Questionable **Tenderloins** Seized, Frozen

DALLAS, Tex., March 8 (UP) More than four tons of horsemeat shipped into three Texas "Canadian beef tenderoins" went into a legal deep freeze today.

Federal authorities began an nvestigation when they learned that the Kansas City packing house which sold a Dallas broker some of the horsemeat was not un der federal inspection. It is illegal to ship meat which has not received federal inspection into another

Texas State Health authoritie joined the inquiry because the state legislature passed a law last year levying jail sentences and fines on persons selling horsemeat as beef for human consumption The Texas legislature par the "anti-horsemeat" act Houston children had been vietimized in 1948 by unscriupulous wholesalers who peddled horse-

meat to school cafeterias. The horsemeat impounded yester day was destined for counters in the more prosperous residential sections of Dallas, Fort Worth

Invoices showed that the horse meat, intended to be passed off as filet mignon at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per pound, wholesaled at 97 cents. Horsemeat, labled as such, retails t only 15 cents per pound. Dr. J. W. Bass, Dallas City

Health officer, announced that 5,-689 pounds of horsemeat had been onfiscated at one wholesale ported it suspected the meat came from dobbin instead of bossy.





ALERT IN THE WEST-The Western Air Defense Command as possible" a tightly knit dual system of air raid warning and aircraft sp ng along the entire Pacific coi area. A call has gone out for 50,000 volunteers to man spotting and warning stations within the command, indicated by white area on map. Of these, 25,000 will be needed for California alone. Spotting stations will be eight miles apart along the length of the coast. Spotters will feed their reports to seven "filter" stations, (four shown) these coordinate reports and pass them on to the Air Force. Key raid warning centers will be manned "24 hours a day, seven days a week indefinitely." After organization is completed, personnel trained and practice exercises held, the aircraft spotting system will go on "standby" basis. 



HOW THE NAVY'S "BREAKAWAY" COCKPIT WORKS—These sketches show the working of a new "breakaway" cockpit unit, designed by the Navy's Bureau of Aeronautics to allow pilots of high-altitude super-sonic planes to escape in emergencies by means of a parachute-borne "pod." The pressurized pod (1) is ejected from the plane's main body; a small, "drogue" parachute is released (2), the drogue chute operates mechanism which releases the main chute (3), which then billows out (4) to drop the pod gently to earth or water (5). In water landing, the pilot releases his chute and drops a battery into water for stabilization.
