

South Part East'd Gets Sewer Line

Old Sewage Beds To Be Used For Burying Trash Disposal

Work on the new sewer pipe line, connecting the south part of Eastland to the disposal plant, has been completed and tie-in to the main line was made this week.

Installed at a cost of approximately \$5,500, the line makes it possible to cover the old sewage beds located southeast of town on the branch of the Leon River.

Included in the installation of the 2,200 feet of line is a pump house and a separator unit. The pump house is equipped with two centrifugal automatic pumps that boost the refuse on to the plant. The separator unit is enclosed in a 16 foot deep trench. Both units are cemented throughout to prevent leakage.

SAVED \$2,500

By using bricks from the old incinerator east of town and personnel from the regular city employees, Eastland saved some \$2,500 on the project. It took about two months to complete the installation.

The old sewage beds will be used for trenches to bury the refuse picked up by the city trash trucks and will save the city another \$1,000 in trench fees. It will take a year to fill in the old sewage beds and \$1,000 per year to dig trenches.

ALL OF CITY SERVED

The new line will carry approximately 10 per cent of the sewage for Eastland. The area it serves was the only part of the city not being served by the disposal plant, and installation of the line furnishes a sanitary outlet for all of the city.

OPERATION OF PLANT

The plant is located a half mile east of Eastland on the south to filter the liquids out into the creek after they have been pumped, and one to dry the solids. The branch of the Leon Creek. There

and two large sewage beds—one when the refuse arrives at the plant it goes into a large sphob tank. There the solids are cured 60 days and liquid seeped off.

The liquid is then pumped into another tank and when this tank is full, automatic plungers are released and the water is sprayed into the air from several jets, coming down on a bed of sand and gravel to filter into the creek.

FUTURE PLANS

Plans to enlarge the Embhoff tank are now being considered due to the fact that it was designed to take care of only a portion of the population now using it.

The Nation's first Armed Forces Day will be observed Saturday, May 20, according to the President of the United States. Designed to honor the Armed Forces, it replaces the separate services observed in the past.

With the slogan, "Teamed for Defense", the theme for the observance is a report to the public on the state of national defense with the underlying emphasis that only through the support and understanding of the public can the service carry out its assigned roles.

The two-fold purpose of Armed Forces Day will be to familiarize the American public with the state of defense and to encourage public attention to the service on the occasion.

Armed Forces Day will be marked throughout the country and at military installations overseas. Parades, balls, luncheons, dinners, mass meetings, and other special events, have been scheduled in principal cities.

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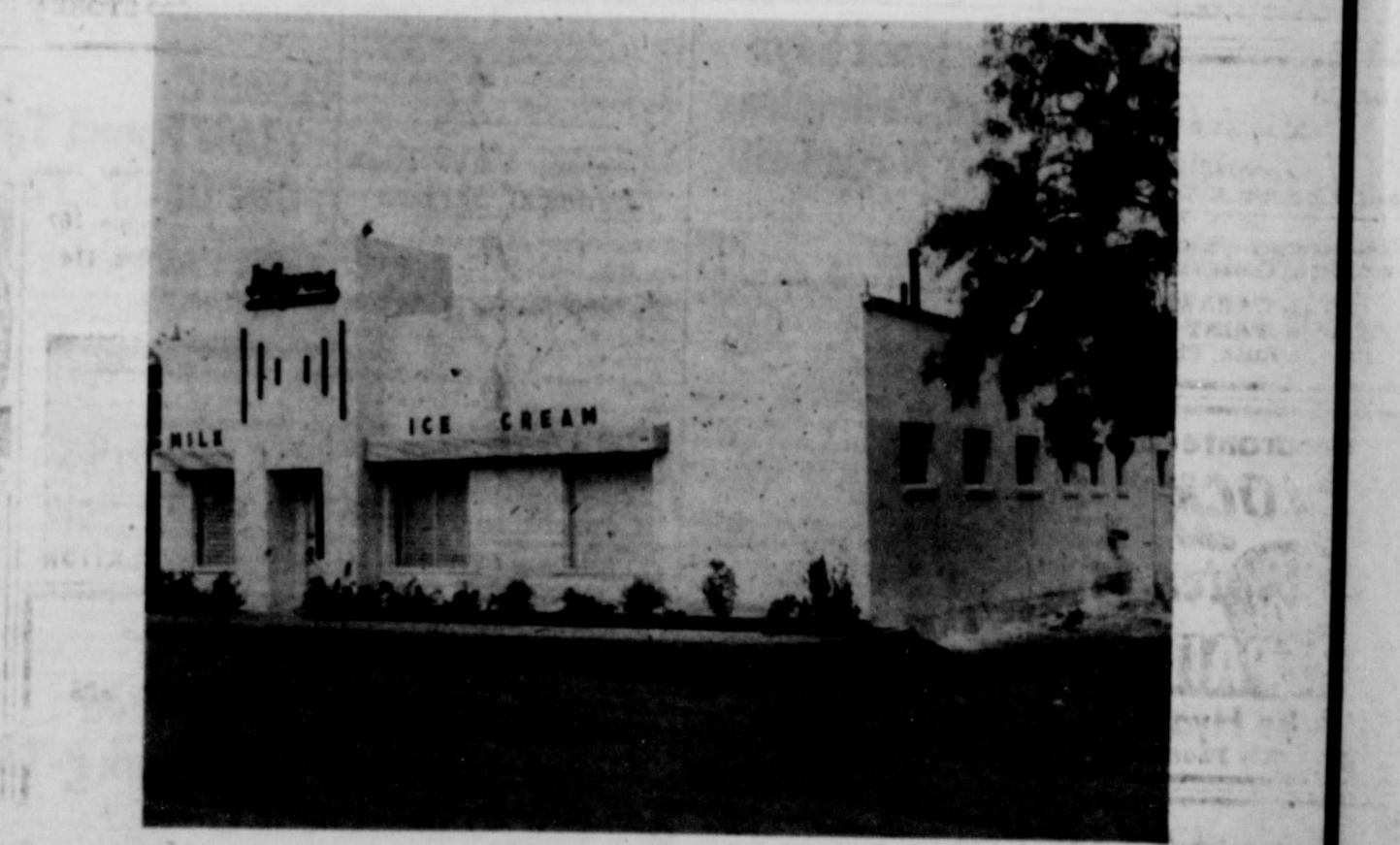

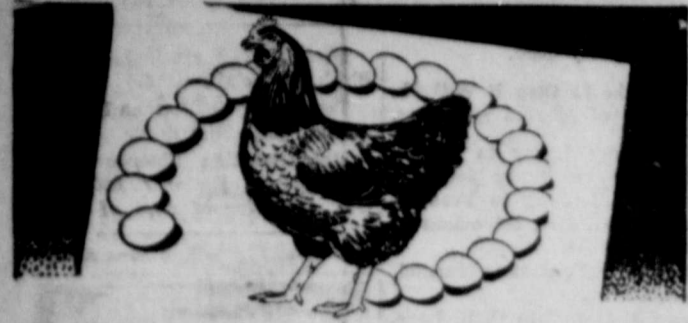

Clutch Pedal Going Out As Firms Convert

DETROIT, May 19 (UP) — The clutch pedal, faster than many motorists realize, is going the way of the old starting crank. Auto companies which have the automatic transmissions can't produce them fast enough. Those which haven't developed shiftless mechanisms of their own are burning midnight oil to catch up.

Most people buying cars on which the completely automatic devices are available choose them. Nearly 99 per cent of Cadillac buyers order hydraulic, for Oldsmobile and Pontiac, the figures are 90 and 65 per cent.

Packard's ultramatic and Buick's Dynaflo are installed on 85 per cent of these cars. Chevrolet, first low-priced car with an automatic transmission, reports a "tremendous demand" for its powerglide. After some tricky production difficulties, the General Motors division has started to double its 1,000 a day powerglide output.

Nash, Kaiser-Frazer and Lincoln offer hydra-matic, bought from GM and Hudson, too, reportedly will make such a move. Studebaker's automatic transmission is just becoming available on its higher-priced models. Month ago, Ford Motor Co. announced development of a torque converter transmission which it will build in conjunction with Borg-Warner. But it will be late summer or early fall before Mercurs, then Ford cars will feature the shiftless device.

Some Dodge models and DeSoto and Chrysler cars have semi-automatic shifting devices, used with fluid drive. But these still have clutch pedals.
