### Diplomacy Enters Fishing Boat Case

TAMPICO, Mexico, April 26. (UP)—Action on five U. S. fishing boats interned here must await diplomatic exchanges between Mexico and the United States, the Mexican Navy said today.

Armed Mexican guards were removed from the boats yesterday after the United States made an official protest on their seizure. The foreign office in Mexico City promised a "quick reply."

The Mexican navy said the vessels might yet be confiscated if an investigation showed their crews had violated Mexican fishing laws.

### BULLET-MARKED WHEEL MAY BE FROM PRIVATEER

LONDON, April 26 (UP)—U. S. Naval authorities said today a bullet-marked air plane wheel found in the Baltic Sea could have come from the unnamed American privateer that disappeared with 10 men aboard after an attack by Soviet aircraft.

They said dimensions of the wheel, fished up in a salmon net about 100 miles southwest of Liepaja, Latvia, fitted exactly those of the small nose wheel of a privateer's tricycle landing gear.

Small anchor markings sealed on the wheel assembly under cellophane were identified by naval authorities as "identical with U. S. Naval insignia."

The wheel, its rim scarred with what Swedish authorities said looked like bullet marks, was hauled up in a salmon net by a Swedish fishing boat south of the island of Gotland yesterday. It was turned over to Swedish customs authorities.

Swedish authorities said the wheel was 90 centimeters in diameter, exactly the figure American Naval officials gave for the small privateer's nose wheel, 36 inches.

Attached was a Firestone tire and a shock absorber with an inspection plate bearing markings in English "23-3-1949 time test." A paper strip under cellophane bore the lettering "Seraft Aris Procurement Period" followed by the capital letters "NTI TY IN SP." Authorities said the lettering probably was a manufacturer's code.

Russia claimed an American bomber was fired upon when it violated the Soviet frontier over Liepaja, Latvia, and fired first on Soviet fighters.

The United States in a note said the only American plane in the area on that day—April 8—was the privateer and that it was unarmed. The U. S. charged that Russian fighter pilots opened fire on the privateer over open waters.

The wheel will be shipped to Africa for study by American intelligence officials.

The find was hauled up early Tuesday by the crew of a Soelversborg fishing boat at a point 100 miles due south of Burgsvik, on the southern point of Gotland Island.

Realizing the importance of the find, Capt. Anton Nilsson of the fishing boat immediately pulled up all his nets and headed for Burgsvik, the nearest port.

The wheel is the latest in a series of items found in the Baltic during the past ten days. Others included two yellow life rafts, one scorched by fire and perforated by what appeared to be bullets.

The five main events will have cash awards of \$500, and \$200 in cash awards will be given in the cutting horse contest and in the cowgirl sponsor contest.

The five main events will be bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bulldozing and calf roping. There will also be a calf scramble for 4-H club boys and FFA members.

Buck Steiner and Tommy Steiner of Austin will furnish the rodeo stock.

A program of improvements has been underway at the rodeo arena for sometime and promises to add much to the 1950 show.

### Animals For Show Not Restricted As To Breed

Animals shown at the Annual Eastland County Dairy Show at Firemen's Field in that city on April 28, need not be purebred or registered, according to A. Z. Myrick, Cisco President of the County Dairy Association.

Anyone in the county is invited to show their female animals to compete for a part of the \$300.00 cash money to be distributed to the winners. Besides Jerseys there will be classes for Holsteins and Guernseys. No classes are provided for bulls, Myrick said.

All 4-H Club and FFA boys as well as adults who believe they can tell good dairy animals are invited to participate in the judging contest. There will be ten cash prizes for the winners in each of the two divisions. M. D. Fox, Eastland, will have charge of the judging contests.

It will be strictly a classification show with R. E. Burleson, A&M College Extension Service, Dairy Specialist, doing the judging. The animals will compete for over \$200.00 in cash awards it was said.

Animals should be in their places by 10 o'clock that morning according to Travis Wheat, Eastland, General Chairman.

LeRoy Fry of the Agriculture Department of Abilene Christian College will speak to the group on importance of roughage to the dairy animal.

NEW YORK, April 26 (UP)—Margaret Truman's chances of singing with the Metropolitan Opera were ruled out today by Rudolf Bing, the Met's new general manager.

"She's a concert singer, not an opera singer," Bing said. "There is no prospect of her being with the Met."

He said there was no significance to the presence of Miss Truman's name on the list of official guests invited to view an oil painting by Rembrandt which the Met is offering for sale to build up its finances.

Bing said the President's daughter was invited simply as a guest of George A. Sloan, chairman of the board of the opera association.

### THREE REMODELED BUILDINGS AT RJC ADD TO CAMPUS APPEARANCE

Workers are putting the finishing touches on the remodeled Ranger Junior College Library, the Student Union building which has been completed and work is well underway at the new girls dormitory which will be ready for use in the summer term.

The library has been named Cooper Library in honor of O. R. Cooper of Tyler who gave the money for the rebuilding of the building and the building has been "dedicated to the memory of Lula Riddell Cooper and Carrie Powers Cooper by O. R. Cooper." The dedication is inscribed on a corner stone in the building which also carries the names of the board of trustees and officials of the school.

The library has been faced with a tan brick and wrought iron grill work has been added to the entrance of the building. The interior has also been finished. The walls have been done in a light cream and green.

plait tile blocks have been laid on the floors. Venetian blinds have been hung over the windows. In one end of the long building is the space for the book stacks and also a few tables for library work and in the other end are long reading tables around which are comfortable chairs. A work shop is in the end opposite the book stacks.

The Student Union building has already been finished and is in use. The attractive interior is done in two shades of blue and sky blue venetian blinds have been hung over the windows. Plastic and Chrome tables have also been placed in the building. Provision has been made for a kitchen and serving room which are to be equipped later. Cold drink boxes have been installed as has a juke-box.

Workmen are busy on the girls dormitory, which when completed will have accommodations for 20 girls. New furniture has been bought for the dormitory, and includes twin beds for the rooms, a highboy and dresser with chairs. Each room has a closet and two large bathrooms are being installed. Each room has hot and cold water with a lavatory.

In speaking of the improvements being made at the college, Dr. Boswell commented that the "nice thing about it all, is that we are doing it without going in debt." He also extended an invitation to the public to visit the college and see the improvements.

### San Antonio Gets Film Company

AUSTIN, Tex., April 26 (UP)—San Antonio may become the Hollywood of Texas.

The Texas Secretary of State's office yesterday issued a charter to a motion picture company which plans to set up permanent studios at San Antonio and produce 26 full-length movies.

M. R. Arnold will head the new company, incorporated at \$1,000 as Atlas Motion Pictures & Television Productions. Other incorporators were Henry S. Marasco and Kendall McClure.

Arnold said Jack Rabin, formerly of Los Angeles, would produce the company's first movie. Atlas releases will be distributed by Eagle - Lion, Republic and Film Classics, Arnold announced.

### Fair And Warmer Weather Is Due

Fair skies and rising temperatures appeared in prospect today for all of Texas after a rather cool night.

The Dallas weather bureau predicted fair and warmer for today with partly cloudy weather expected tomorrow. A gradual rise in temperatures was forecast after a cool day yesterday followed by a cool night.

Temperatures yesterday ranged from a maximum of 85 at Brownsville to 68 at Amarillo and 82 at San Antonio. Early today, the range was from 65 at Brownsville to 40 at Junction.

### Man Wanted For Forgery Sought By Officers

The man who was from Abilene had been working about ten days for the firm on which he passed the check. A \$30 check passed in Cisco was said by the firm head to be good. Head of the Abilene firm was in Eastland last night and redeemed the check passed there.

The man walked into Joseph's in Ranger Tuesday afternoon around 4 o'clock and selected a large bill of merchandise. He had proffered a \$250 check in payment. While he was still buying the merchandise, a call to the Abilene bank on which the check was drawn, was made and the fact established that the account on which the check was written did not have sufficient funds to cover it.

When the man again asked Joseph to accept the check in payment, Joseph told him that because of the size of the check he would have to check with the Abilene bank. He first agreed and then declined, taking cash from his pocket to pay for his purchases.

It was also reported that the man had attempted to cash the check at the Commercial State Bank and when told that the account would have to be checked, he declined, commenting that he would not want to put the bank to that trouble.

I was not until after the man had left Joseph's that it was learned that he had cashed the checks in Cisco and Eastland.

### COMMITTEE ACTS AFTER DEFENSE SECRETARY ADVISES OF NEED

#### New Peanut Bill Provisions Are Announced

Recent legislation as to the 1950 peanut acreage for all cooperatives has been condensed and released and the new farm bill provides the following stipulations:

1. Allows the grower the privilege of planting peanuts in excess of his allotment for crushing into oil and meal.
2. For the purpose of price support you will be considered a cooperator, if you did not exceed your 1947 picked and threshed acreage; and you will be entitled to support prices on your allotted acreage. A penalty will not be required on excess peanuts produced by a cooperator which are delivered to, or marketed through, an agency or agencies designated by the Secretary of Agriculture.
3. If the Secretary of Agriculture determines that the supply of any type of peanuts are insufficient, excess peanuts may be sold by such designated agencies or used for purposes other than crushing; and any profits derived therefrom will be distributed among growers of such type of excess peanuts.
4. Any acreage of peanuts harvested in excess of the allotted acreage for any farm, for any year, shall not be considered in the establishment of the allotment for the farm in succeeding years.
5. Markets will be available for excess peanuts grown by a cooperator.

Contact your County FMA officials for full particulars; as applied to your individual farm. Follow "The Seven Steps To Higher Yields and Greater Profits From Growing Peanuts," recently published by the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association.

### PLANS MADE FOR CHILEAN PRESIDENT'S VISIT

HOUSTON, Tex., April 27 (UP)—Chile's President Gabriel Gonzalez Videla will get his first glimpse of Texas hospitality Friday when his plane arrives at Houston's International Gateway Airport.

As soon as the Chilean executive gets off President Truman's personal plane at 8 p. m. CST, the series of receptions will start.

Mayor Oscar Holcombe and secretary of state John Ben Sheppard will head the official welcoming delegation. The Presidential Party will be escorted to the plush Shamrock Hotel for dinner with city and Chamber of Commerce officials and several prominent Houston citizens.

By noon Houston officials plan to have the visitors at the San Jacinto battlegrounds, 22 miles southeast of Houston, for an elevator trip to the top of the San Jacinto Monument.

After lunch aboard the Houston Port Commission yacht, the President and his party will be taken on a ride up the ship channel to Houston where Gonzalez Videla will hold a press conference at the Shamrock hotel at 4 p. m.

Another reception and dinner are scheduled for Saturday night. Sunday, the group will fly to Lubbock, Tex., for another whirl of tours, including a trip through the new multi-million dollar refinery at Levelland.

President Gonzalez Videla will examine irrigation projects around Lubbock before flying to New Orleans on Monday for the return trip to Chile.

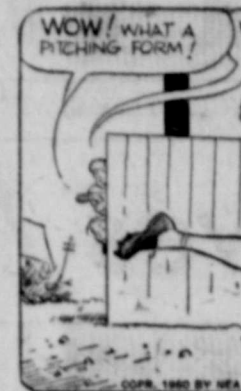

However, Dr. Mikus said, "It is proposed to continue the investigation of valley soils to determine whether it is possible for plants to accumulate selenium in poisonous amounts."

## Jewelry Robber Given Suspended Prison Sentence

PERRYTON, Tex., April 26 (UP)—A sympathetic jury last night suspended sentence for 24-year-old Lloyd Edwin Roberts, who said a feeling of sorrow for "poor people" at Christmas time caused him to stage a \$200,000 jewel robbery.

The district court jury found him guilty of burglary, for the Dec. 7 break-in at a Perryton drug store. The jury's verdict was five years, suspended.

Roberts still faced charges of theft in the same case. Two indictments were returned against him. The first was for burglary, the act of entering the drug store; the second for theft, the taking of the jewels, which had been left in sample cases overnight by traveling salesmen. The suspended sentence was on the first indictment. The haul of an estimated \$200,

000 worth of valuables was the biggest gem burglary in the Panhandle's history. Eight days later, Roberts led officers to a point on the Dallas Southside where about \$50,000 worth of the gems had been buried. Two days later, on a farm near Perryton, he led authorities to an abandoned hog wallow, where another \$150,000 of baubles had been secreted.

He testified that he was drunk when he broke into the drug store and was moved to the unlawful act because "I felt sorry for the poor people" as Christmas drew near.

**Flying Fugitive From Oklahoma To Surrender**

FORT WORTH, Tex., April 26 (UP)—Orval Lindsey Chambless, Oklahoma's flying fugitive, was to surrender today to the Tarrant county (Fort Worth) sheriff's office after losing his battle against extradition to the Sooner state.

Chambless' attorney said, however, he was not giving up the fight.

Gov. Allan Shivers, in a four minute hearing at Austin, yesterday ordered Chambless—a former bootlegger—turned over to Oklahoma authorities to begin serving a three-year sentence for manslaughter.

Chambless was not present and no testimony was heard.

Clifford Mays of Ft. Worth, attorney for Chambless, said he would continue to fight extradition, by asking a Texas district court to rule on the validity of the extradition papers.

But this was admittedly only a tactic to give Chambless time. "My client needs about 60 days to wind up his business affairs," said Mays. He said Chambless had been selling airplanes in Mexico and Central and South America.

Chambless fled to Texas after losing his appeal from a conviction and prison sentence on a manslaughter charge. He was picked up last week on an Oklahoma fugitive warrant at the Laredo Air Gateway, preparatory to crossing into Mexico.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced examinations for filling Mathematician, Chemist, Physicist, and Metallurgist positions in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. An examination has also been announced for the positions of Director of Research and Assistant Director of Research and the General Laboratories of the Philadelphia Quartermaster Depot, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, not later than May 23, 1950.

The salaries for Mathematician range from \$5,825 to \$10,000 a year, and for Chemist, Physicist, and Metallurgist, from \$4,600 to \$10,000. No written test will be required of applicants for these positions. To qualify, they must meet a basic requirement of appropriate education or experience or a combination of education and experience, depending upon the position for which application is made. In addition, they must have had professional experience in the appropriate field.

The position of Director of Research pays \$10,000 a year, and that of Assistant Director of Research, \$8,800. To qualify for these positions, applicants must have completed an appropriate 4-year college course or 4 years of appropriate experience, or a combination of such education and experience. In addition, they must have had 3 years of broad professional experience in physical science, including or supplemented by at least 2 years of experience in an administrative capacity. No written test is required.

Detailed information about the requirements, as well as application forms, may be obtained from the Commission's Local Secretary, Mr. O. L. McDonald located at Eastland Post Office, from civil-service regional offices, and from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications for Mathematician, Chemist, Physicist, and Metallurgist will be accepted in the Commission's Washington office until further notice; however, persons who wish to receive early consideration should have their applications on file not later than May 23, 1950.

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—American Communists publicly admitted today that their membership is declining and their party organization is badly shaken.

Registered party members probably do not exceed 47,000 this year.

The admission came in the published report of last month's New York meeting of the National Committee of the Communist Party, U. S. A. that is the party's official style.
