







# PRESIDENT ARRIVES AT KEY WEST FOR VACATION

KEY WEST, Fla., March 16 (UP)—President Truman, with a head start on his sun tan, arrived here today aboard the U. S. S. Williamsburg for a three weeks vacation.

The yacht pulled alongside the north quay wall of the Naval Station at 6:58 A. M. Mr. Truman was on deck, smiling and waving at the townspeople there to greet him, but was not expected to go ashore until about 8:30 A. M. He

was wearing a gray suit and hat and a green shirt.

The President and his staff bore no visible signs of the seasickness that jolted the party in extremely rough water during the first two days at sea. All of them showed pink traces of long hours in the sun yesterday as the Williamsburg cruised down the coast of south Florida.

The President received full naval honors on his arrival from ships in the Key West harbor, the complement of the Naval Station and the U. S. S. William C. Lawe.

the destroyer which accompanied the Williamsburg on its trip down the coast. Ranking naval officers and Key West city officials made up the dockside welcoming party.

High on Mr. Truman's schedule today was a bulging mail pouch flown from Washington late yesterday. He also planned to get his first swim of the trip during the forenoon.

Among the papers requiring the President's early attention is a bill to repeal federal taxes on Oleomargarine. Congress completed action on it last week but it was not ready for Mr. Truman's signature by the time he left Sunday morning on the vacation cruise.

The President's last night at sea was highlighted by a twilight view of Miami and Miami Beach skylines. Members of the party came on deck to watch the brilliantly lighted scene slip by.

During the afternoon the yacht was hailed frequently by fishing craft off Palm Beach, Stuart and Ft. Lauderdale.

Mr. Truman broke out a dazzling white shirt and cap to match for a lounge on the sun-baked fantail. Other member of his staff, less conservative, wore an assortment of tropical shirts of brilliant hues.

## Leopold's Return To Throne Rumored

BRUSSELS, Belgium, March 16 (UP)—A usually well informed source said today that King Leopold III has decided to end his five year exile and return to the Belgian throne.

Leopold was said to have decided to reclaim the throne on the basis of the 57 per cent majority he won in the Belgian plebiscite last Sunday. He had announced before the plebiscite that he would return if at least 55 per cent of the voters supported him.

Leopold went into exile in Switzerland after the war because of the controversy in his homeland over his surrender of the Belgian army to the Germans, his wartime visits with Adolf Hitler and his marriage to a commoner.

The trouble is that the supply of ACTH is limited. It can be derived only from the pituitary glands in the heads of slaughtered hogs. The supply must come from meat processing plants.  
Dr. C. H. Li, a University of California biochemist who first isolated ACTH, said he has developed an extract, known as ACTH peptide. It is more active and 20 times as powerful as ACTH, used to relieve arthritis, gout and similar ailments.

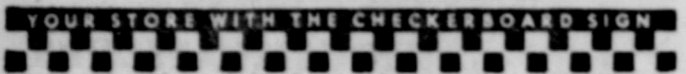

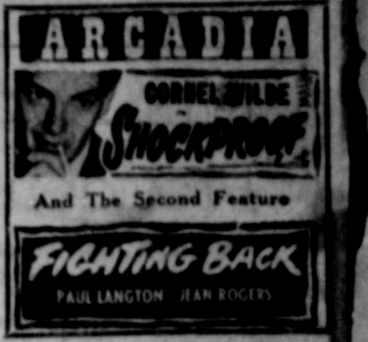
