GROWING

CHICAGO, Jan. 21. (UP)—Floods drove 10,000 persons from their homes in Tennessee and Arkansas today and rivers rose rapidly in the Pacific northwest as a heavy snow pack melted under steady rainfall.

The worst situation appeared to be on the Mississippi River where it passes between Northeastern Arkansas and Western Tennessee.

The St. Charles flooded 80 square miles near Wynne, Ark., and Capt. Felix Stacey of the Arkansas National Guard described the situation as "bad-awfully bad."

Rescue work was hampered because relief workers had to travel far into the Arkansas Hinterlands to evacuate the stricken. Some amphibious trucks made 30-mile round trips to reach families.

Meanwhile, the flood danger in Illinois, Indiana and Missouri was abating as the Ohio dumped its winter crest into the Mississippi. The Wabash River was falling at Vincennes, Ind., threatened seriously earlier in the week, and the Ohio was on a stand at old Shawneetown, Ill.

### Contractor Says Hall Absolutely Safe For Dance

Due to the fact that a rumor had been circulated that the dance floor at the Elks Club was unsafe for a large crowd, officials of the club and city officials had an inspection made of the building Friday.

W. M. Bourdeau, building contractor, after the examination stated that the building is as safe as it was the day it was built. He pointed out that a 24 inch solid beam runs the full length of the building with pilasters every 20 feet and 2 by 12 rafters every 12 inches.

Bourdeau further pointed out that the building was originally a four story building and that two stories have been removed. This in itself should lend strength to the building he said.

Officials pointed out today that three years ago when a benefit dance was given at the Elks Hall, there were over 400 couples there and there were no mishaps. They stated that the rumor that the building is unsafe is entirely without foundation and urged the public to disregard the rumor.

### Patman Hopes For More Cuts In Oil Imports

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (UP)—Rep. Wright Patman, D., Tex., hopes the American oil companies will follow the example of the Texas Company in reducing petroleum imports.

Patman said yesterday he has received a letter from W. S. S. Rodgers, chairman of the Texas Company Board, stating that the firm is making "substantial reductions" in petroleum imports for the first six months of 1950.

### NONE INJURED; WINDOWS, DOORS SMASHED BY POWERFUL TNT

HOUSTON, Tex., Jan. 21 (UP)—A crude bomb, packed with TNT, exploded in a Rice Institute dormitory early today, smashing windows and doors and showering sleeping students with glass.

The shuddering roar hit the north wing of the men's east hall dormitory at 3 A. M., and police said bomb fragments showed the contraption was powerful enough to have killed every man in the building had it been placed strategically.

There were no injuries, although the blast aroused the entire campus.

Clues were the ragged end of a piece of three-inch piping and pieces of brick. A cap was screwed on one end of the pipe, and the entire lethal gadget was wrapped in pieces of newspapers.

Police experts said the bomb was devised by packing a pound of TNT into a one-foot section of pipe, and covering the explosive with bits of brick and wads of paper. They believed it was set off with a fuse and a detonating cap.

The explosion tore a two-foot hole in the tile and plaster dormitory wall. Glass sprayed across the beds of several students. Four doors were blown from their hinges, and glass transoms were smashed.

George Strouhal, 19 year old student from Fort Arthur, Tex., was studying at the time of the explosion.

He heard the noise and then saw a thick cloud of white smoke billow through the hallways. Students raced to another building to call firemen, believing the building was on fire.

Police were baffled as to whether the incident was a student prank or an attempt at mass murder. The five-floor dormitory houses 125 students in its north wing alone.

Capt. Edward Mollering, superintendent of the Police Identification Bureau, took bomb fragments and bits of brick for analysis. He said it might be possible to trace the piping.

Patrolman G. L. Bankston, one of the first policemen to reach the scene, believed the time element saved students from death.

"There was at least a pound of TNT in the bomb. Had it been placed just right, it could have killed everybody in the vicinity. But whoever placed it was obviously in a hurry, anxious to get out of the building," he noted.

Dr. William V. Houston, Rice Institute president, viewed the explosion as a "student prank."

### Russia Denies Charges Made By Acheson

MOSCOW, Jan. 21 (UP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky today angrily denied Secretary of State Dean Acheson's charge that Russia was in the process of absorbing the northern areas of China.

Acheson made the charge in a speech at the Washington Press Club last week. Vishinsky said the charge was "so absurd and monstrous that we first doubted its genuineness."

"It is not difficult to see that in all Acheson's statements there is not one word of truth," Vishinsky said in a statement given to Foreign Correspondents by Yurdi Frantsev, Chief of the Press Department of the Foreign Ministry.

"He said all those absurdities in order to put a decent face to a bad game, to blame Soviet foreign policy and at the same time to place on the U.S.S.R. the fault for collapse of his own foreign policy."

"It is understood that such a doubtful operation couldn't go on without slandering the U.S.S.R."

Acheson charged that the Soviet Union was detaching the northern areas of China from China and attaching them to the Soviet Union. He said the process was complete in Outer Mongolia and nearly complete in Manchuria, Inner Mongolia and Sinkiang Province.

And during his 35 years of preaching, more than 1,000,000 persons ran—shouting, weeping, moaning—down the sawdust trail to be converted. Sunday, once a big league baseball player, preached the "old-time," hell-fire-and-brimstone religion. The devil, he'd shout, has horns, hoofs and a tail. Sunday spent much time on the platform shadow-boxing with Satan. His revivals had the atmosphere of a circus. His sawdust trail was real—a wide, sawdusted aisle through the audience to his platform. Money donations toward his "good works" ran into tremendous sums. He died, almost broke, in 1935 at the age of 72.

cepted when Judge Wesley Dice convened court this morning. He called the Saturday session in hopes of completing the jury selection, which has dragged on since Monday. One jurymen was seated yesterday out of 29 questioned during the day. He was C. M. Parkhill, Holland farmer. Smithwick, a former deputy sheriff at Alice, was accused of being connected with a notorious Alice night club in a Mason broadcast the day before the newsman was slain on an Alice street. The trial was moved here on a charge of venue.

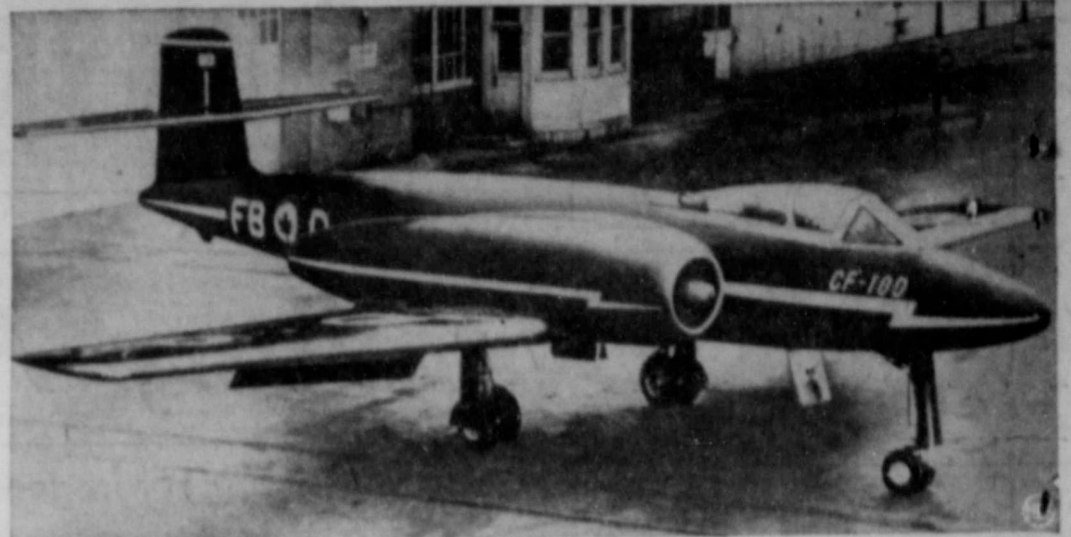

## TWO BRINK'S EMPLOYEES QUESTIONED IN ROBBERY

BOSTON, Jan. 21 (UP)—Two Brink's Inc. employees, one the man who rang a buzzer that sounded in the firm's vault during the \$1,500,000 robbery Tuesday night, underwent intensive questioning by police today.

The man who sounded the buzzer was William L. Manter, 49, of Waltham, who was taken into custody in his home city late last night and brought to Boston.

The other employee was Herman E. Pfaff, 54, of Cambridge, a messenger who was one of the five men bound and gagged by the bandits when they invaded the firm's combined office-garage building and fled with the greatest amount of cash loot in the nation's crime history.

Pfaff was picked up at his home early today and brought to headquarters. He was questioned in a room two doors away from an office where detectives had been questioning Manter for more than five hours.

Deputy Police Superintendent James F. Daley said "We're holding Manter until he comes out of the fog."  
Manter, a Brink's employee for 22 years, had been transferred from guard duty the night before the holdup to a job as attendant in the garage. During the robbery he rang a buzzer for admittance to the vault cage but left when he got no response.

Manter wore a blue pea-jacket when taken into custody. After a thorough search of his automobile, police removed a cap and a roll of tape. A detective said the tape was automobile tape, not adhesive tape, and that the cap was a Brink's cap.

The mask bandits who stalked the robbery wore pea jackets and chauffeur's caps. They stuck adhesive tape on the mouths of the five employees before they scooped \$1,000,000 in bills and \$500,000 in checks into sacks and fled.

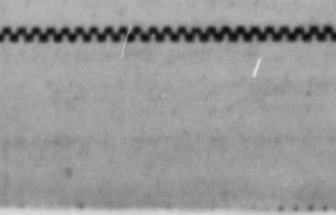

## RUSSIA HALTS TRUCKS; BLOCKADE THREAT LOOMS

BERLIN, Jan. 21 (UP)—Russia halted truck traffic from western Germany to Berlin today in a gesture threatening renewal of the Berlin blockade.

West Berlin police reported a truck convoy loaded with furniture and other household items was turned back at the Marienborn checkpoint on the Soviet Zone border 92 miles west of Berlin.

The gesture threatening reimposition of the Berlin blockade was taken as Russia's answer to western action in seizing the unoccupied German railway administration building in western Berlin.

Western police occupied the building early this week so that the Western Berlin city government could make use of its 600 empty offices abandoned by the Soviets after the bloody Berlin railway strike last summer.

The railway administration is operated by the Russians. They moved out of the western sector because they feared retaliation for the bloody manner in which they tried to put down the strike.

Police reported the Soviet action at Marienborn was one of the longest mass stoppages since the Berlin blockade was lifted last May 9 after nearly a year.

The Russians were forced to lift the blockade when it failed in its object of forcing the western powers out of Berlin and a counter-blockade imposed by the western powers began to kill the economy of the Soviet Zone.

Maj. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, American commandant of Berlin, warned only last Tuesday that the western powers "must always face the possibility" of a new Berlin blockade.

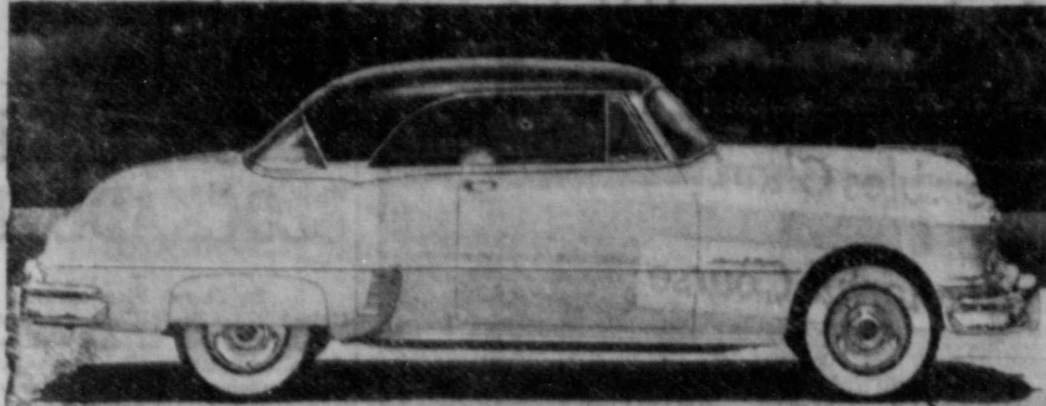

Rust and ivory hard finish fabric side panels with glittering chrome trim, ivory rear seat shell, chrome roof bows, full depth arm rests and rust-ivory instrument panel make the Super Deluxe interiors a designer's dream. Steering wheel and gear shift knob are in rust, while the steering column is in ivory.

Interior lighting arrangement of the Super Deluxe Catalina is noteworthy. Courtesy lights, flanking the instrument panel illuminate the door steps, floor and adjacent roadway when either door is opened. Rear quarter corner lights also operate with opened doors or may be switched controlled from the left rear arm rest.

More conventional but still in the Catalina concept of individualized transportation is the Deluxe Catalina which includes all special equipment items found on other Deluxe Pontiacs. Exterior colors may be selected from Pontiac Deluxe car color options. Interiors are trimmed in two tones of gray broadcloth. Front compartment has a moulded rubber rug with gray carpet inserts. A gray pile carpet covers the rear floor. Exposed roof rails are chrome plated as in the Super-Deluxe styling.

Both Catalinas, as well as all other Pontiac models, may be purchased with six or eight cylinder engines and with Hydra-Matic transmission (as optional equipment).

The 8 cyl. Super Deluxe Catalina advertised delivered price is \$63.00 less than the Pontiac Convertible Coupe. The Deluxe Catalina is priced \$121.00 less than the Convertible.
