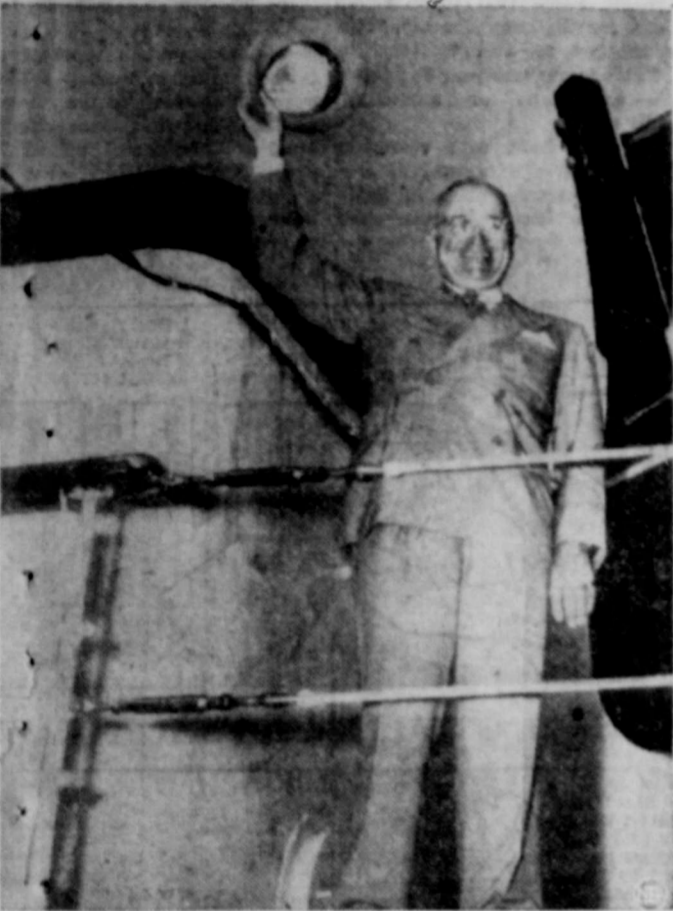

FDR'S PRIVATE, POLITICAL PAPERS OPENED TO PUBLIC

HYDE PARK, N. Y., March 17 (UP)—The bulk of Franklin D. Roosevelt's personal and political papers were made public today, revealing new sides to his colorful personality.

The 5,000,000 pages of papers cover all of Roosevelt's life from an announcement message written by his father a few minutes after his birth to what are believed to be the last words he wrote—"let us go forward with strong and active faith."

It was revealed that like many another person he attempted from time to time to keep a diary, but never was able to stick to it.

He also was a frustrated novelist, having started an historical novel about a business tycoon. But he only finished two pages.

One paper showed that two days before Pearl Harbor Mr. Roosevelt invited the late Wendell Wilkie to go to Australia and New Zealand as his personal representative but told him the Japanese situation was "definitely serious" and "perhaps the next four or five days will decide" whether "armed clash" might develop.

In a letter written in the spring of 1928, Mr. Roosevelt described Herbert Hoover, then candidate for the Republican Presidential nomination, as "an old, personal friend of mine."

About 15 per cent of the presidential papers were withheld because they deal with persons still living and to protect state secrets.

However, Herbert Kahn, the director of the Franklin D. Roosevelt library, emphasized that in no case was a document restricted to protect the memory of the late President.

There is no necessity to protect Roosevelt, Kahn said. "He is dead. There is nothing that could be said about him now that could damage him materially or hurt his feelings or affect his political career—and certainly nothing worse than has been printed."

Kahn, one of four men who spent more than a year cataloguing the papers to make them available to qualified researchers, said he did not believe any of them would cause "any revolutionary upheaval" in modern historical writing or affect the fundamentals of the known Roosevelt story in "any important way."

Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, widow of the 32nd President, was among the speakers at opening ceremonies of the small stone library building a few hundred yards from the Roosevelt Hyde Park home. Today is the 45th anniversary of their marriage.

Mr. Roosevelt was the first American president to leave his presidential and personal papers to the nation. Never before have a President's private files been opened for publication so soon after his death. Even the papers of John and John Quincy Adams are available today only with the permission of their descendants.

"In a world where millions are living under the horrors of Communist torture and terror," President Truman said in a message read at the ceremony by Jess Larson, head of the General Services Administration, "this action we are taking is a simple indication of the faith of Democracy in truth."

Jones Draws Life In Lake Slaying

SHERMAN, Tex., March 17 (UP)—William Morris Jones, 26, was under life sentence today for the slaying of Lake Texhoma resort operator R. H. McLean.

A district court jury found the young farm laborer guilty of murder with malice yesterday after slightly more than an hour of deliberation.

Jones' attorneys had sought to acquit the defendant on the ground of insanity after a family doctor testified the youth was "feeble-minded."

The state argued that Jones killed McLean three weeks ago with rifle fire from a crude barricade on a gride near McLean's resort because he believed McLean had caused his arrest in connection with several burglaries along the lake front.

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EXHIBITS OVERFLOW SHOW BARN INTO RODEO ARENA

Exhibits at the Tri-County Livestock Show which opened in Ranger this morning, had overflowed the show barn before noon and emergency stalls were being set up in the rodeo arena to accommodate the overflow.

Those in charge of the show stated that so far as entries go this is by far the largest show in the history of the project. The overflow of exhibits may slow the program slightly but sifting of animals was due to start at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

One entire side of the show barn was lined with Jersey dairy cattle long before noon today and beef cattle were still coming in. There is an unusually large exhibit of sheep, including all of the leading breeds.

The poultry division was also drawing its share of exhibits as is the swine division.

Only the poultry was scheduled to be judged today with all other divisions due to be judged at various times Saturday. Judging Saturday will continue through to 4 o'clock after which time the exhibitors will be permitted to remove the animals from the show grounds.

In the fore were the junior exhibits being shown by FFA boys and 4-H Club boys from Eastland, Stephens and Palo Pinto counties. These are the exhibits in which the prize awards will be made and ribbons will be awarded winners in the adult exhibits.

B. S. Dudley Jr., vocational agriculture teacher at Ranger High School, is general chairman of the show which is sponsored by the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The Jaycees will honor the exhibitors at a barbecue to be given Saturday at noon at the show grounds. This is an annual feature of the show and the Jaycees today urged that all Ranger business men make their plans to attend the barbecue. Plates for all except the exhibitors will be \$1 each. This is one of the means that the Jaycees have of financing the barbecue and they have urged the support of the business people of the town.

Jaycees today expressed their pleasure over the attendance at the show on its opening day and predict that there will be an overflow crowd at the show Saturday.

Ranger Brothers To Be Queried In Big Spring Case

PORT WORTH, Tex., March 17 (UP)—Two Ranger brothers were being returned to Big Spring by officers today, after their arrests here ended a 30-hour chase across 300 miles of West Texas.

The two, suspected of several recent West Texas safe burglaries, were picked up last night by Fort Worth officers who found nitroglycerin and burglar tools with them.

Police Chief Pete Green and Sheriff Bob Wolfe of Big Spring trailed the men here in connection with a \$2,250 safe burglary a week ago at a Big Spring feed store.

The elder brother, 31, was arrested at a Weatherford highway cafe. Two three-ounce bottles of nitroglycerin were found in his coat pocket.

The younger brother, 24, was picked up in his automobile at a Fort Worth intersection. Detectives said a set of burglar tools were in the car.

Mason Child Hurt In Fall Reported To Be Improved

Word was received this morning that Marcia Ann Mason, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Mason was slightly improved after suffering head injuries in a fall from the family car at Breckenridge Wednesday.

The child is in the Breckenridge hospital and was reported today to be conscious and some improved.

According to reports of the accident, Mrs. Mason and the child were driving into Breckenridge from Mrs. Mason's mother's home on the outskirts of the town when the back door of the car came open and the child fell out.

Mrs. Mason and Marcia Ann have been visiting the mother since Mason was transferred from Ranger to Burburnett by the Gulf Oil Company. The Masons still retain their home here at 201 Summit Avenue.

Mrs. O. G. Lanier and Mrs. Lawrence Purefoy visited the injured child Thursday and stated that her injuries were not as serious as first thought.

Shamrock Irish Celebrating St. Patrick's Day

SHAMROCK, Tex., March 17 (UP)—There was only green to be seen here today as a migration of the Irish swelled the size of this small Panhandle town four fold for its first "all-out" St. Patrick's Day celebration since the war.

Sure and the mayor, himself, is only two generations removed from Ireland, where his grandparents lived most of their lives.

But no one thought it necessary to declare the day a legal holiday here. Mayor Jack Montgomery said as far as the Irish are concerned, that's taken for granted—and only constitute some 3,500 of the town's 5,500 population.

The town is covered with green decorations. And to make it authentic, some 250 Shamrocks arrived by plane yesterday from Shannon, Ireland.

They are expecting about 20,000 outsiders for the celebration that will last all day and, as the mayor said, "probably all night."

"We'd like to have all the Irishmen in Texas here," Montgomery said. "And if they aren't Irishmen when they get here, we'll make Irishmen out of them."

The celebration will include 40 floats and 20 to 25 bands in a parade through the town, and three dances tonight. A mass band concert will be held on the football field this afternoon.

Shamrock started its first celebration for the Irishmen in this country back in 1936. Before World War II, Mayor Montgomery said, as many as 30,000 outsiders came for the affair. The war stopped the annual festivity, but this year, the Irish are at it again.

Products of a score of manufacturers in the city of Keene, N. H., amount to \$14,000,000 annually. They range from woolen goods to golf tees.

TEXAS MILITARY POSTS TO GET IMPROVEMENTS

WASHINGTON, March 17 (UP)—The House Armed Services committee has given tentative approval to a \$665,000,000 (M) military construction program labeled "most urgent" by the department of defense.

Of the total, \$25,995,137 was earmarked for Texas projects. Included in the building plans are more than \$150,000,000 in family housing, many millions in construction at projects too secret to discuss in open committee session, and general expansion and modernization projects at military bases here and abroad.

A big chunk of the funds would be spent in Alaska. Large sums are earmarked also for such far Pacific bases as Guam. More than four million dollars would be spent in Saudi Arabia, and \$325,000 would be expended at Wheeler Field, Libya.

After reaching agreement on a half dozen controversial projects, the committee hoped to put a final okay on the measure promptly—possibly today.

Hood Air Force Base, Temple, Tex., family quarters, control tower, crash station, fuel storage, utilities, \$2,309,467.
Kelly Air Force Base, San Antonio, Tex., addition to sewage disposal plant, \$255,170.

OIL ALLOWABLE DECISION HELD UP UNTIL MONDAY

PORT WORTH, Tex., March 17 (UP)—The Texas Railroad Commission will not announce its decision on the state oil allowable for April until it holds another conference at Austin Monday.

The commission yesterday heard a suggestion to return the state allowable to the February formula during a statewide pronation hearing yesterday. The March formula gave the East Texas field as many producing days as others in the state. To revert to the February formula would take away its new status of equality.

Herman Pressler, Houston attorney for Humble, countered with a plea for keeping the East Texas field on the same number of producing days as others.

Speaking of selective buying, Pressler said Humble Oil would be compelled to seek foreign imports to fill demand for low cold test oil if it could not get it from Texas fields.

Some observers entertained the possibility that an increase of 125,000 barrels daily would be announced in the April allowable. This could be done by keeping the present 17-day production pattern for April's 30 days as in March's 31.

University of Houston officials protested the cut in allowable for the Thompson field in Commission District 3.

Dr. W. W. Kemmerer, assistant to the university president, was "shocked to hear" that Thompson field's allowable had been hacked 64 per cent in comparison with a five-per-cent trimming in others.

The University of Houston owns a share in the field through gifts of the Cullen Estate.

University business manager C. F. McElhiney reported the school had issued \$5,600,000 in dormitory bonds, with interest to come from oil royalties. However, the present allowable does not permit repayment of pledged interest, McElhiney said, and tuition must be increased unless a compromise can be reached.

A large delegation from the Van field protested a 74 per cent cut in its allowable over a 14 month period.

Missing Concert Pianist Sought

WINDOW ROCK, Ariz., March 17 (UP)—Authorities searched the vast Navajo-Hopi Indian reservation here today for concert pianist Zenobia Van Zandt, one-time accompanist for Lily Pons, John Charles Thomas and Enrico Caruso.

The 70-year-old musician was more than two days overdue for a concert at the Ganado Indian Mission.

Mission superintendent C. G. Salisbury said Dr. Van Zandt was touring Western New Mexico and had left Gallup, N. M., for Ganado. He did not know how Van Zandt was traveling.

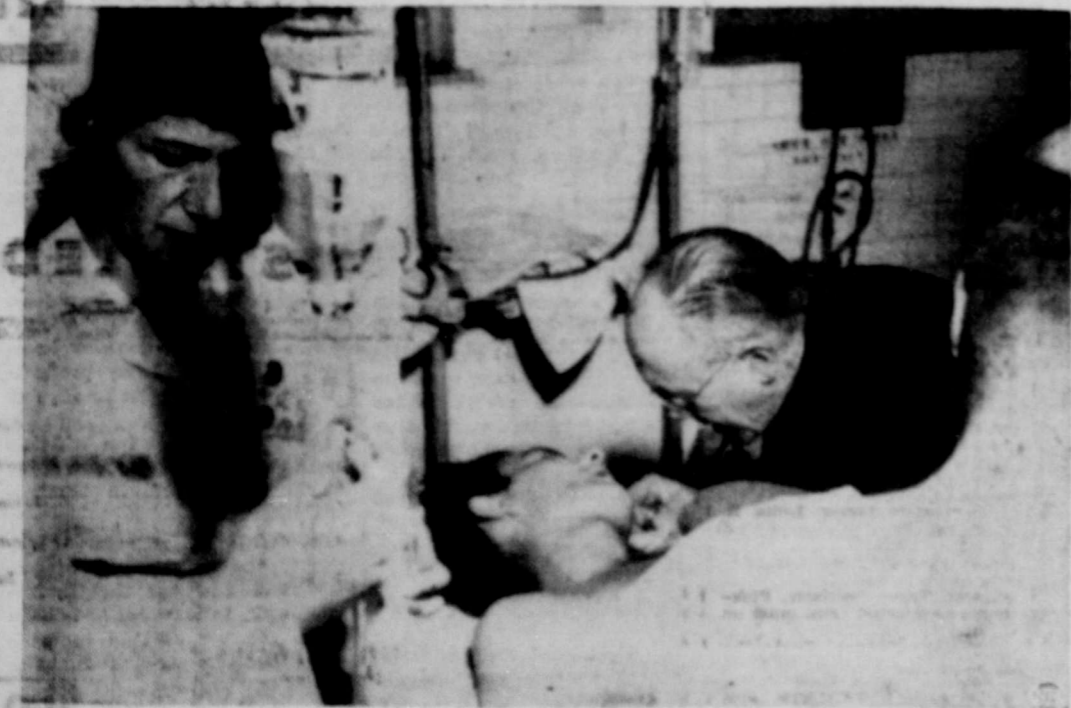

PLUG 'N TRIGGER

The timid duck hunter of the 20th century is an "Angel," when compared with English nimrods of a few hundred years ago.

Whereas the modern sportsman depends on lifelike decoys, a steady aim and a steady heart, hunters across the pond relied on an owl as an accessory.

The abject cruelty of the old-time English hunter is described vividly by one Joseph Strutt, a sports writer of the year 1801. In a book entitled "Sports and Pastime of the People of England," Strutt gives the following account of duck-hunting methods.

"Sometimes the duck is tormented in a different manner, without the assistance of dogs, by having an owl tied upon her back, and so put into the water where she frequently dives in order to escape from the burden....On her return for air, the miserable owl, half drowned, shakes itself, and, hoisting, frightens the duck."

"She, of course, dives again, and replunges the owl into the water. The frequent repetition of this action soon deprives the poor bird of its sensation, and generally ends in its death, if not that or the duck itself."

Hunting, as well as fishing, always has been an informal pastime in this great land of ours, except in some sections where Reynard the fox is hunted with ritualistic glamor and formality.

In ancient times, and particularly in England, where probably the sport of hunting was first

glamorized and pursued with formality, fanfare, set rules and regulations, you had to have a title or know someone who did in order to have fun.

Species of game belonged exclusively to the crown, large areas were set aside for the hunting pleasures of the King and select companions.

Ownership of hunting dogs in areas bordering these restricted hunting areas for the king was forbidden unless the dogs were so crippled that they could not chase game.

The would-be hunter who trespassed without authority in those days were condemned to death. Robin Hood was outlawed because he killed a deer.

The fanfare and glamor growing out of hunting introduced new words into the English language.

The modern hunter speaks of a "covey" or "bevy" of quail, a "brood" of grouse, "flocks" of ducks and a "wedge" of geese.

In the days when hunting was a royal privilege, other words were used.

Strutt mentioned some of them in his book.

"It was necessary for every lover of the chase that he be acquainted with when beastes went in companies, a pride of lions, a lepe of leopards, a herd of harts, a bevy of roes, a route of wolves, a skulk of foxes, a cete of badgers, a richness of martins, a feynnes of ferrets."

The biologist will study fish population, physical and chemical factors, food supply and requirements. He will be able to determine when and at what depth fish are running.

In short, there'll be an official expert on Lake Travis who can tell you when and where they're biting, how deep to fish and what bait to use.

Extradition Of Sheriff's Slayer To Be Sought

PRESIDIO, Tex., March 17 (UP)—County attorney Norman Davis today started extradition proceedings against Jose Villalobos, confessed slayer of Presidio County Sheriff O. W. (Binkie) Morrow.

Morrow's body was found in his automobile on a lonely road near Presidio last Sunday. He had been shot through the heart with his own pistol, probably late Saturday night.

Davis filed murder with malice aforethought charges at Marfa Presidio county seat, after attempting to interview and fingerprint Villalobos, 26, in his jail cell at Ojinaga, Mexico.

Villalobos, a frail youth with curly black hair, was arrested at the home of his parents at Cuchillas Tarral, near Ojinaga, Wednesday night.

Davis crossed the border to interview Villalobos because he wanted to check his fingerprints against those found on the slain sheriff's automobile.

Mexican police informed Davis he could not take the prisoner's prints, however, and Villalobos refused to answer questions.

Mexican authorities told U. S. immigration officers yesterday that Villalobos confessed fighting with Morrow and shooting the 43 year old sheriff with his own pistol after taking it away from him.

Villalobos gave them conflicting accounts about the gun, Mexican police said.

At the time of his arrest he

Lloyd H. Sidener, 44, charged that Lewis ducked a contempt of court citation by publicly ordering the miners back to work, but used a secret signal to keep them out of the pits.

Sidener, who said he was deposed as president of local 7455 because he tried to lead a back-to-work movement last month, has filed an unfair labor practice charge against the Union.

He charged that the Union assessed a \$50,000 fine against him, got him fired from the Buckheart coal mine, and threatened to assess him \$25 a day—more than a day's wage—for every day he works in any mine under contract with the UMW.

Sidener said the secret signal was "the whistle blew one."

He said it was passed down through the Union's "chain of command" by telephone after Lewis had sent a telegram to district

PLUG 'N TRIGGER

The sand bass is putting in a strong bid for the title of "most cast-takerous" fish in Lake Texoma.

Almost as soon as fishing was opened at the huge, sprawling lake, phenomenal catches of sand bass were reported. Until this year, that particular species of fish did more than its share in maintaining lake Texoma's reputation as one of the hottest fishing spots on the North American continent.

Suddenly, without even the flick of a fin for an explanation, the sand bass thumbed their noses at Texoma's vast army of anglers.

Fished out? No, they were there. In fact, you could see them, acres upon acres of sand bass feeding on the surface and striking at everything in sight but the angler's plu.

In dismay and bewilderment, anglers tried to find a reasonable explanation for the strange behavior. But while some wondered and kept on fishing, others gave up in disgust and took a fling at the lowly carp.

Conditions then suddenly reversed once more, and Sand Bass began striking the plug with all the vigor and flash of the post.

No one seems to know the answer but most everybody agrees that Texoma's reputation for fishing "out of the ordinary" has been saved by the change of heart by the sand bass.

Trolling with midget violent action lures, light in color, seems to be most effective, according to reports. Late evening and the period well after dark are the pay off periods.

Excellent reports of sand bass catches have been coming in of Lake Texoma the past few weeks. Black bass are definitely on the move. Catches are being reported made early in the morning and late evening.

The period of inactivity on the part of game fish at least served to turn some anglers to the lowly carp, and at last the carp began to command some well-earned respect from the angler as a fighting demon when hooked.

We personally hate carp, but fish for them when game fishing is off. We have to admit we can't help but admire their ability to pull when hooked.

A few tips for carp fishing: The higher the lake, the better the take. Carp are far more active in rising water. Use small hooks, preferably a No. 12 or No. 14.

Recently, after his sixteenth birthday, the boy who lives on a ranch wrote: "Yes, it's me again and I am still waiting for my twenty-first birthday to be a Texas Game and Fish Warden." He indicated some of the folks were breaking the outdoor code and wanted to know what he could do to help while getting field training in advance. Then, he added: "Please write and send me

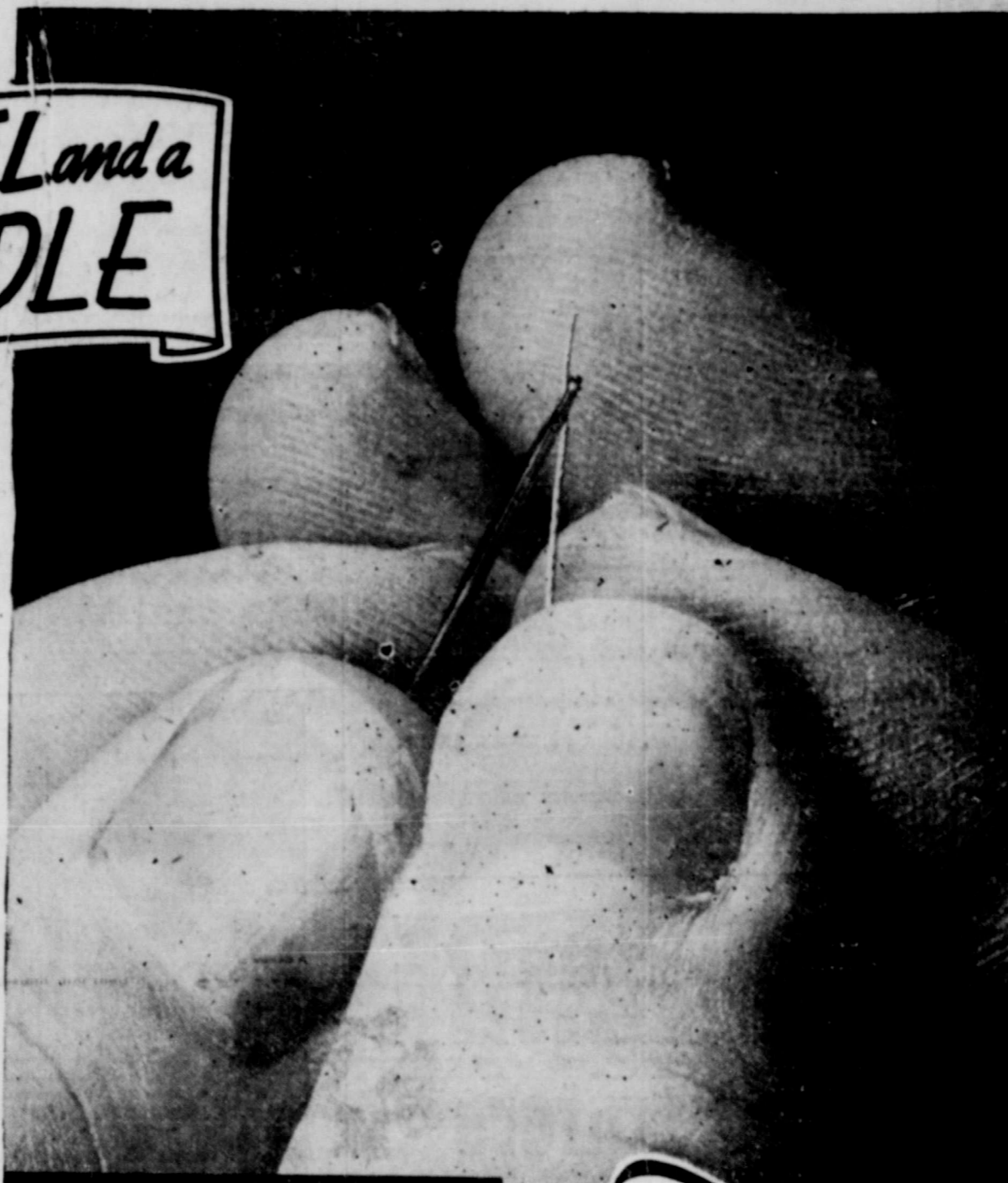

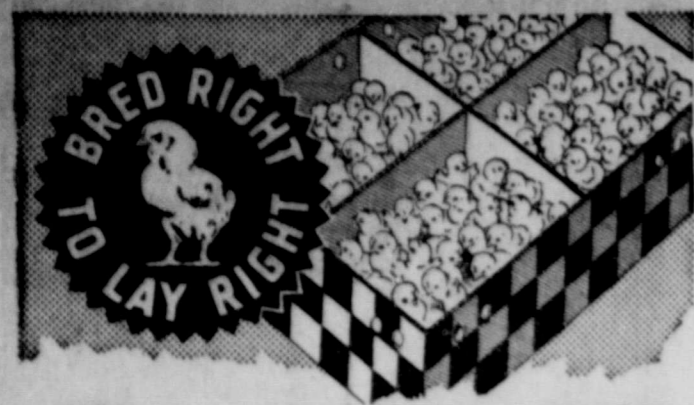

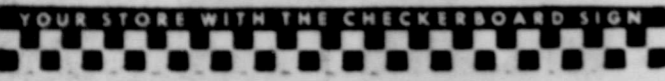

AUSTIN, March 17 (UP)—Influenza cases in Texas during the week ended March 11 jumped almost 400 over the previous week, the state health department reported.

There were 11,124 cases last week, said the department, compared to 10,738 cases the previous week.

Incidence was highest in the rural counties. Ector county reported 785 cases; Gaines, 408; Grayson, 474; Midland, 653 and Raines, 440.

Figures released by the U. S. Public Health Service at Washington showed Texas led all states in incidence of 'flu. There were 27,045 cases nationwide last week.

ODESSA, March 17 (UP)—Bronco rider Herbert Frizzell, 35, was free today of all charges in the deaths of two men at the Big Spring rodeo arena last Aug. 4.

District Attorney Martelle McDonald yesterday ordered the dropping of a charge that Frizzell murdered 23-year-old Carl Myers, a Hardin-Simmons University student.

Myers was struck down by a stray bullet at the time that rodeo judge Henry P. (Buck) Jones was slain. A jury found Frizzell innocent Wednesday of slaying Jones. He pleaded self-defense.

MERCEDES, March 17 (UP)—The lower Rio Grande Valley Farm Bureau demanded a four-cent a pound duty on Mexican tomatoes today because lower labor costs "made them too competitive on the U. S. market."

A telegram advocating the tariff was sent to Rep. Lloyd M. Bentzen, Jr., at Washington. It urged the tariff be imposed from the beginning of the Texas tomato season, usually around April 1, until July 14.

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 17, (UP)—Irate parents from suburban Bethany go to court today in an effort to oust school officials for refusing to let students kiss their basketball queen.

The parents say the school officials were overly strict in their enforcement of city blue laws.

A hearing on their suit to remove the school officials opened before district judge Baker H. Melone.

Their resentment against rigid enforcement of regulations at Bethany flared up when about 30 students went on strike last month because they feared severe reaction to the kiss young Liddell Riggs gave pretty Charlotte McClain in crowning her basketball queen.

Both students are 16. Six leaders of the strike were expelled but the school board agreed to readmit them after the students appeared before them with their parents.

The protesting group strengthened their petition yesterday with an amendment charging that Bethany Loyal Temperance Legion is "taking advantage" of high school students by circulating pledges which read:

"Fathers and mothers who smoke, drink and gamble are evil, sinful men and women."

Bethany once was a stronghold of the Nazarene religious faith, which disapproves of kissing in public, drinking and smoking. During recent years, however, many protestants of non-Nazarene beliefs have moved into the suburb.

The new petition, filed in district court shortly before closing time yesterday, said the temperance legion is active in Bethany's grade school.

It renewed the original request for dismissal of Bethany's school poliomyelitis clinic.

Gas Well Still Unharnessed

TYLER, Tex., March 17 (UP) A wild gas well raged out of control for the fourth straight day today as weary troubleshooters tried new strategy to throttle it.

They ordered a new cap yesterday and said they would try to bleed some of the gas through two side valves and, simultaneously, force heavy steel tubing into the center valve.

By pumping heavy drilling mud through the center valve, the crew believed it could choke the runaway gasser.

The well, owned by independent oilman Bobby Manziel, is located two miles south of the Tyler city limits. It spewed out of control early Tuesday morning after drillers fired an explosive charge to start the flow.

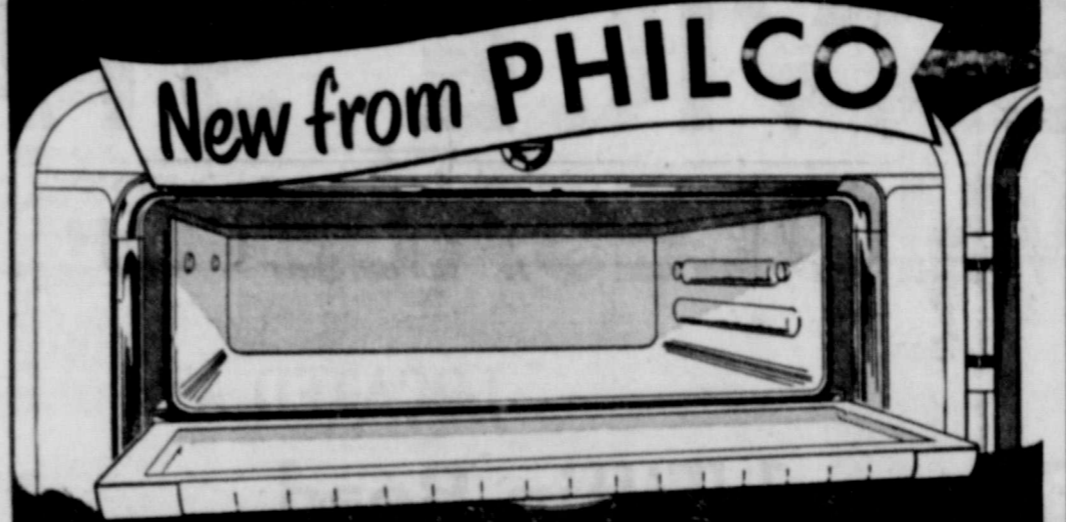

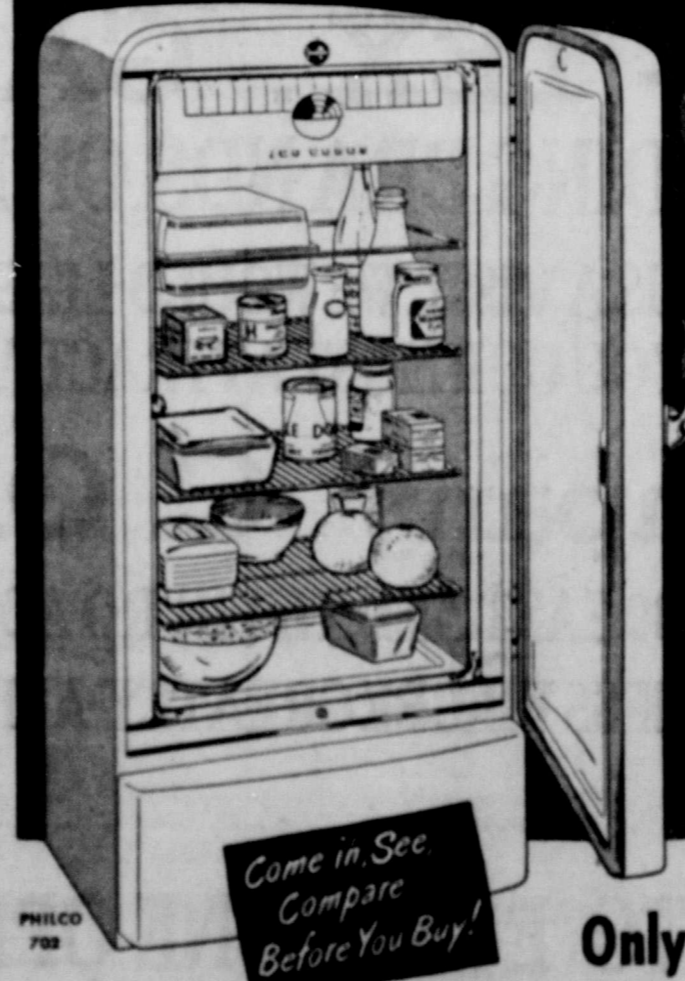
