TEXAS NEWS BRIEFS

HOUSTON, Tex., Feb. 7. (UP)—Earl R. Trone, prominent Fort Bend county rancher whose properties were situated near Guy, Tex., was to be buried here today. Trone, 61, died yesterday at the home of a daughter after a month's illness. He was a son of George W. Trone, nationally known judge and breeder of registered stock.

Houston, Tex., Feb. 7 (UP)—Chain letters backing three-election of U. S. Senator Robert A. Taft, R., Ohio, made their way to Texas today, asking recipients to mail a dollar for the Taft campaign fund.

The two-page letter stated that Labor Union members are now contributing one dollar each to defeat Taft, co-author of the Taft-Hartley labor law.

Houston, Tex., Feb. 7. (UP)—A new calf roping record for the Houston Fat Stock Show was set last night by Toots Mansfield, well known rodeo performer from Big Spring.

Mansfield tied his calf down in 13.1 seconds, bettering the 14.5 mark set last year by Jack Skipworth of Clovis, N. M.

CHECK FORGER QUERIED AS TO BRINKS THEFT

GOLDEN, Colo., Feb. 7 (UP)—A big-time check forger who possessed too many sub-machine guns was questioned today by FBI agents trying to learn if he had a hand in the Brinks robbery at Boston.

Russell P. Kramer, head of the Denver FBI office, said 23-year-old Andrew McCauley, Jr., freely admitted passing an estimated \$250,000 worth of bad checks in a dozen states. But Kramer said the youth "clammed" up when quizzed about armed robberies.

Officers suspected that he was more than just a hard-working forger when they found an arsenal of three sub-machine guns, several pistols and rifles, and stacks of ammunition in his mountain cabin.

It was the collection of firearms that first got McCauley in trouble. Jefferson County officers had arrested him Saturday night for a routine investigation when he grabbed one of the guns and made a break for freedom in a state patrol car with his professed fiancée, Jean Ellen Tivor, 28, of Houston.

DALLAS, Feb. 7 (UP)—The Dallas aquarium will lend one of its two electric eels to a Hermosa Beach, Calif., Marine life exhibit.

Pierre Fontaine, director of the Dallas aquarium, said the loan request came from Hermosa Beach after the California aquarium's attempt to secure a shipment of shocking eels from Brazil came to a bad end.

Hermosa Beach ordered eight, companions of two which arrived in Dallas last week. The eight froze to death enroute from Dallas to Sunny California.

DALLAS, Feb. 7 (UP)—The abandoned Dallas cotton mills property, in the city's business southside, has been purchased by Burton-Dixie Corporation of Chicago.

Burton-Dixie said it would invest \$300,000 in its Dallas project, for manufacture of bedding equipment.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (UP)—The National Labor Relations Board today ordered a collective bargaining election before March 6 at the Alamo refining co., Sweeney, Tex. The election, among Alamo's machinists, was requested by the International Association of Machinists Union, which claims to represent a majority of them.

Unemployment At Post-War Peak

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (UP)—Unemployment climbed to a post war peak of 4,480,000 in mid-January but government officials believe most of the layoffs were "seasonal."

The estimated jobless figure on Jan. 14 was 991,000 higher than on Dec. 10, when 3,489,000 were unemployed. It represented an increase of 1,816,000 over the 2,664,000 jobless on Jan. 8, 1949.

The census bureau said the total civilian labor force in mid-January was 61,427,000. Of these, 56,947,000 persons had jobs. On Dec. 10, 58,556,000 were at work out of a labor force of 62,045,000.

GOP SAYS SOCIALISTIC TRENDS MUST BE HALTED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (UP)—Republicans campaigned to recapture Congress today with charges that the Truman Administration has failed to stop Communism abroad and its domestic program is socialistic.

They promised that a GOP victory in November would put new meaning into bi-partisan conduct of foreign affairs and halt the homefront trend toward socialism.

The platform on which the Republican party is pitching its 1950 campaign was adopted by GOP National Committee as well as the House and Senate membership late yesterday after several hours of wrangling over some of its provisions.

But it got tri-partite ratification in time to win the approval of about 12,000 of the faithful who attended a \$1-a-box chicken supper at Uline Arena in honor of Lincoln Day. They heard speeches, listened to music and singing, and applauded vigorously everytime the new platform

was mentioned.

The three-way agreement breezed through the House Republican group and the National Committee, but it snarled up in the Senate. Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Mass., objected to several points, including what he called Republican Disinclination to take a firm stand on Civil Rights Legislation, even if it was necessary to break a southern filibuster.

As finally approved, the platform—or restatement of party principles, as Republicans prefer to call it—provided for:

1. A foreign policy which follows the spirit and letter of the Constitution, opposes secret commitments, offers full support to the United Nations, and a strong policy against the spread of Communism.
2. A strong national defense and promotion of world trade "on the basis of fair and reasonable competition."
3. A definite stand in favor of individual liberty against socialism. Basic American principles are threatened "by the admini-

stration's program for a planned economy modeled on the socialist governments of Europe, including price and wage control, rationing, socialized medicine, regional authorities, and the Brannan (farm) Plan with its controls, penalties, fines and jail sentences."

4. An end to deficit spending and a return to a balanced budget; adoption of the Hoover report for general government economies; a policy of general tax reduction, and a study of federal-state taxes to secure the sovereignty of the states.

5. Retention of the Taft-Hartley Act, with needed improvements.

6. A farm program which provides for fair prices and government supports without the "Nationalization" effect of the Brannan Plan.

7. Expansion of Social Security and other federal programs of aid for the aged and needy without government socialization.

8. A complete overhaul of the government's Loyalty Program to get all Communists, fellow travelers and party sympathizers off the payrolls.

9. Civil Rights Legislation guaranteeing equal opportunity for all to work, vote and enjoy all other protections of U. S. citizenship.
