## Kansas City Grand Jury Indictes Two

### One Is Against Past Legislation

WASHINGTON, May 22 (UP)—A special Kansas City federal grand jury investigating crime has indicted two persons, one a former member of the Missouri Legislature, on charges of income tax evasion, the Justice department announced today.

Attorney General J. Howard McGrath said indictments were returned against Samuel C. Hayden, Kansas City attorney and former member of the state legislature, and Thomas Locooco, also of Kansas City.

The grand jury previously described Hayden and Locooco in a previous report as among 15 partners in Kansas City's largest gambling operations. Hayden was indicted on charges of evading taxes of \$1,023.80 on his 1948 income; Locooco on charges of evading taxes of \$28,057.84 for the years 1944 through 1948.

In its previous report, the grand jury said Hayden and Locooco were members of a gambling operation which operated under the name of Town Recreation and in less than a year netted almost \$200,000, the report said.

Others who held an interest in the outfit included Charles Binaggio, Democratic chairman, and his first lieutenant, Charles Gargotta, who recently were slain by unknown gunmen.

The indictment against Hayden was in one count and he, if convicted, would face maximum penalties of \$10,000 in fines, or five years in prison or both. The Locooco indictment carried five counts and upon conviction, he would face maximum penalties of \$50,000 in fines, or 25 years imprisonment or both.

## Rayburn, Others To Get Degrees

SHERMAN, May 22 (UP)—Honorary degrees will be bestowed upon five persons, including House Speaker Sam Rayburn, of Bonham, at Austin college's centennial commencement exercises here tonight.

The college, celebrating its 100th year, will also dedicate the Hughey Memorial gymnasium and the Paul Coffin Memorial dormitory at ceremonies today.

The school, described as the only Texas college which has operated for a full century under its original charter and identity, began its centennial celebration yesterday.

In addition to Speaker Rayburn, degrees will be conferred upon J. Leighton Stuart, American Ambassador to China; Louis Calder, New York City, developer of the southern pine newspaper industry at Lufkin; Houston Harte, San Angelo publisher; and Ewell D. Walker, assistant superintendent of Dallas public schools and father of Donal Walker, former Southern Methodist grid star.

## Eastland Man Dies Sunday

Rufus Inman Malone, 68, a native of Tennessee, died Sunday at 6:20 p. m. at his home in Eastland. He had been ill for two years.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon in the First Christian Church with the pastor, J. B. Blunk, officiating. Burial will be in Eastland.

Mrs. Malone had been an employee of the Texas Electric Service Co. for the past 40 years and a resident of Eastland since 1880. Survivors include the widow; one daughter, Mrs. Wayne Cason of Eastland; two sons, Raymond and Harold, both of Los Angeles, California; two brothers, Oscar and Gentry, both of Fort Worth; and a sister, Mrs. Jessie Gargrove, also of Fort Worth.

## Nationalists Say Will Not Participate

TAIPEI, Formosa, May 22 (UP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek said today the Chinese Nationalists will not take part in a projected Eastern Hemisphere Conference at Baguio, unless the participating governments take a firm anti-Communist stand.

The Philippine government has announced that India, Australia, Pakistan, Indonesia and perhaps Thailand and Ceylon have accepted its invitation to discuss mutual problems. The parley is expected to open next Friday.

In a letter to Philippine President Elpidio Quirino, Chiang said the conference platform has failed to affirm last year's pledge that the Chinese and Filipino governments will collaborate in fighting Communism in Asia.

Nationalist China and South Korea were not invited to the conference because the other Asiatic nations would not even discuss an armed anti-Communist alliance, according to Manila reports.

The Nationalist navy announced today it repelled a Communist transport which tried to land troops on Chingchow Island, near Hong Kong, last Saturday. The ship was sunk with the 143 Communist casualties, the navy said.

## Forty-Three To Fight For Places In Race

INDIANAPOLIS, May 22 (UP)—Forty-three drivers will fight next week end for the 11 remaining starting berths for the 500-mile Memorial Day speedway race classic here.

Thirty-three cars have qualified, 11 of them making the grade this week end at speeds up to 132.910 miles an hour on a 10-mile average.

A brick breeze cut down the anticipated field of qualifiers over Saturday and Sunday as drivers ran test laps and then refused to buck the wind on the official qualifying runs.

The week end's trials are the final dates for qualifying for the big race that will draw thousands of spectators May 30. Cecil Green of Oklahoma City, Okla., ran the fastest four laps around the two and a half mile, four-curve oval over this week end. He averaged 132.910 MPH on Saturday. Myron Fohr of Milwaukee, Wis., averaged 131.714 MPH Sunday.

Other qualifiers over the week end were: Duane Carter, Detroit, 131.666; Bayless Leverett, Glendale, Calif., 130.928; Paul Russo, Hammond, Ind., 130.790; Walt Brown, Massapequa, Long Island, N. Y., 130.454; Spiden Webb, Dayton, O., 129.748; Henry Banks, Compton, Calif., 129.644; Jerry Hoyt, Indianapolis, 129.520.

The 22cars qualified to date averaged 131.185 MPH, compared with about 128 MPH of the starting field last year.

## US Arrests Two Russians

FRANKFURT, Germany, May 22 (UP)—Two Russians, a lieutenant and a sergeant, were arrested by U. S. Military Police today for violating restrictions on members of the Soviet Military Mission here.

Army officials said the two were arrested for being outside the limitations set for members of the Russian Mission.

All 14 members of the mission were placed under restrictions last week after the Russians limited the travel of Western Military Missions at Potsdam and Berlin.

U. S. authorities notified the Russians they could travel, only between their homes and their offices, both situated in a block-square fenced area on the outskirts of Frankfurt.

The Russians, traveling in a German-built car, were arrested as they returned to mission headquarters. Witnesses said the car was halted by a military policeman, who approached it with drawn revolver.

## County Authorities Still Continuing Fight to Get Ray

FORT WORTH, Tex., May 22 (UP)—Tarrant county authorities meet today to plan new strategy in their fight to uphold the death sentence of William Keith Ray, convicted child rapist.

Ray was doomed to die in the electric chair last Friday for the rape of a nine-year-old Ft. Worth school girl, but his sentence was commuted 20 days when the child's parents asked for mercy.

They told the state board of pardons and paroles they felt "life imprisonment for Ray will be more punishment than death in the electric chair."

District Attorney Stewart Hellman said numerous callers had protested the commutation. He urged them to express their feelings to the pardon board.

"This is society's fight, not the fight of one family," Hellman said.

## Six Injured In 2 Dallas Plane Crashes, Sun.

DALLAS, May 22 (UP)—Six persons were injured, three of them critically, yesterday in two plane crashes near Dallas.

Arthur Jefferson Perry, 34, and his wife, Lela Mae, 30, were still on the critical list in a Dallas hospital after their light, rented plane stalled and nosed into the ground while they were circling a house east of Dallas.

Harvey Barnett, 20, was reported in "fair" condition at Medical Arts Hospital, where he was undergoing treatment for injuries suffered when a four-passenger plane in which he was riding nosed over at Skyline Airport on a landing attempt.

Three other persons aboard the plane were treated for minor injuries and released. They were pilot Ross Kiddy, Louis Lockler and Frank Beer, all of Dallas.

## Koo Admits Is Unfortunate; Explains More

DEBROIT, May 22 (UP)—Chinese Nationalists ordered evacuation of two strategic island bases this spring to conserve military supplies, Ambassador Wellington Koo said today.

He said the loss of the islands, Chusan and Hainan, was "unfortunate but not a cause for despair."

"The serious military reverses sustained by the National army in the period of October, 1948, to October, 1949, resulting in the loss of the mainland to the Communists were due to many reasons, including financial stress, political deterioration, and perhaps poor logistics," the Nationalist envoy said.

"The recent evacuation of Hainan and Chusan islands, however, were ordered by the Nationalist high command for the purpose of conserving the limited amount of military supplies to better defend Formosa, the seat of the National government."

He termed the strategy of the Nationalists "understandable in view of the American refusal to give more aid."

Koo said Nationalist China wanted light arms, ammunition and technical assistance from the United States, not soldiers.

Koo compared the Nationalists' announced plan to defend Formosa to the end to the "trying days" after the Allies lost the Maginot line and Dunkirk in World War II.

He told the Detroit economic club that Formosa, lying on the trade route between Japan and southwest Asia, is of common interest to anti-Communist countries defending Japan and Korea from aggression.

"It was from Formosa that the Japanese militarists launched their attacks on the Philippines," he reminded.

Warning that "thousands of government agents of the Soviet Union have gone to Communist China and taken up their assigned work in the guise of technicians, artists and scientists," Koo asked that the Atlantic Pact Nations note the relationship of Communist expansion in Asia to the Cold War in Europe.

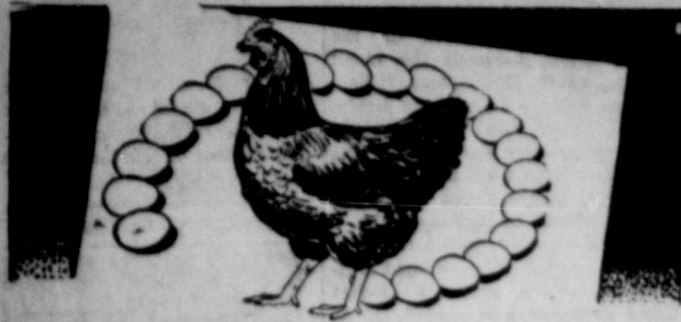
