

Raft May Be Clue To Airmen's Fate

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, April 17 (UP) - Examination of a yellow life raft found by a British thip in the Baltic may prove a clue to the fate of 10 American airmen missing aboard a U. S. navy priva-teer patrol bomber.

The raft, its air supply bottle

The raft, its air supply bottle exhausted and its supply pockets open and empty, was picked up by the British freighter Beechland yeterday in the Baltic 45 miles thoust of Stockholm.






