RJC, Cisco Begin Playoffs Tonite

WINNER OF 2 OUT OF THREE ZONE VICTOR

Coaches and officials of Ranger Junior College and Cisco Junior College met in Eastland shortly after noon Wednesday to decide the playoff schedule for the western zone championship in junior college basketball. A coin was flipped to determine the site of the first game and Ranger won. The game will be played in Ranger tonight beginning at 7:45 o'clock. Three games will be played if both Cisco and Ranger win one of the first two, otherwise the winner of the first two games will be declared champion of the zone. Ranger held the undisputed top rung of the ladder until the second game played with Decatur last week, when Decatur came from behind to win the game 63 to 69 in the last 33 seconds of play in a five minute playoff period. Ranger Monday night of last week had defeated Decatur 57 to 37. But minus the services of Crawley who had registered in a senior college for second semester and with Harper playing on a sprained ankle, the Ranger cagers had a tough fight in the second game with Decatur. They were leading three points

until that fatal last 33 seconds. Tuesday night Cisco defeated Decatur by a wide margin to tie Ranger for first honors in the zone and the right to games to decide the championship. Admission to the game will be 25 cents and 50 cents.

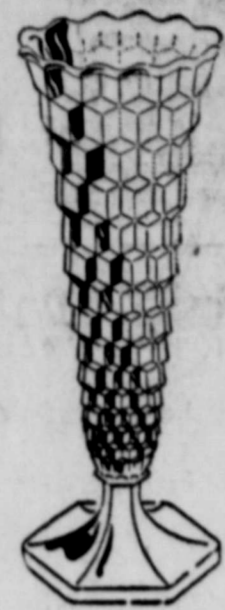
## Lindstrom Friend Amnesia Victim

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## SAYS HYDROGEN BOMB COULD DESTROY EARTH

OTTAWA, Feb. 16 (UP)—Explosion of the first hydrogen bomb might cause the world and all in it to disintegrate in less than a minute, Dr. Allan Munn, one of Canada's foremost physicists, said today.

The super-bomb, if big enough, could set off a chain reaction that would encircle the globe an annihilate it, Munn said in an interview.

Some American scientists do not believe a hydrogen bomb explosion would set off an uncontrolled chain reaction, turning the earth into a ball of fire.

Munn was one of the group which started Canada's atomic energy project at Montreal in 1943. He is now associate professor of physics at Carleton College here.

He said he could not see no possible peaceful applications

of the power represented by the H-bomb. It is "just a frightening monster," he said.

Given the right conditions, Munn said explosion of an H-bomb could "turn us all into little suns, probably in less than 30-seconds after the blast."

"It would be a very painless death," he said. "It would be all over so quickly we wouldn't know what hit us. Our world would then be just another star in space."

Munn's reference to "little suns" arose from the fact that the reactions necessary to produce an H-bomb explosion are somewhat similar to those which occur inside the sun. Explosion of the first H-bomb will have the same result as though a piece of the searing sun had struck the earth.

Munn was asked what the "little suns" could do about science's new and dreadful discovery and its implications in the weapons race between east and west.

"The average man in Canada, Britain and the United States must force his leaders and elected representatives to make a deal with Russia," he said. "None of us want another Munich, I'm sure, but we've got to reach some agreement with Russia or we're just in

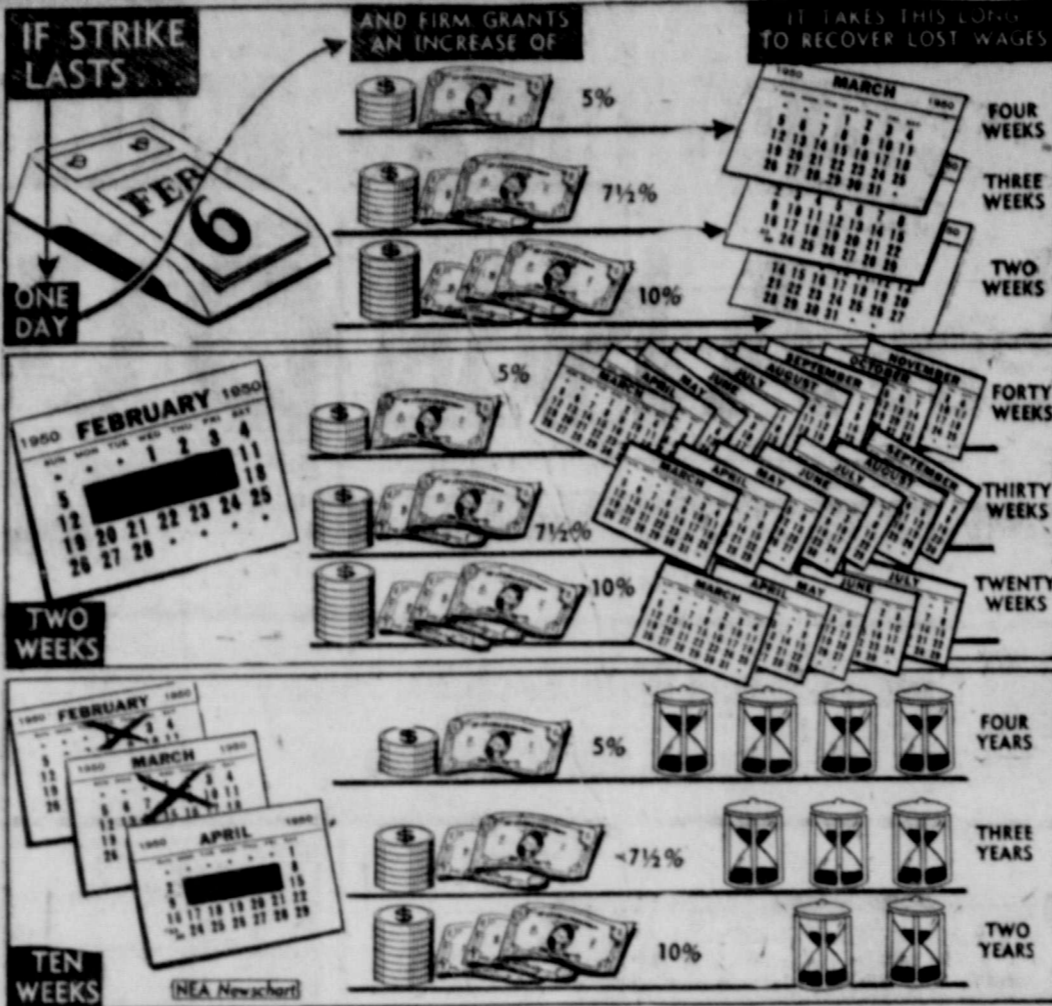
a rat-race towards final and complete destruction."

## Bidault Orders Crack Down On Communists

PARIS, Feb. 16 (UP) Premier George Bidault's government ordered senior officials through-out the nation today to suppress mercilessly and Communist attempts to paralyze the country.

The orders were in the form of circulars warning that the government has reason to believe the Communists will try to demoralize the nation's life through strikes and sabotage.

The Communist program will be directed especially against ports and railroads scheduled to handle American arms shipment under the Atlantic Pact.

The orders were approved at an emergency cabinet meeting held last night to consider the mounting wave of Communist-inspired strikes which have swept France back into the front line of the East-West cold war.

The cabinet, meeting until the early morning hours today, approved of the U. S. troops and Republican Security Guards to

meet the Communist threat.

Cabinet ministers told their subordinates throughout the country that no timidity in dealing with the Communists would be tolerated.

A government spokesman said the instructions dealt especially with measures for the protection of military material.

Competent observers said these developments indicated a new Communist drive against France.

1. A new rush of walkouts, designed to cripple vital French industries temporarily.

2. Communist orders to French dock and railroad workers to block arrival of U. S. military aid shipments to France and to prevent loading of arms for French forces in Indo-China.

3. A recent purge of local and regional Communist party bosses in France, followed by general tightening of the whole Communist party machine.

4. Soviet recognition of the Viet Nam Rebel Regime of Moscow-trained Ho Chi-Minh.
