LONDON, Feb. 10 (UP)—Dr. Klaus Fuchs, German-born British atomic physicist, admitted today in a signed confession that he sold Russia allied A-bomb secrets for seven years while he lived the life of a Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde.

British authorities revealed they had known of his treachery for at least four months and had played a game of cat-and-mouse to break him down.

COAL STRIKE CUTTING DEEP INTO INDUSTRY

CHICAGO, Feb. 10 (UP)—At least 3,000 more railroadmen and industrial workers were laid off today as their companies cancelled trains and shut down plants to save coal until the miners return to work.

At St. Louis, some schools expected to close unless coal deliveries were increased, and scheduled overtime and Saturday work was ordered halted at two General Motors Plants. Three railroads running east of St. Louis also announced curtailment of their regular runs.

Throughout the land today, 559,000 persons were idled by two big strikes. About 400,000 soft coal workers were off the job due to the United Mine Workers strike and the coal shortage laid off at least 40,000 more.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (UP) — Rep. Edward T. Miller, R., Md., spluttered angrily today over an Alaskan's charge that the Bald Eagle is unworthy "as a symbol of our great nation" and ought to be shot.

"I'm amazed that anyone would make such a statement," he said. "The unicorn and the lion have for centuries inspired British patriotism. The American Bald Eagle serves equally as well."

Decatur Downs RJC 69-63

LOCAL CAGERS STILL IN CHAMPIONSHIP RUNNING

In one of the most hair-raising basketball games ever played in Ranger the Decatur Baptist College team topped the champion bound Ranger Junior College from their lofty perch by a score of 69 to 63.

Had Ranger won the game which was played here last night they would have clinched the zone crown. Now the championship hinges on a game to be played between Decatur and Cisco Tuesday night. If Decatur defeats Cisco, Ranger becomes the zone winners but if Cisco defeats Decatur there may have to be a playoff between Cisco and Ranger, as the two would then be tied for first place.

The last 33 seconds of the game spelled Ranger's defeat. The game was tied 53 to 53 at the end of the game and a five minute playoff period was agreed upon. Ranger was leading Decatur by three points with only 33 seconds to play. Ranger slipped badly in these crucial seconds and Decatur turned on the steam to take the final lead of six points.

In the first 10 minutes of the game Ranger led 12 to 6. With four minutes left to play in the first half, Ranger still held the lead 20 to 11 but when the half time whistle blew Decatur was leading 24 to 23.

The second half was a wild scramble for the lead. First one team and then the other pulled ahead to lead by one point. With only one minute and 55 seconds to play the score stood 50 to 50. In the playoff period the two teams alternately held the lead until the last seconds when Ranger

held a three point lead. Ranger called time out and Coach Boone Yarborough instructed the cagers to "kill time" but a too tempting opportunity caused a try for goal and this upset the cart. A foul gave Decatur a try for extra point for which they made and from then, they didn't miss the basket.

Harper led the Ranger cagers in scoring with 17 points; Moseley scored eight points, Cook 14, Ash-ley 15 and Gordon nine. High scorers for Decatur were Kuykendall with 23 points; Gene Reynolds 16, Hugh Ham 13 and Billie Wheeler, eight.

Substitutes for Ranger were Wilson, Gordon and Whitis.

PLUG 'N TRIGGER

ISAAC Walton wasn't talking when he advised that "angling may be said to be so like mathematics that it can never be fully learned!"

Modern manufacturers have done for the fishermen what inventors of the slide rule have done for the mathematicians, but the angler still needs advice.

But the barefoot boy and his can have just as much fun fishing with a pole and a baited hook as the scientific outdoorsman can enjoy with the most complicated gadgets.

That is, he can get the same thrill from watching a cork bobble in a lazy pond that a deep sea artist can feel when he has a fightin' tarpon on his line.

But the barefoot boy and his pole are symbolic of the care-free, irresponsible phase of our three score and ten.

The oldsters, from 16 to 60, still like to use more science, because having proper equipment is half the pleasure and success of fishing.

If you are not already a veteran angler and don't know exactly what kind of equipment you need, consult the man behind the counter at any good fishing tackle store. In most cases, it will be safe to assume that you will be properly equipped. The man behind the counter in today's tackle store is not only a salesman, but a fisherman and an expert trained to assist you in every way possible.

From the angler's point of view, sport fishing came into its own in the days of the caesars when the inspired nobles, tired of the luxuries of court life, started angling for trout in their own private pools.

They fashioned their lines from human hair imported from Egypt and used hooks made of bone. Such outfits cost those noble anglers thousands of "Dollars."

Slain Radio Newscaster's Son Faces Charges

GALVESTON, Tex., Feb. 10 (UP)—Burt Mason, 23-year-old son of murdered Alice newscaster Bill Mason, today faced charges of burglary and felony theft.

Young Mason was arrested by two detectives who said they caught him climbing through a window from the "Gismo Bar."

Detectives George Polish and J. Kline said Mason shouted: "don't shoot! don't shoot!"

Chief of detectives John Fox said Mason, who has been working for a Galveston radio station, told him he had rifled a cash drawer and some slot machines, attempting to justify the theft with: "If other guys can do it, so can I."

Mason's father, a crusading Alice, Tex., news commentator, was shot to death last July 29. Former deputy sheriff, Sam Smith, was convicted of murder and given a life sentence in the slaying of the elder Mason.
