Hippos Die From Lack Of Rain



In the Tanganyika Territory in Africa after two years of no rain, herds of hippopotami are dying in the ooze and slime of Lake Rukwa. When nature's cycle of weather is disrupted, man builds dams, constructs irrigation projects and uses various means of storing water for later use. But lower creatures are helpless before the whims of clouds and wind and heat. In the Rift Valley lies shallow Lake Rukwa, source of physical needs of a herd of hippopotami. In the top photo, trapped in the muddy ooze, the living hippos huddle with dead mates, too weak to struggle from the muddy trap. The lower photo shows the struggle for a few mouths of leaves and dry grass, this hippo has struggled to the dried shore miles away, and on the way back to the muddy grave collapsed in the searing heat. British Labor Leader Dies

LONDON, March 25. (UP)—The ruling labor party today mourned the death of one of its most influential leaders, Harold J. Laski, who thought Britain should be more friendly with the Soviet Union than with the United States.

The 56-year-old Laski died last night 48 hours after being stricken with bronchial pneumonia. In poor health for several months, he had been advised by his doctor to take a complete rest for six months.

He was chairman of the Labor Party in 1945-46 and had been a member of the Labor Party executive from 1936 until he retired last year.

Laski was leader of the leftist intellectual wing of the party and was most influential in formulating labor policy in the years leading up to the party's landslide victory in the 1945 general election.

Laski faded from the picture, however, as Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee and his moderate supporters gradually gained control of the party.

He frequently urged socialist Britain to work for closer friendship with the Soviet Union and in 1946 said:

"To those who say we have to choose—as I do not believe we have to choose—between the Soviet Union and the United States, with its passion for free enterprise that is not free and is not enterprise, we, the Labor Party, stand four-square behind the Soviet Union."

Source Of Foul Odor and Taste In Water Sought

Les Robinson of the State Health Department has been in Ranger making tests to determine what is causing the foul odor and taste in Ranger's city water supply.

Robinson stated today, according to Water Commissioner Addie Williams, that the odor and taste are coming from some kind of growth in the lake but just what it is will not be determined until tests of the water have been made.

Williams said that samples of water from various spots in the lake, from all vats in the purification plant and from city taps and that these have been sent to state laboratories at Austin to be tested. Williams said that Robinson has already tested the water for purity and that so far as that is concerned the water is fine.

Williams said that about one week for the tests to be run and reports made and when the cause of the trouble is discovered that it may take a week or longer to clear it up.



Bergman, Doctor Hit Snag On Money Accounts
