

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 1 (UP)-Gov. Allan Shivers today called upon the legislature to rally "courageously" and immediately levy additional taxes to erase the label of "worst in the nation" from Texes State Institutions.

Shivers, addressing a joint session of the lawmakers, urged that they "meet this problem courageously and solve it adequately and quickly."

"None of us," the governor told members of the House and Senate," likes special sessions, nor do we like to talk of treasury deficits and tax measures. But when the only alternative is to close our state hospitals and turn out the helpless insane, the needy seniles, the epileptics and the feeble-minded to fend for themselves-then no choice actually exists."

A few minutes before the governor began speaking, members of the Senate trooped across the capitol Rotunda to the House Chamber where the governor made his first address to the Legislature as Texas' Chief Executive. His speech followed the policy line of the Shivers' administration, backing a "board based" temporary tax and leaving the way open for enactment of a proposed one-
