Turkish Democrats Claim Big Victory In Parliament Vote

(UP)-The Turkish Democratic party claimed an overwhelming victory today in the general election of 487 members of Parliament.

President Kenal Attaturk's republic People's Party was trailing in the contest for control of the one-house parliament. The party, founded by Kemal Attaturk is 1923, long had held firm control over the house.

Official returns gave the democrats 24,116 votes to the prp's


