Predicts Boom For Television

BOSTON, May 9. (UP)—Television manufacture will rank among the nation's 10 top industries within two years with a value close to \$2,000,000,000 (B), an industry spokesman predicted today.

Ilan F. Cramer, vice-president of the Allen B. Du Mont Laboratories, Inc., in a talk before some 40 Boston TV dealers. Television investment already has reached \$2,500,000,000 (B), Cramer said, with manufacturers expecting a rise to \$4,500,000,000 (B) by the end of the year. He said that industry was producing 5,000,000 sets which will stimulate business activity as much as 15 per cent as an advertising medium.

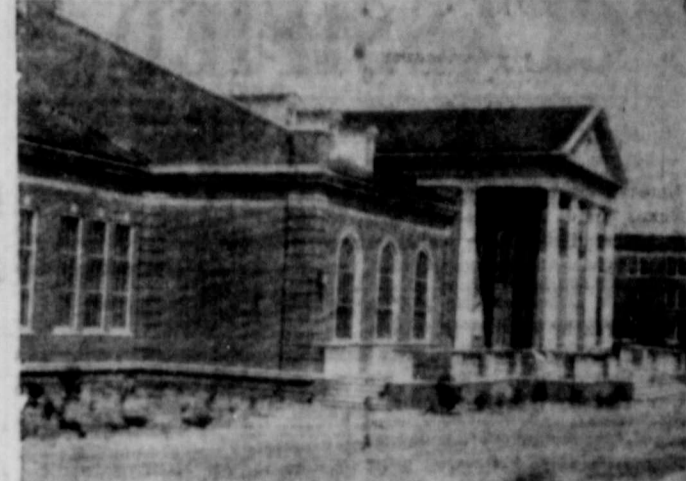
