And during his 35 years of preaching, more than 1,000,000 persons ran—shouting, weeping, moaning—down the sawdust trail to be converted. Sunday, once a big league baseball player, preached the "old-time," hell-fire-and-brimstone religion. The devil, he'd shout, has horns, hoofs and a tail. Sunday spent much time on the platform shadow-boxing with Satan. His revivals had the atmosphere of a circus. His sawdust trail was real—a wide, sawdusted aisle through the audience to his platform. 
