Bradley said the United States and its allies, in a few years, "May have to face the reality of Russian atomic stren-

"The United States may be able to stay ahead in the number of A-bombs, he said, but the Rusians "will probably tating blow at any area they propoe to strike."

When that time comes, he said, he was sure the United States would not have any part of "appeasement at the Elbe."

He was equally certain that this country will not "pull back into a gopher hole of isolation and leave our friends in Europe at the mercy of the atomic

He also said he does not believe the United States and its allies will "be lured by the siren song of preventive war which can only lead us and our friends into chaos and destruct-

Bradley said his four-point proposal was a "choice for freedom through continued

"It callla for unselfishness. and may even require new measures that encourage the greater good, in place of any selfish advantage," he said. "But it is all within the power

of this nation. "If we can mobolize our forces for war, then we can certainly mobolize now our po-

tentian for peace.' The program, he said, should be coupled with increased production conducted with total diplomacy and backed up with adequate armed forces.

"In this way, our defense plans can be part of our strategy for a lasting peace," Brad-ley said. "We can disrupt and break up the Soviet design. We can create order out of dis-order. We can deny the influence of Communist slavery.

War On Flies To Start In State

AUSTIN, May 19 (UP)—The State Health Department next week inaugurates its own "five-yean plan" against flies.

Testing ground will be the Seguin and Sinton-Taft areas, picked after a study of Diarrhea and Dysentery mortality statistics of numerous Texas communities.

Measures to eliminate fly breeding areas will be practiced for a period of from three to five years, State Health Officer George W. Cox announced.

Limitations of funds, personnel and equipment forced the health department to restrict its experiments to the two sections, described as having a population range near 10,000.

The "pilot fly control project" is aimed principally at learning methods of reducing the high mortality rate from Dysentery and Diarrhea among children under two years of age.

South Part Eastl'd Gets Sewer Line

Old Sewage Beds To Be Used For Burying Trash Disposal

Work on the new sewer pipe line, connecting the south part of Eastland to the disposal plant, has been completed and tie-in to the main line was made this week. Installed at a cost of approximately \$5,500 ,the line

makes it possible to cover the old sewage beds located southeast of town on the branch of the Leon River. Included in the installation of the 2,200 feet of line is a pump house and a seperator unit. The pump house is equipped with two centrifugal automatic pumps that boost the refuge on to the plant. The seperator unit is enclosed in a 16 foot deep trench. Both units are cemented throughout to prevent leakage.

By using bricks from the old incinerator east of town and personnel from the regular city emplant it goes into a large emhoff tank. There the solids are cured to the control of the contr two months to complete the in-

The old sewage beds will be uspicked up by the city trash trucks and will save the city another \$1,-000 in trench fees. It will take year to fill in the old sewage ds and \$1,000 per year to dig

ALL OF CITY SERVED

The new line will carry approxtake care of only a portion of the sewage for Eastland. The area it serves was the only part of the city not being served by the disposal plant, and installation of the line furnishes a sanitary outlet for all of the city.
