## Truman Feels Sting Of McCarthy's Lash

### ACCUSES PRESIDENT OF ARROGANCE IN REFUSING ACCESS TO FILES

WASHINGTON, March 23 (UP)—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R. Wis., today accused President Truman of an "arrogant refusal" to grant congress full access to government loyalty files.

He said in a telegram to the chief executive at his Key West, Fla., vacation headquarters that such action was "excusable and is endangering the security of this nation."

Mr. Truman has not said whether or not he will bow to Republican demands that the files be made available to a Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee investigating McCarthy's charge that communists have infiltrated the state department.

He alone can decide whether his long-standing directive against revealing loyalty files, FBI records and other confidential government data should be waived in the current inquiry.

McCarthy advised Mr. Truman that he was "exceedingly disturbed" by newspaper reports quoting a White House spokesman as saying "some portions of the files might be made available to clear innocent people."

McCarthy has said that the senate foreign relations subcommittee can prove — or disprove — his charge that communists have infiltrated into the state department only if it examines all pertinent loyalty files.

Mr. Truman has never commented officially on demands for full disclosure of the files involved in the current inquiry. He must give the go-ahead to make all or part of them available.

James Ratliff was named vice-president and J. D. Nichols was chosen secretary. H. P. Earnest and John Winder were elected new directors.

### Census Data To Indicate Future School Needs

When the Census taker calls at American homes in April he will ask several questions the answers to which have a direct bearing on measuring the future school needs of every community in the country, it is pointed out by Donald F. Ulver, Census district supervisor here.

These inquiries will relate to:

1. Number of children of pre-school age, classified by age.
2. Number of school children, classified by age and by grade of school completed.
3. Number of college students, classified by age and by years of college completed.

Upon completion of tabulations of this information by the United States Bureau of the Census, Federal, State and local school authorities will have the facts on which to base plans for meeting the expanding school needs in practically all parts of the country Mr. Ulver stated.

Every community in the nation is vitally concerned with the school problem and in accurate statistical information on the subject. Amounts paid in school aid programs are frequently based on this information. The United States Congress, State Legislatures and Federal, State, county and school district authorities have a common need for this information.

Reliable statistics can be obtained by the census takers only through the full cooperation of all who are interviewed during the nation's 17th Decennial Census. It behooves every household to give this cooperation to the census enumerator for reasons of self interest, aside from the fact that the census is a part of the American Democratic system to determine proportional representation in Congress and in State legislatures and proportional distribution of public benefits such as educational facilities.

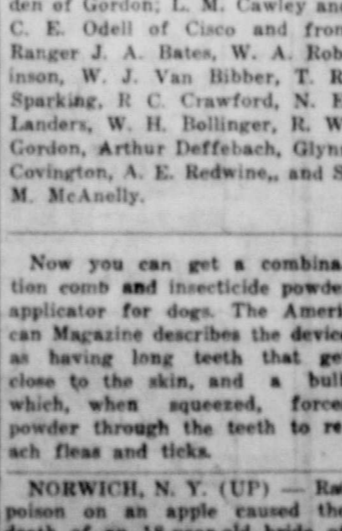

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### EMOTIONAL MATURITY NECESSARY TO SURVIVAL

NEW YORK, March 22 (UP)—Dr. Edward A. Strecker, Philadelphia's famed psychiatrist, today offered a formula for emotional maturity which he described as more important for survival than either the A-bomb or the H-bomb.

Strecker, head of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, said the formula is a combination of "disatisfaction with the status-quo, which calls forth aggressive constructive effort, and of social concern and effort."

Here are the personality traits he listed as essential in a talk at Cooper Union for emotional maturity:

1. The ability to stick to a job, to work on it, and to struggle through until it is finished, or until one has given all one has in the endeavor.
2. The quality of capacity of giving more than is asked or required in a given situation. Such is reliability.
3. Resistance to carry out a goal in the face of difficulties.
4. The endurance of difficulties, unpleasantness, discomfort, frustration, hardship.
5. The ability to size things up, make one's own decisions. This he said, implies a considerable amount of independence, and that a mature person is not dependent unless ill.
6. Determination, a will to achieve and succeed, a will to live.
7. The capacity to cooperate; to work with others, to work in an organization and under authority.
8. Flexibility, a person who can defer to time, other persons, circumstances.

Strecker said that whether a child reaches emotional maturity in adulthood depends much on his relationship with his mother.

"The attainment of emotional maturity for a larger and increasing number of our citizens is the most important consideration that I know of," he said. "It is important not only for the individual, but also, I think upon it, there depends the survival of our democracy."

"All in all, it is more important for our survival than the atomic or H bomb."

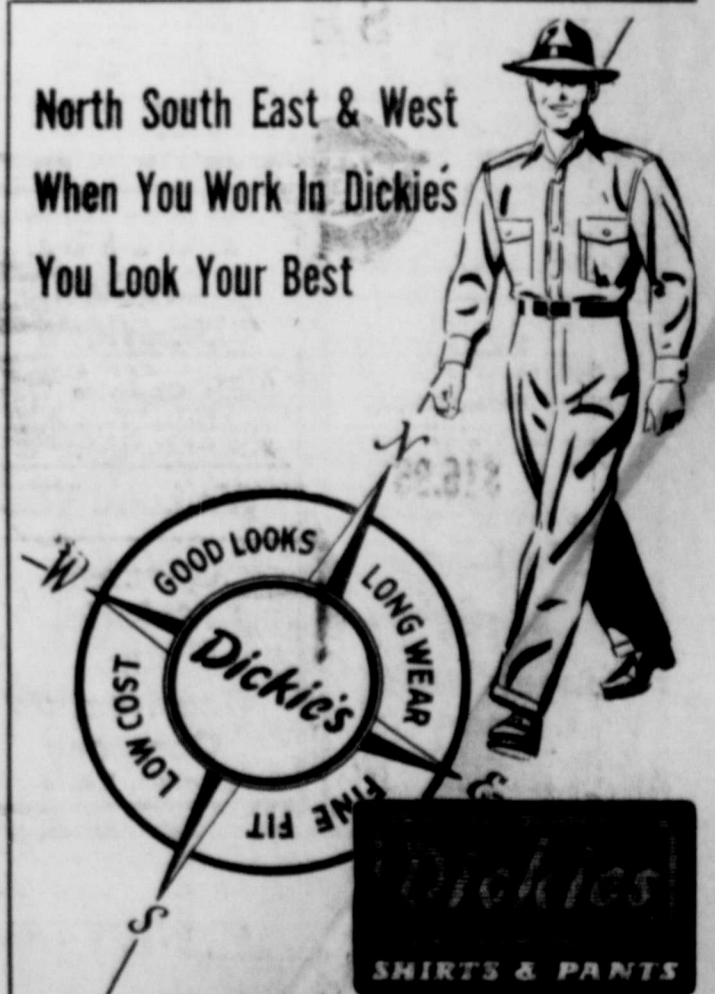

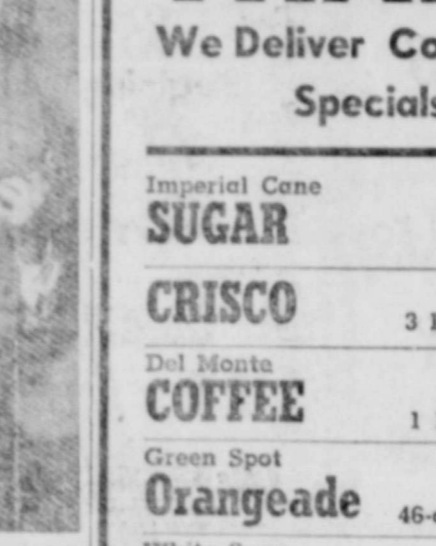

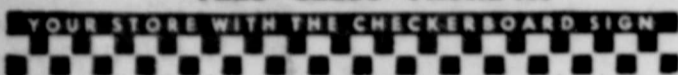
