Judge Clears Mine Workers Of Contempt Charges

PREDICT MORE TAXES FOR TEXANS NEXT YEAR

AUSTIN, March 2 (UP)—Taxpayers in Texas may have to dig even deeper into their pockets next year, state Legislators warned today.

The flat 10 per cent increase in the state's omnibus tax and the new one-cent additional tax on cigars passed by the special session which ended yesterday will not solve all financial worries, they said.

Several lawmakers interviewed by the United Press following adjournment of the special session imparted the sad news that the 52nd session convening next January may not be able to "hold" the tax paying line.

Most of them agreed that everything depends on strengthening oil production—the super-structure of Texas economy.

They pointed out that the omnibus tax increase, due to expire Aug. 31, 1951, can be extended, if necessary. The increase will yield an estimated \$22,000,000 over the 17-month period for operating the state's hospital system. An even greater increase may be needed, some of the legislators feared.

Rep. Ray Kirkpatrick of Trenton, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, was "extremely doubtful" that the 10 per cent increase in the omnibus tax would be permitted to expire.

"It's a lot easier to levy taxes than to repeal them," he said, declaring that the state faces an immediate need "for a revision of the entire financial and tax structure."

Sen. A. M. Alkin, Jr., of Paris, a veteran senate leader, thought it would take "good research" on reducing government expenses without "impairing efficiency" to hold the line.

Former House speaker W. O. Reed of Dallas said he didn't think the omnibus increase was purely "temporary."

"I don't believe anyone who advocated it, or helped pass it, believed it was truly temporary," Reed said. "No one was being

Sen. Walter Tynan of San Antonio predicted "taxes and economy" would make news in the next session, along with a probable search for new sources of revenue.

Sen. John Bell of Cuero shared Cousins' belief that the omnibus increase would be hiked "unless considerable paring is done."

Sen. Searcy Bracewell of Houston thought there would be a "substantial deficit."

"It looks like we'll have to have additional taxes," he said.

Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton remarked that the state's financial structure needed "complete overhauling."

ATTLEE, CABINET PLAN TO JUNK NATIONALIZATION

United Press Staff Correspondent LONDON, March 2, (UP)—Prime Minister Clement Attlee, and his cabinet have decided to call a full stop to Nationalization and to repeal the steel Nationalization bill, reliable sources said today.

These sources said Attlee's dilemma now is how to repeal the steel Nationalization bill, which has been voted into law scheduled to take effect next Jan. 1.

It would be too embarrassing for the government, to sponsor a repeal act, which was one of the key planks in the conservative party's campaign platform, these sources said.

A left wing faction headed by Health Minister Aneurin Bevan demanded full speed ahead on Nationalization despite the labor party's virtually powerless position in commons.

The revolt was beaten down by Attlee and deputy Prime Minister Herbert Morrison, but it is expected to grow as time goes on.

Conservative leader Winston Churchill meanwhile was understood to have advised conservative leaders to follow a policy of "patient toleration" and "watchful moderation."

Texas Due To Be Damp Two Days

Wet weather seemed to be in store for most of Texas the next two days, the U. S. Weather Bureau said today.

The Bureau said that rain could be expected in all but the extreme east portion of the state by tonight or tomorrow.

A variety of precipitation was reported in scattered Texas points at mid-morning today. At Waco, rain fell, mixed with intermittent light sleet. Abilene reported a similar mixture. Clarendon had light snow, while Brownsville and Galveston both had light rain during the morning.

The sleet and snow melted as it hit the ground. Dalhart and Amarillo had reported snow flurries earlier.

During the past 24 hours 56-inch of rain fell at Brownsville, 1.11 at Amarillo, .16 at Victoria, and .12 at Laredo.

Yesterday afternoon, temperatures ranged from 84 at Brownsville down to 44 at Amarillo. Overnight low was 27 at Dalhart, with the high 62 at Brownsville.

Temperatures in the Panhandle will drop below freezing again tonight, the bureau said, but elsewhere slightly warmer weather can be expected.

Bandits Snatch \$100,000 Worth Of Diamonds

NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 2 (UP)—Two armed bandits broke into his taxi and snatched a brief case containing \$100,000 worth of unset diamonds, Jacob Davis of Pittsburgh, Pa., reported to police today.

Davis, a jewelry salesman for Barrett Davis, Inc., said the men obviously knew what they were after and wasted no time in getting it.

One shot was fired during a brief scuffle when Davis grabbed a pistol flourished by one of the men.

Acting Police Lieut. M. D. Lavender said Davis was going in the taxi to the airport to catch a plane when a car, later reported stolen, forced the cab to the curb and two white men jumped out.

"They grabbed at the brief case, and he grabbed at the gun and it went off," Lavender said. "It didn't hit anybody. They ran back to their car right away, with the diamonds, and drove off before Davis could chase them."

"The car was recovered a few minutes later, parked just a few blocks away. It had apparently been stolen for the occasion, since the owner, Curtis Jones, Jr., didn't know it was gone until he came out of a movie."

NOT GUILTY OF CIVIL NOR CRIMINAL CONTEMPT

WASHINGTON, March 2 (UP)—Federal Judge Richmond B. Keach today cleared the United Mine Workers of Civil and Criminal contempt charges despite their refusal to comply with a decree to end their strike.

Henry Ford II said today that "this country will be shut down in two weeks" if the coal strike continues.

American Airlines, hit by a coast-to-coast walkout of some 4,600 maintenance men and mechanics, trimmed its operations by two-thirds as the TWU set up picket lines in 34 cities. The airline said it would keep the rest of its planes flying despite a claim by the TWU that the AFL pilots Association and the CIO Airline Communication employees Association would respect picket lines. The TWU said the airline would be grounded completely by tonight.

The number of workers idled by the coal strike, including 372,000 striking members of John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers, soared above the 560,000 mark as the walkout went into its 25th day.

Officials of the Independent Progressive Mine Workers, a small rival of the UMW, ordered the union's 10,000 members back to work in Illinois but more than 4,200 of the membership voted to ignore the order. They rebelled against an agreement to return to work under a contract extension until March 31.

Ford announced that operations at his plants would be put on a day-to-day basis after tomorrow.

"If John L. Lewis wants to put his own prestige above the welfare of the country, we're licked," Ford said. "You can't make a man work if he doesn't want to."

Lewis was returning to the negotiation sessions at Washington today, and federal mediators hoped his return would end the stalemate.

Federal Judge Richmond B. Keach announced that he had considered the government's petition and the evidence in the case and found the union "not guilty" of both civil and criminal contempt charges brought against it.

Keach's ruling apparently upheld the union's claim that the union's offices had done their best to comply with his no-strike order issued Feb. 11.

Union attorneys contended that 270,000 miners have remained away from their jobs "individually" by their own independent action.

Assistant Attorney General H. Graham Morrison said the government "undoubtedly" will appeal the criminal charge.

But an appeal would take time, and time is running out in the coal crisis.

Keach's action cleared the way for President Truman to take drastic action to get the miners back to work. Barring an early contract settlement—which seems unlikely—Mr. Truman is expected to ask Congress for power to seize the mines.

Many miners have said they would resume digging under a "bona fide" government seizure—with the miners working for the government and the profits going into the federal treasury instead of to the mine owners.

Up to now, Mr. Truman has said he could take no further action while the case was in the courts. But Keach's action removed that obstacle.

Only this morning, Mr. Truman told his news conference that the coal crisis now is a very serious national emergency.

A new cold wave today increased hardships resulting from the coal shortage. Additional cities across the nation cut down on consumption of electricity and closed schools.

Authorities asked the Federal Bureau of Investigation to help halt violence at Southern Mines after nitroglycerin blasts shattered mining equipment near Jasper, Ala.

In other labor developments: The coke and gas workers union filed a strike notice on behalf of 312 workers against the Interlake Iron Corp., of Duluth, Minn., manufacturers of gas, coke and pig iron.

The CIO's new international union of electrical workers won an 8-to-1 victory over the left wing independent united electrical workers union in bargaining elections at five General Motors Corp. plants.

The National Labor Relations Board said the CIO union received 21,167 votes compared to 2,926 for the UEX in an election Tuesday.

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RAID ON CROWS WITH BOMBS KILLS THOUSANDS

HONEY GROVE, Tex., March 2 (UP)—State Game Wardens estimated today they killed 25,000 to 30,000 crows last night when they exploded 213 bombs simultaneously in a 15-acre roost.

The strung 218 bombs in trees throughout the roost on the Turner Farm, five miles southwest of Honey Grove. All but five of the deadly, home-made dynamite bombs detonated.

There was a thunderous noise that rocked the countryside for miles around, and a dense cloud of black smoke billowed up into the clear moonlight night.

State Game Warden Murrell Hopkins, who supervised the bombing, pronounced it a huge success.

"We've found crows down a mile away," he said. "I guess they were crippled that flew out and then fell."

Hopkins said the crow roost on the Turner Farm was one of the biggest in the country.

The bombs were constructed at the Lake Texoma headquarters of the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission. They were tubular affairs, 11 inches long and 3 inches in diameter, loaded with a stick of dynamite and 6 pounds of jagged steel scraps.

Hopkins and his game warden helpers—Joe Brewer of Hunt County, Rep. Burke of Paris and Oma Puckett of Annona—worked all day yesterday to rig the bombs, about halfway up in trees taken over by the crow horde.

Hopkins advanced to within 100 yards of the nearest bomb to touch off the battery charge that exploded them simultaneously at 8:30 P. M. He took cover in a shallow ravine, while dozens of other spectators, farther away, crouched behind trees and rocks and other natural shelters.

A piece of jagged metal struck Hopkins' right shoe, despite his safety precautions. It did not penetrate his shoe, and he was not injured.






He drifts from bench to bench in the "skid-row" hangout, sometimes taking notes, sometimes making sketches, sometimes just listening.

ALL TEN CREWMEN OF PBM BOMBER RESCUED

SAN JUAN, P. R. March 2 (UP)—The U. S. Navy announced today the rescue, in good condition, of all 10 aboard a PBM two-motored patrol bomber which went down in the Atlantic.

The destroyer Palou picked up the crew of the Navy patrol craft some 500 miles north of the eastern tip of the Dominican Republic.

The plane was engaged in war games called operation Fortrex. It was searching for a mythical "enemy" task force, when its two motors failed, one after the other, forcing it down.

It was piloted by Lt. W. H. Westray, St. Louis, Mo. The downed bomber first was sighted from a Pan American DC-4 piloted by Capt. John Steers of Amityville, N. Y., at about 3 A. M. Steers said he circled the disabled craft for an hour and 40 minutes.

The crewmen apparently were a couple of the derelicts in person, because Trenk has talked two of 'em into joining the cast.





The Wharton team piled up 53 points to Ranger's 30 but J. W. Harper of Ranger was high point man in the game with 13 points to his credit.

Amarillo eliminated Del Mar College of Corpus Christi by a score of 46 to 44. Gerald Rogers of Amarillo scored 19 points and John Buckie of Del Mar scored 15.

Others playing in the tournament which is scheduled to end Friday night are Tyler, Schreiner, Lon Morris and Laredo, Paris, Tarleton, Howard County, Allen Academy, Navarro County, and Kilgore, Lamar and Blinn.

A novel "penalty box foul rule" is being tested at the tournament and Marty Karow A&M coach and tournament director, has stated that he will give the national rules makers a full report on the experiment.

Under the "penalty box" rule, players charged with their fifth or subsequent fouls will not be ejected, which would be mandatory under standard regulations.

Instead, the player committing the fifth or more fouls in the first half will be replaced by a substitute for at least three minutes. If excessive fouling occurs in the 15 minutes of the second half, the guilty player will be benched at least two minutes. He will have to "sweat it out" from the bench at least 60 seconds if he overflows in the final five minutes.

Tyler Junior College and Lon Morris led the way into the second round of the Texas Junior College basketball tournament.

Tyler survived the opening-round the hard way—nipping the hustling Schreiner Mountaineers, 50 to 46, after two overtime periods.

Lon Morris had a comparatively easy time in defeating Laredo, 67 to 45.

Other first round winners were Kilgore, trounced Lamar of Beaumont, 42-25; Tarleton State, over Howard County, 54-47; Paris, 57-49 over Blinn; and Allen Academy, conqueror of Navarro County JC, 46-36.

Schreiner took and early lead in its thriller with Tyler, remaining in front during the 39 minutes of the regular 40-minute period. The hook shots of Oneal Weaver in the last two minutes saved Tyler from defeat and his goal in the second overtime period.

BOSTON, March 2 (UP)—A tall Texas woman walked out of a Boston hospital today, listed as cured of rheumatic fever and possibly fatal heart disease by a new method of surgery performed successfully for the first time in medical history.

The patient was Miss Reba Williams, 37, of Lubbock, Tex., who came here Jan. 23 with abnormally high blood pressure caused by rheumatic scars on the heart. The scars made the organ pump three times faster than normal to get required amounts of blood into the arteries.

The operation was performed by Dr. Dwight E. Harken, assistant clinical professor of surgery at Harvard Medical School and visiting chest surgeon at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital.

"This is the first time that an essentially normally functioning valve has been obtained through surgery," Dr. Norbert Wilhelm, director of the hospital, said. "We have been waiting for something like this for years."

Dr. Harken said the operation "is a way of correcting one of the killing aspects of heart disease."

He said when Miss Williams came to the hospital the rheumatic scars had decreased the opening through which the blood flows, making her heart work 'overtime' to provide her system with blood.

"This is a form of disease in which the valve obstructs the flow of blood rather than allowing it normal forward progress," Dr. Harken said. "When the blood becomes dammed up it causes diseases to the lung which often are fatal."

He explained that the operation is not performed with a surgeon's knife but with a "finder" with which the scar tissue in a valve

between the two left sections of the heart is scraped away.

This lets the blood flow in from one side and prevents it from flowing back into the heart section from which it came.

Often, Dr. Harken said, when this valve is blocked the blood backs up into the lungs causing shortness of breath and sometimes suffocation.

He said the operation on Miss Williams was a "startling success" and that he had worked on the technique for several years.

Dr. Harken said the operation is made possible by a process called cardiac catheterization, by which the flow and pressure of the blood through the body's vessels is accurately checked.

He said this gives him an idea of the extent and location of the obstruction before he operates.

Three weeks after the operation, he said, Miss Williams' heart was "working essentially as a normal valve." He said there would be no restriction on her activities. She had been in bed almost continually for five years with rheumatic fever.

The Meadows were to face felony theft charges in 33rd District Court this week, and Craig was due to go to trial today on a forgery charge.

Seaton, James Meadows' brother-in-law, was imprisoned for burglary, while Parker was being held on a misdemeanor.



Store Sales Up For January

DALLAS, Tex., March 2 (UP)—Department store sales in six Southwest cities—five of them in Texas—were up an average of five per cent in January compared with the same month in 1949.

The figures were released today by the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. Fort Worth led the district with an 11 per cent gain, followed by Corpus Christi with seven per cent, Dallas six per cent and San Antonio two per cent.

Houston showed a four per cent decline and Shreveport, La., a two per cent drop.

January's sales compared with December, 1949, were down 55 per cent for the district, the Federal Reserve Bank reported. The decline was seasonal, following the Christmas buying spree.

The largest decrease—62 per cent—was at Shreveport followed by declines of 57 per cent at Corpus Christi, 56 at Houston, 55 at Dallas and Fort Worth and 49 per cent at San Antonio.

Fort Worth To Get New Buildings

Fort Worth, Texas, March 2—A building boom is on in Fort Worth which shortly will add two office buildings to the city's skyline.

The Continental National Bank has announced plans for construction of a multi-million dollar, 25-floor office building in downtown Fort Worth on the northwest corner of 7th and Houston. 



Attorney Bitter Over Ruling Of Nevada Judge

DALLAS, Tex., March 2 (UP)—A Nevada judge's ruling that Gambler Benny Binion, wanted in Dallas on a policy racket indictment, is not a fugitive from Texas as justice "marks a breakdown in the nation's judicial system," District Attorney Will Wilson charged today.

District Judge Frank McNamee yesterday ordered Binion released, as Texas authorities begged for his extradition. In instructing Sheriff Glen Jones to release Binion, who had

posted \$1,000 bond, McNamee said there was "a distinction between commission of a crime and extradition proceedings." Binion recently was indicted by a Dallas County Grand Jury on charges of operating a multi-million-dollar policy gambling racket in Dallas on or about Dec. 28, 1949. McNamee's ruling upheld the right of Texas to arrest and try Binion if he returned but said he could not be extradited "because he was not present in Texas at the time the crime was committed."

Texas authorities must prove, the judge said, that Binion committed a crime in Texas as defined by Nevada law. Wilson, who had sent Assistant District Attorney Louis Wootley
