Secretary Of State To Be C. Of C. Banquet Speaker

Investigation . Started On Two Plane Collision

FORT WORTH, Tex, March 20 (UP)-A specially named board today began an investigation into an aerial collision that killed three Texas National Guard officers early Sunday, including District Clerk Lewis D. Wall, Jr., 32, of Fort Worth.

The two liaison planes collided in flight near Newark at an altitude of about 500 feet. They efashed to the ground about 50 yards apart on pasture land four miles south of the Nation! Guard Base at Eagle Mountain Lake and two miles northeast of Newark. Wall and the other two men killed were officers in the National Guard's 49th armored division army air section. The others were tenant, and an inspector at Convair in Fort Worth; and Charles R. McMinn, 26, first lieutenant, and law student at Souther Methodist University.

The planes were on a routine training flight and had been in the air only about 30 minutes before colliding at 9:42 a. m. in a ip, and Bowden in the other. All were from Fort Worth.







Preston Smith, Lubbock Lawmaker Announces For Lieutenant Governor

Preston Smith, 38-year-old Lub-bock business man, entered the po-litical arena this week by announc-ing his candidacy for Lieutenant

Smith is a three-term veteran of the Texas House of Representa-tives. He was first elected in 1944 to represent District 119.

During his service in the House Smith has been for four years a member of the appropriations com-mittee. He has also served as chairman of the sub-committee higher education. He is a firm be liever in the application of sound business methods in the operation of the state government.

Born on a Williamson County farm, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Smith, he stayed with farm life until 1931. He is the seventh child in a family of 18 and has siz brothers and six sisters.


